One thousand old settlers are expected in Cross Plains Friday as this city plays hosts to the 28th annual reunion of Callahan County pioneers.

Preceding opening of the formal program, a street parade beginning at the school campus and moving down Main Street and on to the City Park will be held. Mayor Doyle Burchfield announced that the procession will get underway at 9:30 a. m. and that at least eight riding clubs from near by cities as well as decorated floats and bicycles will be seen.

Prominent Speaker

High spot of the program, which gets underway at 10 a. m. and is expected to close around 5 p. m., will be an address just before noon by Judge Walter R. Ely, Jr., of Los Angeles.

Paul Shanks of Clyde, president of the old settlers association, said yesterday: "It is a great honor to have such an outstanding jurist, himself a Callahan County native and member of one of our oldest families, here to make the main address."

Judge Ely, son of W. R. Ely of Abilene and grandson of the late Mr. and Mrs. Jasper McCoy, presides over the 9th U. S.

Circuit Court of Appeals which includes Washington, Oregon, Arizona, Nevada, Montana, Idaho, Alaska, Hawaii and Guam.

No Barbecue

For the first time in two years there will be no free barbecue as a part of this year's celebration. Basket lunches, though, will be spread picnic style by various groups during the noon hour.

Serving as masters of ceremonies during the day will be B. H. Freeland and James Paul Shanks, both of Baird, and Randall C. Jackson of Abilene. They will alternate at the microphone.

Officers of the old settlers association in addition to Shanks are Fred Stacy of Cross Plains, vice-president, and Mrs. B. L. Boydston of Baird, secretary and treasurer.

In commenting on Friday morning's parade, Mayor Burchfield yesterday urged merchants

and civic organizations to prepare for some type of entry.

"We will probably have close to 200 horsemen in the procession and feel that there should be a variety of other types of paraders," he said.

Fred Cutbirth Laid To Rest At Baird Tuesday

Fred Cutbirth, widely known Callahan County rancher, died Sunday night at 10:05 in Brownwood Memorial Hospital after an illness of several months.

Funeral services were held from Godfrey Funeral Chapel in Baird Tuesday at 3 p. m. with the Rev. D. L. Barnes of Mineral Wells, former pastor of the First Methodist Church in Cross Plains, officiating. He was assisted by the Rev. Lloyd Coker, present Methodist pastor here, and the Rev. Arthur Cooper, Baird Methodist pastor. Burial was in Ross Cemetery at Baird.

Mr. Cutbirth, son of the late Mr. and Mrs. J. B. Cutbirth who settled in this area in the days of open ranges, before organization of the county, was born at Belle Plain May 13, 1886. He was married to Miss Ada McWhorter at the ranch home of her parents south of Baird, Jan. 7, 1917. He was a lifelong resident of this county.

Mr. Cutbirth had extensive land and catt'e holdings and operated ranches both in the

Cross Plains and Baird localities. He was a long-time member of the board of directors of the First National Bank of Baird and had been vice-president for a number of years, positions which had been once held by his father.

Survivors include his wife; one daughter, Mrs. J. L. Bonner of Cross Plains; one brother, W. L. Cutbirth of Baird; three sisters, Mrs. J. R. Hart of Fort Worth, Mrs. Fred Heyser and Mrs. Howard Farmer, both of Baird; two granddaughters, Mrs. Eulus Parker of Cross Plains and Mrs. Joe McWilliams of Ruidoso, N. M.; and three great-grandchildren.

Active pallbearers were: Forrest Walker, Eddy Don Edmondson and Jack Webb Baum, all of Cross Plains; Dr. John Beall and James Skinner, both of Abilene; Billy Henry, Fred Goble and James Eubank of Baird.

