FIFTY-EIGHTH YEAR

Public Housing Units Be Ready In 2 Weeks

Persons could be living in 20 Cross Plains Housing Authority apartments before completion date of the construction contract is reached.

First occupancy could come in the next two weeks.

The building of the low-rent housing here has gone so smoothly and rapidly that the project was 93 per cent finished last Saturday, 130 days before the date called for in the contract. B-F-W Construction Company of Temple had 260 days to complete the work, and last Saturday was only the half-way point.

W. D. Ertel, architect's inspector, and Charles Barnett, B-F-W construction superintendent, agreed that only about 10 days more would be needed to finish all phases of the job.

Only touch-up work, floor tile and appliance installation and cleaning the premises remained incomplete Saturday afternoon.

"Not a day was lost because of bad weather, Ertel said, and Barnett added that ample labor was readily available.

One phase of the \$202,000 project will not be started until next month. That is seeding of the lawn with Bermuda grass. Ertel explained that the landscape contractor said best results would be attained after warmer weather arrived. Shrubs have already been planted.

The inspector opined that the units would be ready for final inspection within two weeks.

Elderly Dwellings

Fourteen of the units are classified as housing for the

aged. These are located downtown, and Mrs. Gene Rhodes, local board executive secretary, said just after the first of this year that more than enough applications had been received for the 14 apartments. She added that all would probably not qualify, although details will be worked out later by the local board and the Housing Assistance Administration office in Fort Worth.

The secretary has asked that all persons who wish to live in the project contact her within the next few days. The number to call is 643-3191 in Rising Star. Mrs. Rhodes said that numbers listed in the telephone directory are no longer connected with the housing authority.

The downtown apartments have electrical ranges, but are heated by gas forced air units.

Six units in the northeast part of town are presently designated as general housing, had not been filled last week end. More gas appliances are incorporated into these. One apartment has three bedrooms, but others have two.

Board Vacancies Filled

Mayor Doyle Burchfield has announced the appointment of two members to the local board of directors to fill posts which have been vacant for sometime.

Appointed were Mrs. Howard E. Coburn and Mrs. D. C. Jones. Other members are R. C. Gilmore, president, Elvis B. Scott and Claude Foster.

Mrs. Rhodes said Saturday that formal opening ceremonies are probable, but no date or plans had yet been made.

City Pays Last Tribute To Lloyd Bryan Friday

People of the Cross Plains area paid last respects Friday afternoon to one of the town's most beloved personalities.

Funeral services for Lloyd Bryan, 51, local postmaster, who died Tuesday night of last week in a Dallas hospital, were conducted from the Church of Christ with the minister, James Hance, and Claude A. Guild of Fort Worth officiating. Burial was in Cross Plains Cemetery.

Mr. Bryan, a resident of Cross Plains more than 35 years, was born in Erath County Aug. 30, 1915. He attended school here and was graduated with the class of 1935. He married Miss Mozelle McElroy in Cottonwood Aug. 30, 1936. He was a veteran of World War II, having served both in Europe and the Pacific.

He had been with the local post office since October of 1951 and had served as postmaster since May 23, 1964. He was an elder in the Church of Christ, officer in the American Legion Post and active in Chamber of Commerce and civic undertakings. Despite the fact that he

had been in declining health for several years he continued in his many posts of religious and civic responsibility, however, he had recently applied for disability retirement with the postal department. Action on the application was pending at the time of his death.

All Cross Plains business houses closed during the funeral hour Friday afternoon and the post office flag flew at half-staff two full days. Friends crowded the Church of Christ far beyond capacity Friday afternoon. Scores who were unable to get inside stood with bared heads around fringes of the building.

Survivors include his wife; his mother, Mrs. W. L. Bryan of Cross Plains; two daughters, Mrs. Fritz Barnett of Alta Loma, Tex., and Mrs. Kenneth Thate of Irving; five grandchildren; two brothers, Roland of Abilene and Noland of Bristow, Calif.

Pallbearers were Troy Crockett, Oscar Koenig, Cal Long, Herschel McDonald, Ted Souder and James Chesshir.

Girl Cagers Shoot For State Crown

"It's the proudest I've been of them," Coach Jack Gray said after his Buffettes had fought back from a 15-point deficit to nip Archer City 46-45 and win the Region II-A tournament championship at Denton Saturday night.

The victory earned the Buffettes a berth in the State Class A Tournament for the second straight year. The state finals will be held this week end, Friday and Saturday, in Gregory Gymnasium on the University

of Texas campus in Austin. Cross Plains will carry a 31-1 record into the melee.

Local feminine cagers were in the tourney last year, but dropped two consecutive tilts.

