Old fiddlers contest: Frank Spencer, George Sadler and Mrs. Virgil Hill.

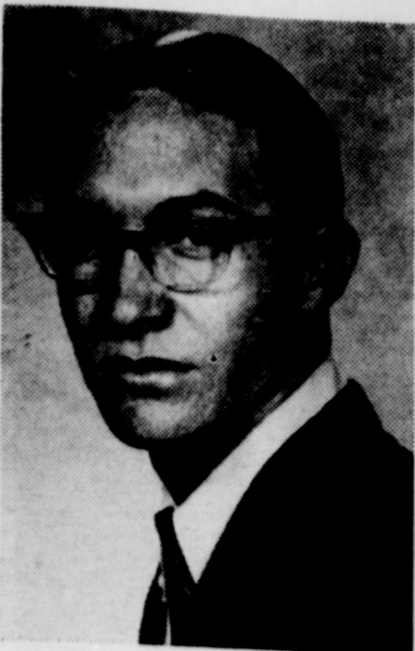
Square dancing: E. P. (Pop) Whitaker.

Government Agency Hires 5 Boys Here

Five Cross Plains boys are currently employed by the Neighborhood Youth Corps, a federal agency to provide jobs for disadvantaged teenagers. They will work 30 hours weekly during the summer months for which they receive \$1.25 per hour. They are required to attend classroom instruction six hours each week.

Classes are being conducted on the Baird school campus and Eddie Howard of Cross Plains is a member of the faculty.

The local boys are presently employed: two by the city, two at Lakewood Recreation Center and one at the school.

Head Coach Named

Leslie Cowan, a former professional football player, and a coach with 17 years experience has been elected to head the athletic program at Cross Plains High School.

He will move here the latter part of July, coming from Luling, where he was head coach and

athletic director for the double A school the past two years. Prior to that he coached at Rising Star 1952-54, at Knox City 1954-58, Wylie 1958-61, Northwest 1961-65.

His high school football was played at Hamlin, after which he attended and received two

degrees from McMurry College in Abilene. Cowan was a standout in college athletics and was drafted by the Los Angeles Rams for which he played two seasons, before being traded to the Chicago Bears.

Cowan is 41 years of age and his family consists of his wife

and three school-age sons.

The new coach, who replaces Jack Gray here, met with trustees in regular session Monday night at which time the discussion of assistants was heard.

Cowan will teach physical education and social subjects in high school.

Beneficial Rains Fall On Parched Pastures

Heavy rainfall over the Cross Plains area this week was welcomed by most ranchers and farmers, however, together with its benefits there were reports of damage and inconvenience.

Ranchers, whose pasture grasses were beginning to wilt, saw in the precipitation relief from expensive summer feeding. Most stock ponds were replenished and all streams in the area ran briskly.

The Atwell sector, mainly a semi-sandy, farming belt, received heaviest amounts of rain and experienced some inconvenience. Nathan Foster said Monday morning that he would be forced to replant grain sorghums, as would many of his neighbors.

Most small grain crops had been harvested, however, a few isolated fields were yet to be combined when the rains came. Among those with grain yet in the field is Dick Koenig, who lives southwest of Cross Plains. This year's wheat crop is estimated to be no more than 20 per cent the size of that harvested last year. Grades and weights, though, are said to have been satisfactory. A droughty winter is blamed with the curtailed yield.

The week end rains were particularly welcomed in the Burnt Branch locality — around the Cutbirth Ranch, Frank and Vernon Spencer places — where other recent precipitation had been exceptionally light. Outlook for summer grass in that vicinity were considerably brightened.

County Commissioner Duke Mitchell received reports Monday of damage to many roads and bridges in his precinct caused by washing. He dispatched repair crews immediately, however, in the Atwell area.

First Golf Event Set At Lakewood Center

A "Sweepstakes Golf Tournament" will be held at Lakewood Recreation Center Sunday, Bill Davee, chairman of the committee on pairings and arrangements, explains that all golfers, members of the club or otherwise, are eligible to participate and will be welcomed.

The last such occurrence was Saturday night when an abundance of squash was taken from the plot, but that night the knave distributed poisoned meat to rid the threat of his discovery by dogs in the area. A canine owned by Mr. and Mrs. T. A. (Bud) Nunn has died.

The gardeners have issued a plea to the unknown thief to cease his deadly tactics, because of danger involved to grandchildren, who frequently visit the homes, and other small children in the neighborhood.

"We don't like having the vegetables stolen," the gardeners agreed this week, "but no amount of fresh produce is worth even the life of a family pet, much less that of a child."

Billy D. Dillard Awarded Citation For Proficiency

An official State Health Department citation for work proficiency has been awarded to Billy D. Dillard Sr., water and sewer superintendent for the City of Cross Plains. The citation reflects the regard in which Dillard is held by state water officials.

Signed by the State Health Commissioner and authorities of the Texas Water and Sewerage Works Association, the certificate of competency is awarded only to those utility plant operators who have successfully demonstrated their skill and knowledge in modern principles of plant management.

To qualify for certification, a plant operator must have accumulated a prescribed amount of actual work experience. He must also have attended both regional and statewide short schools at which the techniques of water treatment and waste water disposal are taught, and must have passed an examination given by State Health Department sanitary engineers.

Lightning Sets Dairy Barn Ablaze Sunday

A rain storm Sunday morning brought an estimated \$10,000 to \$12,000 loss to Mr. and Mrs. B. A. (Bernie) Moore who live about four miles north of Cross Plains.

Fire destroyed a dairy barn which was completely equipped on the couple's farm located just east of the Cottonwood road, Farm-to-Market Road 880.

Moore said that lightning struck near the barn during a heavy rainstorm about 7:30 a.m. and was believed the cause of the blaze. Electric power was interrupted for some time at the Moore place.

Moore had retired from the dairy business some time ago, but the barn still housed machinery necessary for operation.

The loss was partially covered by insurance, according to the owner, but it was thought shortly after Cross Plains firemen extinguished the blaze that nothing could be salvaged.

City Will Get More Paved Streets Soon

Cross Plains will soon have at least four or five additional blocks of pavement.

Mayor Doyle Burchfield said Tuesday that at least four blocks had already been assured, and that many other property owners have expressed interest in the current paving campaign.

According to the mayor, cost to the property owners is five and one-half cents per square foot for half the roadway bordering property. City will pay costs of surfacing intersections.

No work will be done on the new asphalt until "the weather settles and roads have dried sufficiently," Burchfield stated.

A seal coating of existing pavement has been completed.
