Peanut Yields May Approach \$ Million

Barring unfavorable weather between now and harvest time, the Cross Plains area may reap a record peanut crop this year. Some observers predicted yesterday that more than 3,900 tons, worth around \$700,000, may be marketed here this fall.

Cowan Hutton who has in excess of 200 acres planted to peanuts, 70 of which is irrigated, said that the present outlook is as bright as he has ever seen.

Michael Ingram, a young farmer making his first crop, reported Monday that he has 29 acres in dryland peanuts and that prospects are exceptional. He farms about one mile northwest of Cross Plains.

W. B. (Wee) Holcomb was plowing out the middles of his peanut fields this week, preparatory to laying-by. Last week's rains, which measured 1.8 inches at his place, made conditions ideal.

Crop Later

Beryle M. Lusk has 100 acres in peanuts, 15 of which will be irrigated. He reported Monday that his stand was as good as he'd ever seen and that prospects were better than last year when he averaged 60 bushels to the acre on his dryland fields. "I planted more seed and used sulphur in the fertilizer," he said. Lusk predicted, though, that harvesting might be a couple of weeks later this fall.

Earliest peanut crops may be those of J. R. Rector and Damon Jones, both of whom irrigate. They are expected to begin gathering late in September. Both have outstanding prospects.

Calvin Ingram, who farms three miles north of Cross Plains, has 38 acres in dryland peanuts. His stand is not quite as lush as he had hoped but a bumper yield seems possible.

August Rains Needed

Truett Dawkins, who has 147 acres in dryland peanuts in the Sabano locality, reported his outlook Monday as follows: "Prospects are every bit as bright as last year — possibly even better — the 2.3 inches of rain last week left it too wet to plow today but vines are now eight inches high and growing well; my 50-odd bushel average last year could possibly be beat if rainfall in August equals that in 1966."

Raymond Franke, who has 230 acres in dryland peanuts, says the prospect is better right now than a year ago but that grass and weeds present a greater threat. He was plowing middles Monday and predicted that he'd be combatting competing vegetation all through July and possibly August. He stressed the need for August rains to make choice grade, matured nuts. He is experimenting with a chemical which allows peanut vines to utilize nitrogen nodules which sometimes form on roots. "I'm looking forward to the outcome of this experiment," he said.

Sterling Odom, who has 130 acres in peanuts south of Rowden, said Monday that his vines were from six to 19 inches tall and that the outlook seemed to be about par with last year.

Clyde Prospects

Harold and Seth Holden of Clyde who usually market their peanuts in Cross Plains, are reported to have better than average stands and exceptionally bright prospects.

Alfred Franke, who has 20 acres in peanuts, says that the crop looks better right now than at the same time a year ago. He planted late in June and expects to harvest in November. Troy Crockett, who farms nearby, has a slightly earlier crop, having planted about two weeks earlier. His fields, too, look promising, as does that of Leo Franke, on the old Jack Baum place, also in the same general vicinity.

A. L. Breeding, who farms six miles northwest of Cross Plains, said that a 1.80 inch rain which fell at his place last week

came just right for his peanuts. He has 62 acres planted to the crop and believes with adequate moisture in August the yield might even surpass last year's.

Bill Ingram has what neighbors say is an exceptionally good stand of peanuts. A crop of his at the old Tom Lee place, five miles west of Cross Plains, is reported lapping in the middles.

Troy Lamb of Nimrod, who bought the place formerly owned by Dr. Weldon Varner, between Cross Plains and Cottonwood, has about 70 acres in peanuts. He planted around June 7 and is set-up to irrigate, however, watering has not yet been necessary.

Outlook for both irrigated and dryland crops are said to be good at both the Edwin Shafer and Oscar Shafer places, eight miles northeast of Cross Plains. Both the father and son, market about as many peanuts as any producers in this general area.

Edwin plans to irrigate all of his 31 acres if needed, but has not yet started. He reaped 120 bushels per acre on an irrigated plot last year, and hopes for 100 or better bushels this year on the late crop. About 450 pounds of fertilizer per acre was added to the ground.

He continued that grass and weeds are the biggest problem right now.

Cross Plains Little League All-Stars whipped Clyde All-Stars 5-3 Friday night for the Area III championship.

