Fourth place on Cross Plains City Council will be filled by voters at the regularly scheduled April 5 municipal election.

the correct procedure to follow in filling the newly-created council vacancy. He was told in a communication which arrived here Tuesday morning: "Article 13.12a, Subdivision 5, Texas Election Code, provides for the filling of this vacancy at the April 5th election, through the use of a special election, held at the same time and place as the regular city election. You may use the same ballot, simply adding beneath the usual choices for Mayor and two Aldermen, the choice 'For Alderman, Unexpired Term' and the names of the candidates for this one-year term of office."

In compliance with advice received from Austin, Mayor Burchfield immediately posted notices of the upcoming special election.

Alderman Tom D. Lee Dies Suddenly Sunday

Funeral services were held Tuesday afternoon at 2:30 from the First Baptist Church here for Tom D. Lee, 73-year-old Cross Plains City Council member. He was stricken with an apparent heart attack shortly after noon Sunday and was rushed to a Cisco hospital, but he expired at 3 p.m.

Final rites for the well known, retired stockman were under direction of Higginbotham Funeral Home of Cross Plains with the Rev. Roger Butler, local Baptist pastor, officiating, and assisted by the Rev. Don Turner, former local minister and pastor of the Calvary Baptist Church in Mineral Wells. Burial was in Cross Plains Cemetery.

Born April 29, 1892, in Cross Plains, he had lived most of his life in this immediate area. He married Flarra Kirby on Oct. 9, 1916, here. He had been in declining health for the past several months, but his death

was unexpected. He was elected to the Cross Plains City Council in April of last year and was serving as Sanitation Commissioner.

Survivors include his wife; three sons, Earl D. and John G., both of Rising Star, and Tom D., Jr. of Carlsbad, N. M.; three daughters, Mrs. Odell Golson and Mrs. Jack Thomas, both of Cross Plains, and Mrs. H. B. Crutchfield of Cisco; five brothers, D. C. (Dave) Lee, J. H. (Preacher) Lee and Jack Lee, all of Cross Plains, Walter (Mink) Lee of Mena, Ark., and J. C. (Doc) Lee of Coalinga, Calif.; four sisters, Mrs. Alice Grider, Mrs. Myrtle Jennings and Bertie Lee of Cross Plains and Mrs. Mary Calhoun of Coleman; 11 grandchildren and eight great-grandchildren.

Local Girls Play For Texas Cage Crown

Cross Plains High School Buffettes culminated their quest for the region II-A championship last Saturday at Denton, and Friday will compete in the state championship tournament at Austin.

The Buffettes are the first athletic aggregation in the his-

tory of Cross Plains schools to carry the Purple and Gold banners to the state playoffs.

First obstacle to the regional victory was Munday's high school girls' squad, which contested the local sextet Saturday morning. Cross Plains organized a 48-47 campaign in

opposing the Munday group. Darylene Hargrove's offensive efforts contributed 23 points to the Buffette total and Beth Hutchins counted 20 scores.

Forward Betty Wilde led the Munday scoring rally, hitting 24 points.

The home town gals connect-

ed on 20 of 32 free shots from the floor for 58 per cent. Munday sank 18 of 33, or 54 per cent of their field goal attempts.

Cross Plains drew 13 fouls, and Munday, 11.

Take Title

Saturday evening fate again found in favor of the Buffettes, granting them a 49-35 decision over Itasca. Although the competition was somewhat less threatening, the "pressure" of the finals was evident in scoring percentages. Cross Plains bucketed 18 of 54 field goals, dropping their average to 33 per cent. Itasca's scoresheet listed only 10 field goals in 44 tries for a scant 22 per cent average.

Valeta Edington and Darylene Hargrove tallied 21 and 20 points respectively for Cross Plains.

In winning the Saturday finale, the Buffettes brought their season record to 31 wins, and three losses.

The Cross Plains team, along with Coach Jack Gray, will leave here Thursday for the capitol city. They plan to "work out" that afternoon and Friday at 1:45 p.m. the local group will meet Jourdanon, Regional IV-A meet queens. A victory in the first game will send the Buffettes to the finals, Saturday afternoon at 3:50 p.m. A consolation battle will involve the losers of the first games and will be played at 9 a.m. Saturday.

All tournament games will be played in Gregory Gymnasium on the University of Texas campus.

