Meeting Called For Parents And Teens

A meeting of all persons interested in the junior-senior league in this area has been called for Thursday at 7 p. m. at Sisters Cafe. Local league vice-president Glenn Merrill and Pancake have stressed the fact that all parents of the boys are especially urged to attend.

"Time is growing acutely short, and due to that, the bulk of planning must be completed at the Thursday meeting," Pancake said. He added that other boys not presently on the roster interested in playing should be present with parents at the meeting.

The senior team squad, the Chiefs, has been working for the past three weeks, but according to D. C. Jones, manager, all parents of the players are urged to attend.

Plans for workout dates will also be announced following Thursday's session.

The tentative roster includes seven veterans, three players who participated in baseball in other cities last year, and six rookies up from Cross Plains Little League ranks.

Five members of the Drillers team last year are Joe Dodds, David Merryman, Richard Pope, David Hargrove and Tommy Merryman. Two Rebels, district junior league winners last year, Larry Bishop and Perry Jones, are back this year. New to Cross Plains baseball fans this year are Ronny Pancake who played in Brownwood last year, Robert Lewis who lived in New Mexico and Jerry Bennett who was in Clyde Little League.

Those up from the local Little League include Pete Barbar, Bowen Clark, Wayne Bishop, William Falkner, Johnny Luster and Ricky Neal.

The local baseball program has been threatened with extinction after no youths showed up for a meeting slated for April 8.

School Enrollment Rises As Close Of Term Nears

Enrollment at Cross Plains schools is greater today than it was at the end of the first week of the beginning semester in September.

A headcount Monday revealed 483 students in classes as compared with 460 at the start of the current school year.

The growth is in the elementary grades where there are now 329 pupils as compared with 304 at the start of the term. In high school the enrollment Monday was 154 students, just two below the initial figure of 156.

Cross Plains schools are believed to be suffering one of the lowest "drop-out" rates in Texas, reflecting a well-rounded program, geared to both student interest and citizenship preparation.

Jack Gray Quits Head Coach Job

Cross Plains school board met in special session Tuesday night to accept the resignation of Jack Gray as athletic coach here and ponder the problem of his replacement.

Gray, who came to Cross Plains from Eden two years ago, notified Superintendent Wayne Ford Monday morning that he would not be back next year. His present plans were not immediately learned.

Excerpts from his letter of resignation included: "The decision to leave has been a hard one. I would like to express my appreciation of support from the school board, administration, faculty, townspeople of Cross Plains and most of all to our athletes."

Under Gray's leadership the Buffettes, local high school girls basketball team, won two district championships and finished runner-up in State Class A ranks this year and fourth in 1966. His 1966 track squad won District 10-A title, and his

football squads in the last two years compiled a 7-13 record. Gray's grid Buffaloes of 1965 posted a 5-5 won-lost mark, the best of any local grid unit since 1956 season.

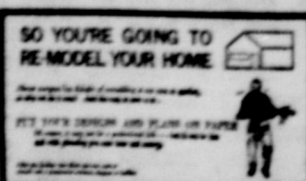

Warn Notaries Public Of Appointment Time

Mrs. Beatrice Deal, County-District Clerk of Callahan County, cautions that the deadline is nearing for Notaries Public who wish re-appointment.

"All Notaries, Public wishing re-appointment must pay the required fee and file a new application, oath and bond with the county clerk between May 1 and May 15," Mrs. Deal said Tuesday.

She added that any person not now a Notary Public but who wishes appointment should apply with her before May 20.

She briefly outlined procedure for new applicants: "Apply, qualify and sign your name; if woman, not that of husband preceded by Mrs. However, maiden name may be used as middle name in addition to middle name if so desired."

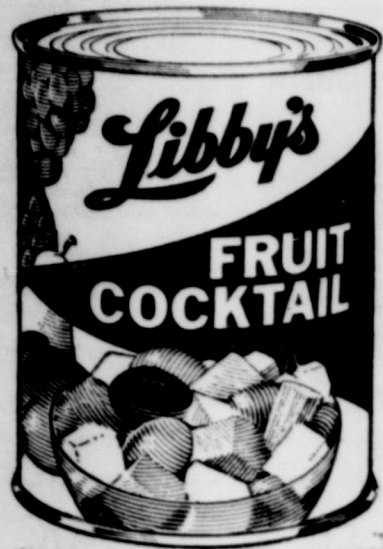

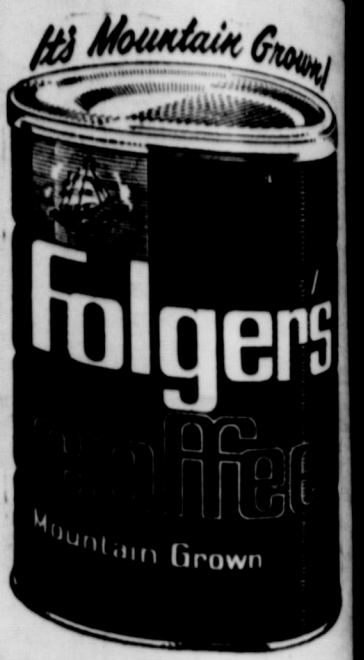