Local elite squad was scheduled to take on winner of Area I in the opening game of the District 26 tournament at Eastland Wednesday, July 26.

Tourney Stated

Cross Plains will play either Ranger or Weatherford, at 7:30 p.m. at Wright Little League Field. Thursday the winner of Area II, Cisco, Eastland, Breckenridge or Albany, will tangle with Area IV victors, a Brownwood or Coleman team.

Two games are on tap Saturday, consolation at 6 p.m. and championship at 8:10 p.m. A win Wednesday would put the locals in the championship game; a loss, in the consolation tilt.

Site of the District 26 Tournament, Wright Little League Field, is located directly south of Eastland High School. According to N. L. Dillard, local president, the field is located atop a hill and is visible from all parts of the city. Parking will be on parking lot behind the high school building.

Cross Plains Wins

Local all-stars snapped a two-year losing streak to Clyde Friday with mid-inning scoring, although Clyde staged a late inning rally.

Rodney Renfro, starting and winning Cross Plains pitcher, threw no-hit ball through three innings and was backed by near-flawless fielding. Renfro fanned 12 Clyde batters while giving up only two hits and two free passes. Jerry Lewis relieved the tiring starter with two out in the sixth with a runner on base, Jackie Fleming, and a 3-0 count on the hitter, John Bonine. Lewis got a strike before walking Bonine, then struck out Jeff Graham to end the game.

After a scoreless first inning, Cross Plains catcher Donnie Dillard led off top half of the second inning with a towering home run to center field. Renfro followed with a walk and scored on a single by right fielder Buddy Dillard. Catcher Dillard tied again in the third after walking, on outfielder Dillard's single.

With two out in the fourth Roger Crawford singled and Don Dillard reached base on an error. Errors on a ball Renfro hit allowed both to score.

Clyde Scores

Down 5-0, Clyde cracked the scoreboard with a single run in the bottom of the fourth. Reuben Ramos, who pitched the final four and two-thirds innings and got aboard on an error, tallied on starting pitcher Allan Holcomb's single to center. Clyde rallied in the sixth for two on Holcomb's home run which scored Robby Tucker who was on via a fielder's choice.

Manager Lester Wyatt said after the game, "I'm really proud of the boys, they gave all they had." That comment was echoed by Coach Edwin Weiss.

Three umpires from Cross Plains are slated to work in the district meet, although the games to be worked will not feature Cross Plains All-Stars.

Coaching staff at Cross Plains High School for the upcoming term, which opens Aug. 28, was completed last week with the election of two assistants to aid head coach Leslie Cowan.

Named first assistant was Jim Ethridge, who coached the past two years at Hutto. He is a graduate of Mullin High School and took his B. S. degree at the University of Texas. Ethridge will teach social subjects in high school. He will also coach girls basketball. He, his wife and their two-year-old son will move here around Aug. 1.

Chosen junior high school coach was John Greer, a graduate of Bangs High School and Howard Payne College. He has two years experience in the coaching field, one at Van Horn and one at Mercedes. Greer will teach health and physical education in junior high school. He and his wife will move here within the next two weeks.

Another recently-elected member of the school faculty is Mrs. Ann Higginbotham, who will teach a section of the second grade. She comes here from Springlake-Earth where she taught the past three years. Mrs. Higginbotham, her husband and their two children, who have been in Cisco for the Summer, will move here around the middle of August.

Contracts are expected to be signed by two more new teachers for the system here. With their election the school faculty will number 28 for the approaching term.

