Schools To Open Monday

Prisoner Leaps From Speeding Car But Fails To Elude Lawman

A prisoner who had just a short while earlier given himself up made a desperate attempt at escape or self destruction late Saturday night near Baird.

He is Paul Sutton, age 19, who stands accused of night time burglary in a warrant which was issued for his arrest July 7 for allegedly burglarizing Foster Grocery and Bishop Chevrolet early that morning. Another warrant was also issued for a man not yet apprehended.

Warrants were issued in Ted Souder's Justice Precinct 6 Court, but will be transferred to 42nd District Court at Baird.

Gives Self Up

Sutton was taken into custody by Edgar H. Heard, former City Marshal here, in Cisco about 10:20 Saturday night. "I had talked with him by telephone earlier," the Cisco policeman said, "and he agreed to give himself up."

Heard then radioed Deputy Sheriff J. H. Cox in Cross Plains

that he had Sutton in custody, and Cox picked the prisoner up in Cisco for transportation to Callahan County jail in Baird.

Just a few miles from Baird Sutton, although handcuffed, opened a door on Cox's auto and leaped from the moving vehicle.

"I stopped as soon as I could. I was driving about 65, and radioed for help as I was turning around," Cox said. Highway Patrolmen Jerry Mathews and Bob Favor of Baird, who were working nearby, arrived within minutes. Cox said that Sutton was so severely injured that he made no attempt to run after leaping from the car. An ambulance was called and he was rushed to County Hospital at Baird, but was later transferred to Hendrick Memorial Hospital in Abilene where his condition was listed as good Monday.

"I grabbed for the bottom of his coat as he jumped," Cox stated, "but it slipped from my grasp."

"I Love Them."

Cox explained in answer to question if he thought Sutton was trying to escape or take his own life, "I think he was trying to take his own life."

Cox qualified his statement by pointing out that the prisoner had asked while en route to Baird where the nearest hospital was and had queried Cox on the punishment he faced.

Cox said, "I could not tell him what punishment he would receive, but explained the various procedures he could use in answering the charges against him."

The Cross Plains Deputy quoted Sutton as saying, "If I don't make it through all this, tell my wife and baby that I love them."

"He then fell silent," according to Cox, "and shortly made his leap."

Narrow Escape

"It's a wonder it hadn't killed him on the spot," the deputy said, "I believe that it was 42 steps from where he hit the gravel alongside the highway to where he stopped in the ditch." He suffered multiple lacerations skidding over rocks.

479 Students Are Expected

School bells will call an estimated 479 students to classes Monday morning to begin the 1966-67 school year in Cross Plains.

A full-strength faculty will be on hand to greet the students in the first day of classes. Twenty-two instructors compose the teaching staff this year, 21 classroom personnel and Superintendent Wayne Ford, and Miss Betty Browning, formerly a regular faculty member, will head the Title I, student enrichment program sponsored by the federal government. She will have a few assistants, and a budget of \$24,197 has been proposed for that program.

Full Day's Classes

A full day of classes is planned for the initial day, Monday, according to Supt. Ford. He explained that the day should go smoothly because high school students have been working on schedules this week.

Following last year's routine, classes will begin each morning at 8:10 and dismiss at 3:25 each afternoon. There will be seven periods daily of approximately 55 minutes duration each in high school.

Enrollment Same

Principals Scot Edington and Jack Watkins, high school and elementary respectively, have estimated this year's enrollment to be about the same as last year.

Initial day of 1965-66 170 students were in four high school classes and 297 in the eight elementary grades. This year, however, only 160 are expected in high school, but the loss is thought to be more than absorbed in grammar school. Preliminary figures reveal that 319 students could be on hand Monday.

Watkins projects an increase of about 12 in the first grade this semester, 36 as compared to 24 last year. Enrollment approximations for other grades are: second 30, third 32, fourth 35, fifth 45, sixth 60, seventh 45, eighth 36. Edington listed possible class strength at 35 freshmen, 48 sophomores, 37 juniors and 39 seniors.

Transportation And Meals

All buses will make regular runs Monday, and the lunchroom will serve the noon meal. Last year's personnel will again staff the feeding facility. They are Mrs. Robert Brashear, Mrs. Doyle Cowan and Mrs. Herman Harris.

