News has been received here that the Post Office Department will continue to operate the Cross Plains post office under present arrangement until examinations have been held to select a permanent postmaster.

Mrs. Verna Mae Ramsey has been serving as clerk-in-charge at the local office since the death of Lloyd Bryan Feb. 28.

Usual procedure is for the Civil Service Commission to

hold open competitive examinations and to designate an eligible list, composed of three high scorers, from which an appointment is made.

Exal D. McMillan and L. D. Koenig, the latter of whom is working on a temporary basis, together with Mrs. Ramsey completed the inside-office staff at the post office here. Rural carriers are Morris Thomas and Joe Hanke, Jr. Bailey Wilson is star route carrier out of the office.

The occasion is sponsored by the Cross Plains Athletic Booster Club, and honors all local high school athletes.

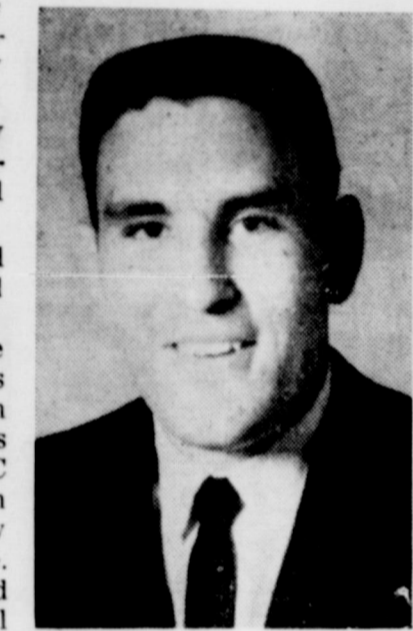
This year's fete will be held in the school cafeteria and will begin at 8 p.m.

3 Buffs Nab Region Posts In Loop Meet

Jerry Strickland, Mike Bright and Randy Montgomery qualified for region competition in the District 9-A track meet held Saturday at Goldthwaite.

The host team captured the loop crown by scoring 139 1/3 points. Santa Anna was second with 96 1/3 followed by Early's 95 1/3, Rising Star's 79 and Cross Plains' 59.

Bright qualified in two events, 12-yard high hurdles and the 330 intermediate hurdles. He romped to a first place finish in the high hurdles with a 16.5 second clocking, and ran second in the intermediate hurdles.

Strickland claimed his regional meet berth in the broad jump with a blue ribbon leap of 19 feet, 2 1/2 inches.

Montgomery also qualified for the regional UIL meet in the broad jump by finishing

only one and one-half inches behind Strickland. Bo Barr took sixth place in the same event.

The 440-yard relay team, composed of the four Bisons mentioned above, claimed fourth place, but two bad baton hand-offs slowed the quartet.

Strickland also captured fifth in the shot put and fourth in the 220-yard dash.

Barr tied for third in the high jump and third in the 440-yard run.

Montgomery added points by placing fifth in the 100-yard dash and sixth in the 220-yard dash.

George Johnson contributed a sixth place finish in the 880-yard run.

Coach Jack Gray said that the Region II-A UIL meet will be held in Denton on April 22.

Well Hit At Putnam In Cross Plains Sand

A Cross Plains Sand oiler, daily potential of 10 barrels, has been completed three miles south of Putnam.

It is Louis Pitcock of Graham No. 2-A E. L. Harwell spotting 2,173 feet from north and west lines of Section 10, BAL Survey. Pumping from perforations at 1,800-04 and 1,808-14, the sand was topped at 1,795 feet and 4 1/2-inch casing is set at 1,840 feet. Hole is bottomed at 1,846 feet.

A water supply well was also completed in the same field. It is Pitcock No. 4-A Harwell, and was drilled to 1,879 feet but plugged back to 1,121 feet. It spots 1,173 feet from the north and 2,150 feet from the west lines of Section 10.

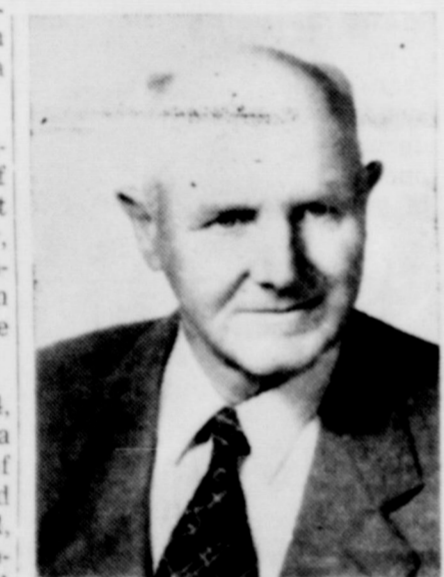
Doss Alexander Dies Monday

Doss Alexander, 72, widely known pecan grower and exhibitor and a founder and former president of Eastland County Pecan Growers Association, died early Monday morning in a veterans hospital in Temple, where he had been a patient three weeks.

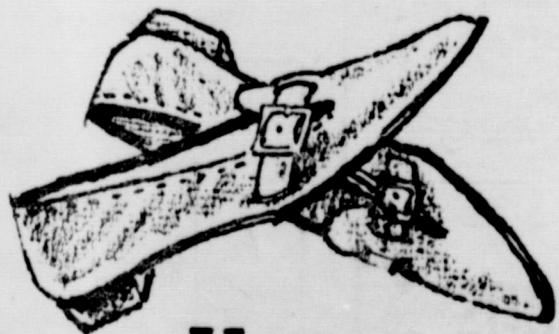

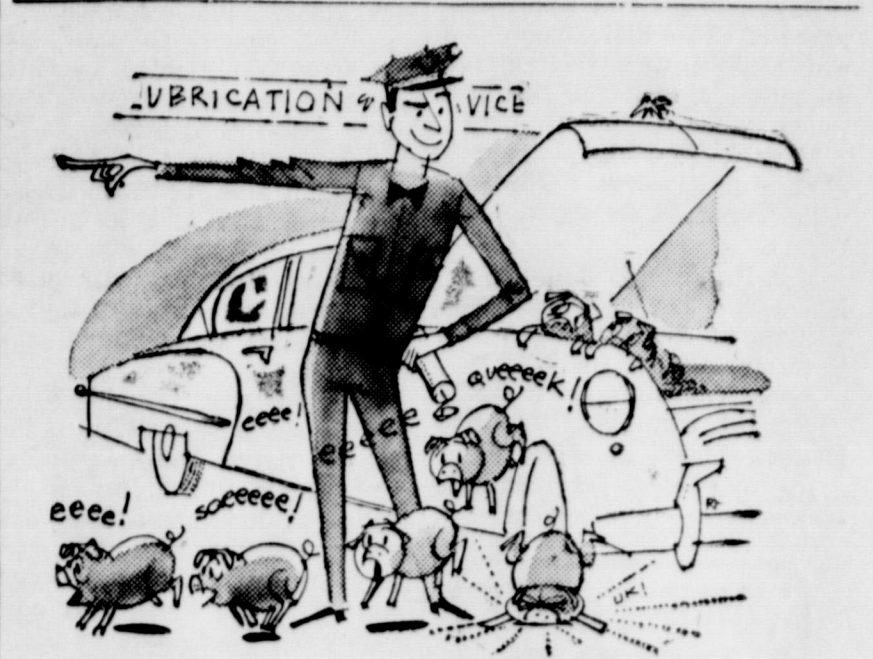
