Work Starts On Housing Project

Development tract. Contractor was in charge of site clearing and cleaning, but it was understood here that sub-contractors were wrecking the three frame buildings on the site. Fourteen of the 20 units will be built on the downtown plot, across the street east from Williams Planning Mill and Cromer Hotel, and are to be designated as housing for the elderly.

Other site, in the northeast part of the city just north of Colonial Oaks Nursing Home, will have six of the dwellings which have been classified as general housing.

Finish July 12

Mrs. Rhodes said first of the week that the contract called for work to be completed July 12, 1967. An official of the Temple firm said at the time of the tentative contract letting, several weeks ago, that his company was anxious to begin in order to have all concrete work finished before winter's first freeze.

"We are happy to finally have construction started on the project," Mrs. Rhodes said Friday after signing of the contract Thursday morning in the Housing Assistance Administration district office in Fort Worth.

Document signing completed about four years of working toward the development.

Among those attending the contract signing were Mrs. Rhodes, Claude Foster and R. C. Gilmore of the local housing board; Elwin Fitch, architect on the project, of Fitch and Holdridge of Houston; I. B. Weatherly, vice-president of the BFW Construction Co. of Temple, and several HAA officials.

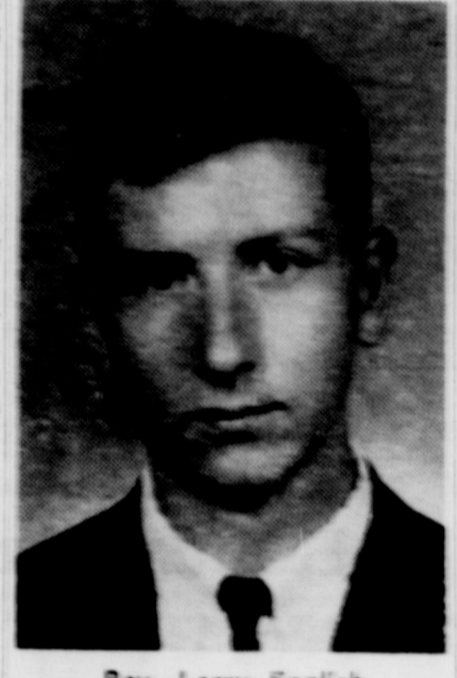
Burglary indictment named L. V. Tollett of Baird, who was accused of stealing the tubing from the deactivated silo Sept. 21.

New Procedure For Fire Alarms

System of fire alert in Cross Plains will undergo a major change about the middle of December.

Under the new setup there will be 10 telephones in firemen's homes or businesses which will ring when the fire number is dialed. Five of the telephones will have incorporated a button which will activate the siren at the fire station when pushed. All 10 fire phones will necessarily be private lines with the last number the same.

Fire Chief Travis Foster pointed out that the siren cannot be activated by pushing the

phone button unless the fire number has been dialed. He explained that all 10 telephones will ring simultaneously, and even though one or more of the phones is busy, a signal will alert the parties that the fire number has been dialed. Other phones will begin ringing immediately. The local volunteer chief continued that even though one or more telephones are unanswered, those will continue ringing for several minutes before automatically cut off.

The fire number in Cross Plains will remain the same. It is 725-2341.

Presently there are only

three phones through which fires can be reported and the alarm sounded.

Cross Plains City Council has approved the change, and Kizer Telephone Co., Inc. has agreed to install the equipment. The apparatus is presently on order and will be installed about Dec. 15.

Mayor Doyle Burchfield said that the City of Cross Plains will pay a regular rental rate on the equipment. Rate quoted by the Kizer firm was \$17.50 monthly with an additional 50 cents for each siren button. Current plans call for five activation devices to be utilized, but 10 can be incorporated.

Peanuts To Hit \$500,000

More than 200 tons of peanuts have already been gathered and warehoused in Cross Plains, although the present harvest is estimated at less than 30 per cent completed.

Cross Plains Grain & Peanut Company's plant here is operating on an around-the-clock schedule seven days a week.

Twelve persons were employed there yesterday.

Enlarged facilities are making drying and storing faster this year. The firm completed and began using Monday a building 60 by 138 feet which will warehouse 1,500 tons. Drying equipment, too, has been updated and speeded.