Kept Fighting
A team effort kept the Buffettes on the win trail Saturday.

Gray exclaimed, "They were behind by 15, and could have quit; but they didn't!"

Archer City led at intermission 29-17, and built it by three more in the third canto. Cross

Plains then began a spirited come-back, but still trailed by four points with about four minutes left in the game.

Buffettes came within one point of the District II-A champs with 53 second left. However, the clock showed only seven seconds when Darylene Hargrove took the tip-off, after Barbara Renfro had tied the ball at midcourt, and drove in to score giving Cross Plains its only lead of the contest, 46-45.

Archer City took one more shot. The familiar number 30, Glenda Lear, to game viewers, pushed the sphere toward the basket with a couple of seconds left from right side and upcourt. The ball rolled around the goal, and then spun out. Peggy Purvis, who had replaced the fouled-out Connie Roby, slapped the ball out of bounds, and that was the game.

Gray rated the Archer City sextet, "The best team we've played all year."

He also complimented his guards on second half play. In the chaotic finish guards grabbed two crucial rebounds which forwards converted into three points to pull within one. Gray said we abandoned the conservative defensive game in the second half and began gambling. Guards Connie Roby and Linda Purvis double-teamed Lear in the last 16 minutes, and Carolyn Tunnell took two Archer City forwards.

Gray continued that Archer City slowed the pace in the second half, and a guard ran into foul trouble which enabled Buffette forwards to drive for closer shots.

Valeta Edgington led the Buffettes with 24 points, and Darylene Hargrove got 18. Renfro contributed four. Although Cross Plains tallied 21 field goals to the 11-A queens' 14, Archer City hooped 17 of 23 attempted free throws, while Cross Plains got four on only seven attempts.

Recreational Center Needs Finance Help

Formal opening of Lakewood Recreational Center, located midway between Cross Plains and Rising Star, has been set for April 29, at which time a basket picnic for members and all interested persons is planned.

Dave Lee, president of the organization, said yesterday that construction is expected to be completed by that time, and the celebration will be to give tours of inspection of the elaborate recreational facilities being made available to the public.

Membership fees will be \$5 monthly and 227 persons paid four months dues in advance to demonstrate local desire for the Center and secure two Farmers Home Administration loans totaling \$161,500. The 40-year obligation calls for annual payments of \$9,490.

Schedule Of Fees
Members of the board of directors met Monday afternoon and set fees which are to be charged non-members.

Fishing will be \$1.50 per day. Green fees for golfers was set at \$1.50 for weekdays and \$2 on Sundays. Swimming tickets will be 50 cents for children and \$1 for adults. Picnickers will be assessed \$1 per car. The reunion pavilion will be available for family gatherings or other large groups at a minimum of \$25 daily or \$2 per person, whichever is greater. With the charge for the reunion pavilion, though, will go all facilities of the Center except miniature golf, for which there will be a regular charge of 50 cents per 18 holes for everyone. Campers will be assigned a specific area and the fee was set at \$1 per car. Clubroom facilities will be available for private parties — restricted to certain hours — at \$5 for small groups and \$20 for larger ones.

Needham Made Manager

R. D. (Bob) Needham was named manager of the club and will move to quarters in the new clubhouse within the next two or three weeks.

Because no funds were provided in the loans for clubhouse furniture and equipment and due to the fact that prepaid dues were necessarily used to meet first installment on the F.H.A. obligation in January, directors reported a financial crisis existed at the outset. To purchase items necessary to opening — including required insurance on the property — and provide funds for the first four months of operation, directors launched a public appeal for contributions.

"There seems to be no other way to get started on a sound financial basis," Lee said.

He urged public support for the fund raising effort and

pointed out that all donors of \$25 or more would receive special recognition on a memorial plaque in the clubhouse parlor.

Winter Dryest Since Days Of Indians Roaming Area

Unless Indians saw it drier here, before the arrival of white settlers, the current Winter is believed the most drouthy ever experienced in the Cross Plains area.

Last precipitation of consequence until Sunday night was Oct. 17, 1966, when .80 of an inch was gauged. Since then the total rainfall, including Sunday night's .75, amounted to 1.34 inches. Normal rainfall for this four-month period is about 6.30 inches.

Even 1917, which many local residents recall as the driest spell they ever saw, the last three months of '18 and first three months of 1919 were wetter, according to the Abilene Weather Bureau.

Soldier Loses Leg In Vietnam Fight

News has been received here that Pfc. James W. Robinson, son of Mr. and Mrs. Wyatt Robinson of Los Angeles and former residents of Cottonwood, sustained serious wounds during his first days in combat in Vietnam.
