364 Eligible For Issuance Of Free Foods In County

Late Monday afternoon 364 Callahan countians had been certified eligible to receive surplus commodities, according to County Judge Byron Richardson.

The 364 people represent 223 families or cases. Cases range in size from one to 14, the largest which has been approved in this county. The second largest family recipient has nine members.

Eighty-seven households have been certified in the Cross Plains area, and 136 have been okayed in the Baird, Clyde and Putnam sectors.

Judge Richardson re-affirmed the date of first surplus distribution as June 21 in Baird. The distribution point will be open six hours that day, from 9 a.m. to 12 noon and from 1 p.m. to 4 p.m.

First distribution in Cross Plains will be Thursday, June 23, and will be governed by the same hours. Certified recipients may pick up foodstuffs in the rear of the City Hall here.

The program will be under direct supervision of the County Judge, however, he will be assisted by Mrs. Bobby Huckabee of Clyde and Mrs. Bobbie Jobe of Baird. The crew will be assisted at Baird by Brownwood personnel who have long experience in the surplus commodity project.

Persons already certified will receive letters next week telling them when and where to report to get the commodities.

Richardson stated that the list of persons has been broken down systematically in order to

further orderly distribution. Recipients are urged to follow the schedule to lessen waiting time and minimize confusion.

Tony Bauer of Brownwood, district commodity distribution supervisor, was in Baird Monday inspecting storage facilities for the foodstuffs. He reportedly "okay'd" the facilities. No storing will be done in Cross Plains, but workers will bring from Baird only what commodities area cards call for.

Primary items which are available through the program at present are flour, corn meal, raisins, rice, canned meat, powdered milk, shortening, margerine and peanut butter. Richardson added, "Other foods may possibly become available at a later date."

Cost to the county for the commodities is 18c per person or \$18 per 100 recipients for the remainder of the year. That cost, though, will double the next year, but under the present set-up will remain constant thereafter.

"Clerical help will take a larger portion of the budget than the foodstuffs," Richardson opined Monday.

The surplus commodity project is being tried for the first time in this county, but surrounding counties have been participating in the program for the needy for many years.

County 4-H Horse Show Slated At Baird June 22

Callahan County 4-H Clubs will hold their annual horse show June 22 at the Rodeo Grounds, one mile east of Baird on Interstate Highway 20, according to County Agent Jerry L. Lackey.

There will be four halter classes: grade mares, grade geldings, registered mares and registered geldings; two games, pole bending and barrel racing, and two performance events, Western pleasure and reining.

Trophies will be presented winners of each class and ribbons will be given through third place in each division.

Lackey stated that all enrolled members of Callahan County 4-H Clubs are eligible to participate, if they or their immediate family own the horse entered in competition. Only one horse per participant and one participant per horse will be allowed.

Methodists Send 2 To Dallas Conclave

First Methodist Church of Cross Plains is being represented at the annual conference of Texas Methodists in Dallas this week by the Rev. Robert Shaw, pastor, and Paul L. Whitton, lay leader of the Cisco district.

Methodists trace their beginning in Texas to the crossing of the Red River from Arkansas by William Stevenson, an early traveling preacher.

Month Just Passed Was Dryest May On Record

The month just passed was the only May in the 17 years that S. F. Bond has served as official weather observer in Cross Plains that no rainfall was recorded here.

Light showers fell during the month but none of measurable quantity.

Until last month the average rainfall recorded here for May amounted to 4.20 inches.

The driest month of May until this year was in 1961, when only .30 of an inch of precipitation was received during the 31 days. Total rainfall for that year, though, was 24.43 inches, a normal figure.

Total rainfall received during the first five months of 1966 in Cross Plains is 9.20 inches.

Compromise Suggested In Phone Rates Impasse

Officials of Kizer Telephone Co., Inc. have offered a compromise to finding a solution to their request of City Councils of Cross Plains and Rising Star to grant increased telephone rental hikes.

The latest proposal asks for approximately the same increase, but entails two different suggestions.

Primary difference in the latest request, which was presented to the Cross Plains City Council Tuesday night and Rising Star aldermen Monday, divides the hike into steps.

