Voters Decide Fate Of 6 Amendments Nov. 11th

Saturday will be election day in Texas.

Voters go to the polls to ballot on six proposed amendments to the state constitution. All Callahan County polling places will be open 12 hours, from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m.

Election officials named by the Commissioners Court to handle general elections will preside over Saturday's voting. A brief summary of the six proposed constitutional changes follows.

Amendment number one would allow counties to put all tax money collected into one general fund without regard to the purpose of source of each tax.

Amendment number two would allow municipalities and other political subdivisions located within a hospital district to support mental health and mental retardation services.

Amendment number three would extend life of the Veterans Land Program and make men in service during the current Vietnam conflict eligible for its benefits.

Amendment number four would authorize each county in the state to pay medical bills for all peace officers who are injured in the course of official duties.

Amendment number five would authorize the issuance of \$75,000,000 worth of state bonds to create Texas Parks Development Fund to acquire lands for public parks.

Amendment number six would

make it legal for non-elective state officers and employees to hold other non-elective positions under the state or the United States.

Only a light turnout of voters is expected for Saturday's bal-

Little **Jackie Jean Parker**, 5-year-old daughter of **Mr. and Mrs. Eulus Parker**, was reported Tuesday in satisfactory condition at **Hendrick Memorial Hospital** in Abilene, where she is recovering from bulbar polio.

Mrs. Parker and her two children, who have been living at **Greenville**, were visiting at the home of her parents, **Mr. and Mrs. J. L. Bonner**, on the **Cutbirth** ranch when the child was stricken Wednesday of last week. She was rushed to a **Brownwood** hospital and treated overnight and then transferred to **Abilene** the following day.

Statement By Health Officer

Dr. Carl J. Sohns, city health officer, yesterday issued the following statement concerning polio immunization.

First, check with your family physician and let him advise you.

Children should have the infant immunization consisting of two or three doses of oral vaccine at two to six months, followed by a booster one year later, and another booster at age of six years. Adults who had the complete series of three oral doses when the community oral polio vaccination was given should receive a booster if there is any question of exposure.

It is thought that a booster dose would be advisable every four to five years to maintain an effective level of immunity, and anyone exposed to a polio patient would be advised to take a booster dose.

Anyone who has not in the past had the complete series of oral doses would be advised to take a complete series since a partial series of doses would mean less than complete immunization.

Herd Hosts Rising Star In Season Finale Friday

Cross Plains Buffaloes will host the **Rising Star Wildcats** in the 35th renewal of gridiron rivalry between the two schools Friday at 7:30 p.m. It is the season finale for both squads.

Extra fuel is added to fire this year in the always hotly contested fracas. Third place in **District 9-A** is at stake. Both elevens have posted one win against two losses thus far in

conference play, and **Rising Star** would like nothing better than to finish ahead of the **Herd** before moving to **Class B** for the next two years.

Six-Year Drought

Cross Plains will be seeking to end a six-year losing string to Friday's visitors. Not since 1960, when the **Bufs** won 18-8, has Cross Plains beaten **Rising Star** on the gridiron. **Wildcats** triumphed 26-0 last year.

The two squads to do battle here Friday night have met five mutual opponents. Each has lost to **Santa Anna** and **Goldthwaite** by similar scores, and each has beaten **Early**, **Bufs** 32-6 and **Wildcats** 22-14. **Buffaloes** defeated **Gorman** 8-6 while **Wildcats** fell 12-6, and the **Herd** nipped **Bangs** 16-15 while **Rising Star** claimed a 6-6 tie.

On the season Cross Plains owns a 5-4 mark, and **Rising Star** has a 3-5-1 record. Statistically Cross Plains rates a bit better offensively, having tallied 158 points to 137 for **Rising Star**. Friday's foes hold the edge defensively, however. Nine opponents have scored 216 points against the **Bufs**, while the same number of foes have hung up 183 points against the **Wildcat** defense.

Wildcat Standouts

Although lean on returning lettermen, which doesn't mean much after almost a full campaign, **Rising Star** is an aggressive team which compares almost evenly with the **Herd** in the weight division.

The **Wildcat** backfield is an especially talented foursome. **Freshman Dick Clarke**, 156 pounds, is a rugged and slick ball handler. The 180-pound, junior fullback **Dalton Hughes** provides most of the power, but halfbacks **Robert Clarke**, 150 senior, and **Tony Long**, 140 sophomore, are elusive and fast.

