## Peanut Harvest Begins In Area

Rain, which measured more than an inch in some sections of the Cross Plains area Saturday, was credited with having delayed peanut harvests in many nearby fields. Opinion varied as to whether or not the moisture will prove beneficial, however, some veteran growers opined that it will.

Farmers with irrigated fields, many of which are earlier-maturing than dryland crops, have already started harvesting. The gathering, though, is not well underway.

Through Monday night a total of 528,200 pounds of peanuts had been dried in Cross Plains, representing roughly 10 per cent of the expected local yield this year.

Cross Plains Grain and Peanut Company, which both dries and warehouses peanuts, estimated that the nuts handled thus far this year at the firm's facilities had an approximate

value of \$59,015.50. This was based on the average support price of \$222.70 per ton.

Lawrence Farm and Ranch Supply in Cross Plains will also buy and warehouse peanuts again this year, and had already handled several loads when a survey of the crop was made by this newspaper Monday afternoon.

Pioneer Farmers Cooperative, located on State Highway 36, four miles east of Cross Plains, was still under construction Monday, however, R. D. Boland, plant superintendent, expressed the hope that facilities there will be ready by the time peanut digging gets well underway.

Consensus yesterday was that this year's crop will compare favorably with that of 1966, one of the best on record for this section of the state. Estimates are that 2,500 tons will be handled locally with an approximate value of \$545,750.

## Commission To Install Presbyterian Minister

At a request of the Session of the First Presbyterian Church of Cross Plains the Brazos Presbytery will provide a Commission to install the Rev. H. Grady James as pastor of the local congregation. A special service is scheduled Sunday night, Oct. 15, beginning at 7:30.

Named to the Commission to be here at that time were: Rev. George M. Walker of Albany, who will preside and propound

constitutional questions; Rev. Charlie L. Morris of Brownwood, who will bring the sermon; Elder C. F. Hemphill of Albany, to charge the minister; Rev. Harry Scales of Haskell, to charge the congregation; Elder James Hickman of Cross Plains, to read the Scripture; Elder Jim Barr of Cross Plains, member, and the Rev. Julian Sleeper of Brownwood, to sit as a member of the Commission.

## Bangs Braced For Buff Invasion

Cross Plains Buffaloes will travel to Bangs Saturday night looking for a fourth straight victory in the last non-conference game of the season.

The Saturday night contest, for which the kickoff is slated at 7:30, will be played before a Bangs homecoming crowd which will surely add fire to the Dragons.

Buffaloes will enter the affair with a bit better record. Cross Plains has won three while losing two, and Bangs has notched a pair of victories against the same number of losses and a tie. Both squads

have allowed opposition more points than either has scored. The Herd has given up 117, an average of 23 per clash, and Bangs has allowed 95, 19 per contest. Buffaloes, however, have tallied 88, a mean of just over 17 points in five tilts, and Bangs has averaged 13 in totaling 65 in the same number of outings.

**No Mutual Oppnent**  
Bangs and Cross Plains have not met a mutual opponent this year. Dragons, however, have tangled with three District 9-A foes. Early fell 32-8, Santa Anna won 21-6 and Bangs and Rising Star tied 6-6 last Saturday.

## Pioneer Co-Op Will Open Next Monday

J. R. Rector, president of Pioneer Farmers Cooperative, said Tuesday that "barring unexpected complications" the peanut drying plant would open for business Monday.

Consulting architect and Farmers Home Administration officials were checking construction with officers and directors of the cooperative Tuesday and consensus of the group was that the plant could open first of the week.

## DONALD BAIRD BUILDS COTTON GIN AT ECHO

Donald Baird, formerly of Cross Plains, is building a new, most-modern type cotton gin just south of Echo on State Highway 206, toward Coleman.

Work is being speeded in the hope of having it ready to accommodate the upcoming cotton crop. Some local growers expect to begin running mechanical pickers in about 10 days.

## BANK DEPOSITS HERE APPROACH 4 MILLION

Bank deposits in Cross Plains have reached a record high.

Figures published this week, following a call on all state banks as of Oct. 4, reveal that the Citizens State Bank here now holds \$3,703,584.66. The total is three times greater than deposits of two Cross Plains banks in the boom days of the 1920's, and more than 30 times the amount on deposit in August 1937, when Fred V. Tunnell, present president, assumed helm of the local financial institution.

