## Rising Star And Cross Plains Battle For 3rd In Grid League

place in District 9-A at stake Friday night in the 14th renewal of the Plains-Rising Star grid football battle.

The traditional battle will be the season-ending conflict for the two teams, both having already been eliminated from championship contention.

The host Wildcats carry a 4-4 season and 1-2 league record into Friday's ancient battle. Cross Plains has an identical conference mark, 1-2, but has posted just two wins on the season against seven losses.

Season offensive and defensive records give the Wildcats a slight edge. Rising Star has tallied 68 points in eight games, while the Buffaloes have managed 44 in nine encounters.

Defensively Rising Star has allowed opponents 163 points, while Cross Plains has given up a whopping 230. Favorite role is also earned by the Wildcats in claiming five consecutive victories over the Buffs.

However, Cross Plains also has some plus signs on its comparison sheet. In District play the thundering Herd has tallied 30 points to 14 for the Wildcats, and has defeated Early 30-14, while Rising Star took an 8-0 decision from the Longhorns, although both teams have been dealt almost identical defeats at the hands of Santa Anna and Goldthwaite.

Also Cross Plains has never lost a game to Rising Star in a year ending in "4". Bison triumphed 20-7 in 1936, 19-7 in 1946, and 32-0 in 1956.

Cross Plains holds the edge in the 33-game series, having won 20 times while Rising Star has claimed wins in 12 tilts. Only tie of the series was played in the first meeting, 6-6 in 1929. Buffaloes own the longest win streak, nine straight dating from 1950 through 1957 and 1960.

Kickoff Friday is slated for 7:30 p.m. at Wildcat Stadium.

### Paul Neeb Is Given Probated Sentence

Paul Neeb, 42-year-old former Cross Plains and Baird man, received a five-year probated sentence Thursday in a murder trial in 18th District Court at Cleburne.

Neeb was on trial for the fatal shooting of Charles A. Ingram, 26, at Burleson on Sept. 10.

The case went to the jury Wednesday afternoon after the defendant led officers to two pistols in a dry Johnson County creek bed. The verdict came at 8:47 a.m. Thursday, less than an hour after deliberations were resumed Thursday morning.

Neeb had testified he shot Ingram when the younger man went for a gun in his pocket. He indicated he believed the jury was "very fair" with attorney saying there would be no appeal.

Defense attorneys were Bill Thomas and Allen Glenn of Abilene. They rested their case after the weapons were found in a dry creek under U.S. 81 in Alvarado. Two pistols and a partially filled box of shells were discovered caked with mud.

## Carr Wins Callahan In U.S. Senate Race

Returns from over the state early Wednesday morning indicated that Republican John G. Tower had retained his seat in the United States Senate despite a strong showing by Democrat Waggoner Carr.

Carr, who carried Callahan County by a plurality of 170 votes, had not conceded the race as the Review went to press, however, projections of nationwide tallying bureaus showed Tower the victor.

In Cross Plains where 595 votes were tallied, returns were not announced until two hours and 18 minutes after the polls closed. A lengthy ballot, occasioned by 16 proposed amendments to the state constitution, was believed to have slowed counting.

A write-in contest developed in the race for Justice of the Peace of Precinct 6, however, the Democratic nominee, Edgar H. Heard, polled 428 to 35 who

wrote in Ted Souder. The vote by boxes in this race was, Cross Plains 388 for Heard and 81 for Souder; Cottonwood, 24 for Heard and 4 for Souder; and Atwell, 16 for Heard and none for Souder.

In Cross Plains all proposed changes to the state constitution were approved with the exception of numbers five and 13 on the ballot.

In Callahan County all amendments were approved with the exception of numbers 4, 5 and 13.

Widows may be unaware of a change in the social security law and still think they have to wait until they become 62 to collect social security widow's benefits. This is the concern of R. R. Dailey, Jr., district manager of social security in Abilene.

