

Teachers Added; 3 Aids Will Be Hired By Trustees Monday

Three new teachers — Mrs. Truett Jones, Mrs. Ross Rowlett and Mrs. Billy Pope, — have been employed by the board of trustees and will begin the remedial instruction Monday. Three teachers aids will also be employed at a board meeting Monday night and begin work immediately thereafter, assisting the newly-elected teachers and other instructional personnel in specific assigned functions.

The funds made available to Cross Plains Schools for this purpose come through enactment of the Elementary and Secondary School Education Act of 1965, passed by the current Congress.

It is expected that 126 students here will gain additional instruction and more individual attention of teachers in correcting weakness in the two subjects.

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County Stock Show Here This Week End

A total of 327 entries will compete for \$1,400 in prize money in Callahan County Junior Livestock Show in Cross Plains Friday and Saturday. The 12th annual exposition will be held in the county-owned showbarn, one mile north of town on State Highway 206.

Judging will begin Friday morning at 9 a.m. with the classing of poultry entries by Marvin Weber of Abilene. This will be followed at 9:30 by judging of rabbits by Byron Wilson, also of Abilene. Goats are to be judged at 10 o'clock, breeding sheep at 11 and fat lambs at 1:30 p.m., all by Jim Gray of San Angelo, Texas Extension Service's animal husbandryman.

Saturday's schedule calls for judging to begin at 9 a.m. with the classing of dairy cattle. This will be done by Sterling Lindsey, Coke County farm agent, who will judge all events Saturday except horses. At 10 the judging of swine will get underway. Saturday afternoon's judging will start with the classing of horses by Don McDonald of Abilene. The judging of beef heifers will start at 2 o'clock and fat steers at 2:30. Entries are to be in place by 8:30 a.m. each day.

Albany Man Enters Race For House Job

John E. Musselman, Jr., former manager of the Albany Chamber of Commerce and member of a pioneer West Texas ranching family, announced this week he will be a candidate for the Democratic nomination to the Texas House of Representatives from the 63rd District.

Musselman's announcement came on release of the news that Rep. Wayne Gibbens of Breckenridge, House member from the 63rd since 1961, was resigning to go to Washington to operate the new Texas Liaison office.

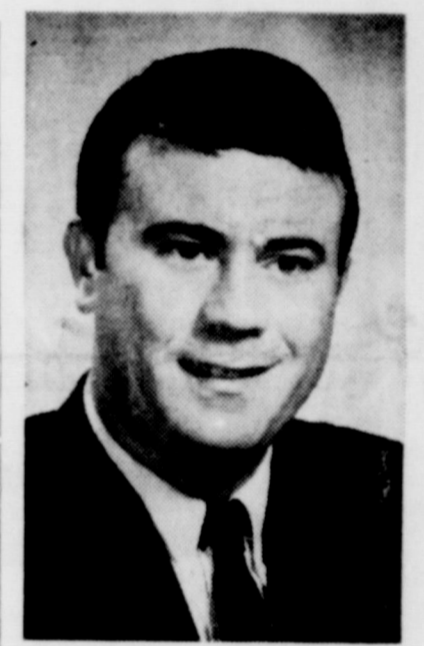
Musselman, who said he will file formally for the office within a few days, praised Rep. Gibbens' long service in the House. "I hope I can give our portion of West Texas the same able, energetic representation Rep. Gibbens has provided," he said.

Musselman, 24, is the son of a Shackelford County ranch couple and grandson of Mrs. Henry Green and the late Mr. Green who were among the earliest settlers of this area. His paternal grandfather was the late Claud Musselman of Paris, Tex., theater owner who had movie interests in various West Texas cities.

Musselman attended Albany public schools and was graduated from Lawrenceville Preparatory School in New Jersey with an outstanding record. He was a letterman in football and track, president of the chapel board, president of his dorm, president of the dramatic club and business manager of the student newspaper.

He has had three years work at the University of Texas toward a law degree.

Callahan County Oil Activity On Increase

A proposed 4,000 feet Lake Sand Wildcat rotary project 10 miles southeast of Baird heads increased oil activity in Callahan County.

The venture is C. W. Gore of Albany No. 1 Jim Hatchett.

