## Okay Given Second Loan At Lakewood

Congressman Omar Burleson has announced from Washington the final approval of a \$49,500 loan from the Farmers Home Administration to Lakewood Recreational Center, located midway between Cross Plains and Rising Star.

The additional funds will be utilized to fence the property, construct a miniature golf course, build a reunion pavilion, add three golf tee-box shelters, launch a floating boat dock, install children's play-

ground equipment, complete the water system, pave approaches and parking areas and other incidental improvements.

### \$100,008 Spent

Already completed at the center are a new clubhouse, swimming pool, revamped, nine-hole golf course and other facilities which were built at a contracted cost of \$100,008. This money came in an initial loan from F.H.A. First installment on repayment of this obligation was recently made, the

funds having been derived from \$20 initial fees paid by 235 members.

First annual meeting of Lakewood membership was held last Saturday night, attended by 63 persons. At that time eight directors were chosen for the ensuing year to oversee the remaining construction program and supervise the center. Named to the board were: Dave Lee, Jack Scott, O. B. Edmondson and Jack W. Tunnell, all of Cross Plains, and James Rutherford, Glen Henry, Jack Jackson and W. E. Tyler, of Rising Star.

### Directors Meet

A quorum of the directorate was not present at Saturday night's session and the first meeting of the group was, therefore, reset for Wednesday afternoon, Jan. 25, at 4:30. It was expected that at that time consideration would be given to the closing of final loan agreement and selecting officers for the ensuing year, as well as the possible naming of a caretaker to operate the center.

The Cross Plains-Rising Star recreational center is the first in Texas and said to be one of the first in the nation built under financing provided by F.H.A.

Contractor on the job was Bowden Lumber Company of Cross Plains and architects were Yeatts & Decker, of Abilene.

It is expected that all facilities will be completed and ready for use during the approaching Summer.

## Magazine Article By Jim Gilmore Spotlights Cross Plains Rifleman

It took a national magazine and an article authored by Jim Gilmore, son of Mr. and Mrs. Cliff Gilmore of Cross Plains, to acquaint local residents with the fact that a Callahan rancher, J. L. (Pokey) Bonner, is one of America's ranking benchrest rifle shooters.

February issue of Guns & Ammo, a publication of 300,000 circulation, contains a 2,700-word story by Gilmore, member of the editorial staff of the Abilene Reporter-News,

explaining the popular sport of benchrest rifle shooting. It is illustrated with eight color pictures, one of which shows Bonner hand-loading ammunition in a workshop at his ranch home, 10 miles west of Cross Plains. Bonner is credited with much of the technical advice in Gilmore's story, which Guns & Ammo headed, "Straight From The Shoulder."

Bonner is not only one of the nation's perennial winners in competitive shoots, accord-

ing to Gilmore, but is Gulf Coast Regional Director of the National Bench Rest Rifle Shooters Association and president of Texas Bench Rest Rifle Shooters Association.

A fact unmentioned in Gilmore's article is that the author, who is rapidly winning fame as one of Texas' most gifted outdoor writers, is also very adept in rifle marksmanship and has scored high in competition since taking up the sport only a few years ago.

## Navy Flier Known Here Shot Down In Vietnam

Lieutenant Commander W. P. Yarbrough, a navy veteran of 25 years service, was reportedly shot from the skies over Vietnam last week. He is a brother of James Yarbrough of Shriever, La., and Art Yarbrough of Fort Huachuca, Ariz., both of whom lived many years in Cross Plains.

Art Yarbrough was visiting in Cross Plains Friday when word came that his brother was missing in action. He contacted military authorities and learned that Commander Yarbrough, who is a veteran pilot, was serving as bombardier on a mission which hit enemy railheads. His plane was said to have been hit and exploded just as it was coming out of a dive after unloading bombs on the target. Witnesses reported seeing two men eject and one parachute function normally, however, the other was feared to have only partially opened.

Commander Yarbrough visited in Cross Plains on numerous occasions with his late parents, Mr. and Mrs. W. P. Yarbrough, and has many friends here who join with members of the family in anxiously awaiting additional information.

## 2 Local Elections Due Early In April

First elections for Cross Plains this year are expected to be the two docketed in April, when balloting is scheduled to name two city councilmen and another to select two school trustees.

Persons not otherwise exempt will use new voter registration receipts for the first time as these elections are held.

On the city council the terms of Oscar Koenig and J. P. McCord are expiring. Neither has yet announced whether or not he will seek reelection. On the school board the terms of Dr. Carl J. Sohns and Jimmy McCowen are running out. It is not known at this time whether they will again be candidates.

Hold-over members of the council are: Mayor Doyle Burchfield and Councilmen Raymond DeBusk and T. T. Nichols.

Hold-over members on the board of trustees for the school district are: Zed Bright, Nathan Foster, Edwin Baum, D. C. Jones and Vernon Phillips.