Until the change in the law, effective September 1965, the widow of a man who had worked under social security could not qualify for monthly widow's benefits until she reached 62. Now, she can elect to have her payments start as early as her 60th birthday, but in smaller installments to take account of the longer time that benefits will be paid.

# Mountaineer Rushing Dumps Herd 40-0

It took a potent Santa Anna Mountaineer offense over 13 minutes to solve Cross Plains Buffalo defenses in a District 9-A encounter in Buffalo Stadium Friday night.

However, when the Mountaineers did find the key, the door was unlocked for six touchdowns and a 40-0 victory for Santa Anna. Although the Bisons seemed at the outset to make a battle of it, mistakes plagued Herd efforts from the start. Fumbles, pass interceptions and defensive lapses aided the Mountaineers in keeping the doorway to Buffalo end zone open and barring the Herd from sampling Santa Anna paydirt.

Only in the first quarter did Buffaloes play Mountaineers on even terms although Bisons thwarted Mountie offensive efforts through much of the second quarter. After intermission Mountaineers displayed much superior line play and fast, shifty and hard running backs ate up big chunks of yardage.

## Buff Drive Stalls

Second play from scrimmage Cross Plains halfback Jerry Strickland corralled a Santa Anna fumble at the Mountaineer 36. Fullback Joe Pierce got a first in two tries at the 25, and a third down, 13-yard pass from quarterback Ricky Jones to wingback Randy Montgomery cleared for another on the

eight. Strickland slashed for five and Pierce managed one, but a fumble cost the Buffs two and on fourth down Pierce was cut down a yard short of the double stripe.

Remainder of the initial period was spent in Santa Anna territory, but late in the same quarter the Mountaineers began first touchdown drive.

Mountie left halfback Butch Makuta suckered Buff defenders with a fake and circled right end from six yards out capping a 73-yard, 11-play sustained drive. Left end Tommy Blanton kicked the extra point with 10:50 showing on the clock in the second quarter.

## Screen Perfection

Just as the initial frame was played in Mountaineer land, the second stanza took place on Buffalo ground. Defenses held the spotlight until late in the chuckker.

Santa Anna used four plays driving 32 yards to the Herd 26, but a 15-yard violation showed the ball back to the Cross Plains 34 then was aided by a four-yard loss. Mountaineers then executed the screen pass to perfection for a 38-yard score. Quarterback Roy Joe Harvey fell back and lofted the oval over the head of charging Buffs to fullback Eddie Jones who scampered untouched into the end zone. Blanton split the uprights from placement with 42 seconds left before inter-

mission. Touchdowns came easier for the visitors in the second half as the Mountaineers forward wall tore huge holes in Cross Plains defenses.

Mountie Harvey claimed the third tally with a one-yard sneak with 4:15 showing on the timer. It climaxed a 79-yard, 13-play march. Blanton rolled the score to 21-0 with an extra point. First play from scrimmage in the drive Harvey turned a broken play into a 79-yard touchdown run, but a clip nullified the run.

Bisons handed Mountaineers the fourth tally. Defensive guard Steve Valdez recovered a loose ball on the Herd three, and Makuta swept right end for the score with 49 second left in the third canto. Blanton again kicked the point.

Two minutes and three seconds later Mountaineer Jones tipped up the middle for 56 yards and the fifth tally. Buff defenders end Mike Bright and guard Sammy Balkum combined to deflect Blanton's attempted placement.

## Buffaloes Counter

Cross Plains took the ensuing kickoff and marched from the Herd's 40 to the Santa Anna eight in seven plays before a fourth down pass from Jones to Montgomery lacked only inches getting the nine yards needed for a first.

## Tallies Come Easy

A bad pass from center on an attempted punt, which cost Cross Plains 27 yards, aided the Mountaineer final tally. In four plays Santa Anna covered the 34 yards with right halfback Dale Herring sprinting through a gapping hole for the final 16 yards. Three Bisons, defensive back Rusty Beggs, end Bo Barr and Bright, combined to partially block Blanton's attempted kick.

