Bowden Low Bidder For \$106,008 'Playground'

Bowden Lumber Company of Cross Plains was apparent low bidder on a new recreational center to be built midway between this city and Rising Star. Site is that of the old Lake-wood Country Club.

A bid of \$106,008, tendered by Gerald Bowden, owner of the local concern, was the lowest of seven submitted and opened at the City Hall in Rising Star Monday at 4 p.m.

A spread of \$75,992 separated the low and high bids. Proposals, in the order of their opening at Monday afternoon's session were as follows: (1) Anderson Construction Company of Abilene \$182,000, (2)

Rose Construction Company of Abilene \$130,000, (3) Herman Bennett Company of Brownwood \$132,747, (4) Burk Construction Company of San Angelo \$143,739, (5) W. B. Abbott & Company of Lubbock \$162,400, (6) Hawkins & Westbrook of Abilene \$163,900 and (7) Bowden Lumber Company of Cross Plains \$106,008.

R. D. (Bob) Needham convened directors in session immediately following Monday afternoon's bid-opening and conferred with the engineering firm of Yeatts and Decker of Abilene, which had been retained to draw specifications, and with representatives of

the Farm Home Administration, federal agency through which construction funds are being obtained.

It was expected Monday afternoon that 180 days for completion of the contract would be allowed after official letting. Previously only 120 days had been mentioned, however, a late addendum to bidders specified the longer time.

Improvements planned at the 69-acre recreational center tract include a swimming pool, nine-hole golf course with watered greens and fairways, spacious clubhouse, reunion and camping facilities providing water, sewer and electrical out-

lets, a lighted putting links and playground equipment for children.

Directors of Lakewood Recreational Center are: Needham of Cross Plains; James Rutherford, secretary, of Rising Star; Dave C. Lee and Luther Forbes of Cross Plains, and W. E. Tyler, Jack Jackson and A. A. (Banta) White of Rising Star.

\$112,000 Loan
In addition to local officers and directors attending Monday afternoon's bid-opening, others from Cross Plains were: Bowden, C. C. Westerman, Alton Hornsby, J. C. Claborn, Fred Tunnell and Jack Scott.

A \$112,000 loan for construction of the recreational project was made through the Eastland office of the Farm Home Administration, of which Homer Cole is administrator. Local member on the board is Oscar Schaefer of Sabanno, who explained that recently broadened objectives of the FHA had made the loan possible. It is a directive which spelled out assistance to non-profit organizations in small country towns battling the problems of stagnation and deterioration.

Local Support

To assure local support and meet FHA requirements, 237 families from the Cross Plains and Rising Star areas paid \$20 fees in advance to assure patronage during the first months of operation. Facilities at the center, though, will be open to the entire public. There will be no membership. Charges will be assessed for the privileges used.

Needham said Monday night that a lot of people in several communities had worked long and diligently to advance the recreational center thus far and that he was grateful for the spirit of neighborly cooperation manifested by so many.

"I believe we will all be proud of the results when the recreational center is finished," he concluded.

\$4,200 Mistletoe Market Will Close Here Thursday

An estimated \$4,200 would be paid for mistletoe at the purchasing station in Cross Plains before ceasing operation at close of business Thursday, according to Robert Lubke of Comanche, station manager here.

"We had bought about 30,000 pounds which runs approximately \$2,100 although the rain last week halted gathering three days," Lubke said late Monday afternoon. He continued, "We expect to buy that much more before shutting down."

The plant here, which began buying the Christmas decoration late last month, is a sub-station of the Schuster Circle X Ranch of Comanche, one of the nation's leading mistletoe suppliers. Lubke said that the mistletoe purchased here would be sold primarily in the New England states.

Some of the Yuletide accessory is packed in the Cross Plains station for shipment to the northern market in boxed quantity lots. Some, however, is trucked to Comanche where it is readied for market packed in a one and one-half ounce

package. Bulk mistletoe is trucked from purchasing points to Dallas where it is flown to cities in the North. Buying stations are also located in Comanche and Goldthwaite.

"Quality of the mistletoe is generally better than it was last year," Lubke stated. Majority of it is not coming from the immediate Cross Plains area this year. The local manager said that it is being brought here from the Oplin, Clyde and Lawn areas with some being brought from as far as 25 miles south of Coleman.

Biggest single day to Monday afternoon was last Saturday when 3,000 pounds was bought here. Lubke said, however, that days this week were expected to closely rival last Saturday's production.

