It is interesting, though, to hear various persons relate their experiences of that era and chuckle about them.

Edie Kelley recalls that she was more fortunate than most. "I had a steady job at a month," he says, "and I had to put in 91 hours a week."

Edie was a baker and ran the back end of a shop. In addition to mixing the dough, she baked the bread, wrapping products and the hundreds of incidental details.

Edie had to fire his ovens with kerosene. "I guess I would have even burned the wood if they'd allowed it," he says, "but I got to where they wouldn't pay my wages, I quit."

Area Begins 45th Day Without Rain

Although crops in the Cross Plains area have been especially good this year, the territory is currently facing a drought.

Through Tuesday 43 days had passed without an appreciable amount of moisture being recorded. Last beneficial rainfall gauged by S. F. Bond, official weather observer, was 80 of an inch on Oct. 17, although .02 of an inch teased Cross Plains last Saturday.

Almost all farmers and stockmen in this area have been lamenting the dry condition for the past several days. Arid weather was, however, timed almost perfectly with cotton, peanut and late grain sorghum harvests, but planting of cover crops and small grain has been hampered. That which has been planted is needing moisture badly, and winter pasturage is also suffering.

Through the first 11 months of this year, Bond has logged 21.46 inches rainfall, a bit below the norm. Wettest month of the year thus far was August when 5.57 inches fell, wettest here in the past 16 years. May counter-balanced being recorded the driest in the same period. No moisture was measured.

Average rainfall for this locality through the past 16 years is 23.11, although normal is listed as 24.54.

Callahan Has Had 31 Post Offices

Down through the years 31 post offices have been established in Callahan County, although not all were in operation at one time. The number has now dwindled to five.

Of the surviving, one has been reduced to a rural station. It is Cottonwood. The others still functioning are Baird, Clyde, Putnam and Cross Plains. Although two other post offices were established prior to the one here, the Cross Plains mail house is today the oldest still in operation.

No community enjoys the distinction of having the first post office in this county, for on Feb. 26, 1877, two post offices were created in the newly-organized Callahan County. They were at Shaw's Ranch and Calahan. The "single 'I' in the word Callahan is in accordance with official

documents maintained in Washington. The mis-spelling is believed to have occurred as a result of an error by the person making the original request.

The Cross Plains office was created July 25, 1877.

Rust; Caddo Peak, May 13, 1878, William H. Crawford; Belle Plain—spelled without an e in the second word until officially changed in 1888, created June 18, 1878, William H. Parvin; Eagle Cove, March 17, 1879, David M. Thomas; Tomato, Jan. 13, 1893, Charles C. French; Annadale, July 14, 1879, James P. Massie; Clyde, June 27, 1881, Jesse L. Miller; Rough Creek, Feb. 20, 1886, William J. Taylor.
