Bison Nab Track Title; Eye Region

What some might consider more than a skeleton, Cross Plains Buffalo team again illustrated superiority of quality at the District Relays in Ranger last

The local cindermen, under tutelage of coach Jack Gray, registered 112 points on the way to the conference track title and qualified five boys for participation in seven events at the regional relays April 23.

Bo Strickland paced Buffalo point-earners, collecting blue ribbons in the 100-yard dash with a 9.8 time, and in the 220-yard dash, clocking 21.8. In addition, he received a second place award in the broad jump with a leap of 19-9/4 feet, five inches short of the winning jump.

Jim Brown's 120-yard hurdle time of 15.1 was adequate for a first in that event, but a Ranger "dark horse" nudged him out of the winner's circle in the 180-yard lows, leaving Brown in second place by scant inches. Brown added additional points to the Herd's cause with a fourth place in the high jump, clearing the bar at 5-5.

Junior Lee jogged his mile in 4:47.0, earning his first place ticket to the regional matches.

The Bison also drew blood in two relay events. Jerry Strickland, Jerry Watson, Brown and Bo Strickland combined efforts for first place in the 440-yard relay and a Cross Plains mile relay group finished third.

Jerry Strickland backed up his brother, Bo, in every event, placing fifth in the 100-yard dash, the 220, and in the broad jump.

Jerry Watson sprinted to third place in the 220 and Bo Barr followed with a fourth in the 440.

Ronnie Rhodes tossed the discus to sixth place, 110-11 1/2. Nearest challenger to Cross Plains was Baird, with 100 1/2 points. Ranger had 86 1/2, De Leon 79, Albany 54 1/2, Eastland 39 1/2 and Clyde 19.

Saturday, April 23, will find Bo Strickland, Jerry Strickland, Brown, Lee and Watson in Den-

Cross Plains school board was reorganized at a meeting of trustees Monday night.

Nathan Foster was named president; Vernon Phillips, vice-president; Edwin Baum, secretary; and D. C. Jones, assistant-secretary.

Resignation of Mrs. Paul Whitton, second grade teacher, was accepted to become effective at the end of the current school term.

Contract Action

The board voted five to two not to extend contracts of four

faculty members, who presently hold tenures for one or more years. The four are Superintendent Paul Whitton, High School Principal Wayne Ford, Elementary School Principal Jack Watkins and Coach Jack Gray. Contracts of Ford, Wat-

kins and Gray expire at end of the 1966-67 school year and Whitton's tenure will expire Feb. 1, 1968. It will be the policy of the Board of Trustees in the future not to grant contracts longer than for one year duration.

Eighteen members of the faculty, bus drivers, custodians and lunchroom personnel were chosen for another year.

Bart Thomas was again named custodian and A. J. (Ted) McCuin tax assessor-collector.

Regular meeting dates of the school board are the second Monday night of each month.

Citywide Clean-Up Campaign Set

An annual Spring Clean-Up, expected to be the most thorough undertaking of its kind in many years, will be conducted the last five days of this month. Co-sponsors of the undertaking are the City Council and Cross Plains Garden Club.

The drive to clean every "crack and cranny" of the town will begin on Monday morning, April 25, and be completed by Saturday night, April 30, declared Mayor Doyle Burchfield yesterday.

Garden Club members, who will work in generating enthusiasm for the drive and as near

100 per cent participation as possible, hope to accomplish noticeable improvement in the downtown section of town as well in the residential district. Merchants are being asked to improve appearance of store fronts and to remove merchandise and litter from sidewalks.

Special recognition will be given two places, one downtown and one residential, for the cleanliness and good order being maintained. Winners will be picked by an anonymous committee selected by the Garden Club.

Trash will be hauled from

homes by city employees on Thursday and Friday, April 28 and 29, without charge. Only requirement is that the refuse be placed at an alley or street, where it will be handy for collectors to load. Any person missed in the trash collection may telephone the City Hall, 725-2021, and a truck will be directed to make the pick-up.

"We have a wonderful little town, however, there are a great many vacant lots which should be cleared and cleaned and a bit of painting-up and fixing-up would greatly enhance beauty of the downtown area," Mayor Burchfield said.

