## Additional Features Being Sought For Local Recreational Center

Although chances for Lake-wood Recreational Center being used much this summer appeared remote late yesterday, indications were that the vast playground, located midway between Cross Plains and Rising Star, may ultimately offer many facilities not included in the original set of plans.

Work on construction of a

swimming pool, bathhouse, clubhouse and revamped golf course, all a part of the original \$101,500 contract, has been moving on schedule except for delays created by difficulty in procuring some materials. It appeared Tuesday, however, that the Aug. 1 target date for opening could not be met.

Contractors expect to have the swimming pool, clubhouse

and auxiliary facilities ready by Aug. 15. Seeding of the golf course, though, will not get underway until next week. Although irrigation lines have already been laid out is believed that the course will not be ready for use before the Autumn.

Architects are presently preparing a set of plans to request additional federal funds to add:

boat docks, loading ramps, paved parking areas, a reunion pavillion, picnic shelters, miniature golf course and outside fences. Exact amount of money required for these additional improvements will not be known until plans have been completed and estimates prepared.

Inclusion of the extra facilities would make the project one of the most complete rec-

reational spots in this section of Texas, offering inducements to persons of all ages.

Need for the reunion sites was pointed up the past week when 3,800 persons spent the week end at Brownwood State Park — and that figure is only a portion of those on the lake as a whole — and many of them were families gathering for annual get-togethers. It is

pointed out that a less congested gathering site would be most welcomed.

"Although we probably won't get open as soon as we would like," said R. D. (Bob) Needham, chairman of the board for the local recreational center, "I believe that the additions now being planned will justify the short delay and be welcomed by everyone."

Members of the elite group, who will represent Cross Plains in area Little League playoffs, were recognized Thursday night of last week following the final game of the regular season. Each all-star will receive a pin at the area playoffs in recognition of his achievement.

All-Star teams from Cross Plains and Clyde will compete to determine the area championship, but date and site of the playoffs have not yet been established.

Winner of that title will advance to the district playoffs, scheduled July 18-23 at Weatherford. The victor of that encounter is entitled to compete in the sectional playoffs at Levelland, and sectional champs congregate at Lubbock later in the season to vie for the state crown.

The local all-star group will be under the supervision of Manager Dale Bishop and Coach Billy Dillard, who led the Cats to their third consecutive championship this year.

The group will probably begin workouts around July 7, Bishop said.

Date and site of the area playoffs will be published in this newspaper as soon as plans are finalized.

## Rare Disease Breaks Out In Comanche County Livestock

There has been reported an outbreak of vesicular stomatitis among livestock herds in Comanche County.

The disease is characterized by blisters in the mouth of cattle and horses and on the snout and feet of swine. It can be told from foot and mouth disease only by laboratory tests. The malady often causes infected livestock to stop eating.

The disease is not usually found in cattle and horses less than one year old. The first symptoms usually noted in cattle and horses are salivation and a softening and tearing off of the mucous membrane of the tongue, lips, hard palate, and gums. A sick animal shows an acute temperature rise two to five days after exposure. Temperatures in cattle rise to 105 degrees but are seldom observed in the field because

this stage of the disease has passed before the owner is aware of an abnormal condition in his cattle.

In cows and horses there is a patchy reddening of the oral mucous membranes, especially the tongue. Small areas start swelling. The swellings develop into vesicles as small as a dime up to the size of a dollar.

The vesicles often join together to form large vesicles. The fully developed vesicle contains a clear, straw-colored fluid, which has a high virus content. The vesicles usually rupture in a few hours and are therefore not often seen in the field.

A raw undersurface, red with gray-white fragments, is seen after the rupture of the vesicles. The virus disappears in a few days. Severely infected animal may lose the outer layer of tissue from the entire

tongue. A prompt and exact differential diagnosis of vesicular stomatitis is imperative — the disease is contagious and causes considerable alarm because of its close resemblance to foot and mouth disease.

Whenever a vesicular disease appears, therefore, state livestock officials impose local quarantines to prevent its spread. State and federal veterinarians make primary investigations. If their findings warrant, a specially trained veterinarian is sent to the infected premises to make a differential diagnosis.

Treatment of the disease consists in isolating infected animals and feeding them a soft food until they have recovered. Authorities say that the malady usually runs its course in about two or three weeks.

The deed of trust became necessary when difficulties arose concerning mineral rights on building sites of the 20-unit federal housing project planned for Cross Plains.

