Texas Bank Examiners Will Query Customers

Routine examination of all Texas-chartered banks will soon take on an additional verification.

Auditors will mail forms to bank customers, whose accounts are selected on a random sampling basis, asking that deposits and loan balances as reflected on books of the financial institutions be verified by individual customers.

Texas banking commissioner J. M. Falkner explains that similar verification programs are already in use by various bank supervising agencies of the federal government.

secretary of the organization, Bluebonnet Chapter of American Business Women's Association. Mrs. J. Peyton Smith, also of Cross Plains, is president of the Brownwood organization and delivered the welcoming address at Thursday night's function.

"I have enjoyed coming to Brownwood for these "Boss Night" meetings for years, but I never expected this to happen to me," Tunnell said in accepting a commemorative plaque, presented by Miss Agnes King, the 1966 "boss of the year."

Tunnell has headed the Citizens State Bank in Cross Plains since August 1937. At the time he took over, deposits totaled \$118,119.59, whereas today they aggregate more than \$3,500,000, representing a gain of more than \$30 for every dollar then held by the local financial institution. Mrs. Sims has served as his secretary since October 1937.

Congressman Omar Burleson was featured speaker at the banquet. He was introduced by Wendell Mayes, Brownwood radio executive, who is a former "boss of the year," chosen by the clubwomen.

"He is a longtime friend of mine, and I'm happy Brown County has been added to his district," Mayes said. "He's just our kind of folks." Mayes continued, "I believe he is one of the most able men in Congress today," he added.

Burleson stressed the need for re-dedication to the principles which made America great. "Patriotism isn't corney," he said, "and needs to be transmitted to our children and grandchildren just as it was passed on to us by our forefathers."

Miss Barbara Taylor, the 1967 "woman of the year" named by Brownwood clubwomen, presided at Thursday night's banquet. At the close she designated Mrs. Tunnell, wife of the night's chief honoree to receive a beautiful floral piece which centered the head table.

28 Teachers Assured For New Term School Faculty

Cross Plains schools will have a faculty of 28 when the new term opens Aug. 28. There will be 24 regularly assigned instructors, two under the federal government's Title I program and two teacher aides.

Members of the board of trustees met Monday night and definitely filled at least two vacancies. They were that of a home-making instructor and an English and business teacher in high school. Action was also taken to fill other vacancies in the teaching staff, but Supt. Wayne Ford had not received acceptances from the prospects at noon Tuesday.

Definitely added to the local teaching corps was Mrs. Leslie Cowan, wife of the incoming head football coach. She will teach high school English and business subjects. Ford also received a verbal acceptance from Mrs. Betty Odom of Cisco to teach homemaking. She has taught 18 years and recently has been employed in a cooperative program, teaching in both Strawn and Desdemona. Mrs. Odom will continue to make her home in Cisco and

drive back and forth each day. Trustees Monday night approved the inclusion of another first grade section and also the adding of another second grade. Teachers for these sections are expected to be announced next week.

Coach Leslie Cowan is presently contacting two assistants and contracts with them are expected to reach here Monday or Tuesday, Ford said.

One teacher will be added here under the federal government's Title I program, bringing to four the number serving in that capacity. Miss Betty Browning, Mrs. Joe Ingram and Mrs. James Chesshir will continue in this phase of instruction during the approaching term, as well as one additional teacher to be named soon.

Trustees Monday night stud-

ied the insurance program offered to Texas schools and voted to offer participation to local students. Parents will be provided with forms for enrollment in the program if they so desire. The board, however, voted to take the policies on high school football players, paying \$10 of the \$12 cost from budgeted funds.

The calendar of holidays for the upcoming school term was also set by trustees Monday night. It provides for observance of Labor Day, Sept. 4, as a holiday, the taking of Nov. 23 and 24 for Thanksgiving, a Christmas recess from Dec. 22, 1967 to Jan. 1, 1968 inclusive, a holiday on March 8, when teachers attend the Texas State Teachers Association annual meeting and April 12 to 15 inclusive for Easter.

S.S. Decisions May Be Taken To Court

(Editor's Note: This is the third of a series of six articles, telling of safeguards against wrong decisions in the social security program, prepared for the Cross Plains Review by R. R. Tuley, Jr., Social Security district manager.)

In the first two of this series of articles readers were told of reconsideration actions and then the process of a hearing before a Hearing Examiner. This week's story goes further down the road of seeking an award action.

If the Hearing Examiner denies the claim, then the claimant generally has 60 days in which to ask that the decision be reviewed by the Appeals Council in Washington.

The Appeals Council has the power to ask that more specific and detailed evidence be secured before reaching a decision to reverse or to uphold the Hearing Examiner.

The Appeals Council has also the power to intervene on its own wish, if in regularly reviewing decisions it feels that the Hearing Examiner gave too little or too much weight to some parts of the evidence. Although this is not done frequently, such intervention is taken often enough to be of value in keeping the Hearing Examiners from careless mistakes.

But, if the Appeals Council rules against the claimant, that's still not the absolutely final answer. Read next week's article for what comes next.

Former Local Man Directs Vast Recreation Program

One of Texas' most aggressive small town recreational programs is headed by a former Cross Plains man, Keith Coburn, son of Mr. and Mrs. Howard E. Coburn.

The little city with such a lively undertaking is Crane.

Recreation in Crane County is financed by the county. Since Crane is the only town in the county an unusually large amount of recreational facilities can be supplied. Youths and adults alike are benefactors.

Coburn, who teaches physical education in the school system during the regular term, plans and directs the all-inclusive Summer program.

Crane County in cooperation with the public schools sponsors a program during the Summer for persons between the ages of seven and 18. Supervised instruction is given in golf, archery, tennis, ping-pong, badminton and indoor games and crafts. Included are free instruction to beginning and intermediate swimmers.

Another feature of the Summer program is competition offered in track and field events. Meets are arranged whereby Crane boys compete with athletes from other nearby towns.

Also on the Summer calendar is a Summer Beauty Pageant, which is widely-attended. Winner of the senior division for young ladies is given the title of "Miss Crane" and represents the town throughout the year.

Within the City of Crane are six parks and playgrounds, three of which offer finest baseball diamonds.

The Recreational program at Crane also includes a well-rounded Little League and baseball for boys both younger and older, a three-day rodeo and the usual 4-H, FFA and activities customarily found in West Texas counties.

Young people from the 8th grade to 19-year-olds are supplied with a youth center, where participation in arts and crafts, table games, ping-pong, billiards and similar pastimes are closely supervised. The center has a large room for dancing, music, concerts and public functions.

A special facility with exceptional equipment is provided for Negro youth.

Approximately 600 young people are enrolled in the youth program. During Winter months activities of the centers are coordinated with public school functions.
