It is a good thing Mr. and Mrs. Ottie Knight like tomatoes because they have raised a bumper crop this year on small plot at their home about nine miles southwest of Cross Plains.

Proof of that was shown in Cross Plains Monday. A single limb from only one of the nine irrigated plants had 15 tomatoes clinging to it, weighing two and one-half pounds. One of the fruits gathered earlier this year weighed one pound and measured more than 13 inches in circumfer-
