Democratic Committee Fixes Candidates Costs

Callahan County Democratic Executive Committee met in the courthouse at Baird Monday and set assessments to be paid by candidates at the May 7 primary election.

All county and precinct office assessments were based

on 10 per cent of the earnings of the offices. If a candidate is unopposed he will pay the entire sum. Where there is more than one aspirant the assessment will be prorated.

For offices encompassing more than one county the fee

was based on 10 per cent of the salary divided by the number of counties involved.

It is pointed out that the assessments on candidates pay all expenses of holding the two primary elections. After the run-off, whatever balance is left is returned to the candidates in proportions to the original amounts paid.

Assessments by the County Executive Committee Monday were as follows:

County Superintendent of public instruction \$1,047. It is pointed out that office will earn \$10,428 annually at beginning of next fiscal year, although present salary is \$9,840.

County Judge \$655, based on an annual salary of \$6,550.

County commissioner \$580, based on an annual earning of \$5,800.

County treasurer \$530, based on an annual earning of \$5,300.

County clerk \$480, based on an annual earning of \$4,800.

Salaries were established for three justices of the peace at a meeting of the Commissioners Court Monday and their assessments were levied by the Democratic Executive Committee on the same 10 per cent basis.

Justice of the Peace, Precinct 1, (Baird) \$400, based on an annual earning of \$4,000.

Justice of the Peace, Precinct 5, (Clyde) \$400, based on

an annual earning of \$4,000.

Justice of the Peace, Precinct 6, (Cross Plains) \$60, based on an annual earning of \$600.

The assessment for Congress, 17th Texas District, was set at \$46.88. This figure was arrived at by taking the annual salary of the office and dividing by the number of counties involved and then cutting it in half for the reason that a congressman runs every two years, whereas all others over whom the county committee has jurisdiction in setting fees run for four-year terms.

No assessment was made for County and Precinct Democrat Chairmen to have their names on the ballots, for the reason that their offices return no financial compensations.

Presiding over Monday morning's session of the Democratic Executive Committee was A. E. Dyer, Jr., of Baird, county chairman. Precinct chairmen present were: Hugh Ross, Baird; Allen Johnson, Clyde; Alton E. Hornsby, Cross Plains; Raymond Gibbs, Rowden; J. C. Dyer, Putnam; C. R. Myrick, Cottonwood and Lawson Armor of Dudley.

The County Democratic Executive Committee will meet again March 21 and draw for the positions in which candidates' names will appear on the ballot.

2 In Race For Chairman Of County Republicans

Callahan County Republican Executive Committee met in Cross Plains Monday night and laid plans for the primary election scheduled May 7.

Two candidates have filed for County Republican Chairman, a post now held by Jack W. Tunnell, who is not seeking re-election. Aspirants for the place are Ike M. Neal of Cross Plains and Charles Holden of Denton.

Gail Stallings has filed for precinct chairman at Clyde and

Mrs. Charles Holden seeks the same post for the Denton Valley precinct.

At Monday night's meeting here, Marshall Newcomb, Jr., of Baird was appointed precinct chairman to fill out the unexpired term of Paul Washburn in Precinct 1.

A resolution was adopted at the meeting commending the efforts and leadership of Senator John Tower of Texas in a successful fight to retain this state's right-to-work law.

Pavement To Oplin Possible During 1966

Callahan County Commissioner's Court unanimously adopted a resolution Monday after-

noon asking Jake Roberts of Abilene, Division Highway Engineer, to begin immediate construction on a Farm-To-Market

road from Cross Plains westward to Oplin.

The road has been in the Highway Commission's long-range planning for several years, however, Tuesday's petition sought a hastening in the construction process.

In reply to the court's action Roberts said that he would endeavor to program the project this year.

Recent traffic counts have re-

vealed that the route to be served by the Cross Plains to Oplin pavement is one of the county's most heavily used unsurfaced roads. In addition to accommodating a large number of people it is used by two rural mail carriers and at least three public school buses.

Some right-of-way along the route has already been pledged, say proponents who have long advocated this project.

W. M. Stansbury Asks Support Of Candidacy

W. M. Stansbury of Cross Plains this week made an introductory statement in behalf of his candidacy for the office of Justice of the Peace for Precinct 6, which includes Cross Plains, Cottonwood, Atwell and Dressy, in fact, the same boundaries as Commissioners Precinct 4.

Eastland Man Announces As Legislative Candidate

Saul Pullman, 25, son of Mr. and Mrs. Henry Pullman of Eastland, has authorized this newspaper to announce that he is a candidate for State Representative, District 63, which includes this county, a post formerly held by Wayne Gibbens until his resignation to accept a federal-state liaison position.

A graduate of the University of Texas Law School, Pullman holds the L.L.B. degree and is a member of the Texas and American Bar Associations. A native of Eastland County, he is a graduate of Eastland High School, where he was an outstanding football and track athlete.

He attended Texas Christian University where he played football and was a member of the track team. He is a member of the TCU Ex-Lettersmen's

Association. Upon receiving his Bachelor of Science and Commerce Degree at TCU, he attended St. Mary's Law School in San Antonio.

He holds memberships in the Phi Alpha Delta Law Fraternity and in high school was elected senator at Boy's State, sponsored by the American Legion. He attained Eagle Scout rank and is a member of the Order of the Arrow Brotherhood.

As a member of the United States Army Reserves, he is assigned to the Headquarters, First Judge Advocate General's Detachment in Austin.

His parents are longtime Eastland residents and are owners and operators of Eastland Iron and Metal Co.

Mr. Pullman will issue a formal statement at a later date, he said.

