Cross Plains Council postponed action for at least two weeks Tuesday on a telephone rental increase request by Kizer Telephone Company.

George Culler of Dallas, the company's accountant, presented Kizer's case with facts and figures. He said, "All we ask is a fair rate of return enabling us to show a profit." Culler continued that more exchanges of comparable size operate at a six to seven per cent return, but that Kizer was asking only a four and one-half per cent return. Ralph Kizer listed rising wages and state taxes and material costs as reasons for the hike request.

It has been announced by the county ASCS office that a meeting to explain the new cotton and wheat programs in detail will be held in Baird tonight, Thursday. The session will start at 7 p.m. in the 42nd District Courtroom in the courthouse.

Details regarding the transfer of upland cotton allotments were released this week by Tommie Harris of Cross Plains, chairman of the Callahan Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation County Committee.

The question which will permit transfer of allotments outside of the county but within the state will be voted on Tuesday in a cotton referendum on marketing quotas, but has no connection with the latter.


