Open Bids For Dryer At Pioneer In March

Sealed bids will be opened in Pioneer for a proposed peanut dryer in that community March 14, according to J. R. Rector, president of Pioneer Farmers Cooperative.

A Farmers Home Administration loan for \$185,000 has been approved for construction of the facility.

Rector said that present plans call for beginning construction as soon as possible after awarding of contract, hopefully about April 1. Completion is desired by Sept. 1.

The plant will include 16 dryers and accessories, 1,750 ton storage, warehouse, office and 50 ton capacity scales.

This was the first time in several years that members of the Illingworth family had been together.

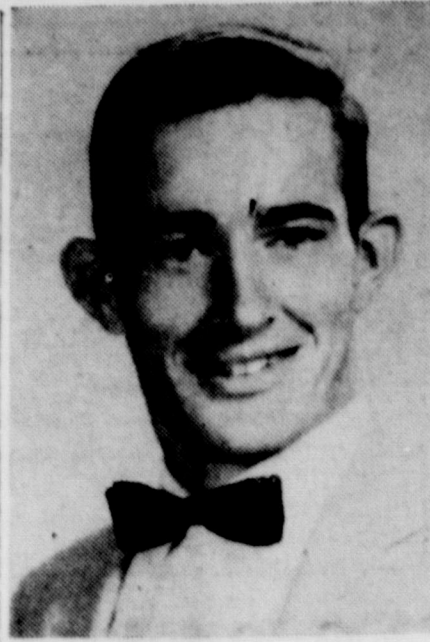

Athletic Club Holds Wednesday Session

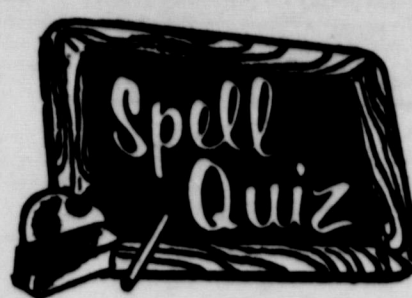
Officers and two directors were to have been elected to head the Cross Plains Athletic Booster Club Wednesday night, according to Harry Dodds, club president.
