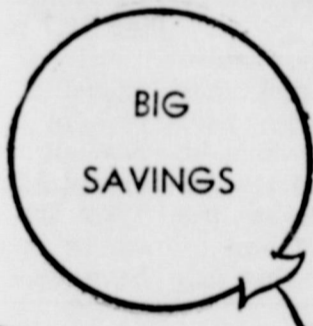

Teacher Tells Of Trip To European Nations

(Continued from Page 1.)

school teacher from Ireland was critical of our educational system and said her school hates to get American kids. They don't know anything. Our guide admitted that she had dreaded having us join the group. Americans always have too much luggage or cause trouble in some other way. For a while I was "the Angry American". These people presumed to know all about us. But as we shared experiences, most became dear to us. We learned that there is need for better communication even among those who theoretically speak the same language. Perspective makes a great deal of difference in our views, and the recognition and appreciation of differences in an atmosphere of warmth and respect make for friendships.

Concerning Yugoslavia, we saw little except government corn. I am told the country is poor, and I believe it. A shampoo and set cost about 80 cents, and one girl added a haircut for the same price. In the country we saw machinery, overhead irrigation and manpower. In the stores the atmosphere is quite different from that in Greece and Italy. Tourists are

practically ignored. No one is begged to buy anything. There is no bargaining. It is as if all are saying, "We tolerate you but we don't need you."

My impressions of Italy I shall keep to myself as they were formed on a prior excursion. Suffice it to say that much of the country is beautiful. Florence, Rome and Venice have sights worth seeing; but those people haven't learned about pure water yet. It does something to this American to have to pay for bottled water. So my interests this Summer was primarily Greek drama, but gratefully I became involved in the drama of life itself: new customs, new thoughts, new friends. I was lifted in spirit by the vision of past generations and humbled by the needs of humanity in the present age, realizing that my eyes will be opened to situations at home. I became convinced that more good, country-born Americans need to travel to create a better image of America. I know better than before that I must teach that communication is the meeting of minds, not word-calling. I know we are rich every time I drink a glass of cold water. But without a doubt, the best part of going is coming home.

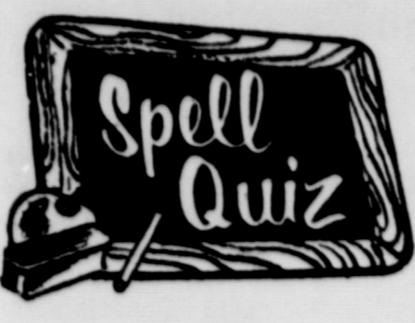
