New Industry To Employ 5 People

Garrett, owner of poultry on State Highway two miles south of Cross Plains, has leased the Eudling on North Main and will open an egg processing plant there within the next few weeks.

Garrett has secured a building in the process of being built and moved here. The plant will process 750 dozen eggs per hour and represent an investment of \$20,000.

The plant will candle, wash and grade eggs from the Garretts as well as other pro-

ducers which are marketed by the Cross Plains man. The eggs are then placed in cartons which are automatically sealed and made ready for delivery to retail outlets.

Five persons will be employed to operate the plant and an estimated 1,000 cases of eggs — 30,000 dozen — will be processed weekly.

Only one other plant of this type is located in this area. It is in Abilene, however, the capacity of that plant will not equal the one being installed in Cross Plains.

Garrett now supplies eggs for Dyess Air Force Base in Abilene in addition to all major food stores in that city, as well as Cross Plains and a number of area towns.

Garrett eggs are now distributed in recently purchased refrigerated vans.

Fox Hunters Again Choose City Host

Cross Plains has again been designated host city for the annual Star Fox Hunters Association dog show.

H. H. Harrelson, president of the organization, said this week that the show will be held Saturday, May 13. He continued, "It will be an all-day affair, and a big barbecue supper is planned." It will be held at 6 p.m.

"We sincerely appreciate the help of Cross Plains area business people in helping put the show on each year," the president explained, "and a larger and better show is anticipated this year." The organization has held the annual event here for the past several years. Harrelson pointed out that the city park is ideal for that kind of activity.

Although plans are currently incomplete, additional entertainment is called for along with a bench show tentatively scheduled to begin at 8 p.m.

Wheat, Feed Grain Exchange Possible

Callahan County A.S.C.S. office in the courthouse in Baird now has information concerning various changes which can be made in the wheat and feed grain programs necessitated by winter drought conditions.

C. E. Carp, manager, briefly explains some means by which unyielding wheat acreage can be diverted to other crops.

"Where a farm is signed up in both the feed grain and wheat programs and the producer wants to plant feed grain on the destroyed acreage, the wheat must be reclassified. It should also be remembered that if you sign up to divert all your feed grain base or reduced down to 25 acres and agreed to plant no feed grain, then the destroyed wheat acreage could not be planted to a feed grain.

"If a producer signed up in only the wheat program and did not sign a feed grain agreement on any other farm, he could devote all the destroyed wheat acreage to feed grain if he so desired. Sudan, cane, or any sudan cross, such as hay-grazer, sweet sue, or golden sue may be planted on the destroyed wheat acreage provided it is to be grazed, banded or baled."

Street Paving Offered Home Owners

A street paving program may be initiated by the City of Cross Plains.

City Councilmen discussed

the possibility during the regular meeting Tuesday of last week. At that time it was suggested that all interested per-

sons contact either Mayor Doyle Burchfield or any alderman.

Present tentative plans call for property owners to pay for the asphalt surfacing along their holdings, but intersection paving expenses would be absorbed by the city, according to Mayor Doyle Burchfield.

Burchfield stated, "It is necessary to find out if there is sufficient interest in paving additional city streets before further negotiations are entered into."

He explained, "The council already has cost quotations from reliable paving contractors, and if interest is great enough others will be sought." The Mayor advised that cost per foot would depend upon how

much paving could be secured.

Councilmen agreed that not only would additional paving improve the appearance of the township, but would also help in drainage problems.

It was emphasized that no contract has yet been signed or even considered, but Burchfield opined, "We are contacting persons who are sincerely interested."

No estimated costs were released by the city's governing body.