RAIN SHOWERS TOTAL .74 INCH LAST WEEK

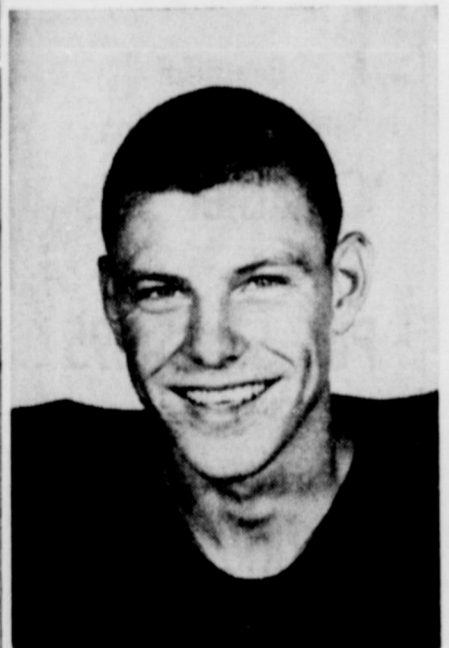

Meeting Beginning At Revival Center

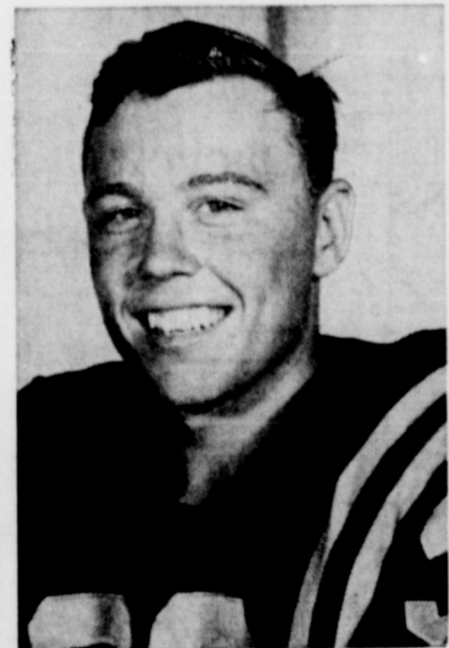

Services will be held each night beginning at seven o'clock.

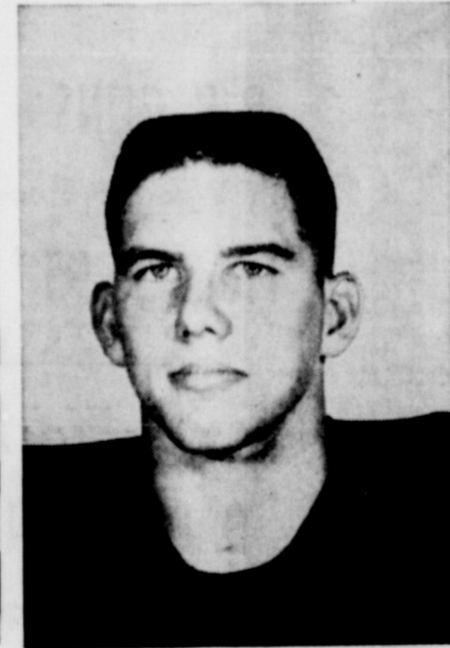

Last rental increase allowed was in 1959 when the company installed free dialing service between Cross Plains and Rising Star. Kizer bases its current appeal on figures released by the company's accountant which ascertained that for fiscal years ending March 31, 1964 and 1965, the system showed a 2.8 and 2.4 per cent return. However, during the first two quarters of this year, April through September, the company showed 7 of one per cent return.

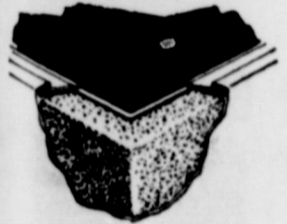

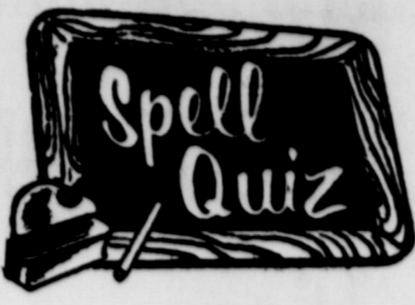
Postmaster Gives Yule Mail Advice

"One of the biggest problems that postal employees face is illegible writing," said Postmaster Lloyd Bryan yesterday, "and at Christmas time, when volume skyrockets, this can become quite a problem."

Bryan urged that patrons be especially careful to write names and addresses plainly and to use ZIP codes. "Poor wrapping of packages is another encumbrance of Christmas mail handling," Bryan continued. Parcels are generally shipped in mail bags and often heavier items rest on top. Care should be taken in wrapping to prevent contents from being crushed.

"All parcels should be addressed on only one side and have the address written somewhere inside the package in case the exterior wrapping should be torn away."

Bryan suggests that packages should be sent by insured mail.