Callahan County Without Representation In House

Callahan, Eastland, Shackelford, Stephens and Palo Pinto Counties are without representation in the special session of

the Texas Legislature convened Monday by Governor John Connally.

The recent resignation of Wayne Gibbens, as state representative from this district to accept an appointment in Washington, left a vacancy which can only be filled by a special election.

A number of Callahan countians had petitioned the governor to appoint J. Rupert Jackson, Jr., Baird attorney, to serve during the interim. They were advised, though, that Texas Constitution does not permit the state's chief executive to do so. The vacancy would have to be filled by a special election, and since no additional session was expected until Gibbens' successor is named at the polls in April or May, that action had been deemed unnecessary until the special session was called.

The special session was necessitated by a court ruling last week outlawing the poll tax in Texas as a requirement for voting. While the ruling is on appeal Gov. Connally deemed it judicious to re-convene the legislature to work out a registration plan

Nathan Foster Candidate For School Trustee Place

Nathan Foster has filed for re-election to Cross Plains Independent School District Board of Trustees subject to election April 2.

Terms of Foster and Sterling Odom are expiring, but at noon Tuesday only Foster had filed. Odom had not revealed his plans as the Review went to press.

Trustees are elected for three-year tenures with three trustees chosen every three years. Holdover members are: one year remaining, Dr. Carl J. Sohns and Jimmy McCowen; and two years remaining, Vernon

Phillips, Edwin Baum and D. C. Jones.

Candidates may file with County Judge Byron Richardson at Baird or Dr. C. J. Sohns, local board secretary, on or before March 2, deadline for filing to get name on ballot.

Edgar H. Heard Enters Justice Of Peace Race

SHALLOW OIL VENTURE STAKED NEAR BURKETT

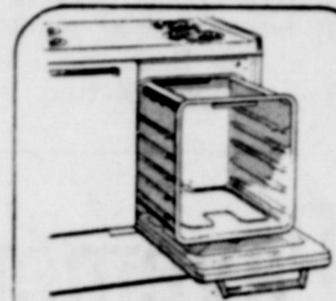

Conner died at 3:45 a.m. Callahan County Hospital following a short illness. Her funeral was in Ross Cemetery that city with Minister Ham of Baird officiating.

Conner was believed to be the oldest citizen, and she had lived in her home there for 55 years. She came to Abilene as a small child, and was married to Josephine Epley on Feb. 18, 1866, in Knoxville, Tenn. She married Mr. Conner in 1957, in Mullin, Okla. The couple later moved to Putnam in 1897.

Conner has three daughters: Fred (Maude) Hart of Roswell, N. M., and Myrtle (Myrtle) Page of Dalhart, granddaughters, Mrs. C. Hart of Midland, Mrs. of Lubbock, Charles of Anson, Mrs. Virgil of Roswell and Miss Page of Dallas; and great-grandchildren.

Duncan, 73, Died On Saturday

(Nolan) Duncan, 73, a resident of the Burnt Fork and Dressey areas, died Friday in Callahan County Hospital at Baird after a illness of four days.

Funeral services were held at 4 p.m. at the First Baptist Church Saturday with the Rev. Lewis, pastor, officiating. The service was in Cross Plains beside the grave of the deceased who died Jan. 22, 1964.

Mr. Duncan was born Feb. 10, 1893, in Brown County, Mo. He came to Callahan County as a child and had lived in Baird and Cross Plains for most of his life except for a period at Odessa, Tex., from 1944-58. He was a main-employee at Odessa until his retirement in 1958. He was also a farmer and rancher.

Mr. Duncan had lived the past 23 years in Baird. He was married June 23, 1911, and she was living at De Witt, Tex., when she was fatally injured in an automobile accident here and Rising Star, Tex., over a year ago.

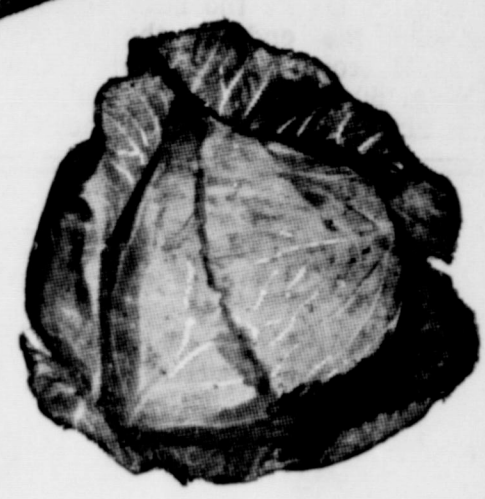

Dignitaries Watch As Old Oil Well Plugged

A delegation of dignitaries, including Railroad Commissioner Byron Tunnell, witnessed the plugging of a Callahan County well Friday afternoon. The test was on land owned by Joe Antilley, one mile north of Admural.

Operator of the old project, which had been drilled about 1929 at a depth of 700 feet, was not known. The RRC and the West Central Texas Municipal Water District have been working jointly to plug projects of which the operator is not known.

The plugging Friday was the fifth to be made in the Hubbard Creek watershed. Tunnell said the three Railroad Commissioners signed an order Friday morning in Austin authorizing

the plugging of seven other projects of which the operators are not known.

The next well to be plugged is on the Patterson land three miles south of Moran in Shackelford County.

A plug in the Callahan County project was set at 225 feet with the work being done by McCarrell & Son of Abilene. The well is near Deep Creek.

"Cooperative efforts, such as the one in Callahan County, will help us abate the pollution problem," said Tunnell.

He explained that local Railroad Commission personnel spends about 40 per cent of its time working on pollution problems.

"We realize that pollution is a public concern to the public and the industry," said Tunnell.
