Buffalo Band Seeks Sweepstakes Laurel

Cross Plains Buffalo Band will be shooting for a third straight Sweepstakes Award at UIL concert and sight reading contests at Tarleton State College in Stephenville Saturday. Director E. J. (Ed) Burt said Monday that the local band will be on stage at 10.30 a.m.

Cross Plains has already won a division I rating in marching held at Brady last Fall. A "one rating" must be earned in all three contests to claim a Sweepstakes Award. Only two other area Class A bands, Albany and Eldorado, are eligible for the highest UIL laurel.

Other area schools participating in the event Friday and Saturday are: Baird, Santa Anna, Early, Goldthwaite, Ranger, Dublin, Glen Rose, Junction, Marble Falls, Menard and Sonora.

Recreation Center Opens For Use Of Public Sunday

Formal opening of Lakewood Recreational Center has been delayed until June 2, however, all facilities of the newly-completed playground will be thrown open for public use Sunday, April 30.

Dues, of which 232 persons have already paid four months in advance, will begin accruing

May 1. The swimming pool, miniature golf course, the golf links, fishing and boat docks, children's playground equipment, picnic shelters and reunion pavillion will all be ready at that time.

It was explained that formal opening, originally scheduled for Saturday evening, had been postponed to permit officials of the F.H.A. to be here. It would have been impossible for them to be on hand earlier.

In a recent meeting of the board of directors a revision of fees to be charged non-members was made. The stipend for reservation of the reunion pavillion was set at \$25 per day per family or group. Fishing fee was put at \$1 per day and swimming set at \$1 for adults and 50 cents for persons 18 years of age and younger.

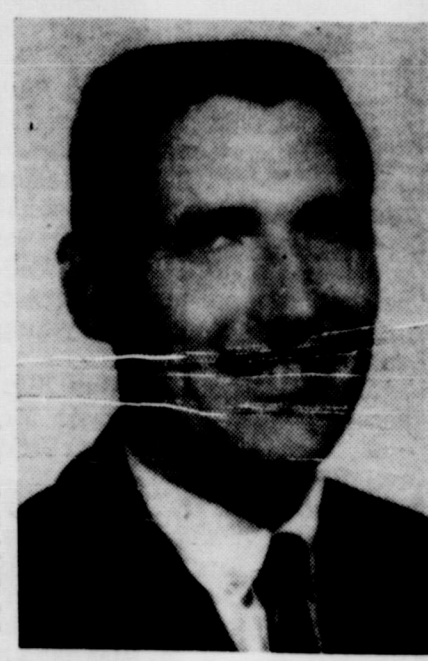
Second Coach Resigns From School's Faculty

Cross Plains High School is now without an athletic coach. Carter T. Williams resigned last week as boys basketball coach and assistant football coach, positions he has held the past two years. Jack Gray, head coach, previously tendered his resignation.

Only Billy E. Pope, junior high school head coach, remains on the staff of the athletic department on the local campus. Williams has accepted a position as boys basketball coach at Pittsburg, Tex., a city with a population of over 4,000. It is a Class AA school, and according to Williams, "it has a good chance of being advanced to Class AAA in the near future."

He came here from Paint Rock. Buffalo cagers under Williams' guidance compiled a 31-22 won-lost record the past two years. His charges captured the District 9-A basketball championship this year for the first time since 1956. In 1965-66 season Buffs recorded an 11-14 mark and finished fourth in seven-team District 10-A. Last campaign Bisons posted a 20-8 showing.

The coach and his family will move shortly after school ends next month. He said in announcing his resignation. "We have enjoyed it here, and support of the basketball program by Cross Plains area people has been tremendous."

Courthouse, Bank, School On Daylight Saving Time

Saturday midnight is clock-changing time. Most Cross Plains business concerns, the Callahan County courthouse and area schools will adopt Daylight Savings Time, as approved by the Texas Legislature, becoming effective April 30.

County Judge Roy Gilbreath told this newspaper yesterday that all county offices would be open beginning Monday morning the same hours as usual but by DST clock-setting.

Cross Plains school board adopted DST and the local system will operate on DST starting Monday morning. Buses classes and other school activities will go by the same hour of the clock as now, however, the time will be one hour earlier by the sun. Most other area schools will follow the same policy.

Cross Plains postal people said yesterday that directives have come down authorizing DST clock settings. Routes and mail dispatches will be the same time as now, but an hour earlier by the sun.

Mail Vote Set By Cotton Producers

Cotton producers in Callahan County will be mailed ballots to be cast in a referendum to determine if allotted acreage will be eligible for transfer out-of-county in 1968 and 1969.

May 15 through 19, 1967, has been approved as the date of the referendum. In case an eligible voter fails to receive a ballot, he may obtain one at the ASCS office in the courthouse at Baird. Marked ballots must be received in the county office or if mailed, postmarked not later than midnight, May 19. Ballots will be counted May 24.

Beryl M. Lusk has drilled in a water well at his farm, one-half mile west of Sabanno, which indicates potential production of between 150 and 200 gallons per minute.

He is presently having the well cased, preparatory to putting it to irrigation use. It is believed capable of watering 20 acres of peanuts.

"It's impossible to accurately predict exactly how much the well will make right at this time," Lusk said, "however, the drillers guessed it between 150 and 200 gallons per minute."



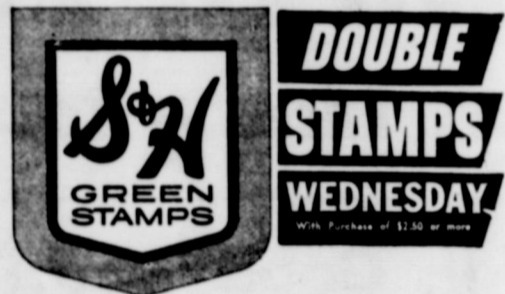

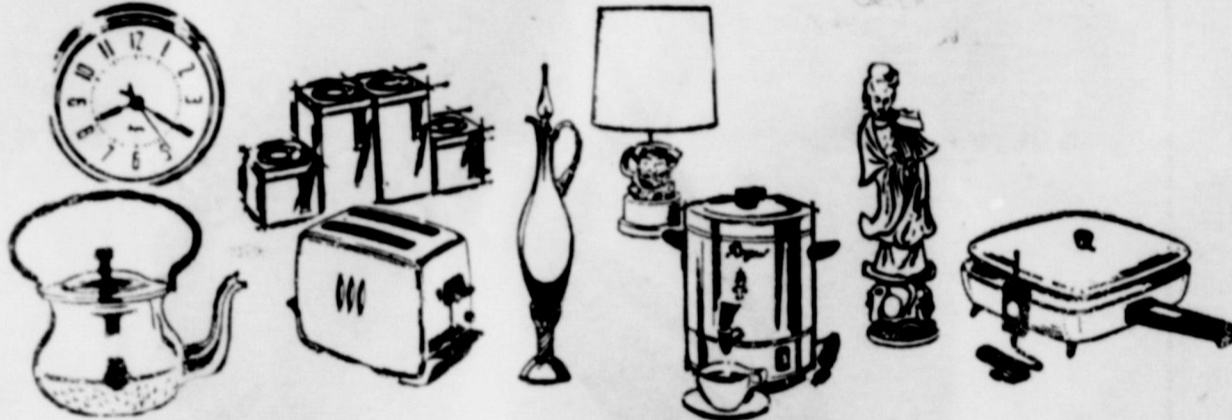