Ralph Kizer, secretary of the company, said Tuesday, "The plan calls for the increase to be divided into two parts of approximate equal amounts." He continued, "We thought it might help to lessen the burden if we staggered the raises."

As proposed and if okayed by the councils, the first step

would become effective July 1, and second would go into effect Jan. 1, 1967.

Extensions Static

Kizer explained the second difference that no increase would be asked on extension telephones either in businesses or private homes. "Present rate on the extra phone would become permanent," he said. Extensions now cost businesses \$1.50 per month and private homes \$1.00 monthly.

All other classifications would be affected except local pay station rates which would remain at 10 cents per call.

The initial proposal offered by the Kizer firm would have raised both types of extensions by 50 cents. The secretary said it would lessen the increase by about \$1,500 annually.

Stepped Raises

Kizer concern listed the requested hikes by steps as follows.

Present rate for one party business phone is \$9.25. It would be increased by \$1.65 to \$10.90 beginning July 1, and starting in January 1967 would jump to \$12.50, another \$1.60 increase. Two party business phone would follow the same general outline, increasing to \$8.25 in July from \$6.00 then to \$10.50 in 1967.

Residence rentals would also be stair-stepped. Private lines advanced from \$5.25 to \$5.90 then \$6.50. Two party service would cost \$5.40 and \$5.80, and four party line phones would advance from \$4.00 to \$4.40 and \$4.80.

No Formal Action

The proposition was presented to Rising Star council Monday, and informal discussion indicated an even split among council members, according to Kizer. He continued, however, "They expressed a desire to confer with the Cross Plains council before making a binding decision." Neither did local councilmen make a decision Tuesday night.

A joint meeting could come this week, although no definite plans had been announced as the Review hurried to press.

Continuing Battle

Governing bodies of both cities formally rejected the initial request last month in marathon sessions. Rising Star vetoed the request 3-2 and Cross Plains nixed the proposal 5-0.

Continuous negotiations have been waged between the telephone company and the two councils since Kizer first made the request late last year. The company, serving Cross Plains, Rising Star, May and surrounding rural areas, asked at that time the request be granted by Jan. 1.

Action was delayed until last month while the cities awaited results of an auditor's report hired by the councils. After long deliberation the councils refused the increase.

Wayne McDonald Hired By Eldorado

Cross Plains is about to lose its music man.

Wayne McDonald, who has directed Cross Plains High School Buffalo Band to national recognition during his five years here, has been elected bandmaster at Eldorado High School.

"We couldn't beat Cross Plains in band competition," a member of the board of trustees at Eldorado is reported to have said, "so we went after their director."

McDonald, who has headed the local band since 1961, has guided it to many prize winning performances. The Buffalo Band has won more than any other band at the annual Brady Band Festival with three show night awards, three firsts in street parade and four blue ribbons in concert and sight reading. The Buffalo Band was named Honor Band in UIL Region VII last year. In 1964 the local

group represented Texas at the Indianapolis 500 Festival at Indianapolis, Ind., and garnered a first in a street parade at Abilene Christian College Band Day.

Musgrove Wins Race For Seat In State Legislature

A much lighter voter turnout than expected was recorded in Callahan County Saturday in the Democratic run-off election.

Only 954 ballots were counted in the 12 voting boxes and absentee polls in the county. Baird topped all other places with a total of 301 polls. Cross Plains tallied 219 and Clyde voted 187. Putnam reported 85 polls for fourth place.

A. E. Dyer, Jr. of Baird, County Democratic Chairman, said, "The vote was much lighter than we expected; we had hoped for 1,500 to 2,000. However, farmers being busy and the fact that there were no county races contributed heavily to the light vote."

Burke Musgrove of Stephens County, Breckenridge, won the representative post from the five-county 63rd Legislative District by just over 500 votes. The victor carried Palo Pinto, Eastland and Stephens counties with the latter boosting his total by almost 800 votes. His opponent, John Musselman of Albany, won margins in Callahan and Shackelford counties as he did in the first primary election.

Musgrove fills the post vacated by Wayne Gibbens several months ago when he resigned to accept a position as state liaison officer in Washington, D. C.

ty was given a better than a 2-1 vote margin in Callahan County in his successful bid for nomination as Democratic candidate for Attorney General. Martin garnered 653 votes while his opponent, Franklin Spears of Bexar County, totaled 292 in Callahan.

