County Hospital Nets \$4,141 In December

Callahan County Hospital at Baird completed 1966 showing substantial profit and wide patronage.

A. E. Dyer, Jr., chairman of the hospital's board of supervisors, reports that gross receipts during December totaled \$15,238.08. All expenses aggregated \$11,096.18, leaving a net profit of \$4,141.90.

A summary of the year's activities and plans for the future were heard by the board of supervisors in session at Baird last Wednesday night. It was pointed out at that time that capital improvements planned within the near future include, installation of fire exits at the East and West ends of the building, new lights for the operating room and the laying of a floor in the surgical quarters which is incapable of transmitting static electricity. It is expected that the improvements can be financed from the hospital's working funds.

A financial statement read to supervisors Wednesday night revealed that the institution currently has on hand \$4,516.05 plus approximately

\$12,000 due from insurance companies in payment of claims conveyed by former patients.

Administrator of the hospital is C. K. (Red) Meadows, who recently completed his third year in that capacity. During his tenure the hospital is said to have never operated in the red financially.

Present members of the hospital's board of supervisors include: Dyer, Sterling Odom, B. D. (Bye) Montgomery, Lowell Johnson, R. B. (Slim) Taylor and George Yancy. The County Judge of Callahan County is an ex-officio member of the board but votes only in case of a tie.

Although the hospital is generally equipped to handle 20 patients, 22 were there the night of the last board meeting, two being accommodated in curtained quarters at either end of the hall.

"We're doing everything possible to broaden the service to the people of Callahan County," Dyer said, "and from the wide use being made of our facilities, the people seem to approve of the program."

Register Soon Or Lose Right To Ballot--Lovell

With only nine days remaining in which to register for voting privileges during 1967, indications yesterday were that many citizens may be disfranchised by failure to comply with new statutes which supersede the old poll tax law in Texas.

In Callahan County persons over 60 do not have to register, however, those between 21 and 60 must complete registration forms on or before Jan. 31. Forms are available at the office of Albert Lovell, tax assess

or-collector, in the courthouse in Baird, the Citizens State Bank in Cross Plains, or the Peoples State Bank in Clyde. Or, there is a form printed elsewhere on this page of the Review which may be used. The forms must be received or mailed to the tax assessor-collector no later than Jan. 31. There is no fee and all who comply will be mailed registration receipts.

Persons over 60 on the day they wish to vote need not have done anything to be eligible to

ballot in Callahan County, other than to have met residence requirements.

Voters less than 60 years of age, though, must have registered between Oct. 1, 1966, and Jan. 31, 1967 inclusive, to ballot in any election held between February 1, 1966, and Jan. 31, 1968. Only exceptions concern persons who become 21 during that period.

Lovell said yesterday that less than 900 persons had registered for voting rights in Callahan County, this despite

the fact that only nine days remain before the Jan. 31 deadline is reached.

Remember 3 Things
In commenting upon the new voter registration law, Lovell said: "There are three things to remember: (1) All persons must register who are under 60 year of age (2) All applications by mail must be signed by the applicant or his lawful agent. The same applies to those who register in person; (3) No charges whatsoever are made for voter registration.

Baird Brothers Capture Top Prize At County Junior Livestock Show Here Last Week End

Tom Windham of Baird showed the grand champion steer at Callahan County's 13th annual Junior Livestock Show in Cross Plains Saturday.

His 1,080 pound Hereford, one-half of which the youth had given to his brother, Bill, after the latter's club calf died, had previously won reserve championship at the State Fair of Texas Exposition. The calf came from the herd of the boys' father, Richard Windham, well-known Callahan County breeder.

Reserve champion of the local show was won by Murray Edwards of Clyde, son of Mr. and Mrs. Weldon Edwards, who claimed top prize at the show here a year ago. His steer, an 870-pound wet-lot calf, had been bred by his father, and moved into championship contention by virtue of having won the middleweight, milk-fed class.

Prominent Putnam Man Dies In Cisco

W. A. Everett, 88, of Putnam, one of Callahan County's better known, long-time citizens, died at noon Thursday at Graham Hospital in Cisco, following a lengthy illness.

Funeral was held Saturday at 2 p.m. from the Putnam Methodist Church with the Rev. A. E. Richards of Jayton officiating. Burial was in Putnam Cemetery.

Born April 4, 1878, in Newton County, Miss., he came to Eastland County in 1894 from Mississippi, then moved to Callahan County in 1900.

A grocer and gin manager, he was a banker at one time in Cottonwood and Baird. He also served as county commissioner Prec. 3, for three terms, 1924 to 1930. He was a member of the Primitive Baptist Church in Cisco.

Mr. Everett married James Ina Faulkenburg Aug. 18, 1901. She died in 1922. He married Viola Ellis Aug. 14, 1930, in Baird. Of the second marriage, one son, Billy J. Everett, was born.

Survivors include the wife, Viola; four sons, Loren T. of Putnam, Buel F. of Big Spring, Jack of Midland and Billy J. of Irving; four daughters, Mrs. Angie Sandlin and Mrs. B. B. (Era) Suttin, both of Corpus Christi, and Mrs. W. E. (Onie) Harris of Aransas Pass, and Mrs. B. J. (Velda) Lee of Eunice, N. M.; 20 grandchildren and 27 great-grandchildren. A son, James Albert, died in 1933.
