Seven years ago today I sat down at a typewriter in the editorial room of the Cross Plains Review to write the first lines for the news column.

Ironically, though, the candidate withdrew from the race a few days before election, and the only small business he ever got around to helping was the Cross Plains Review.

# Formal Opening Set Friday At Lakewood

An estimated 1,000 persons are expected at Lakewood Recreation Center, located midway between Cross Plains and Rising Star, Friday afternoon for formal opening of the \$167,500 facility.

The 272 members, their families and executives of Farmers Home Administration, federal agency which provided the loan for building the elaborate play-

ground, will spread picnic baskets near the palatial clubhouse.

Formal program, which is expected to last no more than 20 minutes, will begin at 7 o'clock. Picnic baskets will be spread together immediately thereafter.

Coffee, iced tea, paper plates and drinking cups will be provided by the club. Members are

being urged to bring well-filled picnic baskets and arrive at the grounds in time to view the facilities before the program begins.

## How It Started

First efforts to form the club were launched in the Fall of 1965, when R. D. Needham of Cross Plains and W. E. Tyler of Rising Star contacted F.H.A. and were advised of require-

ments to be met for federal financing. Needham is presently manager of the Center and Tyler is an honorary member of the board of directors.

People in Cross Plains, Rising Star and surrounding communities rallied to the idea of forming the club and 234 members paid \$20 advance fees, equivalent to four months dues, to evidence good faith. Contract to build the Center was awarded to Bowden Lumber Company of Cross Plains and all phases of the project were finished early this year. Although the \$25,000 swimming pool, \$24,000 clubhouse, \$13,000 miniature golf course, the nine-hole, grass green links, reunion pavilion, boat docks and other facilities have been in use several weeks, formal opening was delayed until June 2 to accommodate F.H.A. personnel who could not be here until that time.

## \$4,000 Contributed

When it developed that funds to furnish the clubhouse, buy numerous items for maintenance of the property and opening operating capital had not been allocated in the F.H.A. loan, a financial drive was launched and more than \$4,000 contributed to start the Center on a sound financial basis.

The \$167,500 loan to F.H.A. is repayable over a 40 year period. Annual payments will run between \$10,000 and \$11,000.

Officers of the Center in addition to Tyler and Needham, all of whom will be presented to the membership Friday afternoon, are: Dave Lee, president; B. B. (Jack) Jackson, vice-president; O. B. Edmondson, Glenn Henry, Jack Tunnell, James Rutherford and Jack Scott, directors, and James R. Wagner, secretary-treasurer.

Membership certificates, together with rules for operation of the club, will be presented members at Friday afternoon's formal opening.

## 272 Members

Total membership of the club was reported at 272 early this week, however, a number of the initial signers have moved from the Cross Plains and Rising Star localities since drive to build the club was first launched. It is pointed out, though, that collecting monthly dues presents a time-consuming undertaking and members are being asked to sign authorizations permitting Wagner to draw monthly checks through designated banks for the \$5 stipend.

Questions which members or prospective members may have regarding operation of the Center will be answered by persons who will staff an information table on the grounds Friday afternoon.

## Auto Demolished In Mishap In Burkett Monday Morning

The two men were returning to Cross Plains from Coleman and in nearing the Alvin Hutchins station at Burkett, the captain, who was driving, swerved his 1965 Volkswagen bus sharply to avoid collision with a car driven by Mrs. Donny Porter. The Crockett car turned over at least twice, winding up on the pavement.

Both occupants of the car were taken to Abilene hospitals, the soldier to Dyess Air Force Base, and his father to Cox Memorial, where they received medical attention. ## Annual Audit Shows City In Sound Shape

Annual audit of the City of Cross Plains reveals that the municipality is being wisely managed.

The yearly statement, compiled by Chas. F. Hemphill, Albany public accountant, shows that total receipts during the 12 month period from April 1, 1966 to April 1, 1967, were \$81,234.68.

Expenses aggregated \$66,977.69, reflecting a net gain for the city of \$14,236.99.

Bulk of the city's revenue came from the sale of gas, water and sewer services, which ran \$65,810.05. Current taxes contributed \$12,597.02. Other sources of revenue included: franchise taxes \$567.10, penalties and interest \$145.12, gas tax revenue \$617.73, miscellaneous \$526.28, street lights \$80, rent from part of the City Hall \$210, tapping fees \$145, fines \$20, uniform rental collections \$182.80, gas fee charges \$102 and interest on savings \$220.85.

## Lake Brownwood Given \$206,000

Lake Brownwood State Park received the largest amount in appropriations for Texas parks in a legislative budget which allocated \$1,074,724 for the public properties.

Lake Brownwood's share was set at \$206,000 and was earmarked for development and expansion.

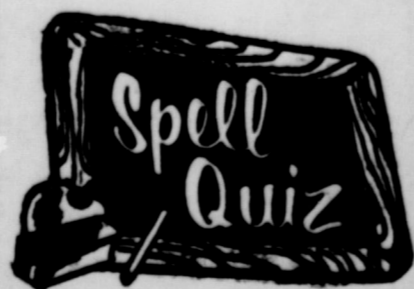