Location is 4,950 feet from the north and 330 feet from the east lines of Section 31, D&DA Survey.

The lease is composed of 240 acres.

A Moutray Sand test, the No. 7 Mrs. Max Logan by R. R. Bloomer and Skinner Corp of Abilene, is slated for 1,550 feet seven miles southeast of Clyde. It spots 1,135 feet from north and 760 feet from west lines of Section 28, BBB&C Survey.

Arcadia Refining Co. of Tyler has staked a 600-foot regular field test two miles northeast of Putnam as the No. 13 L. Williams. Site is 1,400 feet from the south and east lines of TE&L Survey.

Arcadia has also applied to drill two water injection wells two and one-half miles southwest of Cross Plains. Both are slated for 380 feet on the Wade McDaniel lease spotting in Lot 56 of Comal CSL Survey.

Decisions Face Cotton Farmers

J. C. Earp, office manager of Callahan County ASCS office in the courthouse at Baird, reminds that final date to buy, sell or lease cotton allotments has passed for the current crop year.

"The important decision facing growers now is to determine if cotton is to be planted this Spring. Failure to either plant or release cotton acreage in 1966 will result in allotments being about one-half next year, Earp said.

There are a number of ways that cotton history may be protected, Earp pointed out. He suggested, though, that growers contact his office for particulars.

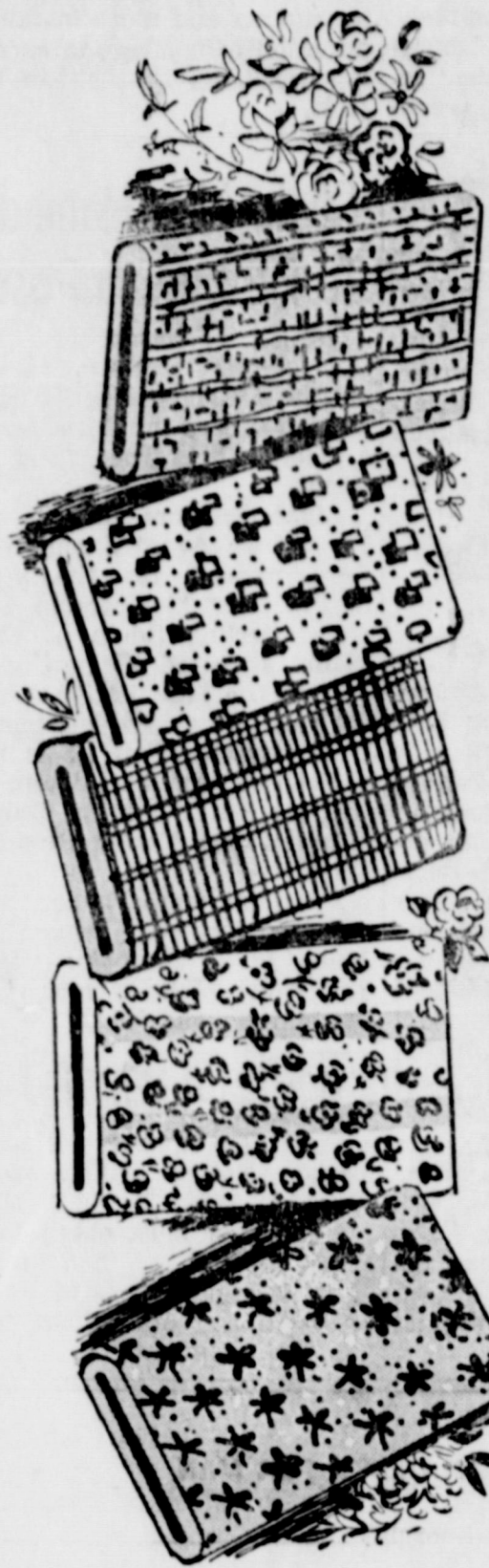

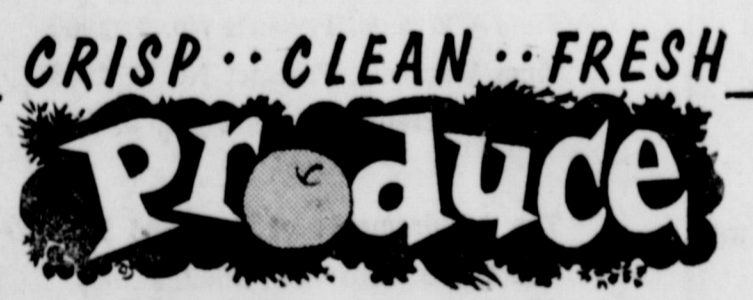

Business population in Callahan County was up seven per cent the first of January over the same time in 1965.

