

Early Grazing Okay On Diverted Lands

Farmers who are participating in the Department of Agriculture's 1967 cotton program or the feed-grain program may begin grazing diverted acres Oct. 1. The date is 30 days earlier than previously allowed.

"In no way is a producer allowed to harvest a crop from diverted acreage, other than by grazing," says J. C. Earp, manager of the Callahan County ASCS office.

It is pointed out that the earlier grazing date applies to one-year programs only and does not include acreage designated under long-term contracts, such as the Soil Bank or Cropland Adjustment Program.
