On To Region

Playing with their usual composure, confidence and talent, Cross Plains Buffettes cinched a shot at the Region II basketball crown as they defeated Early girls at Longhorn gymnasium Tuesday night, 59-42.

Cross Plains townspeople packed the visitors' section to witness the bi-district play-off.

Local girls, District 10-A queens, hit 44 per cent of their field goals, shooting 45 times from the floor. Early's forwards, who paced the sextet to the District 9-A crown, connected with 39 per cent of the two-pointers.

Nineteen fouls were charged to Early, and the Buffettes were cited on 18 counts.

Lead From Beginning

Cross Plains took the opening tipoff and controlled the ball throughout most of the game. Jumping to a 10-point, 17-7 lead in the first quarter, the Buffettes added three more points in the second period to their margin, and at the end of the third quarter the scoreboard gave Cross Plains a 19-point lead, 49-30. Early reduced

the deficit by two points in the final frame, out-scoring the Buffette reserves 12-10.

From the free shot line, Cross Plains bucketed 15 of 26 attempts, slightly less than Early who listed 18 of 27.

Darylene Hargrove, whose name invariably appears among leading Buffette scorers, connected with 11 field goals and 7 free throws for 29 points. Valleta Edington, another frequent recipient of high-scoring laurels, backed 10 field goals with 4 free shots and 24 markers.

Judy Collins paced Early's attack bucketing 22 points on 4 field goals and 14 free tosses.

Next stop — Denton.

The Buffettes will journey to Denton this week end to compete with three other aspirants for the regional championship Saturday.

"We hope to have a grandstand-full of Cross Plains fans at Denton this Saturday," said Coach Jack Gray Tuesday night. "We're going to have some tough competition, and we'll need all the support we can get."

Voter Registrars Named In Clyde And Cross Plains

Deputies have been named at Cross Plains and Clyde to assist the courthouse staff at Baird in voter registration to be conducted in Texas between March 3 and 17, to comply with recently-enacted laws which followed outlawing of the poll tax in this state.

Tax Assessor-Collector Albert Lovell was in Cross Plains Monday and announced the appointment of Mrs. Lloyd Bryan here and of Mrs. Rufus Miller at Clyde.

Lovell pointed out that poll tax payers would be required to do nothing else to be eligible to vote this year. The poll tax they paid prior to Feb. 1 complied with the new registration law, he said.

Neither will persons exempt from payment by reason of age — those over 60 — be re-

quired to register. Counties of less than 10,000 population are exempt from the registration of senior citizens.

Persons between 21 and 60, who did not pay poll taxes may now gain the voting franchise by filling out one of the registration blanks at either Baird, Clyde or Cross Plains. There is no fee. This is a service rendered without charge.

Lovell pointed out that he will also accept registrations mailed to his office, so long as they are postmarked on or before March 17. Blanks which were formerly used for poll tax payers will be acceptable for the registration. They are available at any Callahan County bank.

Auto Used In Theft Hits Ex-Local Newsman's Car

D. J. (Jack) McCarty, Glen Rose publisher, formerly of Cross Plains, received superficial injuries early Saturday morning when his automobile was involved in a collision with a car believed to have been used in the robbery of a Glen Rose grocery and a cafe.

McCarty had been called to take pictures of a double murder, which had just been discovered at a farm home and was en route to his newspaper office to get camera equipment. As he was crossing a bridge, a car running without headlights, met him head-on. The other auto left the scene of the accident but was found abandoned six blocks away.

Lawmen apprehended two Fort Worth youths and lodged them in Somervell County jail at Glen Rose. They are not held, however, in connection with the murders. That is thought to be an entirely separate crime.

Although McCarty's automobile received damages estimated at between \$800 and \$900 he escaped with only minor cuts and bruises and was not hospitalized.

Race for two places on Cross Plains school system's board of trustees developed into a four-man race Tuesday, according to Dr. Carl J. Sohns, board secretary.

Filing Tuesday were Sterling Odom and C. F. (Pat) McNeel, Jr. Already having made known their candidacies were Nathan Foster and Zed Bright. Odom and Foster are seeking re-election to the board while Bright and McNeel are asking initial terms.

Deadline for filing with names printed on the ballot in the April 2 election was to have passed Wednesday, March 2, at midnight.

Trustees are elected for terms of three years. Hold-over board members are Dr. Sohns, Jimmie McCowen, Vernon Phillips, D. C. Jones and Edwin Baum.