Miss Melba Irene Coker, daughter of the Rev. and Mrs. Lloyd Coker of Cross Plains, has been chosen for inclusion in annual publication of "Who's Who Among Students in American Colleges and Universities".

Nomination of Miss Coker, a senior at Tarleton State College at Stephenville, was made by a committee in recognition of outstanding achievement both in scholastic programs and in student activities. Notification of her acceptance for the honor was received by her parents in Cross Plains this week.

## \$2,500 U F Quota Now Looms Likely

Despite a 25 per cent increase in the current United Fund goal over a year ago, nine-tenths of the quota came from one day's effort by 47 ladies who canvassed the trade area last Thursday.

Jack Tunnell, United Fund treasurer, reported Monday night that \$2,249.37 had been deposited. Collections from two rural communities and at least one more business firm are yet to be reported.

Goal for the ensuing year was set at \$2,500 as compared with \$2,000 a year ago.

Cowan Hutton, U. F. Fund president, and Mrs. J. C. Claborn, who served as solicitation chairman, joined yesterday in expressing deep appreciation to the ladies "who did such an outstanding job" in the financial canvass.

Although quota for the ensuing year is \$500 more, the general opinion of civic leaders yesterday was that it will be reached. Tunnell pointed out that several individuals customarily come to the local bank and leave their annual contributions. These, added to the two outstanding totals from two near by rural communities and that from at least one more business firm is expected to make up the \$250.65 deficit, he opined.

## New Law Requires All Voters Register

House Bill 89, as passed by the 60th Legislature, concerning qualifications and requirements for voting, will effect many people in Callahan County, particularly the provision that specifies that all voters must register, regardless of age.

The legislation provides that all voters must be registered in order to vote in any election held after Feb. 1, 1968. Previously persons over 60 years of age in this county did not have to register. There is no charge for the registration and the registration period opened Oct. 1, and continues to Jan. 31, 1968.

Tax Assessor-Collector Albert Lovell advises that an individual may register by mail or in person. Blanks for registration will be left at the banks, and places of business for the convenience of those not able to come by the courthouse in Baird.

Another change from the past is that the voting year will begin March 1, rather than Feb. 1 as in the past.

## Military Personnel

The law is now changed as concerns the military personnel. Those serving outside Texas may vote without having registered through the regular registration procedure as administered by the Tax-Assessor-Collector. The official federal post card application for absentee ballot for each election is treated as an application for registration, and this application will be handled through the office of the County Clerk. It is stressed that the application for absentee ballot serves as registration for that election only. The individual in military service outside of Texas may also register through

the ordinary procedure, through the Tax Assessor-Collector office.

There are new regulations concerning former aliens, new residents and persons reaching voting age. Persons becoming 21 years old after the close of the regular registration period and new residents to the state after the registration deadline may register at least 30 days prior to any election in which they wish to vote.

Persons over 60, who have not been required to register in the past, may continue to vote under the old law until Feb. 1, 1968.

Help supplied by people of the Cross Plains area for flood sufferers in South Texas has been described as "most generous."

Two pick-up loads and one trailer-full of wearing apparel and household items were sent from here to a collection point in Abilene. The drive was sponsored by two Cross Plains churches, Methodists and Baptists.

Announcement is made that additional gifts for victims of Hurricane Beulah may be brought to Dressy Hall at the First Baptist Church and that they will be forwarded to sufferers. Such gifts must be brought no later than this week to be in time for the final shipment to South Texas.

In addition to his gridiron prowess, news releases from the Tyler college list Byrd as a straight A student and a leader in student activities. He has been a frequent after-dinner speaker at student functions.