Members of the family requested that all of Mr. Cutbirth's friends be included as honorary pallbearers.

eration of any those factors relative to such agricultural use. Amendment No. 2: Would authorize creation of airport authorities composed of one or more counties. Amendment No. 3: Would withdraw Arlington State College from participating in the Permanent University Fund. Amendment No. 4: Increases the permissible term of office for directors of conservation and reclamation districts from two to six years and validating present statutory terms of office for such officials. Amendment No. 5: Would

authorize the legislature to provide for a system of retirement, disability and death benefits for county officials and employees and others. Amendment No. 6: Provides for payment of assistance to survivors of law enforcement officers, custodial personnel of the Texas Department of Corrections and full-paid firemen. Amendment No. 7: Would repeal the Constitutional provision requiring a poll tax as a prerequisite to voting and requiring the Legislature to provide for annual registration of all voters.

Amendment No. 8: Would authorize the Legislature to enact laws permitting persons to vote for state officers and for president and vice president of the United States without having fulfilled residence requirements to vote for other officers, as well as laws permitting former residence of the state, for a certain period, to vote absentee for president and vice president. **Judicial Increase** Amendment No. 9: Increases to five the number of judges on the Texas Court of Criminal Appeals and lengthens the terms

of that court. Amendment No. 10: Provides that taxes or bonds previously voted in any independent school district or in any junior college district shall not be abrogated, cancelled or invalidated by any change in boundaries and authorizing the continuance of the levy after such change without further election. Amendment No. 11: Would authorize the issuance of an additional \$200,000,000 in bonds by the Texas Water Development Board upon two-thirds vote of the Legislature and expanding the uses to which mon-

ey in the Texas Water Development Fund may be put. Amendment No. 12: Provides the method and manner for dissolution of hospital districts. Amendment No. 13: Would authorize the Legislature to provide for consolidating the functions of government within a county having 1,200,000 or more inhabitants and to provide for intergovernmental contracts between political subdivisions of the county. **Military Vote** Amendment No. 14: Would allow members of the armed

forces to vote in Texas upon satisfying the residence requirements applicable to Texans in general. Amendment No. 15: Authorizes the channeling of funds from private and federal sources through the state for use by privately owned or local agencies in establishing and equipping facilities to assist the handicapped in becoming gainfully employed. Amendment No. 16: Establishes the date on which newly-elected members of the Legislature qualify and take for office.

Opening of the 1966 high school football season is yet a month away, but conference coaches have already made forecasts of district campaign results.

Mentors of the various districts voted last week on results, and no Callahan County grid team rated better than third. Cross Plains, Clyde and Baird, formerly all members of District 10-A, have gone separate ways. Cross Plains moved into 9-A, Baird remained in the 10-A loop, and Clyde advanced into Class AA, District 7.

Balloting was held in connection with the annual coaching school held in Houston last week.

Cross Plains Third
The Buffaloes were picked to break even in four games with other league members, finishing in the middle of the heap.

Goldthwaite Eagles, defending 9-A winner, was projected to again claim the championship on the strength of 11 returnees from last year's team which posted a 10-1 mark. The Mountaineers of Santa Anna was recognized as a possible strong challenger with experience as a trump. Nine regulars head eight other lettermen returning to don the Black and Gold spangles of the Mountaineers.

The local Bison's expected returnees, nine strong, were believed to be 9-A's third best unit, although, coaches opined, "Quickness, desire and good leadership just may be the keys to a higher finish." The Buffs had a 5-5 season in 1965.

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FIFTEEN ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1966.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 33 proposing an Amendment to Section 6, Article XVI, Constitution of the State of Texas, to authorize state participation in programs financed with funds from private or federal sources and conducted by local level or other private, nonsectarian associations, groups, and nonprofit organizations, in establishing and equipping facilities for assisting the blind, crippled, or otherwise physically or mentally handicapped in becoming gainfully employed, in rehabilitating and restoring the handicapped, and in providing other services determined by the state agency to be essential for the better care and treatment of the handicapped.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 6, Article XVI, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 6. (a) No appropriation for private or individual purposes shall be made, unless authorized by this Constitution. A regular statement, under oath, and an account of the receipts and expenditures of all public money shall be published annually, in such manner as shall be prescribed by law.