Estimates Monday were that local peanuts are averaging \$223 per ton and that approximately 2,500 tons will be processed here, giving the crop now moving to market a value of \$557,500. Nuts have been handled here from as far away as Stamford and Comanche. Bulk of the crop grown in the Clyde area is coming here, it was reported.

Some well-informed local observers are predicting that the 1966 crop, for which harvesting is not expected to be finished until nearly Christmas, will be the largest from the standpoint of both tonnage and cash value ever produced in the Cross Plains area.

Attendance Good At School First 6 Weeks

Attendance was good at Cross Plains schools the first six week period according to figures released by Superintendent Wayne Ford.

Scholastics numbered 471, 315 in the eight elementary grades and 156 in high school, at the end of the initial six weeks, Oct. 7. Average daily attendance was 462.4 or 98.1 per cent. Daily attendance in grammar school was 308.9, a 98.5 percentage, and high school had a mean of 153.5, a percentage of 97.2.

Average membership of the school during the first six weeks was listed as 313.4 in elementary grades and 157.9 in the four upper classes. Total of 471.3 students.

Senior class had the lowest attendance percentage with 95. Several classes, including the third, fourth, fifth and one section of the sixth and seventh grades, rated a 99 per cent attendance record.

Herd Challenges Early In Second 9-A Conflict

Two 9-A football teams which are winless in conference play will tangle at Early Friday at 7:30 p.m.

Cross Plains Buffaloes take to the road after a two-week fruitless home stand to meet the Early Longhorns. Neither team has won a District 9-A game, nor has one scored against a league opponent. Friday's host has dropped two loop encounters, 33-0 to Santa Anna and 8-0 to Rising Star last week, while the thundering heard lost its only 9-A contest to Goldthwaite 52-0 last Friday.

Although the Longhorns have yet to win in district play, they have claimed three victories on the season and will carry a 3-4 record into the affray Friday. Buffaloes have but one win against six losses.

Early rates the favorite's role comparing offensive and defensive records thus far into

the season. The Longhorns have scored 63 points in seven outings, while opponents have pushed across 111. The Bisons have cashed in for only 14 points in a like number of tilts, but have given up 174 points.

Tending to balance the scales, Cross Plains rates the nod in comparison scores with mutual foes. Both teams have met Bangs and Gorman with both 9-A units on the losing end. However, Bangs clipped Early 38-0 and Cross Plains 25-0, while Gorman scuttled the Longhorns 20-6 and felled the Buffs 8-0.

Seven lettermen return from Early's 2-8 mark last year, and 13 departed via graduation from the team the Bisons belted 20-0 in 1965. Weight-wise the two teams are more evenly matched than has been the case with Cross Plains in the majority of games this season.

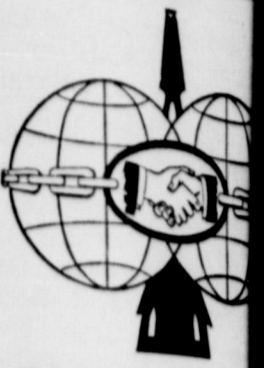

Eagles were once a scourge of the frontier, and Goldthwaite football Eagles reminded Cross Plains sport fans of that last Friday night in flying past the Buffaloes 52-0.

The loss, the Herd's first in District 9-A play but sixth of the season against one win, was the worst dealt the Bison unit this season, and lacked only one point equalling the worst whipping an opponent has administered in the past five years. Albany thumped Cross Plains 61-8 in 1961.

Blackburn Scores 42

Eagle right halfback Charles Blackburn was primarily responsible for the rout. He scored 42 points on seven touchdowns. The speedy, 180-pound senior got six of his tallies on rushes and ran one intercepted pass into paydirt.

Goldthwaite coupled an impregnable ground defense with its powerful offense. So effective was the running bulwark that Cross Plains lost 14 yards. Eagles ran for 357 yards.

Adding to Cross Plains' woes were big, agile Eagle linemen. Across the front the Bufs were out-weighted 186.5 to 160.3 pounds average, a mean of 26.2 pounds per man.

Halfback Blackburn got the visitors on way to second District 9-A triumph with 7:37 left in the first quarter with a 25-yard romp around right end. Two plays before he had rambled 59 yards for a tally only to have the play called back on a clipping violation. Left halfback Bobby Rountree kicked the extra point.