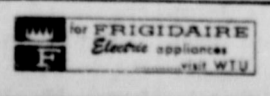

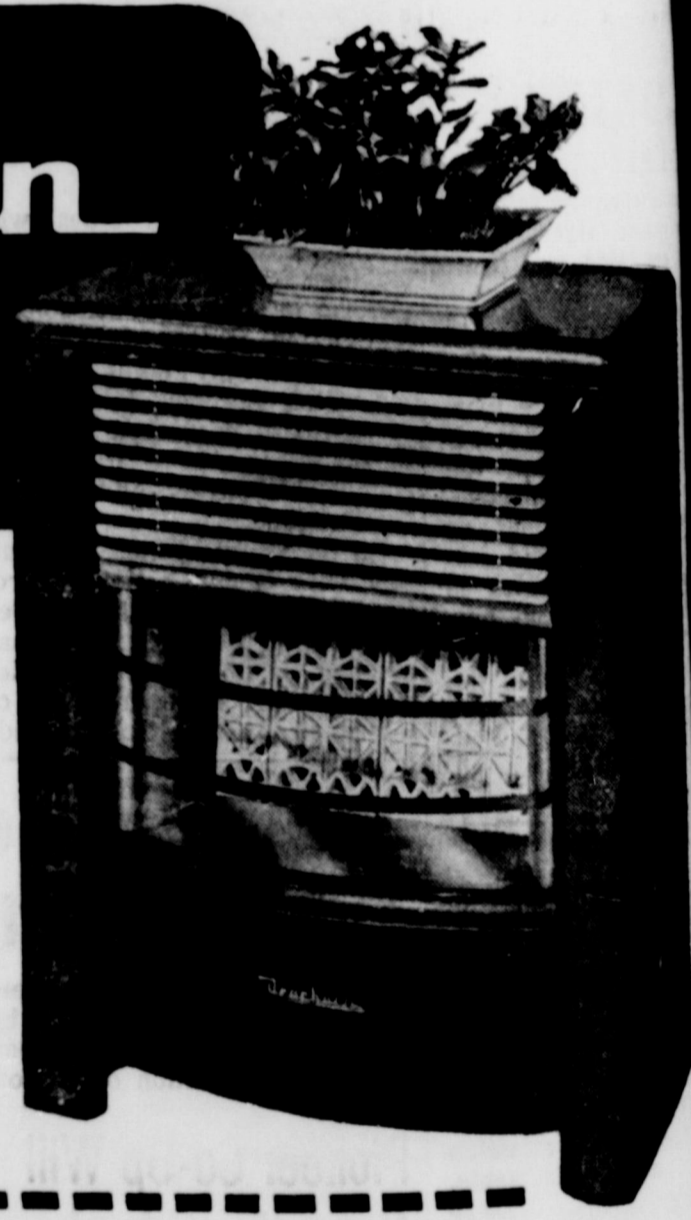

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# Beating Gorman Sends Buffs Winning Streak To 3 Straight

Cross Plains Buffaloes claimed a third straight football victory here Friday night in besting the Gorman Panthers 8-6. The third consecutive win equalled the longest winning streak a Buffalo Herd has put together in seven years. In 1960 Bisons claimed three straight triumphs, and that figure had stood since 1956 when Cross Plains won in eight straight contests winning the district championship.

### Conversion Wins

Margin of victory last Friday was a successful two-point conversion. The all-important bonus came on a pass from Quarterback Rick Jones to Tailback Joe Dodds, who was open in the right flat deep in the end zone.

Buffaloes began the scoring march following a short Gorman Panther punt. It was climaxed by Right End Bo Barr hauling in a six-yard toss from Quarterback Jones with 1:17 left in the first quarter. Although Barr caught the scoring strike, it was Left End Mike Bright that turned in the key play. Facing third and eight yards to go, Jones lofted the ball downfield to Bright who made a fine leaping catch 22 yards toward the Panther goal. After two rushes, Jones hit Barr with the touchdown pass.

### Gorman Hits Pay

Four minutes and 12 seconds later Gorman had cut the margin to two points. Then Panthers blitzed 86 yards in eight plays.

Utility Back Daryl Hirst climaxed the march with a 44-yard romp around right end. The talented 186-pound senior personally accounted for 77 yards in the drive on four carries.

### Conversion Fails

Panthers figured to tie the score with a two-point conversion after the touchdown, but an unidentified Buffalo grabbed Gorman Quarterback Mike Duran before he could hand off the ball. With 9:05 remaining in the second quarter, all scoring had ended, but it was just the beginning of anxious mo-

ments for Buffalo supporters.

### Field Goal Attempt

The ensuing kickoff found the Bisons unable to move, and Panther Scatback Johnny Scitern returned the punt 15 yards. A personal foul moved scrimmage to the Herd's 20. At that point, however, Buffs displayed the first of many more stands to come in allowing only one yard in three runs. Then the talented Hirst had visions of a field goal from about the 25-yard line. Buff Linebacker James McMillan broke through to block the placement kick.