"(b) State agencies charged with the responsibility of providing services to those who are blind, crippled, or otherwise physically or mentally handicapped may accept money from private or federal sources, designated by the private or federal source as money to be used in establishing and equipping facilities for assisting those who are blind, crippled, or otherwise physically or mentally handicapped in becoming gainfully employed, in rehabilitating and restoring the handi-

capped, and in providing other services determined by the state agency to be essential for the better care and treatment of the handicapped. Money accepted under this subsection is state money. State agencies may spend money accepted under this subsection, and no other money, for specific programs and projects to be conducted by local level or other private, nonsectarian associations, groups, and nonprofit organizations, in establishing and equipping facilities for assisting those who are blind, crippled, or otherwise physically or mentally handicapped in becoming gainfully employed, in rehabilitating and restoring the handicapped, and in providing other services determined by the state agency to be essential for the better care or treatment of the handicapped.

"The state agencies may deposit money accepted under this subsection either in the state treasury or in other secure depositories. The money may not be expended for any purpose other than that for which it was given. Notwithstanding any other provision of this Constitution, the state agencies may expend money accepted under this subsection without the necessity of an appropriation, unless the Legislature, by law, requires that the money be expended only on appropriation. The Legislature may prohibit state agencies from accepting money under this subsection or may regulate the amount of money accepted, the way the acceptance and expenditure of the money is administered, and the purposes for which the state agencies may expend the money. Money accepted under this subsection for a purpose prohibited by the Legislature shall be returned to the entity that gave the money.

"This subsection does not prohibit state agencies authorized to render services to the handicapped from contracting with privately-owned or local facilities for necessary and essential services, subject to such conditions, standards, and procedures as may be prescribed by law.

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified voters of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1966, at which election ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing assistance to the blind, crippled, or otherwise physically or mentally handicapped in the form of grants of public funds obtained from private or federal sources only, to local level or other private, nonsectarian associations, groups, and nonprofit organizations for establishing and equipping facilities to assist handicapped in becoming gainfully employed, in their rehabilitation or restoration, or for providing other services essential to the better care and treatment of the handicapped."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment authorizing assistance to the blind, crippled, or otherwise physically or mentally handicapped in the form of grants of public funds obtained from private or federal sources only, to local level or other private, nonsectarian associations, groups, and nonprofit organizations for establishing and equipping facilities to assist handicapped in becoming gainfully employed, in their rehabilitation or restoration, or for providing other services essential to the better care and treatment of the handicapped."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of the state.

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER SEVEN ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1966.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 13 proposing an Amendment to Sections 2 and 4 of Article VI of the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to repeal the provision making payment of the poll tax a requirement for voting and so as to authorize the Legislature to provide for the registration of all voters.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 2 of Article VI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended, effective February 1, 1968, by deleting the following language:

"and provided further, that any voter who is subject to pay a poll tax under the laws of the State of Texas shall have paid said tax before offering to vote at any election in this State and hold a receipt showing that said poll tax was paid before the first day of February next preceding such election. Or if said voter shall have lost or misplaced said tax receipt, he or she shall be deemed to have paid said tax before offering to vote at any election in this State and hold a receipt showing that said tax receipt has been lost. Such affidavit shall be made in writing and left with the judge of the election. The husband may pay the poll tax of his wife and receive the receipt therefor. In like manner, the wife may pay the poll tax of her husband and receive the receipt therefor.

provided, however, that before offering to vote at an election a voter shall have registered annually, but such requirement for registration shall not be considered a qualification of an elector within the meaning of the term 'qualified elector' as used in any other Article of this Constitution in respect to any matter except qualification and eligibility to vote at an election. Any legislation enacted in anticipation of the adoption of this Amendment shall not be invalid because of its anticipatory nature. The Legislature may authorize absentee voting. And this provision of the Constitution shall be self-enforcing without the necessity of further legislation. Any member of the Armed Forces of the United States or component branches thereof; or in the military service of the United States, may vote only in the county in which he or she resided at the time of en-