According to a physical count by the Fort Worth office of Dun & Bradstreet, Inc., there were 137 manufacturers, wholesalers and retailers in this county in January 1965 as com-

pared to 147 this year, an increase of 10.

Clyde Leads

Clyde led the business expansion, but no city showed a loss. The west side city gained nine new firms raising its business population from 34 to 43, an increase of 26.5 per cent. Cross Plains was the only other county township to show an advance.

It was listed as having 54 concerns this month as compared to a count of 53 last year, an increase of 1.9 per cent.

Baird, Putnam and Cottonwood remained the same showing 42, 7 and 1 respectively.

During the past year 15 changes were made in the Dun & Bradstreet Reference Book list-

ings of Callahan County businesses, including four names added, five names deleted and six changes in the ratings of continuing businesses. The changes occurring in Callahan County are higher than the rest of the county where a change of business significance is counted about every five seconds.

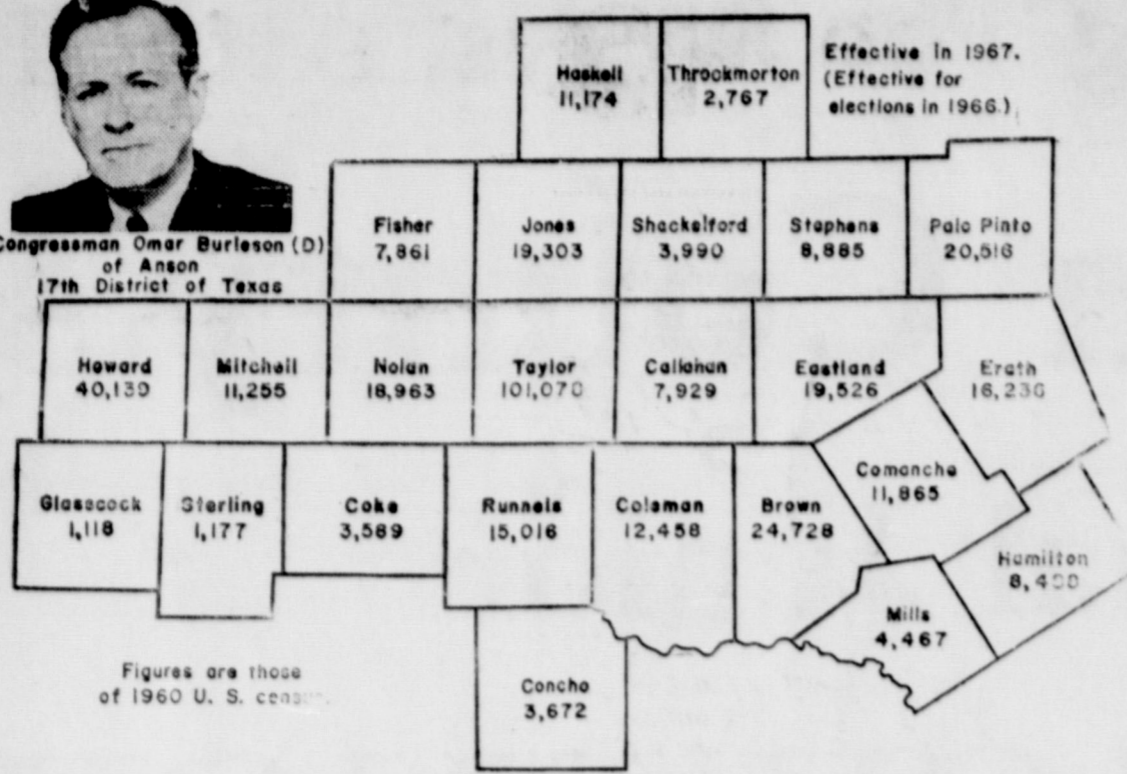
