6 Persons Seek Postmaster Job

Civil Service Commission in Washington, D. C. told the Review in a long-distance telephone call over the week end that six persons have applied for the postmastership of the Cross Plains office.

Deadline for applying to take written test for the position was May 23. The job pays \$7,038 annually.

Persons eligible for the examination, expected to be given the latter part of this month, are: Charles R. Calhoun, Richard C. Brown, Jr., Alton E. Hornsby, Exal D. McMillan, Daniel R. Mitchell and Verna Mae Ramsey.

Mrs. Ramsey is currently serving as clerk-in-charge, following the death of Postmaster Lloyd Bryan, who died February 28 in Dallas.

Exact date of the examination for postmaster had not been set when the Civil Service Commission telephoned this newspaper, however, it was said that June 24 is a probable date and the Brownwood post office a likely place for the test. Candidates will be officially notified of the time and place by the Civil Service Commission.

Suicide Ruled In Death Of Lady, 25, At Rowden

Justice of the Peace Garvin Jones of Baird ruled Monday that Mrs. N. O. Fiscus, 25, of route 1 Clyde, who was found dead in a car Sunday morning one and one-half miles east of Rowden, died of "self-inflicted gunshot wound".

Deputy Sheriff J. H. Cox of Cross Plains made the discovery about 9:50 a.m. Sunday after receiving a telephone call from a local woman who became worried upon learning that Mrs. Fiscus had not reached home after a visit in Cross Plains Saturday night.

Cox said that he immediately began searching and found the dead woman in a late model auto parked along State Highway 36 about 10 miles west of Cross Plains. He radioed Callahan County Sheriff Homer Price and the Department of Public Safety in Abilene upon making the discovery. Price, Jones and Deputy C. S. (Hoot) McGowan of Baird and Patrolman Jack Shields of Abilene assisted in the investigation.

The Cross Plains Deputy stated that Mrs. Fiscus had "apparently been dead for several hours, and time of death was fixed at 1:30 a.m. Sunday. Death resulted from a gunshot wound in the chest. A

.22 calibre pistol was found in the car.

Cox and Jones both reported that two rounds had been expended in the pistol, but only one wound was visible. Jones added that the other bullet had evidently been discharged at a previous time.

Investigating officers found in a day-long investigation that Mrs. Fiscus had been suffering periods of depression, and had at one time been under a physician's care, according to the Cross Plains lawman.

Funeral for Mrs. Fiscus was held at 10 a.m. Tuesday at the First Methodist Church in Clyde with the Rev. Wayland Dodwen, pastor, officiating, assisted by the Rev. Clyde Kelley of the Revival Center in Cross Plains. Burial was in Clyde Cemetery.

She was born July 4, 1941, in Dallas and married Norton Olin Fiscus Dec. 4, 1962, in Dallas. Survivors are her husband; two sons, Russell Dale and Rex Dean, both of the home; two step-daughters, Beverly Joice Costello of Montana and Stella Marie Dewbree of Tyler; her mother, Mrs. Kenneth Eaton of Clyde; her father, Durwood Blair of Pasadena, Tex., and her maternal grandmother, Mrs. Elinor Tucker of Clyde.

The road will begin at a point on the pavement to Coleman (100 yards south of where it intersects with State Highway 36) and proceed westward in front of the Tom Cross and Oren Barr places.

Texas Highway Commission earmarked \$81,000 last week for 3.6 miles of the route.

District Highway Engineer, J. C. Roberts of Abilene, announces that the project will be under supervision of Elmer L.

Harris, resident engineer.

In a telephone conversation with Roberts Monday morning, County Judge Roy Gilbreath, who with County Commissioner Duke Mitchell, recently headed a delegation which met with the Highway Commission in Austin asking the road, was told that it would possibly be a year before actual construction got underway.

The \$81,000 earmarked last week will be for building and grading and drainage structures on the road.

The new Farm-to-Market road is a school bus and mail route and said to be one of the busiest unpaved thoroughfares in this county.