Herd's Strickland briefly excited Buffalo fans with a 25-yard romp, shaking off three tacklers en route, on a rushing play after the kickoff. Santa Anna's second pass steal of the night squashed the blitz, and Mounties ran out the clock.

## Final Tribute Paid Fred W. Stacy, 72

First Methodist Church of Cross Plains was crowded to capacity Thursday afternoon and scores stood in front and outside the church as friends paid final tribute to Fred Warren Stacy, 72, a well-known local farmer, who died unexpectedly at his home six miles south of town two days before.

Stacy, who had been working on foot when stricken, died immediately. Death resulted from heart attack.

Funeral services were held at 2:30 p.m. Thursday afternoon at the church, officiated by the Rev. Roger Coker, local Methodist pastor, assisted by the Rev. Roger Coker, pastor of the First Methodist Church here, and the Rev. J. H. Foster, also of this church. Burial was in the Cross Plains area.

Stacy was born Feb. 19, 1894, in Russellville, Ala., and was 72 years old. He was re-

garded as one of the best known and highly respected citizens of this area. He was president of Callahan County Old Settlers Association, on the official board and faithful member of the local Methodist congregation, a Woodman of the World for 53 years, president of Dressy Cemetery Association and had formerly been a member of the County Hospital Board, head of Callahan County Singing Convention, director and local chairman of numerous federal farm programs.

Survivors include his wife, Madge; one daughter, Mrs. Willie Gay Baird of Coleman, and three grandchildren.

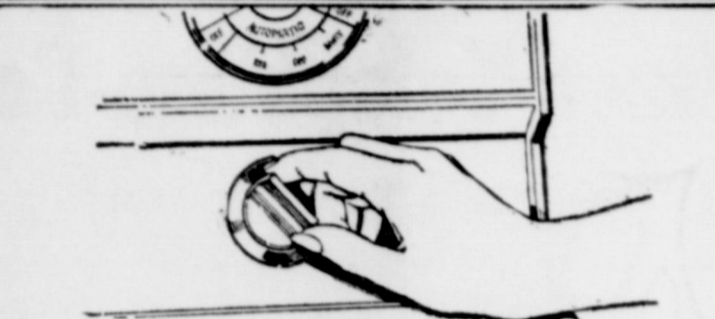

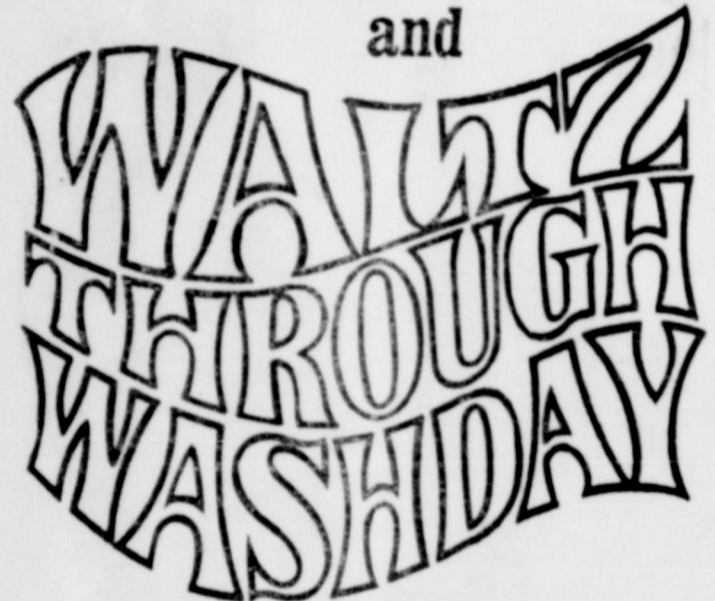