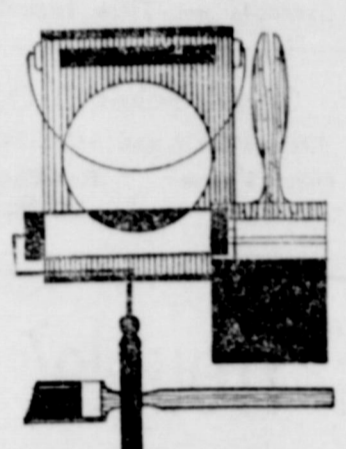

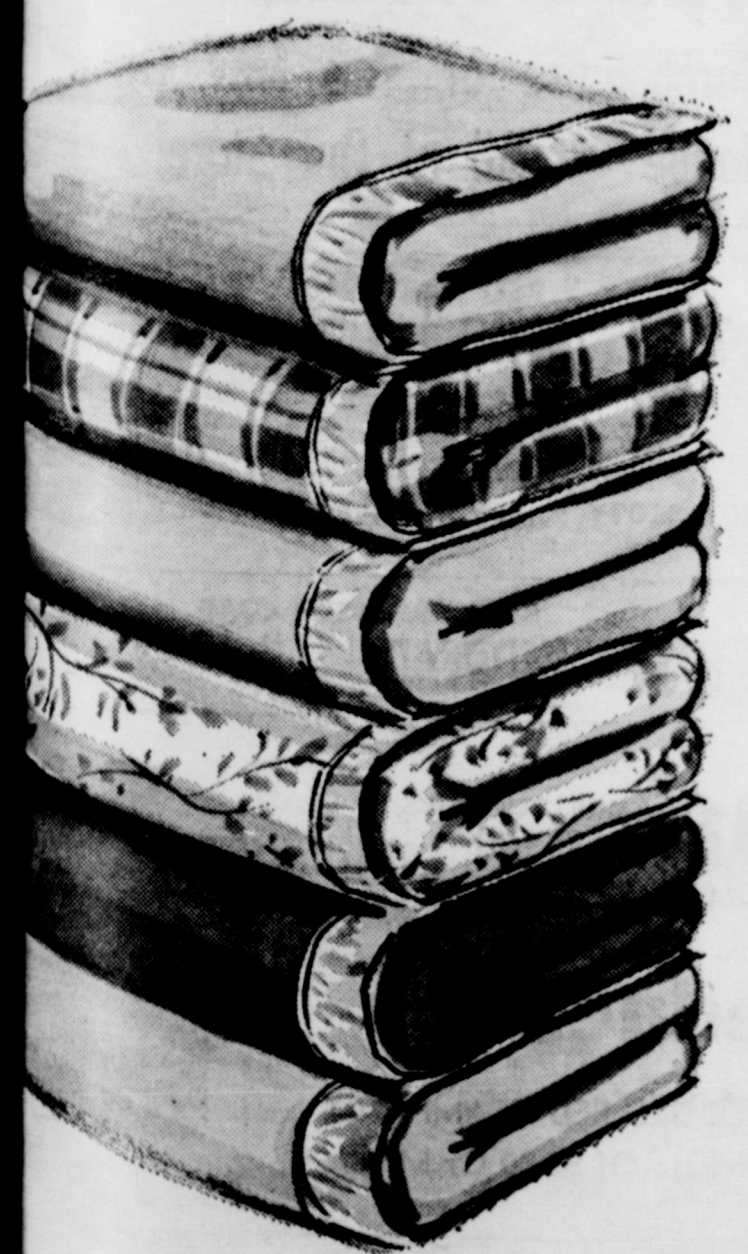

Unused Clothing To Be Sent To Mission

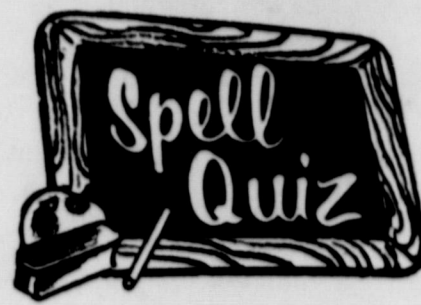
Unused clothing stored away in a closet will keep no one warm this Winter. Ladies of the Women's Missionary Union of the First Baptist Church suggest a better plan.