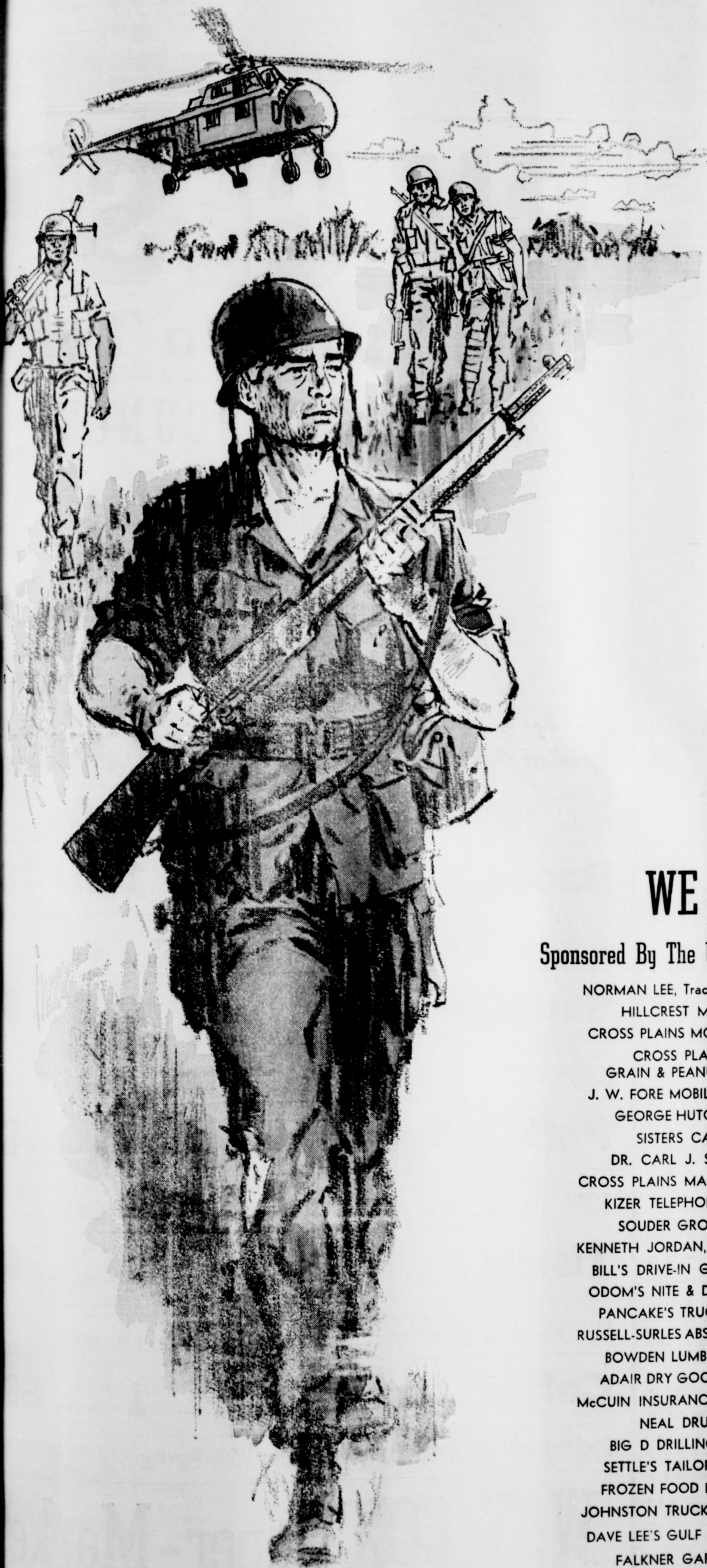

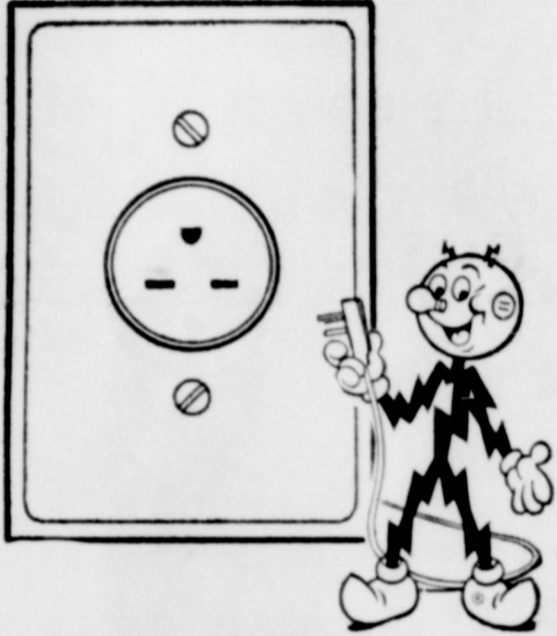

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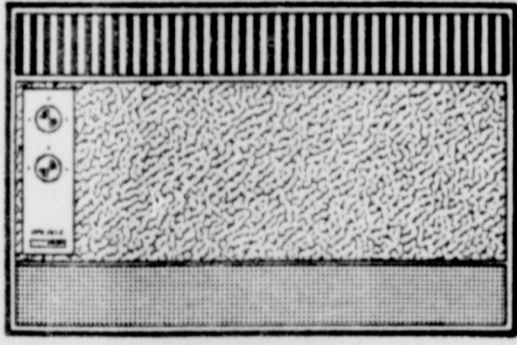
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
