## \$2,000 Is Sought In UF Drive Friday

Can Cross Plains lead the state?

The answer to that question will be known Friday night when 45 local ladies complete a canvass of this and adjoining communities to raise a \$2,000 United Fund goal in a single day. No other town in the state is expected to reach its quota on initial day of the annual campaign.

"We may not make it the first day but we're sure going to try," said Mrs. J. Peyton Smith, who serves as general chairman of the undertaking

and has organized workers to cover all parts of the trade territory.

Nathan Foster, local UF president, urges that the solicitation committees be generously received, stressing that each of them needs to complete the drive in the one day of working.

It is suggested that individuals endeavor to contribute the equivalent of one day's income if at all possible.

The annual campaign in Cross Plains and surrounding communities is to finance all

charitable undertakings for the ensuing 12 months. A budgeting committee, which recently surveyed needs for the year ahead, allocated the \$2,000 to be distributed as follows: West Texas Rehabilitation Center \$600, M. D. Anderson Tumor Research \$400, American Red Cross and Salvation Army \$175 each, Gonzales Warm Springs Foundation \$100, Texas Mental Health Association \$100, Medical Research Foundation of Texas \$50, Christmas cheer to unfortunate local families \$300, and local and transient relief \$100.

## Postal People Offer To Supply ZIP Code Data

Residents in the Cross Plains delivery area will be offered an opportunity to ZIP Code their mailing lists during October. Postmaster Lloyd Bryan announced today.

The local post office will deliver "no postage needed" cards to each of the patrons of the office beginning Oct. 10, Bryan said. Cards will have blanks for addresses used most often, but for which individuals do not know the proper Zip Codes. Throughout the nation 95 million of the cards will be delivered.

"This is a good time to get the ZIP Codes missing from

your lists," Postmaster Bryan noted. "This Christmas, ZIP Code will be as important as shopping and mailing early for the efficient and on-time delivery of the record-breaking avalanche of mail expected in the pre-holiday weeks," he explained.

After filling in the street number, city and state, the cards are to be mailed back to the postmaster. Post office personnel will add the proper ZIP Codes and return the cards to the sender.

President Johnson has proclaimed October 10-15 as "ZIP Code Week" to promote great-

er usage of ZIP Code.

Postmaster General O'Brien announced May 19 that steps were being taken to make ZIP Codes more accessible to the mailing public. The present program resulted from a search of the effective method to get the codes in the hand of private mailers. A poll conducted by Elmo Roper and Associates earlier this year found that about half the population is using ZIP Code. Of the remaining half who are not, 80 per cent said the reason was that they did not know the ZIP Codes for the people they write.

"The Roper poll strengthen-

ed our conviction that the public generally is ready and willing to cooperate with business mailers who will be presorting their second and third-class mail after Jan. 1, 1967," O'Brien said.

Addresses which cannot be ZIP Coded because of insufficient or improper addresses will be forwarded to the city indicated on the card, if legible, and codes will be added there. "Only addresses, not names of correspondents, should be listed on the cards," the postmaster said. ZIP Codes represent delivery areas for the postal services, not individuals.

## Bufs Seek Second Win At Gorman Friday Night

Cross Plains Buffaloes who took to the victory trail last week will hit the road again Friday night hopefully keeping on the path en route to tangling with Gorman Panthers.

Gorman of District 17-B will be trying to get back on the winning line after being derailed by Santa Anna 31-12 last week. Cross Plains will represent the third District 9-A opponent the Panthers have faced, and Gorman will attempt to get a winning percentage over the loop. Early had fallen 20-6.

Gorman, in pre-season polls rated to finish second behind Bangs in 17-B, was coasting along with a 3-0 mark until the 9-A Mountaineers upset Gorman's homecoming last week. Gorman has proved its scoring ability by ringing up 74 points in four tilts, an average of 18.5 per game, and had allowed just one six-pointer until Santa Anna's 31-point onslaught.

