Eleven returning lettermen have led Goldthwaite in scoring 164 points through six games while allowing 66. Cross Plains has managed just 14 points through the same number of tilts, and has given up 124. The Herd has scored in just one game, its single win over Baird 14-7.

## \$202,000 Housing Deal Will Be Signed Thursday

Contract for construction of a \$202,000, 20-unit housing project in Cross Plains will be signed in Fort Worth today, Thursday, at 9 a.m.

Mrs. Gene Rhodes, executive secretary of the Cross Plains Housing Authority, said Monday. "We (Mrs. Rhodes and other members of the local board) will be in Fort Worth Thursday morning to sign the contract." The signing will culminate more than two years of negotiations and preliminary work to secure the development here. Mrs. Rhodes joined the local housing authority in October 1964, and some ground-work had been going on many months before.

**No Starting Date**  
Mrs. Rhodes said that she

had no idea as to when actual work would begin, but did explain it was her understanding. "Everything is ready to go as soon as the contract is signed." She formerly stated that the contractor would begin clearing sites prior to actual construction quickly after contract completion.

Fourteen units, to be occupied by elderly persons, are to be located on the back side, western half, of block 800 of Main Street, and six other dwellings, for general occupancy, will be situated in property north of Colonial Oaks Nursing Home. According to plans known here, all units will be constructed simultaneously.

**Low Bidder Anxious**  
BFW Construction Co. of Tem-

ple submitted low bid of \$202,000. It was tentatively accepted by the local board immediately after sealed bids were opened by the architect and Cross Plains board members Sept. 8.

An official of the successful company, who has built several similar projects throughout the state, was reported to have indicated at that time that his firm wanted to have all concrete poured before the first of Winter. However, since that time final approval has been withheld by the district office of the Housing Assistance Administration in Fort Worth pending completion of final details.

Earlier this month the executive secretary and two board members met with a district

officer of the federal agency and approved a permanent construction budget in a pre-construction conference in the Fort Worth office. The tentative figure at that time, with one portion of the estimate still under consideration, was \$277,000.

Mrs. Rhodes said Monday that those who will attend the Thursday morning contract signing had not been determined. She added, "I will be there and expect two or three other members of the board to attend."

Current members of the directorate other than Mrs. Rhodes are Jimmielee Payne, president, R. C. (Cliff) Gilmore, Claude Foster, Elvis B. Scott and Cross Plains Mayor Doyle Burchfield. No original director remains on the present board.

## MORE SWEET POTATO PLANTS SHOW BLOOM

Mr. and Mrs. R. L. Carey, who live south of Pioneer, report that they, too, have sweet potato plants in bloom.

Mr. Carey, 70, who has been growing sweet potatoes for 50 years says that like L. M. Purvis of Cross Plains, who found some of his plants in bloom last week, he had never before seen such blossoms. The Carey plants, just like those at the Purvis place, have blossoms that somewhat resemble that of a morning glory.

## Callahan County Farms Produce Nearly \$5 Million Worth Food, Fiber Annually

A total of 770 farms was counted in Callahan county during the 1964 Census of Agriculture, the U. S. Department of Commerce's Bureau of the Census reports.

In the previous Census of Agriculture (1959), the total counted in the county was 669.2 acres and that the average value of the county's farms (land and buildings) in 1964 was \$58,973.

Other important county statistics in the report are:  
1. Value of all farm products sold by farms in the county in 1964, \$4,057,487; in 1959, \$4,660,006.

2. Value of all crops sold by

county farms in 1964, \$731,218; in 1959, \$625,093.

3. Value of all livestock and livestock products sold by county farms in 1964, \$3,324,938; in 1959, \$4,034,913.

Information obtained for the first time in an agricultural census included the amount of income received by the county's farmers (\$1,300,000 from recreational services as well as data on the use of pest control chemicals in the county in 1964.

A census of agriculture is taken every five years in years ending in "4" and "9" to gather information on the nation's agricultural resources and production. The data are needed to make decisions effecting many segments of the U. S. economy. The 1964 farm census was the 18th, a series begun in 1840.

The preliminary report for

the county contains more than 500 facts about agriculture in the county. Among additional facts it contains are the number of farms by size, type, economic class; the number of farm operators by method of tenure, age, color, off-farm work, and number of school years completed; land in farms by use and by use practices; data on equipment and facilities; farms expenditures; number of hired workers; and number of farms reporting poultry and livestock production and those reporting crop production by acres and quantities as well as sales.