Peanut Support To Stay At \$227 Ton

The Agriculture Department said Friday the support price for this year's crop of peanuts will remain at the previously announced national average of \$227 a ton. This compares with \$224 a ton for last year's crop.

There had been a possibility that this year's rates might be changed, depending on the production outlook. The department said, however, there will be no change in the supports.

This year's rates by types and areas include: Spanish type in Southwest area \$227.70, and runner type, \$215.24.

Peanut Warehouse Will Be Built Here

Construction will begin soon on a warehouse to be built by Cross Plains Grain & Peanut Company to store 1,500 tons of peanuts. It will be located on the southwest corner of the firm's property.

Glenn Winfrey, partner and manager of the concern, said Monday that the facility will be ready to handle this year's crop. "We have been getting everything in readiness to serve farmers more rapidly and completely during the approaching harvest season," Winfrey stated.

Putnam Schools To Begin On Monday

A general assembly at 9 a.m. Monday morning will officially begin another new term for Putnam schools, it has been announced by Superintendent W. R. Reynolds.

With everything in readiness and splendid facilities, faculty members and trustees are looking forward to a highly successful school year.

Elementary teachers will be Mrs. Roland Nichols, first and second grades; Mrs. Richard Purvis, third and fourth; Mrs. John McIntyre, fifth and sixth.

Other instructors will be Mrs. James Paul Shanks, English; Mrs. Sarah Berry, physical education, business and girl's athletics; Warren Townley, social studies and boy's athletics; Jerol Price, science and math; Superintendent R. W. Reynolds, math.

Supt. Reynolds said classes will be held all day the first day of school, and the lunchroom will be in operation. The public was invited to attend an assembly at 9 a.m.

School Lunch Price Raised; Board Sets Annual Budget

Education is not only important business, it is big business.

Budget for the approaching school year was tentatively set by members of the board of trustees for Cross Plains schools Monday night at \$237,012.27.

Lunch Price Higher

The board also approved increased charges for meals at the school lunchroom. The new price structure will be 30 cents per meal for students of the first six grades, 35 cents for those in the 7th through the 12th grades, if the lunches are bought on a weekly basis. Single meals will cost 45 cents for those in the first six grades and 50 cents for those of higher classification. School lunch-

es last year were served at a 20 cent flat rate.

Less Commodities

It was pointed out that the increased schedule of charges was necessitated by a diminishing list of commodities available free from the federal government and rising costs of foodstuffs bought for operation of the local project. Superintendent Wayne Ford revealed that the loss from operation of the school lunchroom last year totaled \$1,524.97, as compared with a deficit of \$301.29 for the year before.

Hope was expressed by trustees that parents will have their children take all of their noon meals at the school lunchroom, thus avoiding losses sustained by preparation of foods which are not consumed.

Bids tendered by three bread companies serving the Cross Plains area were accepted by trustees Monday night. The school will pay 26½ cents for a pound and one-half loaf. A low bid for milk was accepted from the Forden Company calling for 6.1 cents for half pints of

pure milk and 6.3 for the chocolate milk drink.

Federal Money

In commenting upon the new budget Supt. Ford explained that of the total figure of \$237,012.27, an appropriation is anticipated from the federal government in the amount of \$24,197 to finance the Title I Program, aid made available for deprived children.

Ford was in Austin last week for conference on this program and believes that definite okay will be received Aug. 29.

Miss Betty Browning will serve as the Title I director. Subject to expected approval of the federal program, Mrs. James Chesshir and Mrs. Lesley B. Ingram will serve as teacher aids. Contract negotiations are underway with an Abilene teacher for the second teaching position under the program.

Other business transacted at Monday night's meeting included the designation of Dave Lee's Service Station as official tire repair place for school vehicles.

Poverty Agency Board Qualifications Outlined

Joe D. Philpott, Central Texas Opportunities, Inc. director of Coleman, has announced qualification requirements for membership to the proposed Policy Advisory Committee in Callahan County.

Meeting to select the board has been set for Thursday, Sept. 1, in the commissioner's court room at Baird at 7:30 p.m. All interested persons are urged to attend to choose the committee which will be composed of not less than 8 nor more than 16 persons.