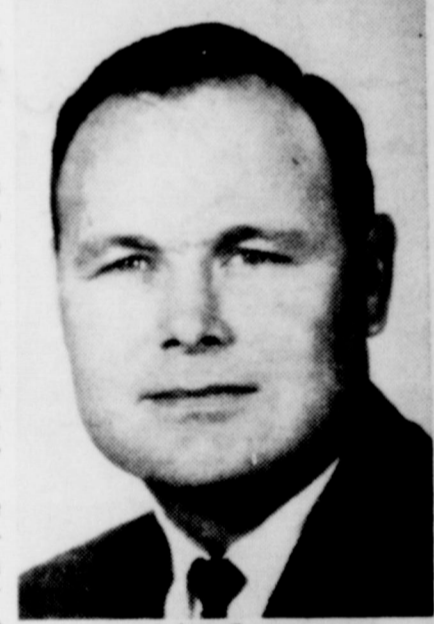

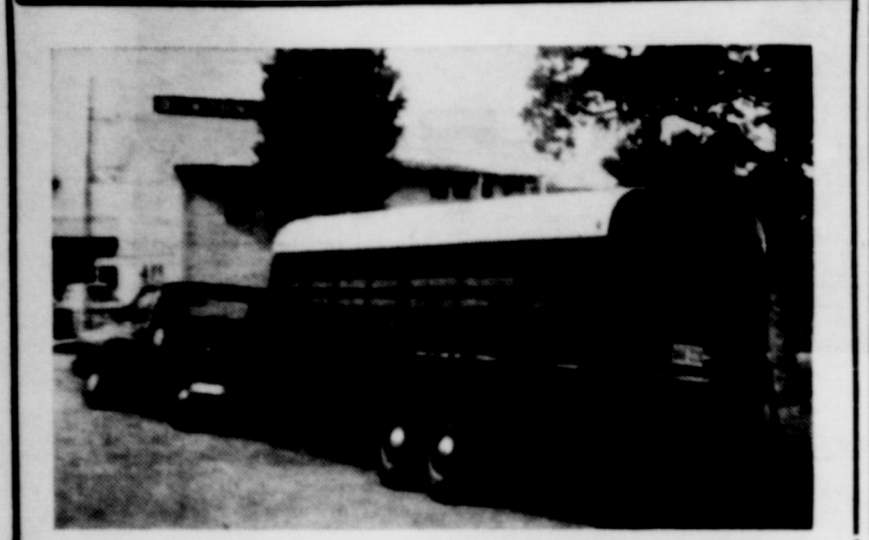

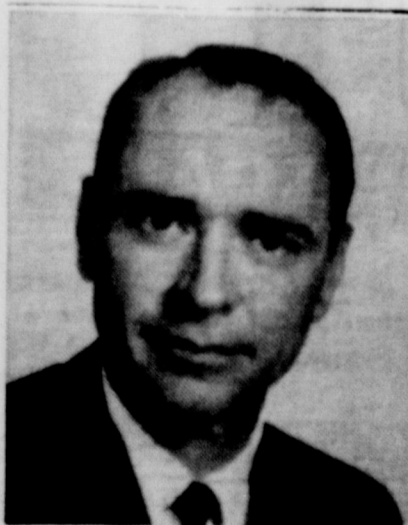

Half Appealed S.S. Claims Get Award

(Editors Note: This is the fifth of a series of six articles, telling of safeguards against wrong decisions in the social security program, prepared for Cross Plains Review by R. R. Tuley, Jr., Social Security district manager.)

As the next to last in this series of articles showing how a dissatisfied social security claimant may press his claim on through the courts, here are some statistics as to the effect of such actions.

Out of every 100,000 disability claims, some 42,400 are initially denied. Reasons include lack of sufficient social security credit, failure to present medical reports, or that the medical reports do not reflect a disabling condition severe enough to prevent continued employability.

Of those denied, about 14,400 disagree with the decision and ask for reconsideration, which brings award action for 5,350.

Out of the remaining 9,050 reconsidered denials, about 4,100 ask for a hearing, which results in some 1,570 awards.

About 1,380 of the remaining 2,520 again denied ask for a review by the Appeals Council. At that stage 249 become award actions.

Only 165 of the remaining 1,140 again turned down file suit in a Federal District Court. Those courts, and later appeal courts, find that 100 should be paid.

Thus, 57,600 award actions taken initially grow to 64,860 through the reconsideration, hearing, review and court actions.

Decisions on claims are not taken lightly by the Social Security Administration. At each step along the way, denied

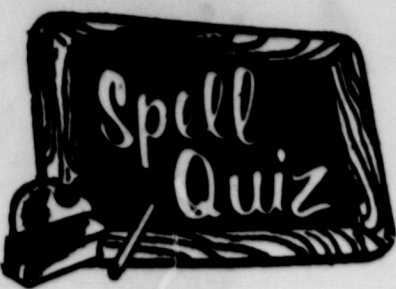
