Icy Roads Blamed For Auto Crashes

Icy roads were blamed for three one-vehicle traffic mishaps in the Cross Plains area Friday afternoon.

Two of the accidents were just west of Cross Plains on State Highway 36 and one was on North Main in Rising Star.

Only one slight injury resulted to four persons involved in the crashes.

First of the accidents occurred shortly before 1 p.m. when James Vernon Blackburn of Hawley lost control of his 1960 Chevrolet pick-up on ice just west of the Turkey Creek bridge. He was not hurt, although the vehicle sheared off a post marking a culvert and overturned. Cross Plains Highway Patrolman Bill Vineyard, who investigated all three mishaps, estimated damage at \$500.

At 2:10 that afternoon a 1965 International cattle truck skidded off the pavement into the barrow ditch and through a wire fence about 300 yards east of the site of the first accident.

Stokie Joiner, Negro of Moody and passenger in the truck, sustained a slight back injury, but the driver, Charles Steward, Negro of Temple, was unhurt. The truck which belonged to Erwin Mill & Elevator of Gatesville, was unloaded, but sustained \$500 in damages.

Third mishap was in Rising Star at 5:35 p.m. when a 1965 Chevy II driven by Paula Earlene Booth of Cisco skidded on slick street into a cement curb. She was not injured, but Vineyard estimated damage to the auto at \$200.

Construction Okay Given On Housing

It was first thought, according to Jimmielee Payne, local board president, that building would have to be postponed until all titles to the proposed sites could be cleared. City Worth More Than 4 Times As Much As Owed

With an 84 per cent tax col-reported in a much-improved financial position as of Feb. 1, roll and recent collections of value of properties owned unpaid accounts due three mu-amounts to more than four nicipally-owned utility systems, times the total debt. the City of Cross Plains was A \$9,425 note made to the

Citizens State Bank here one year ago to replenish the general fund was paid off last week, leaving all obligations now owned by the city — including bonded indebtedness — at

\$61,854.26. This sum is broken down as follows: \$6,000 bonded indebtedness balance on refinancing done in 1952, \$53,000 balance on issues voted in 1963, two payments of \$1,365 each on a back-hoe digger and loader, and two payments of \$62.13 on a truck.

It is pointed out that \$5,000 from the bonds voted to repair city utility mains in 1963 was never used and is now on time deposit drawing interest. From this same source there is another \$212.31 held in a specially set-up gas fund. The city's general fund account as of Jan. 31, 1966, showed a balance of \$9,478.16 and the sinking fund a balance of \$2,455.43.

Assets listed on the last audit of the municipality revealed that book value of properties owned by the city aggregated \$262,123.37. These values were itemized as follows: water works \$145,645.31, sewer system \$48,001.82, gas system \$39,590.79, street machinery \$110,103.60, sprayer \$81.43, fire station \$4,457.24, dump truck \$506.13, fire trucks and equipment \$8,991.82, office furniture and equipment \$1,619.97, City Hall \$3,125.66.

Tax collections showed marked improvement from the roll of 1965 during the current tax-paying period as compared with the year before. Total assessments on the '65 roll amounted to \$12,393.74. Of that amount \$10,495.67 was paid on or before the due date — Jan. 31, 1966. The remainder goes on the delinquent roll and is subjected to penalties and interest when paid later.

Although the '65 roll was \$442.23 greater than the levies of 1964, only \$1,898.07 will go on the delinquent roll this year, as compared with \$1,977.47 a year ago.

Mrs. Neeb was also preceded in death by a son, Dr. Edwin C. Neeb, Jr., who expired May 31, 1947. Burial Wednesday afternoon was to be beside the graves of her husband and son.

Survivors include a number of nieces, nephews and two sisters-in-law.

1,780 Poll Taxes Paid In Callahan

Four hundred and forty-eight poll tax receipts were issued in Callahan County Monday, Jan. 31, before the midnight deadline stopped sales. Total number paid polls was listed at 1,780, as compared with approximately 1,400 last year and 2,300 in 1964.

Twenty-nine of the tax receipts were issued free of charge to 21-year-olds who are qualified to vote in future elections.

"The number of qualified voters will be unusually small since this is an election year," remarked Albert Lovell, county tax assessor-collector.

Recreation Center Nearer To Reality

The big, new recreational facility for Rising Star and Cross Plains moved a step nearer completion Monday, when agreements were reached by the directors of the organization and Bowden Lumber Company of this city for contract revisions bringing the total cost to \$101,500.

Low bid on the project had been \$106,008, a sum slightly greater than the amount of available money.

Temporarily deleted from the specifications were a miniature golf course, surfaced en-

trances and parking area, an outside fence and signs and a revision in swimming pool design.

It is pointed out, however, that these features will be built later with an additional loan to be secured through the Farmers Home Administration.

The contractor was given 10 days to complete his performance bond and return signed acceptance of the agreement to directors. It will then be processed and forwarded to the state headquarters of FHA for acceptance.



Several years ago he was flown to New York and appeared on nationwide television, having won the "showcase award" on The Price Is Right program.