Cross Plains Smallest
Spring Lake, Lamb County and Region I-A champs, take on Midway of near Waco and Region III-A winner, in the other first round bout at 11:35 Friday. Cross Plains is the smallest Class A school involved in the state tourney. Average daily attendance records for 1965 show Cross Plains with 471 students, Jourdanon 662, Spring Lake 950 and Midway 1,002.

The game will be broadcast live Friday over radio KSTA, Coleman, 1000 kilocycles. If the Buffettes make the finals, the Coleman station will also carry that game live, the Review was told.

Alton E. Hornsby has been appointed election judge and will select clerks to assist him at a later date.

Pat C. Garner, County Agent in Callahan County, tendered his resignation to the Commissioners Court in special session Thursday of last week.

Duke Mitchell, local commissioner, said that the court accepted the resignation, but took no action toward procuring a replacement.

Garner said Monday, "I have really enjoyed working with the people of Callahan County, and they have been very helpful and cooperative." His resignation becomes effective April 1, and he said that he plans to move around that date. Garner has accepted a similar position in Pecos County and will headquarter at Fort Stockton. He began work here in May of 1963, coming from Cameron, in Milam County.

FIRE RAZES 10 ACRES OF PASTURE SATURDAY

2 Contracts Let For Highway 36

Two contracts for improvements on State Highway 36 were let last week. They total \$755,771.22.

Allen Construction Company, Inc., submitted low bid of \$333,984.83 for a project of 16.4 miles and J. H. Strain & Sons was low with a bid of \$421,822.89 for 18.6 miles.

The two jobs call for grading, widening structures and application of flexible base and asphaltic concrete across the full length of Callahan County. Specifications call for work on both projects to be completed within 150 working days.

R. W. Domann, resident engineer for the Highway Department in Abilene, will be in active supervision on both jobs.

Callahan County Commissioners Court has voted to table until the next regular session a proposition on adopting a surplus commodity distribution program.

Moore, State Department of Public Welfare, commodity division, of Austin, discussed the program of distributing surplus governmental foods to needy families in this county in special meeting last Thursday. Duke Mitchell, commissioner of Precinct 4, said that some action would probably be taken on the proposition Monday, March 14.