93-Year-Old Man Relates Joy Of His First Plane Ride

In deference to my host of friends that take note of the anniversary of my natal day, in many and sundry forms of congratulatory recognition, none of which was more appreciated than the presentation of a round trip ticket by plane from Abilene to Dallas, for my first ride by plane.

Boarding a Tran-Tex plane in Abilene and leaping from land to sky and listening to the siren's song of Motor and Propeller, looking down on receding earth and Texas and Pacific roadbed and ribbons of concrete pavement as they are fast becoming secondary modes of travel, Jimmie Nell Montgomery, my engaging chaperone, was the first to break the silence, observing that if Orville Wright could be reincarnated and come back to earth he would be much surprised to see what the miniature efforts he contributed to aviation had resolved themselves into.

This brought to my mind, days of long ago when I read of the efforts at Kitty Hawk and had my doubts that Newton's law of gravitation could be

overcome by man sufficient to make a mechanical device heavier than air fly above the earth. Of course, this was before I embraced the philosophy that all things are possible and that there is nothing improbable.

Arkwright, with his spinning jenny and Stephenson trying to utilize the expansive force of Jamie Watts' tea kettle steam and apply it to his locomotive rods and others brought into existence what is known as the industrial age and completely altered the old agricultural society.

Today no one plows with a stick or reaps with a scythe. Industry and invention put that plowman in a sulky seat and the reaper in an arm chair drawn by a triumphant six or V8. This makes me think of that day when an employee of the patent office in Washington retired from his job, giving as his excuse that most of the inventions had been made, and that he stood in need of regular employment. Franklin, Whitney and Fulton had enrolled their names in that hall of fame, and McCormick had just knocked for admission while

the line of civilization waited on his invention for its forward march across the wheat plains of the west. Elias Howe, Erskinson had not lived, Edison had not been born and the grandfather of the Wrights, great brothers twain, kept a blacksmith shop at Dayton.

We are advised that we are standing on the brink and shoal of a new day, that Technology, Computers and Automation are ready to take over, if industrial endeavor and inventions are to be superseded man will still possess his prerogative of manipulating the throttle valve, the Johnson bar and the brake lever. In other words throw the switch.

The exhilarating, animating, thrilling, thought provoking experience of the plane ride was conducive of refreshing thoughts that had lain in the dusty archive of forgetfulness for years. To ride above the clouds and gaze on a panorama of endless beauty. To be the beneficiary of your thoughtfulness and generosity; what a sublime joy for which I thank you gratefully.

State 36 Project Costs \$754,000

Three quarters of a million dollars will be spent in Callahan County on rebuilding and improving State Highway 36 this summer.

R. W. Domann, senior resident engineer of Abilene, said in a meeting with Texas Highway Department authorities, construction company personnel and state, county and city lawmen and officials in the City Hall Friday morning, that cost of rebuilding the thoroughfare will total \$754,000. The project, which includes grading, widening of structures, flexible base and application of asphaltic concrete pavement, has been divided into two separate contracts. First will extend from the Taylor County line to Highway 283, intersection west of Rowden, a distance of 16.4 miles, at a cost of \$333,000. Contract has been awarded to Allan Construction Co. of San Antonio. Second project, 18.7 miles from Highway 283 to Eastland County line, was awarded to J. H. Strain & Sons of Tye, at a cost of \$421,000.

Started Monday

According to Domann preliminary work was to have begun Monday on the projects. Concrete work on structures was expected to begin first, starting on the western side of the county and progressing eastward. Both projects call for completion within 150 working days. Preparatory construction before hot topping was estimated to be finished about Aug. 15-20. Domann added that paving must be finished before Oct. 1.

No Traffic Stoppage

"There will be no traffic stop-

page during the work," Domann stated. He continued that work would be done on one-half of the roadway at a time, leaving the other half to handle two-way traffic. It was brought out that construction personnel would be properly stationed in areas in which caution was necessary, and proper markings would be installed.

Climbing Lanes

Most striking improvement to the present roadway is the addition of 12 climbing lanes for ease of passing slow traffic in heretofore no passing zones. These climbing lanes will be scattered throughout the two projects at strategic points," Domann explained.

Although in these places the roadbed will necessarily be widened, no additional right-of-way has been or will be purchased.

