\$165,892 Low Bid On Plant In Pioneer

B & W Construction Company of Dallas, with a bid of \$165,892, was apparent low bidder Tuesday afternoon on the construction of a peanut drying and warehousing plant to be built for Pioneer Farmers Cooperative. The facility would be located on Highway 36, just west of the Mrs. Homer Brown place.

Bids were opened by the cooperative's board of directors in the Pioneer Community Center with officials of the Farmers Home Administration, from which a \$185,500 loan has been secured, and representatives of the architectural firm of Yeatts & Decker of Abilene, consultants, in attendance.

Bidding Close

Second low bid was tendered by Miller Building Company of Brownwood. It was for \$166,737, a figure only \$845 over the apparent low bidder.

Other bids were submitted by Hawkins & Westbrook Construction Company of Abilene \$210,200 and V. B. Likins Associates also of Abilene \$187,761.

Buffettes Finish Season As Texas Second Best Class A Cage Team

Cross Plains High School Buffettes did not return from Austin Saturday night Class A girls state basketball champions, but folk hereabout could hardly be more proud if they had.

It took what several coaches at the tournament called "the best team ever in the state tournament" to deny the most successful team ever in the history of Cross Plains the Texas championship.

Jack Gray tutored the local sextet to a 32-2 season record and state Class A runner-up place, and he said of his charges, "We've had a tremendous season, and the girls have

a lot to be proud of." He added, "Not only did they have a real good win-loss mark, but also set a high mark in sportsmanship and fighting spirit."

Immediately following the championship game Saturday afternoon Buffette captains, Connie Roby, Carolyn Tunnell and Darylene Hargrove, accepted the two-foot high silver cup which culminated the campaign begun last November.

No news had been received here Tuesday at noon concerning an All-State Class A team, but Gray opined selections would be released within the next few days.

Buffettes demonstrated their fighting spirit in the opening game against George West by claiming a 54-52 triumph in the final seconds.

Although completely outclassed in the championship game by Springlake of Earth, 105-52, and falling farther behind as time elapsed, again Buffettes' pride would not let them surrender. One viewer said, "They kept trying although the game was lost."

In Gray's words, "it was the tremendous effort" and never-say-die attitude that brought Buffettes from as far as nine points behind to whip George

West. Darylene Hargrove's field lifted Cross Plains into a 53-52 lead with less than a minute to play, Vickie Hargrove, who was intentionally fouled, hit the free shot with eight seconds remaining to ice the game to the howling approval of a huge number of Buffette supporters.

Only one other time did the Buffettes hold the upper hand. With 3:35 left in the third quarter, Buffettes led by one point, but quickly fell behind again.

A 15-point outburst in the final frame, coupled with guards limiting foes to six points, enabled the Buffettes to win. George West gradually built a

seven point lead through the first 24 minutes.

Valeta Edington is normally a starting forward, but after ace guard Carolyn Tunnell collected a fifth foul in the first half, the talented junior switched to a guard post and turned in a sparkling performance.

Gray said, "We felt at half-time that if we could keep the score close, we could win it in the last quarter."

Springlake Wolverettes and Buffettes combined to re-write the record books.

Although the final tilt was anti-climactic to Cross Plains fans, it was not so to Buffette

Barbara Renfro. She equalled a state Class A mark by bucketing 23 free shots of an attempted 34.

Springlake's 105 total eclipsed the former high single game score of 85 set by Baird, and the two teams' aggregate, 157, established a new combined single game mark. Wolverettes' two-game total of 171 points was also a new record. They defeated Brownsboro in the opener 66-45.

Gray pointed out that the total fouls, 74, Cross Plains' 35 and Springlake's 39, could possibly have been another new mark. (Continued on Page 8.)