School trustees are chosen for three-year terms and city councilmen for two-year terms.

## Oscar Schaefer Produces Best Test Peanuts In Area

Cross Plains area peanuts rank with the best produced anywhere.

Oscar Schaefer, veteran producer, has been awarded a \$25 gift certificate by Cross Plains Grain & Peanut Company for bringing in the highest grade handled by the firm. The prize winning load, about 10,000 pounds, tested 77 and sold at \$247 per ton.

Producing top quality peanuts is no new experience for Schaefer. In 1965 he had the

best test at Rising Star. He did the same thing at May in 1964 and was tops in the Gorman district in 1962.

Schaefer had 65 acres in peanuts in 1966 and harvested an over-all average of near 50 bushels. His average grade for the entire crop was 75.4. His son, Edwin Schaefer, also gained the distinction during the past harvest of reaping the greatest yield in the Cross Plains district. He averaged 120 bushels to the acre on an irrigated crop.

## Data Published As Helpful Aid To Local Income Tax Payers

Note: (With income tax filing time just following answers to non questions are published in hope of being of help to readers. Do you have to file a return? Do you have to file a return under 65 who has income of \$600 or more this year? For those 65, a return does not have to be filed until gross income is \$1,200. However, if you are employed you must file a return if you had self-employment income of \$400 or more, or if your gross income is more than \$600. Filing requirements also apply to minors. If, for example,

a child has income of \$600 or more from savings or trust account or any other sources, then a return must be filed on behalf of that child.

Q. I'm due for a refund this year. What can I do to speed it up?

A. The best advice we can give is to file a complete and accurate return and to mail it early to the address listed in the 1040 instructions.

The largest single reason for delays in refunds last year was a missing or inaccurate Social Security number. Be sure to enter an accurate number for yourself and for your wife if it is a joint return. Other reasons for refund delays are failure to

attach required W-2 forms, failure to sign the return and omission of other forms or schedules that may be required.

Another point — if you live in one of the states that have direct filing to IRS Service Centers, be sure to send the refund return to the Service Center, rather than to the District office. Page 8 of the 1040A instructions or page 10 of the 1040 instructions will tell you where to file.

Q. Are auto license tags a deductible expense?

A. Usually this is not a deductible expense. The exception would be where the license fee is based on the value of the car. In that case the expense would be considered a personal prop-

erty tax and deductible.

Q. I do not have a Social Security number. Now I find I need one for my tax return. What should I do?

A. You may obtain a Social Security number, which also serves as a tax account number, by filing application form SS-5 with the local office of the Social Security Administration. This application is available at IRS offices, Social Security offices and at many post offices.

Q. How much can a child earn and still be claimed as a dependent?

A. Generally a person may not be claimed as a dependent if he has gross income of \$600 or more. However, if your child is

under 19 or is a full-time student, you may claim him as a dependent regardless of the amount of income he may have as long as you provide more than 1/2 of his total support.

Q. I have a disability pension from Social Security. Is this taxable income?

A. No. Social Security benefits are not taxable.

Q. I thought there was supposed to be a box to check on the 1040 if you wanted to have \$1 of the tax go to a presidential campaign fund? I can't find it.

A. The provision in the law you refer to goes into effect for taxable years beginning after Dec. 31, 1966. Instructions

will be issued at a future date on how to do this.

Q. Where can I get the form I need to claim sick pay exclusion?

A. Form 2440, "Statement of Support Exclusion of Sick Pay", is available at IRS offices.

Q. My wife and I are filing separate 1040's this year. Which tax table or rate schedule should we use?

A. Schedule 1 on page 11 of the 1040 instruction booklet if separate income is \$5,000 or more or deductions are itemized. Otherwise, use Tax Table C on page 14.

Q. I am a widow with children, how much can I deduct on my return for child care expenses?

A. You may deduct up to \$900 of this expense when there are two or more children under the age of 13 for which this expense is incurred in order to work or seek a job. If there is only one child the maximum deduction is \$600.

Q. Are state unemployment benefits taxable?

A. No they are not.

Q. Does a person have to be a citizen of the United States to be claimed as a dependent?

A. No. A non-citizen may qualify if he or she is a resident of the U. S., Canada, Mexico, Canal Zone or the Republic of Panama, or is an alien child adopted by and living with a U. S. citizen abroad.

Tommy Harris, Chairman of the Cailahan ASC County Committee, has announced that a mail referendum among mohair producers will be held Feb. 6-17, to determine whether or not they approve a proposed agreement between the Secretary of Agriculture and the Mohair Council of America, Inc.

The agreement provides for the Secretary to withhold up to 1½ cents a pound from producers' payments on mohair marketed during 1966-69. The payment deductions, authorized by Sec. 708 of the National Wool Act, would be used by the Council to finance advertising and promotion programs for mohair and mohair products. The proposed agreement is similar to those under which advertising and sales promotion programs for wool and lambs have been conducted since 1955.

