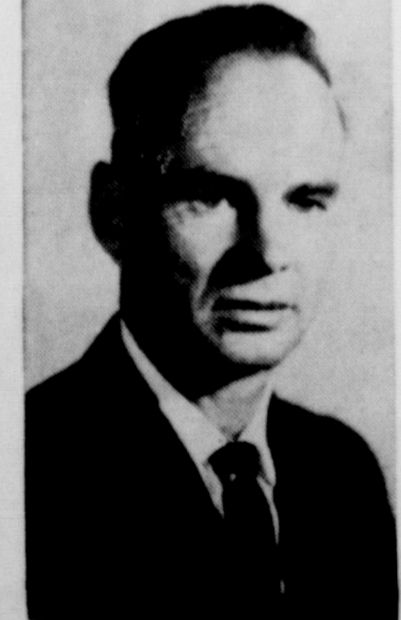

mon sense," gained through his years of public service.

Burleson is a former County Attorney and County Judge of Jones County. He was appointed an FBI Agent, and served in a number of assignments over the U. S. He resigned from the FBI to join the Navy in World War II, with duty in both the Atlantic and the Pacific.

As a leader in Congress, Burleson has consistently urged the return to a sounder fiscal policy and the cutting of unnecessary and extravagant federal spending.

"I have tried to see that your tax money is spent as wisely and as judiciously, as you would have spent it had you been in my place," Burleson said. "The record will definitely show that on many occasions I have found myself in the minority — especially on needless spending of the taxpayers' money. I am proud that I have never failed to exercise the right to vote and do as I thought best."

"At every session of Congress, I have voted for expenditures below that recommended by the Executive Department, and far below that actually appropriated by the Congress, except that in the field of National Defense," Burleson said.

"When it comes to the defense of this Country, I have always voted for those things calculated to make and to keep our Nation stronger than any other in the world," he said.

Burleson said he feels there are those other things for which the Government was designed and, of course, it costs money. "Such things as the conservation of our natural resources — caring for God's gifts to people that they may be preserved for future generations," he said.

Burleson also said that the individual, groups of individu-

als or local governmental entities are unable to cope with matters of flood control and, in many cases, an adequate water supply. "We have got to look to the future if our area progresses. For one thing, this means water is a priority concern."

"The Federal Government has assisted our area in numerous respects in coping with some of these problems. We have our share of flood control projects and our share of attention to those now in the planning stage. An example is the effort to find an answer to the flood threat in Abilene and several other places.

"An example of other Federal activity in our area is, of course, our military installations, new Post Office buildings and other Federal interests which are proper and needed."

Further, Burleson said that he "certainly subscribes to the idea that the Government should help the elderly and those people who are unable to help themselves."

Burleson has been an implacable foe of the constant encroachment of the Federal Government into the area of State and local affairs.

"As the Federal Government has grown to its colossal proportions, the threat of centralized power in Washington has increased," Burleson pointed out. "To this, I am opposed, as my actions have proved."

"Big Government and high taxes are the result of many activities of the Federal Government which should be reserved to the States. Big Government with its far-flung operations has created needless waste and extravagance."

Burleson stated he was proud of the "trust and the confidence placed in me by the people who send me to Congress — and to violate that

trust in any respect would be unthinkable."

He urged residents of the 17th District not familiar with his background of service to investigate the record he has made — "And if you believe I have been faithful to duty and worthy of your continued support, then your active participation in my campaign will be greatly appreciated."

Well-known throughout Texas, Burleson is a native of the 17th District. He was born and raised on a farm between Anson and Stamford in Jones County. He attended rural school, and graduated from Anson High School. Following graduation, Burleson attended Abilene Christian College, Hardin-Simmons University, and graduated from Cumberland Law School. Later, he studied postgraduate law at the University of Texas.

Burleson married Ruth DeWeese, daughter of Rev. R. D. DeWeese, who pastored Baptist Churches in West and South Texas.

SECOND COLEMAN LIQUOR TRY EXCLUDES BURKETT

Legalized sale of all alcoholic beverages is again being sought in Coleman County. This time, however, the Burkett area is not involved.

Reportedly the legal sales petition for off-premises consumption is being circulated only within the corporate limits of the City of Coleman, not including the entire precinct as was the case a few weeks ago. Burkett voters helped to defeat the last try, in the township by better than a three to one margin.

Walton Linley Goble, nearly 90, one of the last of Callahan County's pioneer cattlemen, died at his home in the south part of Cross Plains Tuesday morning at 7:25 after an illness of several weeks.

Funeral services were scheduled for Wednesday afternoon at 3 o'clock from the first Baptist Church, of which he was a member, with the Rev. Dan Gaines, of Abilene, and the Rev. Roger Butler, pastor, officiating. Burial was to be in Cross Plains Cemetery beside the grave of his wife, who died April 8, 1963.

Mr. Goble was born April 7, 1876, in Llano County and married Mattie C. Woodward in Leon County Feb. 9, 1898. He and his wife came to Callahan County shortly after the turn of the century, settling on the Dick Cordwent Ranch, west of Cottonwood, one of the largest cattle spreads ever operated in this country. He assumed duties as ranch foreman and helped in management of the Cordwent holdings in Texas. He continued in capacity until the death of the owner, who was disposed of by his kinsmen in the area.

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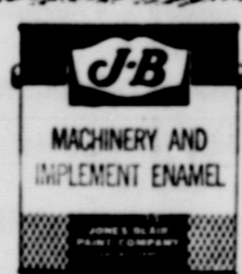
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