Every person subject to none of the foregoing disqualifications who shall have attained the age of twenty-one (21) years and who shall be a citizen of the United States and who shall have resided in this State one (1) year next preceding an election and the last six (6) months within the district or county in which such person offers to vote, shall be deemed a qualified elector; and provided further, that any voter who is subject to pay a poll tax under the laws of the State of Texas shall have paid said tax before offering to vote at any election in this State and hold a receipt showing that said poll tax was paid before the first day of February next preceding such election. Or if said voter shall have lost or misplaced said tax receipt, he or she shall be deemed to have paid said tax before offering to vote at any election in this State and hold a receipt showing that said tax receipt has been lost. provided, however, that before offering to vote at an election a voter shall have registered annually, but such requirement for registration shall not be considered a qualification of an elector within the meaning of the term 'qualified elector' as used in any other Article of this Constitution in respect to any matter except qualification and eligibility to vote at an election. Any legislation enacted in anticipation of the adoption of this Amendment shall not be invalid because of its anticipatory nature. The Legislature may authorize absentee voting. And this provision of the Constitution shall be self-enforcing without the necessity of further legislation. Any member of the Armed Forces of the United States or component branches thereof; or in the military service of the United States, may vote only in the county in which he or she resided at the time of en-

tering such service so long as he or she is a member of the Armed Forces."

Sec. 2. That Section 4 of Article VI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by changing the words "may" to "shall" in the last clause thereof and by deleting the words "in all cases containing a population of ten thousand inhabitants or more."

The text of this Section so amended, is shown here with the deleted language marked through by a broken line and with the new language underscored:

"Section 4. In all elections by the people, the vote shall be by ballot, and the Legislature shall provide for the numbering of tickets to make such other regulations as may be necessary to insure the purity of the ballot and to punish fraud and to provide by law for the registration of all voters at an election containing a population of ten thousand inhabitants or more."

Sec. 3. If any other Amendment to Sections 2 or 4 of Article VI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, being a different provision, is adopted at an earlier election, the adoption of this Amendment shall not be construed as nullifying any change made by any other Amendment.

Sec. 4. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified voters of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1966, at which election ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR repealing the provision making payment of the poll tax a requirement for voting."

"AGAINST repealing the provision making payment of the poll tax a requirement for voting."

Sec. 5. If the foregoing Amendment is adopted, the proclamation of the Governor declaring the adoption of the Amendment shall set forth the full text of the amended Sections, as amended hereby, and as amended by any other proposed Amendment which has been submitted by the Legislature and which has been duly adopted prior to the proclamation.

Sec. 6. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of the state.