"Its purpose will be to counsel and advise the directors of the corporation on problem of their community and to advance ideas as to worthwhile programs which should be instituted to help the underprivileged," Philpott said of the organization which serves Callahan, Coleman, Concho, McCulloch and Runnels Counties.

The directors stated first qualifications for a place on the committee was to reside within this county and listed the fol-

lowing other specifications. "A person whose family income is \$3,000.00 per year or less, or is a member of a minority group.


"A person who is a recognized leader within his respective community who has displayed prior concern with economic, social and educational problems.

"A person who is engaged in one of the following activities: public education, public health service, welfare agencies, labor organization, employment agencies, legal profession, law enforcement agencies, religious institution, civic and service organization, business people, city, county and government units, and existing organizations concerned with social and economic development."

"Each Policy Advisory Committee shall have not less than 30 per cent of its members elected thereto who are members of a minority group and representatives of low income families," he said.

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1966. SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 39 proposing an amendment to Section 18, Article VII, Constitution of the State of Texas, to withdraw Arlington State College from participation in the Permanent University Fund.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 18, Article VII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 18. For the purpose of constructing, equipping, or acquiring buildings or other permanent improvements for the Texas A & M University System, including Texas A & M University, Prairie View Agricultural and Mechanical College of Texas at Prairie View, Tarleton State College at Stephenville, Texas Agricultural Experiment Stations, Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas Engineering Experiment Station at College Station, Texas Engineering Extension Service at College Station, and the Texas Forest Service, the Board of Directors is hereby authorized to issue negotiable bonds or notes not to exceed a total amount of one-third (1/3) of the value of the Permanent University Fund exclusive of real estate at the time of any issuance thereof; provided, however, no building or other permanent improvement shall be acquired or constructed hereunder for use by any part of the Texas A & M University System, except at and for the use of the general academic institutions of said System, namely, Texas A & M University, Tarleton State College, and Prairie View A & M College, without the prior approval of the Legislature or of such agency as may be authorized by the Legislature for the purpose of constructing, equipping, or acquiring buildings or other permanent improvements for the University of Texas System, includ-

ing The Main University of Texas at Austin, The University of Texas Medical Branch at Galveston, The University of Texas Southwestern Medical School at Dallas, The University of Texas Dental Branch at Houston, Texas Western College of The University of Texas at El Paso, The University of Texas M. D. Anderson Hospital and Tumor Institute at Houston, The University of Texas Postgraduate School of Medicine, The University of Texas School of Public Health, McDonald Observatory at Mount Locke, and the Marine Science Institute at Port Aransas, the Board of Regents of The University of Texas is hereby authorized to issue negotiable bonds and notes not to exceed a total amount of two-thirds (2/3) of the value of the Permanent University Fund exclusive of real estate at the time of any issuance thereof; provided, however, no building or other permanent improvement shall be acquired or constructed hereunder for use by any institution of The University of Texas System, except at and for the use of the general academic institutions of said System, namely, The Main University and Texas Western College, without the prior approval of the Legislature or of such agency as may be authorized by the Legislature to grant such approval. Any bonds or notes issued hereunder shall be payable solely out of the income from the Permanent University Fund. Bonds or notes so issued shall mature serially or otherwise not more than thirty (30) years from their respective dates.

"The Texas A & M University System and all of the institutions constituting such System as hereinabove enumerated, and The University of Texas System, and all of the institutions constituting such System as hereinabove enumerated, shall not receive any General Revenue funds for the acquiring or constructing of buildings or other permanent improvements, except in cases of fire, flood, storm, or earthquake occurring at any such institution, in which case

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1966, at which election lots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment withdrawing Arlington State College from participation in the Permanent University Fund."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment withdrawing Arlington State College from participation in the Permanent University Fund."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue necessary proclamation for the election and this amendment shall be published in the manner required by the constitution and laws of the State.