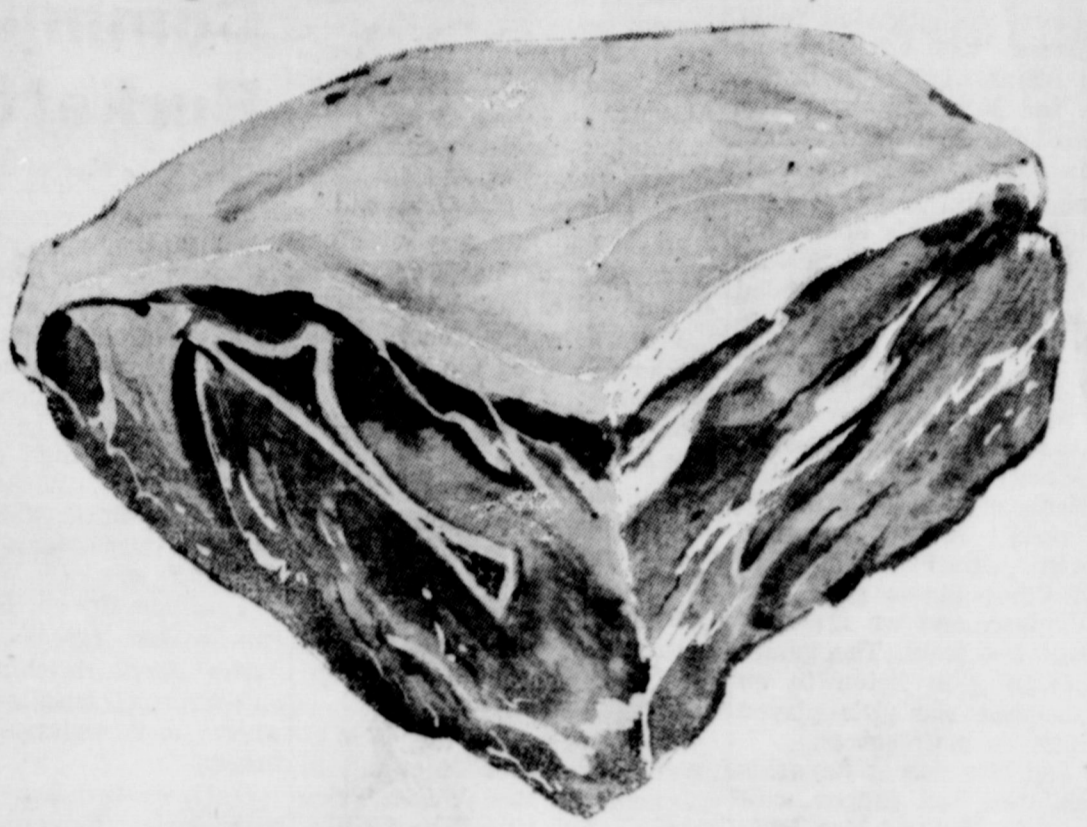

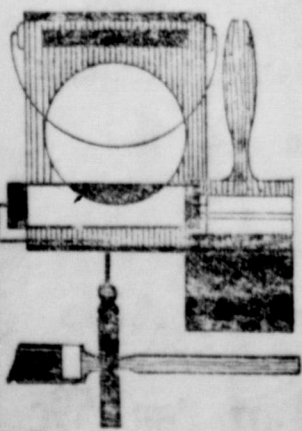

The local pilot emplaned at Dallas for Travis AFB, Calif., where he again boarded an airplane early Saturday morning for Saigon, South Vietnam.

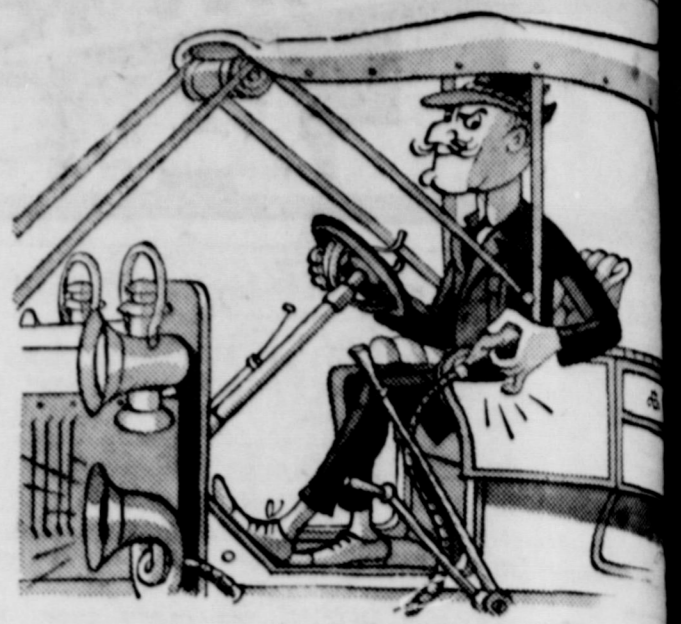

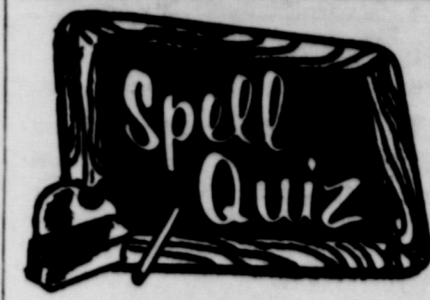