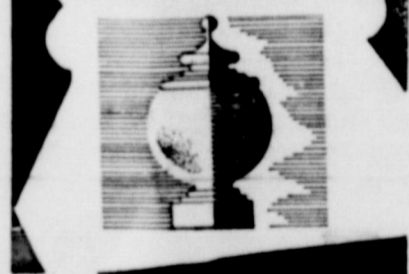



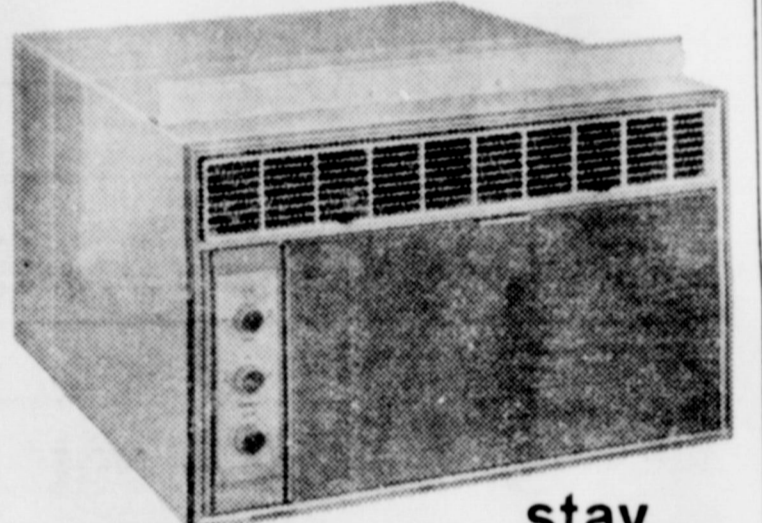

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TWELVE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1966.
HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 48 proposing an Amendment to Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas, providing the method and manner for dissolution of hospital districts created under Article IX of the Constitution.
BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Section 9, Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read as follows:
"Section 9. The Legislature may by law provide for the creation, establishment, maintenance and operation of hospital districts composed of one or more counties or all or any part of one or more counties with power to issue bonds for the purchase, construction, acquisition, repair or renovation of buildings and improvements and equipping same, for hospital purposes; providing for the transfer to the hospital district of the title to any land, buildings, improvements and equipment located wholly within the district which may be jointly or separately owned by any city, town or county, providing that any district so created shall assume full responsibility for providing medical and hospital care for its needy inhabitants and assume the outstanding indebtedness incurred by cities, towns and counties for hospital purposes prior to the creation of the district, if same are located wholly within its boundaries, and a pro rata portion of such indebtedness based upon the then last assessed tax assessment rolls of the included cities, towns and counties if less than all the territory thereof is included within the district boundaries; providing that after its creation no other municipality or political subdivision shall have the power to levy taxes or issue bonds or other obligations for hospital purposes or for providing medical care within the boundaries of the district; providing for the levy of annual taxes at a rate not to exceed seventy-five cents (75c) on the One Hundred Dollar valuation of all taxable property within such district for the purpose of meeting the requirements of the district's bonds, the indebtedness assumed by it and its maintenance and operating expenses, providing that such district shall not be created or such tax authorized unless approved by a majority of the qualified property taxing electors thereof voting at an election called for the purpose; and providing further that the support and maintenance of the district's hospital system shall never become a charge against or obligation of the State of Texas nor shall any direct appropriation be made by the Legislature for the construction, maintenance or improvement of any of the facilities of such district.
Provided, however, that no district shall be created except by act of the Legislature and then only after thirty (30) days' public notice to the district affected, and in no event may the Legislature provide for a district to be created without the affirmative vote of a majority of the taxpaying voters in the district concerned.
The Legislature may also provide for the dissolution of hospital districts provided that a process is afforded by statute for:

(1) determining the desire of a majority of the qualified voters within the district to dissolve it;
(2) disposing of or transferring the assets, if any, of the district; and
(3) satisfying the debts and bond obligations, if any, of the district, in such manner as to protect the interest of the citizens within the district, including their collective property rights in the assets and property of the district, provided, however, that any grant from federal funds, however dispensed, shall be considered an obligation to be repaid in satisfaction and provided that no election to dissolve shall be held more often than once each year. In such connection, the statute shall provide against disposal or transfer of the assets of the district except for due compensation unless such assets are transferred to another governmental agency, such as a county, embracing such district and using such transferrable assets in such a way as to benefit citizens formerly within the district.
Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1966, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:
"FOR the constitutional amendment providing the method and manner for dissolution of hospital districts."
"AGAINST the constitutional amendment providing the method and manner for dissolution of hospital districts."
Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1966.
SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 39 proposing an amendment to Section 18, Article VII, Constitution of the State of Texas, to withdraw Arlington State College from participation in the Permanent University Fund.
BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Section 18, Article VII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:
"Section 18. For the purpose of constructing, equipping, or acquiring buildings or other permanent improvements for the Texas A & M University System, including Texas A & M University, Prairie View Agricultural and Mechanical College of Texas at Prairie View, Tarleton State College at Stephenville, Texas Agricultural Experiment Stations, Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas Engineering Experiment Station at College Station, Texas Engineering Extension Service at College Station, and the Texas Forest Service, the Board of Directors is hereby authorized to issue negotiable bonds or notes not to exceed a total amount of one-third (1/3) of twenty per cent (20%) of the value of the Permanent University Fund exclusive of real estate at the time of any issuance thereof; provided, however, no building or other permanent improvement shall be acquired or constructed hereunder for use by any institution of the Texas A & M University System, except at and for the use of the general academic institutions of said System, namely, The Main University, and Texas Western College, without the prior approval of the Legislature or of such agency as may be authorized by the Legislature to grant such approval. Any bonds or notes issued hereunder shall be payable solely out of the income from the Permanent University Fund. Bonds or notes so issued shall mature serially or otherwise not more than thirty (30) years from their respective dates.
"The Texas A & M University System and all of the institutions constituting such System as herein enumerated, and The University of Texas System, and all of the institutions constituting such System as hereinabove enumerated, shall not receive any General Revenue funds for the acquiring or constructing of buildings or other permanent improvements, except in case of fire, flood, storm, or earthquake occurring at any such institution, in which case