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TWELVE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1966. HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 48 proposing an Amendment to Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas, providing the method and manner for dissolution of hospital districts created under Article IX of the Constitution.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 9, Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read as follows:

"Section 9. The Legislature may by law provide for the creation, establishment, maintenance and operation of hospital districts composed of one or more counties or all or any part of one or more counties with power to issue bonds for the purchase, construction, acquisition, repair or renovation of buildings and improvements and equipping same, for hospital purposes; providing for the transfer to the hospital district of the title to any land, buildings, improvements and equipment located wholly within the district which may be jointly or separately owned by any city, town or county, providing that any district so created shall assume full responsibility for providing medical and hospital care for its needy inhabitants and assume the outstanding indebtedness incurred by cities, towns and counties for hospital purposes prior to the creation of the district, if same are located wholly within its boundaries, and a pro rata portion of such indebtedness based upon the then last approved tax assessment rolls of the included cities, towns and counties if less than all

the territory thereof is included within the district boundaries; providing that after its creation no other municipality or political subdivision shall have the power to levy taxes or issue bonds or other obligations for hospital purposes or for providing medical care within the boundaries of the district; providing for the levy of annual taxes at a rate not to exceed seventy-five cents (75c) on the One Hundred Dollar valuation of all taxable property within such district for the purpose of meeting the requirements of the district's bonds, the indebtedness assumed by it and its maintenance and operating expenses, providing that such district shall not be created or such tax authorized unless approved by a majority of the qualified property taxing electors thereof voting at an election called for the purpose and providing further that the support and maintenance of the district's hospital system shall never become a charge against or obligation of the State of Texas nor shall any direct appropriation be made by the Legislature for the construction, maintenance or improvement of any of the facilities of such district.

Provided, however, that no district shall be created except by act of the Legislature and then only after thirty (30) days' public notice to the district affected, and in no event may the Legislature provide for a district to be created without the affirmative vote of a majority of the taxing voters in the district concerned.

The Legislature may also provide for the dissolution of hospital districts provided that a process is afforded by statute for:

(1) determining the debt of a majority of the district voters within the district to dissolve it;

(2) disposing of or transferring the assets, if any, of the district; and

(3) satisfying the debt and obligations, if any, of the district, in such manner as to protect the interest of citizens within the district, including their collective property rights in the assets of the district, and provided, however, that any debt from federal funds, loaned or dispensed, shall be considered an obligation to be repaid, satisfaction and provided no election to dissolve shall be held more often than once each year. In such case the statute shall apply against disposal or transfer of the assets of the district except for due compensation, less such assets are transferred to another governmental entity, such as a county, creating such district and using such transferred assets in a way as to benefit citizens formerly within the district.

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1966, at which election ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the constitutional amendment providing the method and manner for dissolution of hospital districts."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue necessary proclamation for the election and this amendment shall be published in the manner and time as required by the constitution and laws of the State.

**HOUSE JOINT RESOLU-

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FIFTEEN ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1966. SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 33 proposing an Amendment to Section 6, Article XVI, Constitution of the State of Texas, to authorize state participation in programs financed with funds from private or federal sources and conducted by local level or other private, nonsectarian associations, groups, and nonprofit organizations for establishing and equipping facilities for assisting the blind, crippled, or otherwise physically or mentally handicapped in becoming gainfully employed, in providing other services determined by the state agency to be essential for the better care and treatment of the handicapped.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 6, Article XVI, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 6. (a) No appropriation for private or individual purposes shall be made, unless authorized by this Constitution. A regular statement, under oath, and an account of the receipts and expenditures of all public money shall be published annually, in such manner as shall be prescribed by law.

"(b) State agencies charged with the responsibility of providing services to those who are blind, crippled, or otherwise physically or mentally handicapped may accept money from private or federal sources, designated by the private or federal source as money to be used in and establishing and equipping facilities for assisting those who are blind, crippled, or otherwise physically or mentally handicapped in becoming gainfully employed, in rehabilitating and restoring the hand-

capped, and in providing other services determined by the state agency to be essential for the better care and treatment of the handicapped. Money accepted under this subsection is state money. State agencies may spend money accepted under this subsection, and no other money, for specific programs and projects to be conducted by local level or other private, nonsectarian associations, groups, and nonprofit organizations, in establishing and equipping facilities for assisting those who are blind, crippled, or otherwise physically or mentally handicapped in becoming gainfully employed, in rehabilitating and restoring the handicapped, and in providing other services determined by the state agency to be essential for the better care or treatment of the handicapped.