## Wounded Soldier Back From Viet Nam

Specialist E-4 Aubrey Childers, son of Mr. and Mrs. Blanton Childers of near Cottonwood, has been separated from the U. S. Army after 13 months duty in South Viet Nam during which time he was wounded.

The 24-year-old local soldier suffered a wound in his right hand, for which he received the Purple Heart, during a Viet Cong surprise attack on his station which was located nine miles north of Saigon. He also suffered an ear injury during his 13 months in the battle zone. His parents did not know of either injury until his return

home Wednesday of last week, June 29. Childers' mother said that in every letter received from the soldier he would write, "it is just fine with me."

Childers' mother told the following of his account of the hand injury. He was sitting in the mess hall when mortar shells began exploding. He left his protection to go help his buddy who was in sleeping quarters. His buddy was killed, but he helped carry two other soldiers to safety who had suffered hip and leg wounds. It was reported that one died later but the other recovered. She added that he did not know

exactly when during the attack he was hurt. The hand injury happened during the last six months of his duty there, which "was the worst" according to Mrs. Childers.

He sustained his ear injury while clearing jungles with a "dozer" tractor when his machine set off a mine. The specialist was assigned to an engineering company which helped clear sites for air strips and other military undertakings. Mrs. Childers said, "He told us that he was shot at several times while running his dozer." While in Viet Nam a Vietnamese general presented him and

others of the engineering company with a citation commending his bravery and skill while building an air strip. "It is a pretty and impressive document," his mother said.

The former Cross Plains High School student received his separation papers in San Francisco, Calif., after completing two years of duty in the armed service, but he still has two years of duty in the Army Reserve to complete.

Although his future plans are as yet indefinite, he plans to spend a few weeks with his parents and visit with other relatives.

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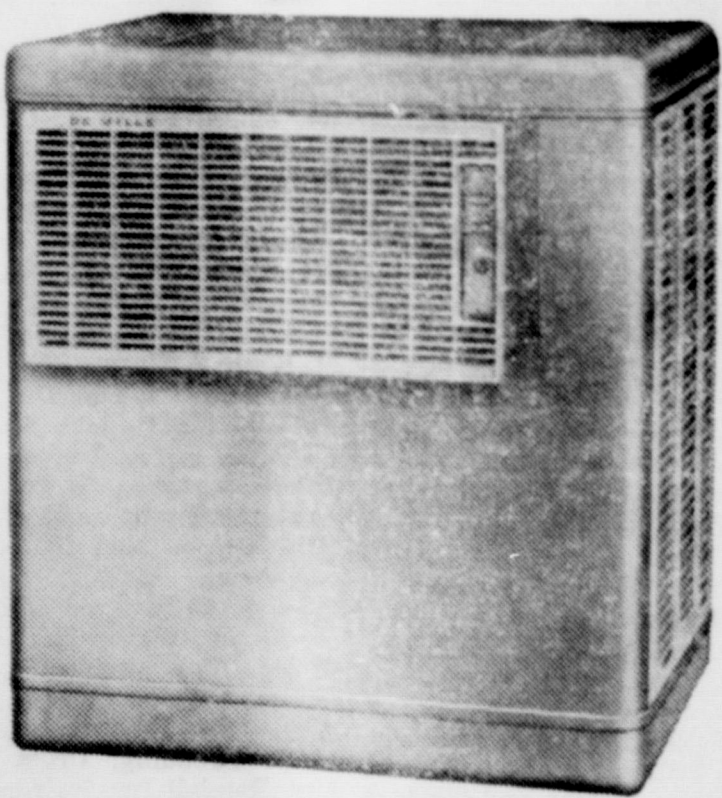