Among those from out-of-town present at the brief meeting which was held "to better inform you and the public of what will take place during construction of the two projects," were, in addition to Domann: J. H. Strain, owner of J. H. Strain & Sons, Inc., and Herman Lloyd of Tye, Richard Ivey, state highway department, and Bob Warren, engineer technician, of Abilene, R. W. Atkins, area superintendent of Allan Construction Co., and Floyd A. Smalley, Texas Highway Department Maintenance supervisor, of Baird.

Local authorities attending were: Patrolman Bill Vineyard, Deputy Sheriff Howard Cox, City Marshal Eddie Heard, Mayor Doyle Burchfield, Postmaster Lloyd Bryan, and Superintendent Paul L. Whitton.

Site Clearing Begins At Lakewood Center

Site clearing began Monday morning, kicking-off construction on a \$101,500 recreational project midway between Cross Plains and Rising Star. Location is that of Lakewood Country Club.

Bowden Lumber Company, general contractor, has 180 days to finish the project making Oct. 8, 1966, the completion date. Gerald Bowden, owner of the firm, said Monday that materials have been ordered and that negotiations are being completed with sub-contractors for the swimming pool and irrigation and water system. Bowden will build the clubhouse, which is to be located at approximately the same site as the present golf shop at Lakewood.

Enlargement Planned
R. D. (Bob) Needham of Cross Plains, president of Lakewood Recreational Center Board of Development, pointed out yesterday that although the present program calls for an expenditure of only \$101,500, plans are to apply for additional Farm Home Administration funds to incorporate additional features, probably next year.

"When the project is completed it will offer recreational facilities for persons of all ages and tastes," Needham declared. Clubhouse will face the East with entrance through a 12 by 16 foot lobby and pro shop. To the South will be a recreational room encompassing 1,600 square feet, overlooking both the lake and the swimming pool. The large room, suitable for small conventions, will have facilities for partitioning. It will contain a large ornate fireplace across one wall.

Living Quarters
Included in the clubhouse will be 1,200 square feet of living quarters for the family of the custodian.
A total of 233 persons paid four months fees in advance to guarantee financial success of the recreational center from

beginning. Directors of the organization, who remained steadfast in their resolve to secure the facility despite several sizeable roadblocks are: Needham; James Rutherford, secretary, of Rising Star; Dave C. Lee and Luther Forbes of Cross Plains, and W. E. Tyler, Jack Jackson and A. A. (Banta) White of Rising Star.



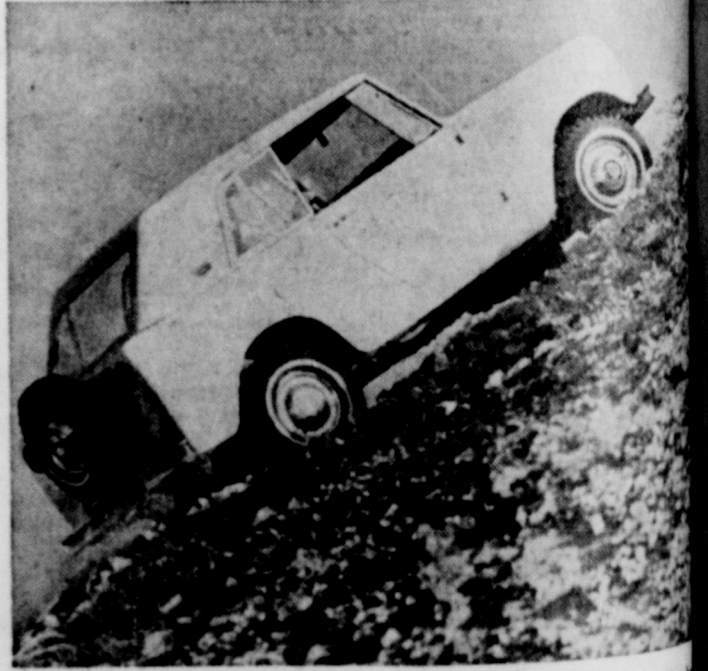

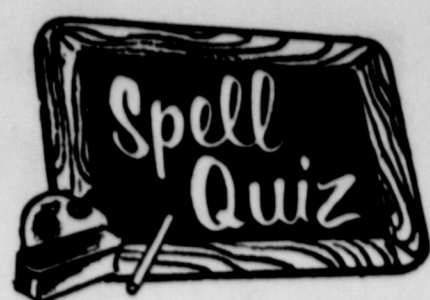