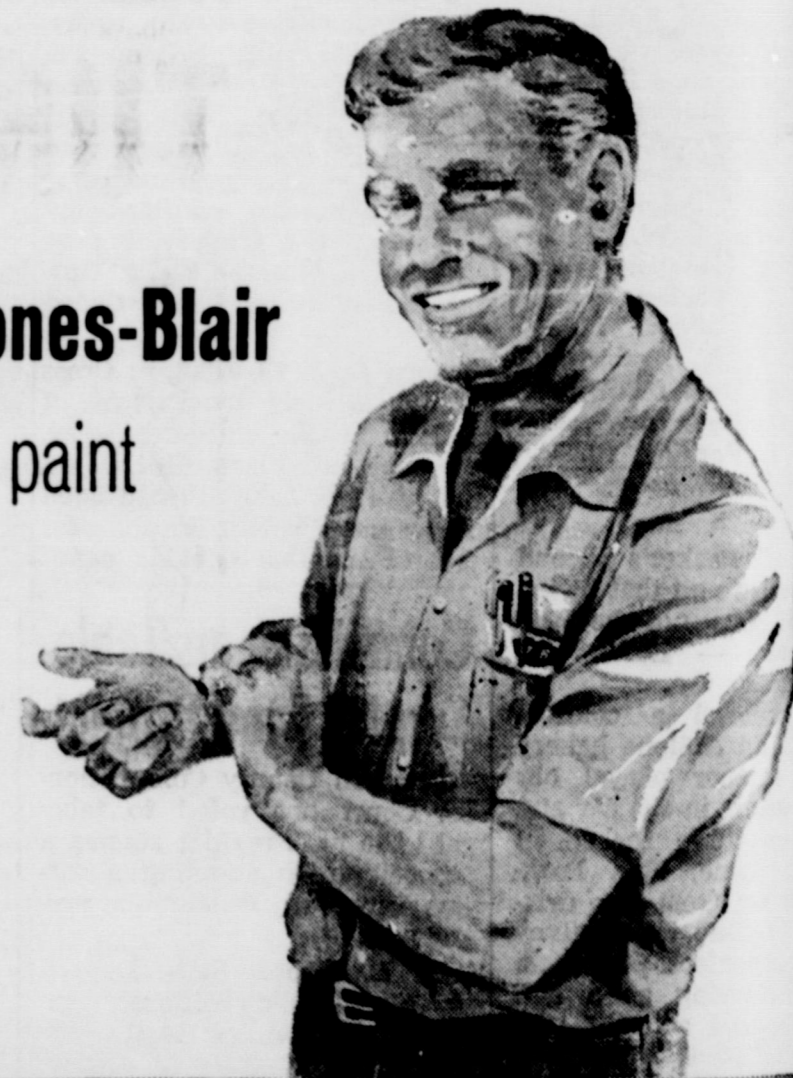

J. D. Sandefer, Jr. of Breckenridge completed a Callahan County Regular Field well three miles southwest of Cross Plains.

It is No. 36-A William Franke, located 150 feet from the south and 2,250 feet from the west lines of Section 72, Comal CSL Survey 181.

Daily potential was four barrels of 32 gravity oil. It is pumping from an open hole at 308 to 344 feet.

A re-entry project was completed as a producer seven miles northeast of Baird in the Herr-King (Cross Cut) Field.

It is A. V. Jones & Sons of Albany No. 3-1 Herr-King Field Unit, 330 feet from the south and 2,270 feet from the east lines of Section 3, T&NO Survey.

Daily potential was two barrels of 41 gravity oil, pumping from a casing notch at 2,464 feet. Pay was fractured with 50 sacks of sand. The 5 1/2-inch casing is set on bottom at 2,525 feet.

It was originally S. C. Her-ring No. 1 M. D. Snyder.

R. H. Andrews, operating from Cisco, staked two regular field locations 10 miles north of Putnam. Both are on the J. S. Hart 160 acre lease and slated for 500 feet with rotary.

No. 15 Hart is 1,165 feet from the north and 2,310 feet from the west lines of Section 6, D&DAL Survey.

Site for No. 16 Hart is 1,060 feet from the north and 1,790 feet from the west lines of Section 6.

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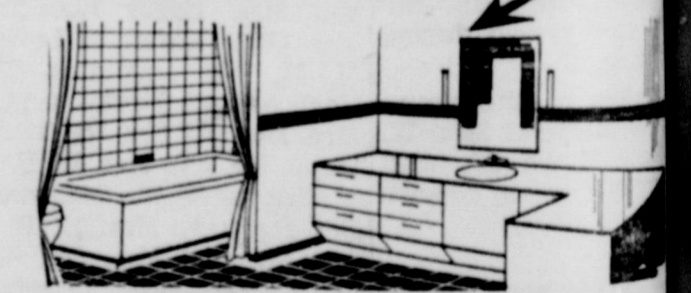

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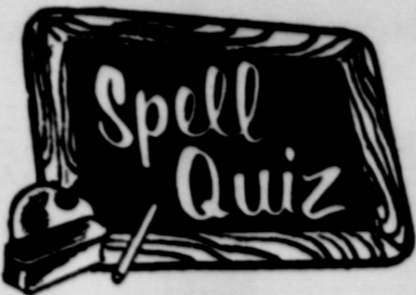

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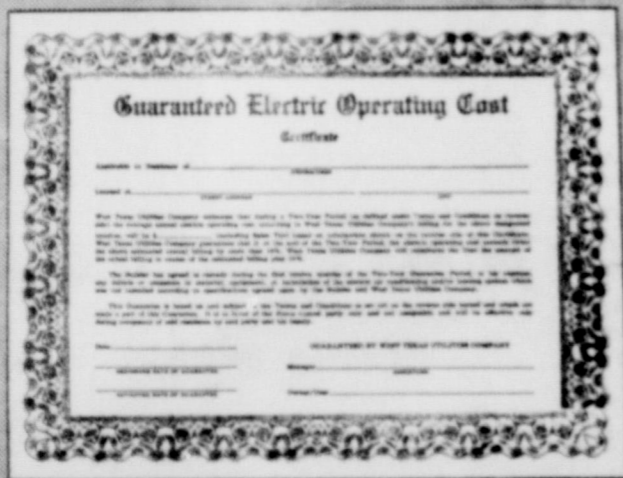
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