"The state agencies may deposit money accepted under this subsection either in the state treasury or in other secure depositories. The money may not be expended for any purpose other than the purpose for which it was given. Notwithstanding any other provision of this Constitution, the state agencies may expend money accepted under this subsection without the necessity of an appropriation, unless the Legislature, by law, requires that the money be expended only on appropriation. The Legislature may prohibit state agencies from accepting money under this subsection or may regulate the amount of money accepted, the way the acceptance and expenditure of the money is administered, and the purposes for which the state agencies may expend the money. Money accepted under this subsection for a purpose prohibited by the Legislature shall be returned to the entity that gave the money.

"This subsection does not prohibit state agencies au-

thorized to render services to the handicapped from contracting with privately-owned or local facilities for necessary and essential services, subject to such conditions, standards, and procedures as may be prescribed by law."

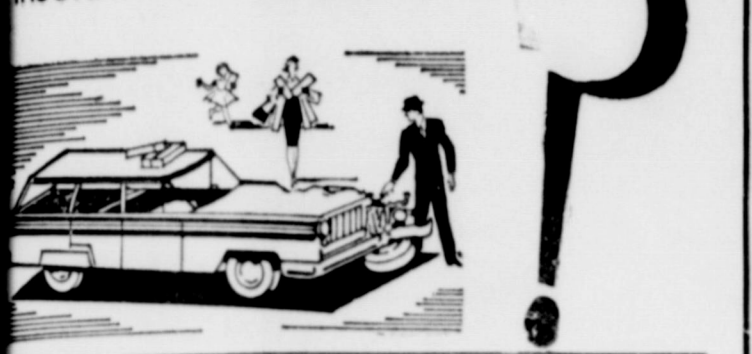
Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified voters of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1966, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing assistance to the blind, crippled, or otherwise physically or mentally handicapped, in the form of grants of public funds obtained from private or federal sources only, to local level or other private, nonsectarian associations, groups, and nonprofit organizations for establishing and equipping facilities to assist the handicapped in becoming gainfully employed, for their rehabilitation or restoration, or for providing other services essential for the better care and treatment of the handicapped."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment authorizing assistance to the blind, crippled, or otherwise physically or mentally handicapped, in the form of grants of public funds, obtained from private or federal sources only, to local level or other private, nonsectarian associations, groups, and nonprofit organizations for establishing and equipping facilities to assist the handicapped in becoming gainfully employed, for their rehabilitation or restoration, or for providing other services essential for the better care and treatment of the handicapped."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

INDUSTRIAL FOUNDATIONS

... to finance industrial growth

Competition between states and cities to improve their competitive abilities to attract new payrolls has increased the forming of Industrial Foundations in Texas. Many industries want and need someone else to own the land, brick and mortar, keeping their money available for plant operations. Industrial Foundations indicate the interest and desire of a community for new industry. Local citizens who participate usually figure that they get a return on their money in a Foundation by having an additional payroll circulating in their community.

— PURPOSE — is to give a community a corporate entity to assist industry to create jobs within the community — can be an existing industry as well as a new one. Foundations usually assist industry that cannot or will not use normal commercial financial institutions.

— EXTENT OF ACTIVITIES — usually are to acquire and develop industrial property . . . construct buildings for lease . . . provide funds for training workers . . . purchase machinery and equipment . . . prepare promotional material and prospecting expenses and any other function that would give the community a competitive advantage for a new payroll.

— ORGANIZATION — is usually by a group of businessmen who are interested in the economic growth and development of their community. A local attorney should prepare the application for the charter and by-laws in order to conform to state laws and internal revenue service regulations. The local bankers' support is very helpful in forming an Industrial Foundation.

— TYPE — of Industrial Foundations vary — profit or non-profit — stock or contributions — the type a town needs depends upon the attitude and characteristics of the local people and its competitive position with other towns to attract new manufacturing payrolls. In most cases, Industrial Foundations are only used to assist industries where labor cost is a big factor in the operation, as the payroll provided is the important thing to the economy of the community.