The agreement was proposed by the Mohair Council and is supported by the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers Association, the Texas Angora Goat Raisers Association and the American Angora Goat Breeders Association. The referendum will be conducted through the county offices of the Agriculture Stabilization and Conservation Service. The county offices will distribute copies of the agreement and ballots to mohair producers early in February. Producers may cast their ballots by mailing or delivering them in person to reach ASCS county offices by the close of the referendum.

Anyone who has owned Angora goats, six months old or older, for at least 30 consecutive days during 1966 may vote. Votes may be cast by individuals, corporations or partnerships. Cooperative associations may qualify to vote for all of their eligible members who would not then otherwise vote in the referendum.

The agreement requires approval by two-thirds of the total number of producers voting, or by producers of two-thirds of the volume of production represented in the referendum. It is estimated that deductions from payments at the rate of 1½ cents per pound of mohair marketed in 1966 will total about \$450,000.

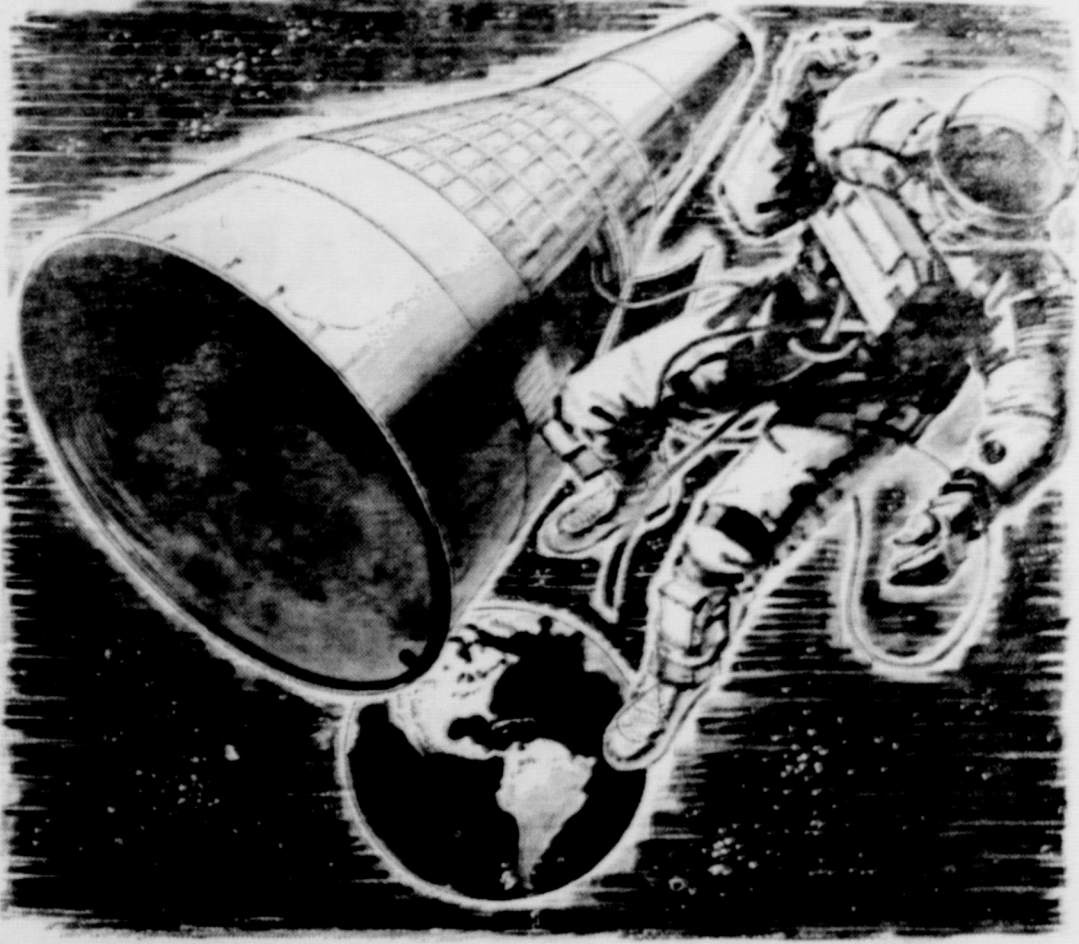

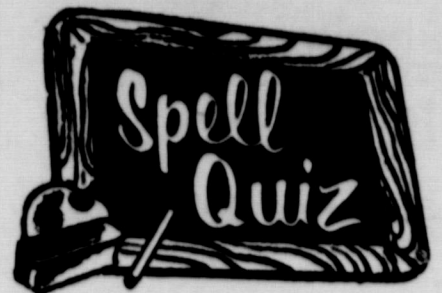