The Herd, on the other hand, notched its first victory in four outings last week over Baird 14-7, and those points are the only Bison counters of the year. Buffalo defenders have allowed 91 points, although, defense is the Herd's strong point. Cross Plains won last year 40-8.

Gorman's high-gear offense is headed by scatback Daryl Hirst, a 170-pound junior, who has personally accounted for 38 of Gorman's points. An experienced backfield is composed of Jackie Harrison, James Jay and Luis Torries.

Ten more Panthers have won letters in the forward wall and are anchored by center A. B. Eaves, 150 senior, and tackle Larry Snider, 185 senior.

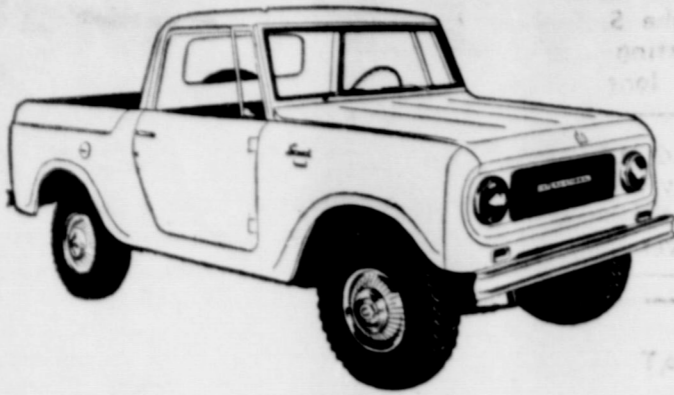

### 3-Part Program For '67 Wheat Explained

"There will be a wheat program for 1967, and the sign-up will be conducted early next year," according to J. C. Earp of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service office in Baird.

He explained that there are three methods by which a producer may be eligible for payment. The three-part program includes: (1) plant within the 1967 wheat allotment, (2) plant 1967 wheat allotment plus oat-rye or barley base, (3) plant the 1967 wheat allotment and substitute wheat for feed grain base acreage, in accordance with program requirements.

"It will be required," Earp continued, "that acreage be diverted where wheat is substituted for feed grain, however, no diversion is necessary when wheat allotment or wheat plus oat-rye or barley acreage is planted."

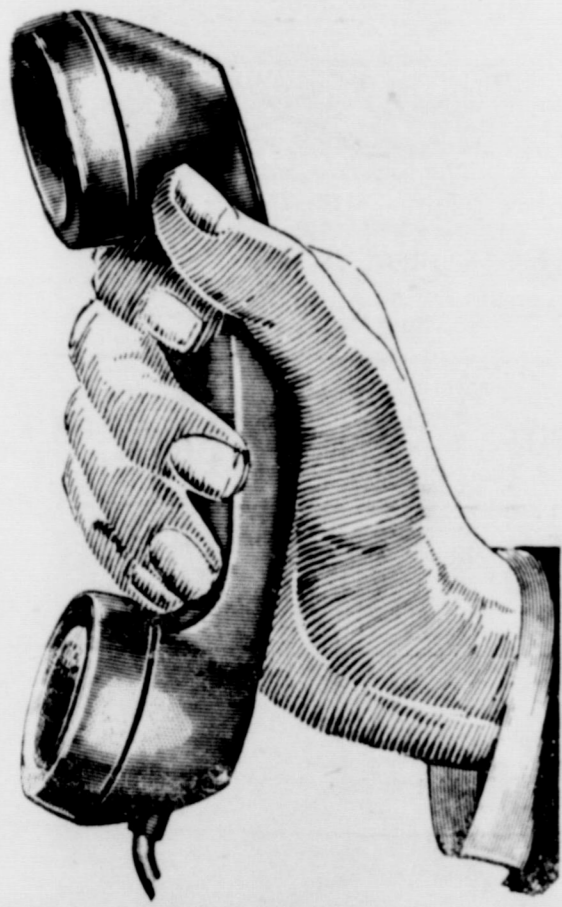