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32 New Lakes Due Area As Pecan Bayou Plans Okayed

The Upper Pecan Bayou Watershed Work Plan, which calls for 32 flood water retarding structures to be built in this general vicinity, has been given definite approval, according to an announcement from E. J. Hughes of Brownwood, area soil conservationist.

Approval of the work plan with the 10 sponsoring local organizations was initiated in September, 1965, and included five Soil and Water Conservation districts. They are the Brown-Mills, the Central Colorado, the Lower Clear Fork of the Brazos, the Middle Clear Fork and the Upper Leon.

County commissioners courts involved in the watershed program are represented by Brown County, Callahan County, Tay-

lor County and Coleman County. The City of Clyde is also a co-sponsor with the proposed multiple purpose lake some six miles south of Clyde.

The work plan provides for 32 floodwater retarding structures, which when installed will have a combined sediment pool storage capacity of approximately 3,144 acre feet or a total of approximately 72,160 acre feet of floodwater detention which will be released at regular rates for down stream users.

715-Acre Surface Area

Surface area of the 32 floodwater retarding structures will cover 715 acres when drawn down to the sediment pool level. At critical flood storage, the detention water will temporarily inundate approximately 5,000 surface acres. In addition to flood detention storage, the multiple purpose structure being planned in cooperation with the City of Clyde will have a total drainage area of approximately 38 square miles having 5000 acre feet of water for multiple and other uses and approximately 5000 acre feet of flood detention capacity.

Volume of compacted earth represented in the 32 floodwater retarding structures and the Clyde City Lake will amount to about 5,265,000 cubic yards. Total estimated structural cost for the project is approximately \$4,166,000.

When installed, the structural measures will reduce annual flood damages by 67 per cent,

Hughes points out. The average annual primary benefits derived from the floodwater retarding structures in this work plan amount to approximately \$368,000.

When installed, the program will provide an estimated \$2.30 benefit from reduced annual flood damages for each \$1.00 cost. Installation of the flood prevention structures is planned to begin this Spring or by early Summer to include construction unit number 2 involving floodwater retarding structures Nos. 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 8, 9, 10 and 11.

Easements Being Granted

arrangements with the commissioners courts in Coleman, Callahan and Taylor counties to perform maintenance responsibilities following construction. Next fiscal year's construction schedule will be established by about Oct. 1 based upon progress the local sponsors make in obtaining easements and rights-of-way for construction by the Soil Conservation Service, who builds on easements obtained by local interests.

Farmers and ranchers in the Upper Pecan Bayou Watershed have been installing needed conservation land treatment measures through cooperation with their Soil and Water Conservation Districts during the past 10 or more years. It is

estimated that local non-Federal costs of applied conservation work now on the land in the Upper Pecan Bayou exceeds \$4,425,000 and that an additional \$1,752,000 will be needed during the next 10 years to supplement the planned structural work.

Technical assistance for planning and installing needed land treatment above each of the floodwater structures and municipal lakes will be provided at a stepped up rate by the Soil Conservation Service, according to Hughes. This assistance will be provided through the Soil and Water Conservation Districts at the Soil Conservation Service Work Units in Baird, Coleman, Rising Star, Abilene and Brownwood.

Tom Barton, 47, Buried At Baird

Tom B. Barton, widely-known Baird petroleum distributor, rancher and civic leader, was laid to rest in Ross Cemetery in that city Monday afternoon. He died at 1:30 p.m. Saturday in Eastland Memorial Hospital after two years of declining health.

Mr. Barton, agent for Humble in Callahan and Eastland Counties, was instrumental in causing his company to build the service station at the intersection of Main Street and Highway 36 in Cross Plains, which is presently operated by Oscar Koenig.

He was born in Clyde Oct. 8 1918, and has been a resident of Callahan County all his life, having lived in Baird the last 20 years.

He married Frances Baulch Nov. 29, 1942, at Clyde.

He was a graduate of North Texas State and was a former school teacher. He served in the Army Air Corps during World War II and held the rank of captain.

He served as Callahan County Democratic chairman for a number of years. He was a member of the American Legion and the Methodist Church.

He was a past city councilman of Baird, a member of the school board, having served his last year in 1965.

Mr. Barton was a member of the Lions Club and has been an area representative for the West Texas Rehabilitation Center in Abilene.

Survivors include the wife; a daughter, Mrs. Don (Ann) Burns of Roanoke, Tex.; a son, Tommy, a student at Texas Christian University; a sister, Mrs. J. B. Taylor of Clyde; and a grandson, Timothy Burns.

Brush Control Projects Near Here Keep Dozers Humming

A lot of new country is becoming visible in the Cross Plains area. It is that which has been hidden by brush for years.