Single copies are available for 10 cents from the Bureau of the Census, Washington, D. C. 20233, or from any field office of the Department of Commerce, located in major cities.

## County West Side Has Two Screwworm Cases

First two cases of screwworms in Callahan County livestock herds in more than a year have been confirmed by County Agent Jerry Lackey.

The cases were found in cattle on the Leo Chrane Ranch in the Dudley community. Lackey said conditions were favorable for an increase in the screwworm population and urged all livestock owners to be alert to any wounds on livestock and to check closely to make sure the animals do not

become infected.

Livestock owners who find infested wounds on their animals should obtain at least 10 live specimens of worms, preserve them in ordinary denatured alcohol until they obtain a mailing vial from any county agent's office so that they may be sent for positive identification.

Curtis Martin of the Texas Animal Health Commission said a load of sterile flies would be "spot dropped" on the area.

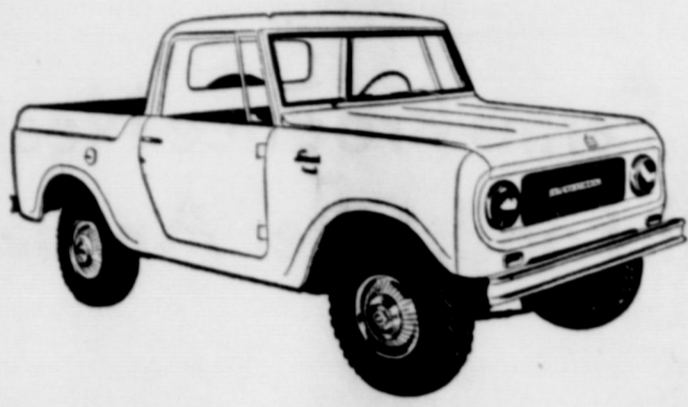

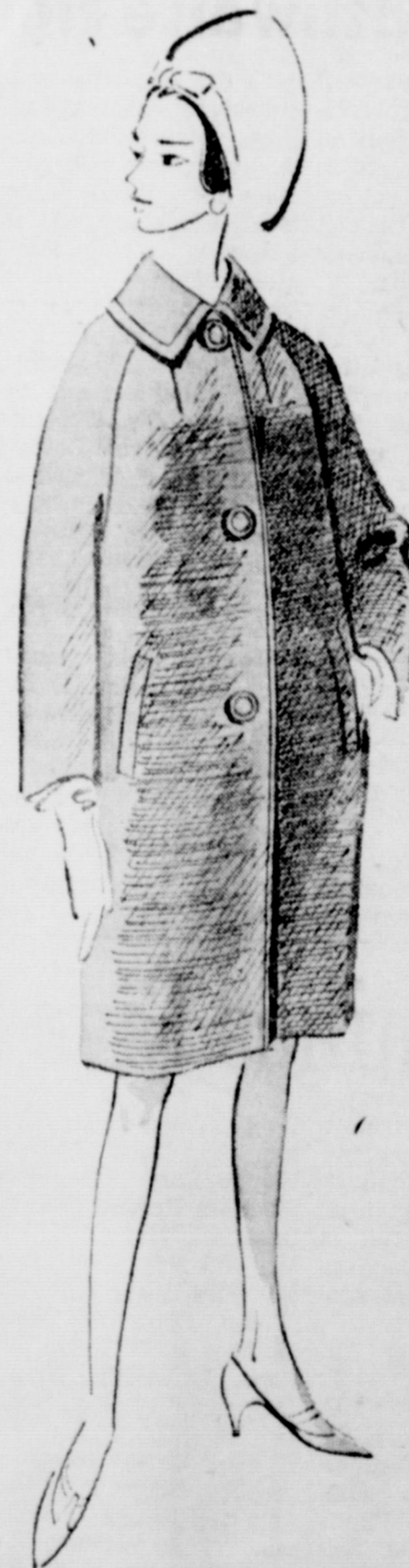

### Army Worms Hit Callahan's Fields

County Agent's office at Baird has received reports of Army Worm infestation in oat fields in the Southwest part of the county.

There are five species of Army Worms and the one noted in Callahan County is very similar to the Corn-Ear Worm, a green striped color, and ranging in size up to one inch in length, says County Agent Jerry Lackey.

This insect can be very destructive, depending on the intensity of infestation. Lackey said that the best control measure is one-half pound of parathion or methyl parathion per acre on fields that will not be grazed within the next 15 days.