Gorman made another goal-ward thrust late in the second quarter after gaining the ball on downs at the Herd's 40. Hirst ripped off a 20-yarder, but suffered two 10-yard losses as the half ended.

### Panthers in Hole

First half of the third quarter was used largely in punt exchanges. Midway of the period, however, Buff Wingback Randy Montgomery broke into the clear, Jones heaved the ball and 49 yards later Cross Plains had a first on the Gorman 20. Although the scoring bid failed as the visitors held for downs, it backed Gorman into a hole that the squad did not break out of until late in the final stanza.

Early in the last 12 minutes Buffaloes made two more threats. First came after a short Gorman punt gave Cross Plains the ball on the Panther 26. Immediately Jones passed to Bright for 12, and the same combination worked for six more. But Panther giant tackle Ed Sutton, 223-pounder, bagged a Buff fumble at the Gorman 11.

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# Ex-Burkett Man Made State's Top Veterinarian

Dr. James B. Henderson, who was born and reared at Burkett, has been named chief veterinarian for Texas, replacing Dr. S. B. Walker.

Henderson has worked in East Texas on tuberculosis control, in North Texas as the commission's chief veterinarian for that area, in West Texas as area supervisor and even in Mexico on hoof-and-mouth disease campaign.

All that experience has resulted in a 14-year relationship with the commission and a total of 18 years in governmental regulatory work.

### Looking Ahead

The 42-year-old Henderson has hardly had time to fill the fountain pens on his desk so far, but already he's looking for constructive changes that can be made in the operation of his state agency.

"Right now, we're just planning to attempt to expedite the progress of current programs," Henderson says. "We are not, however, contemplating the re-organization of our state program, because apparently our field organization is operating in a very effective manner."

Henderson is planning some new animal-health programs, "but they are strictly in the planning and talking stages at this time."

A new hog-cholera eradication program is one of these. "The groundwork is now being laid between the state and federal agencies," he says, "and certain agreements have to be made before the program can be initiated."

Henderson is very clear on his philosophy and goals in his new office. "I'm taking the attitude that certainly our only reason for existence is to serve the livestock industry, and that includes all segments of the industry."

Henderson was awarded a degree in veterinary medicine from Texas A&M University in 1947, after which he entered private practice in Runnels County.

He left that to do a tour of duty with the federal government in the tuberculosis control work in East Texas, spending all his time traveling. Next came the year and a half in Mexico.

The years 1951-52 were spent as assistant state veterinarian in Indiana, but then he returned to Texas and spent the next six years as chief veterinarian and sometimes acting director of the commission's Fort Worth office.

### Returned to Coleman

Eight years ago, Henderson finally got to return to West Texas and Coleman, where he became the commission's area supervisor for a 40-county district. He still holds that job, until a new supervisor can be named.

Texas' new chief veterinarian's family consists of his wife, Ima Jeanne, their daughter who is a freshman at Texas Woman's University in Denton, and a 14-year-old son, who attended Coleman High School.

"I'm very optimistic so far as the future of our regulatory programs are concerned," the new executive director says, "because I feel that we have some very good staff members as well as field personnel."

"The majority of them are well trained in their work ... Also, generally speaking, the Legislature was rather gracious to us during the last session and budgeted us money in a manner that we should be able to operate to the benefit of the different segments of the livestock industry."

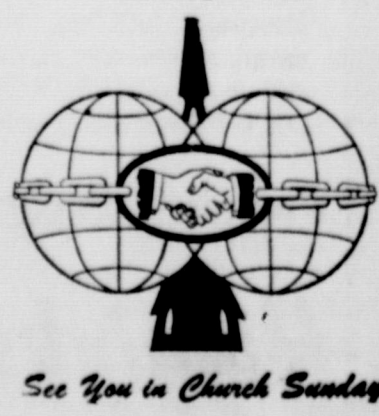

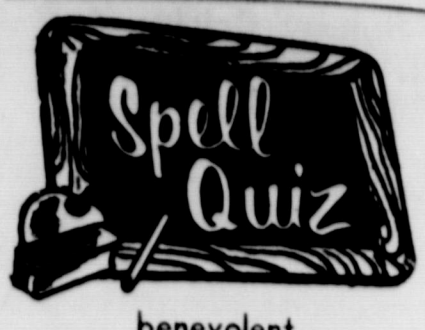