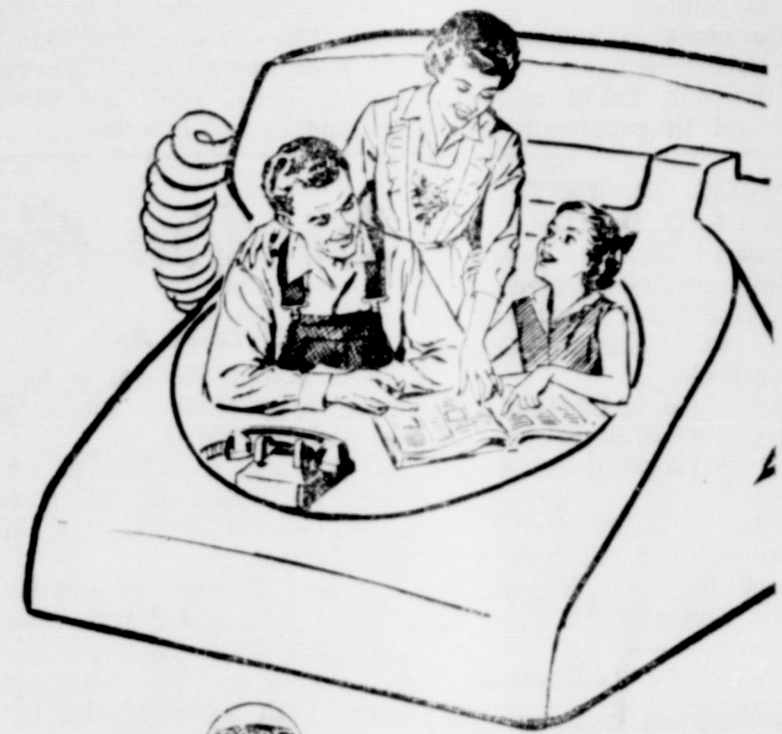

## Sabanno Man Cages Pair Of Unusual Birds

Newspapermen are not necessarily nuts, however, their actions do occasionally need explaining.

It is, therefore, pointed out that members of the Review staff who may have been seen chasing insects the past few days were doing so for a purpose. They were searching for food for two strange birds, recently captured by W. B. (Wes) Holcomb at his home in the Sabanno community. The birds, which were to have been offered to the newly-opened Abilene zoo, have flown the coop. Staff members were trying to feed them Tuesday when one of the birds escaped. Since they seemed to be a pair, the other was released.

The birds are swifts — so named by the rapidity of their flight — and are somewhat uncommon in the Cross Plains area. Holcomb caught the pair and notified the home town newspaper, which assumed the feeding and tending obligation until the Abilene zoo could be contacted.

Encyclopedias describe the birds as follows:

"The swift is a small bird with strong wings but weak feet. Various kinds of swifts are found in practically every

part of the world. The swift is sooty brown or greenish black in color. Some have white throats or rumps. They fly tirelessly all day, capturing insect food while on the wing. They seldom alight. At dusk they return to chimney, cave or cliff, or hollow tree, where they live in colonies or roost in flocks. Their song, continuously repeated, is little more than a chattering. Swifts build odd nests, in which sticks are cemented together with saliva. Some of these nests are almost entirely made with saliva, as are the birds' nests of eastern Asia which people eat.

"The common American swift is a bird of eastern North America. It lives almost entirely in chimneys. It is generally called chimney swift, or, wrongly, chimney swallow. In perching, it clings to the wall with its feet, and braces itself with its spine-pointed tail. It breaks off the twigs for its nest with its beak or feet as it flies. The nest is semicircular in form. It is firmly cemented to the inside walls of chimneys which are not used during the summer. The female lays four to six white eggs. Swifts are very useful birds. They eat almost nothing except insects."

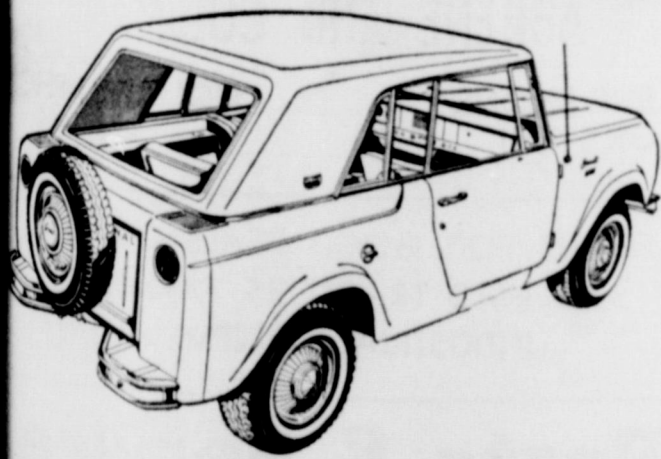

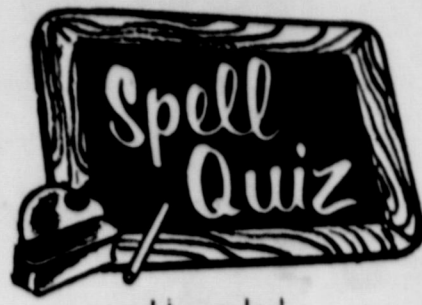

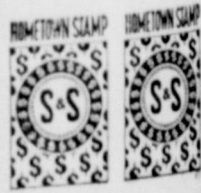