Martin carried each of the 12 polling places in this county, but Musgrove and Musselman split the boxes. Musselman was favored in this county 568 to 386, and he won margins at Baird, Clyde Cross Plains, Cottonwood, Putnam, Eula, Atwell, Oplin, Rowden, Denton and absentee balloting. Admiral and

W. J. (Will) Gattis, 83, store-keeper in the Scranton community for 57 years, died at 8 p.m. Thursday in an Abilene hospital after an illness of two weeks.

Funeral services were held at 2 p.m. Saturday in Scranton Methodist Church with the Rev. V. R. Whittington, pastor of Scranton Methodist Church, officiating. Burial was in Scranton Cemetery.

Born in Meadon, Tenn., Dec. 3, 1882, he moved to Scranton in 1894. He helped his father, the late W. T. Gattis, build a general merchandise store.

Assuming operation of the store after the death of his father, he and his brother, A. L., operated the business until the brother's death in 1958.

He was a longtime member of the Methodist Church and was well-known.

Survivors include his wife; two sons, Bill of Scranton and Bob of Midland; one daughter, Mrs. Bill Taylor of Weatherford; and five grandchildren.

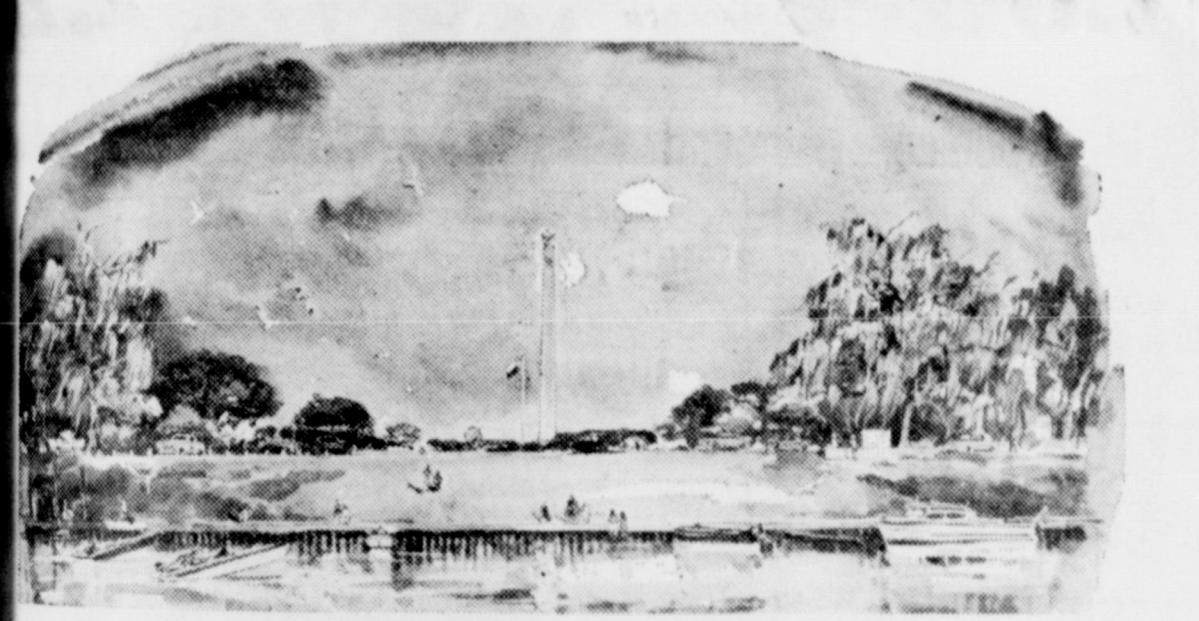

He also is a student at East Texas State University.

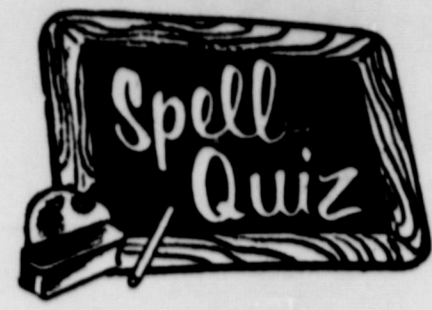