As a result of the Great Plains program, being sponsored by the Soil Conservation Service, and subsidies available through the county ASCS offices more local acreage is expected to be cleared of invading brush this year than ever before in history.

"Many farmers and ranchers are reasoning that it's more economical to improve the productivity of land they already own than it is to buy additional acreage," says Bob Needham, Cross Plains contractor, who has four brush control contracts now running simultaneously.

One of the most thorough eradication projects slated near here is that being undertaken in the southeast corner of Callahan County by Wayne May, Brownwood livestock auction ring owner and local rancher. He is having 125 acres root-plowed,

the brush windrowed and burned and is reseeding with K.R. Bluestem and Blue Panic grasses.

Paul Lutzenberger has Needham's dozers grubbing 80 acres at his place four miles northeast of Cross Plains, preparatory to seeding with Sideoats and K.R. Bluestem. The brush being removed there is predominately oak.

Edwin Baum, who has been following a brush eradication and soil building program for the past several years, is grubbing 13 acres three miles west of Cross Plains. Follow-up work there will include a seed bed preparation, raking and the sowing of K.R. Bluestem and Panic grasses. Brush being controlled is primarily oak and mesquite.

Mike Cunningham is root plowing 40 acres along Turkey Creek at his place two miles northeast of Cross Plains. He plans to sow Weeping Love grass after invading oak is removed.

John Howard Balkum has dozers felling and chopping oak from pastures at his land, three miles south of town. He plans to sow approved grasses. August Garlitz, northeast of Cross Cut, has a similar project scheduled.

Dave Lee cleared his place south of Cross Plains and placed 18 acres of Coastal Bermuda under irrigation. He had Needham build him a 10,000 cubic yard circular pond to provide the water for irrigation. Lee had his brush chopped and reseeded pasture with Love Grass varieties.

Anna Myrl McGowen and Jack Scott have had 240 acres root-plowed, 11 miles west of Cross Plains, and the pasture reseeded with K.R., Sideoats

and Blue Panic grasses. Brush being controlled there consisted mainly of mesquite, Blue Brush and clump cactus.

It is pointed out that these are only a few of the numerous brush control projects now underway in this area and that reports on others will be available for publication shortly.

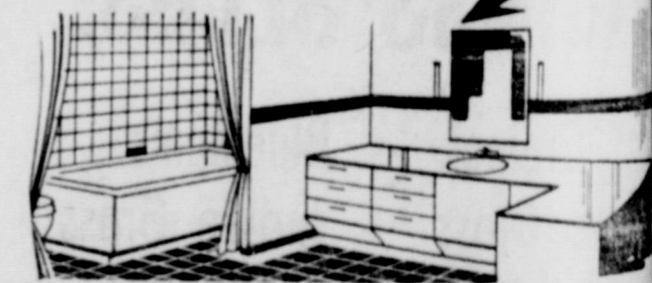

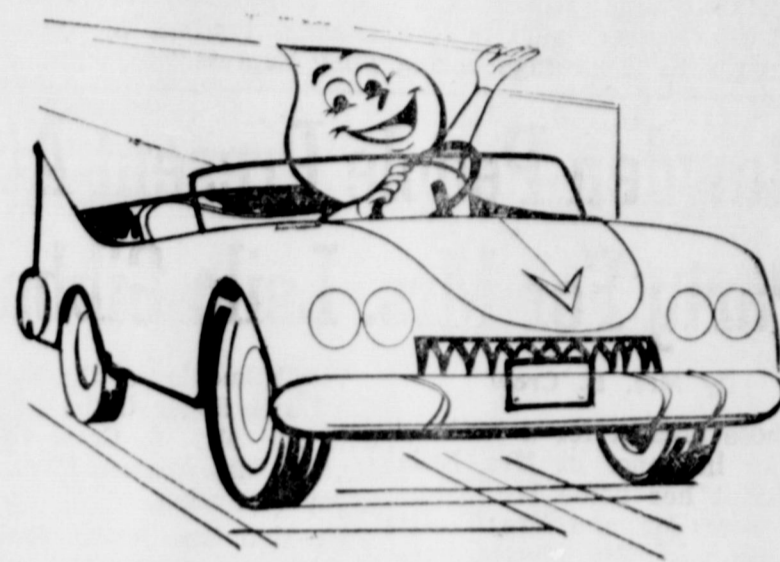

The House resolved that Roddy "be congratulated upon his achievement and that he be encouraged to send forth new generations of the Gold Dust strain into a world often too concerned with Atomic dust and fallout to stress the merits of friendship, courage and stamina typified by the early Pony Express."