an appropriation in an amount sufficient to replace the uninsured loss so incurred may be made by the Legislature out of General Revenue funds.
"Said Boards are severally authorized to pledge the whole or any part of the respective interests of Texas A & M University and of The University of Texas in the income from the Permanent University Fund, as such interests are now apportioned by Chapter 42 of the Acts of the Regular Session of the 42nd Legislature of the State of Texas, for the purpose of securing the payment of the principal and interest of such bonds or notes. The Permanent University Fund may be invested in such bonds or notes.
"All bonds or notes issued pursuant hereto shall be approved by the Attorney General of Texas and when so approved shall be incontestable. This Amendment shall be self-enacting provided, however, that nothing herein shall be construed as impairing any obligation heretofore created by the issuance of any outstanding notes or bonds under this Section by the respective Boards prior to the adoption of this Amendment but any such outstanding notes or bonds shall be paid in full, both principal and interest, in accordance with the terms of such contracts."
Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1966, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:
"FOR the Constitutional Amendment withdrawing Arlington State College from participation in the Permanent University Fund."
"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment withdrawing Arlington State College from participation in the Permanent University Fund."
Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the constitution and laws of this state.

August 27, 1920

Shook No. 3, north of the Hillburn wells was shot into a big producer on last Saturday, the 21st. In a few minutes after it came in, the oil was turned into the pipeline. It is estimated to be making 90 barrels an hour.

Warren Everett of Cottonwood stated to the Review that the Cottonwood public school will begin on the first Monday in September. H. S. Varner will be principal and F. E. Mitchell will be first teacher.

Mayor Wakefield is having some work done on Main Street in the way of putting gravel in the holes and filling in on the sides of the concrete crossings, which have been very mean for sometime.

August 28, 1925

August 30, 1935

Philpeco Country Club golfers won the championship of the Heart of Texas and Oil Belt associations by defeating Ranger nine to six at the Cisco course Sunday afternoon.

August 30, 1940

Cross Plains schools will open Monday morning according to Supt. Lewis C. Norman. Norman stated that approximately 600 students were expected to enroll.

In the run-off primary Saturday, B. H. Freeland defeated J. H. Carpenter for the county judge's office, and J. M. (Jim) McMillan beat Jeff Clark for commissioner of the fourth precinct. For Representative of the 17th District Sam Russell defeated incumbent Clyde L. Garrett, and John Lee Smith was victorious over Omar Burleson for the State Senate.

Mark Adair, Cross Plains businessman, underwent a tonsillectomy at the Coleman Overall Hospital Monday. He is doing splendidly.

C. D. (Doke) Westerman this week assumed management of the Magnolia Service Station, on Eighth Street, just across the street north of the Methodist Church.

August 24, 1945
