Apply For Medicare Before Reaching 65

Cross Plains and area residents who have a 65th birthday will be protected by medicare's medical insurance at the earliest date only if they apply during the three months before they become 65.

R. T. Tuley, Jr., social security district manager in Abilene, explained that each person who reaches 65 on or after Jan. 1, 1966, has a seven-month period during which he may enroll for the supplementary medical insurance plan, but the effective date of this protection depends on the date of his application. This individual enrollment period begins with the third month before he is 65 and ends in the third month after his 65th birthday. As an example, Tuley said, if an application is not filed until the month after a person becomes 65, medical insurance coverage does not begin until the first day of the second month after he applies.

He urged everyone who has a 65th birthday approaching, including those who continue working, to file his application at the social security office two or three months before that 65th birthday. This early action will guarantee full medicare protection beginning on the first day of the month age 65 is reached, but no earlier than July 1, 1966.



Distributing Stamp Book
 66 edition of a perennial household favorite the S&H Green Stamps is being introduced May 12, at J.R.B. Supermarket in Cross Plains. This edition marks the 70th anniversary of the Sperry and Hutchinson Company, nation's largest trading stamp company, which was founded in 1896. The 66 edition, biggest the company ever published, contains 2,000 pages and some 2,000 illustrations, according to J. R. Beadle, manager of the store here. There are 12 categories for stamp-accumulation. From there, you choose from, he reports, approximately 37 per cent of the merchandise displayed in the store this year.

Beadle said the 1966 Idea Book continues the trend, starting years back, to provide a selection of leisure items. As an example of this, he said that skiing and riding equipment was introduced for the first time this year. Mr. Beadle said the teenage beds and Spanish-style furniture among other new items listed were a sport-automatic pet feeder, clothes dryer, electronic set, solid-body guitar, teflon-coated iron, and a battery-carving knife.

He expects to distribute 2 million catalogs this year, Beadle said.

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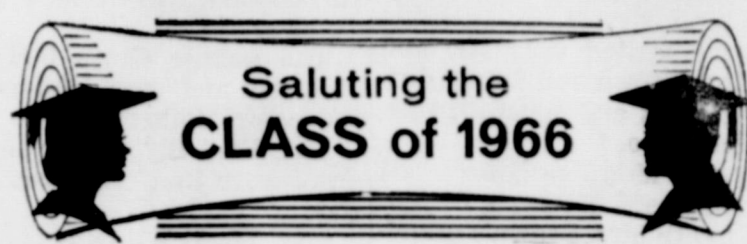
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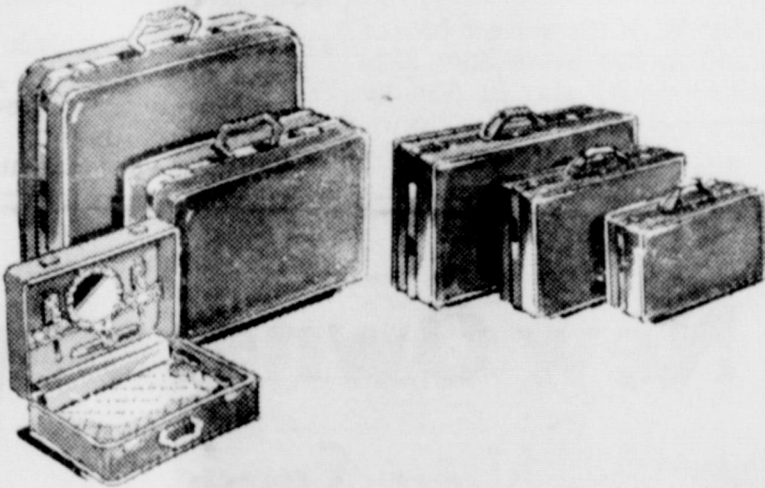
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