Mike Rhodes, 210 junior and former **Buff**, is the heavyweight in the line at center, and moves to tackle on defense. Fine gridsmen are to be found elsewhere in the line including: **Ronald Hunt**, 140 senior end, and **Travis Ford**, 173 senior tackle. **Tony Geyer** is a stand-out on defense.

Bufs Hobbled

At least three **Bufs** are hampered with injuries. **Bo Barr**, starting right end, did not play last week, and is suffering a thigh muscle injury. **James McMillan**, **Barr's** back-up on offense and regular defensive linebacker, sprained a wrist in the **Santa Anna** game. **Head Coach Les Cowan** reported that the team physician had said that both should be ready to play by Friday. Tackle **David Merryman** is still bothered by an ankle, but will see action.

Cowan said he expected **Rising Star** coaches **Frank Gray** and **L. C. Housel** to throw new variations of standard **Wildcat** formations and possibly a new formation or two at the **Bufs**. "To win," **Cowan** said, "we must keep our poise, be alert and stay after them."

Buff-Wildcat Record

Elsewhere is a year-by-year result of the 34 **Buff-Wildcat** games. Cross Plains has been victorious 20 times, and **Rising Star** has triumphed on 13 occasions. Only tie, 6-6, was played in the first league encounter in 1929.

Mountaineers Bruise Buffaloes 44-16

Cross Plains Buffaloes were eliminated from District 9-A title contention Friday night as the host Santa Anna Mountaineers slaughtered the Herd 44-16.

The defending league champion Mountaineers did most of the damage on the ground against an improvised Buffalo defense. Defensive End Bo Barry did not play, and Linebacker James McMillan was hurt which forced some Bisons to man spots strange to them. Santa Anna rushed for 334 yards on the ground and four touchdowns. The squad also passed for 148 yards and one tally. Kicker and Fullback Dickie Horner added a field goal and five extra points.

Wind Hampers

A strong, cold wind slowed Buffs in first canto and allowed little distance on punts. Cross Plains, however, moved the ball to the hosts' 29 after End Mike Bright had recovered a fumble, on the second possession before Santa Anna began its first half touchdown barrage.

It was Quarterback Larry Williams who cracked the ice

for Santa Anna. He romped 55 yards around right end, and with 3:29 left in the initial quarter, Horner upped the lead to 7-0. That paved the way for three more Mountaineer tallies in the second period. Horner got the second score on a two-yard plunge, but he missed the placement kick. Williams then stepped back into the spotlight with a 38-yard trip, breaking through three tacklers en route. From that point Horner's toe did not err. Williams then got his third touchdown on a stuttering 21-yard romp around right end, and Santa Anna carried a 27-0 lead into the field house at half-time.

Bisons Score

Defensive Halfback Randy Montgomery got the Herd moving for its initial touchdown when he intercepted a Santa Anna pass and returned it about 10 yards to the Cross Plains 20. From there it took eight plays, all on the ground, for Tailback Jerry Strickland to slice the final five over left tackle. He turned in the key play on the march, a 45-yard ramble to the five. Fullback

Vernon Johnson bulled over right guard for the two bonus points with 7:49 left in the third canto.

Santa Anna rebounded late in the period as Williams toured left end for the last 13 yards of a 56-yard, five-play thrust. Williams also set up Horner's field goal with a 47-yard punt return to the Cross Plains seven where Buff Bright hauled him in. Three plays netted one yard, and Horner booted the ball 24 yards through the uprights at a sharp angle to the right.

Herd Counters

Buffaloes cut the margin to 37-16 in the fourth stanza on a 62-yard, 13-play drive. Strickland kept the march alive in the early stages running for 30 yards on four carries, but Bright made two good pass catches for 33 yards to set up the tally. The latter was an 18-yarder for a first on the Mountaineer one. Quarterback Ricky Jones crossed the double stripe on his second sneak. He hit Right End Tommy Dodds for the two-point conversion.

An attempted outside kick failed and Mountaineers began a last goalward drive culminated by an eight-yard pass from Williams to Right End Davey Beal. Horner kicked the 44th point with seven seconds left in the game.

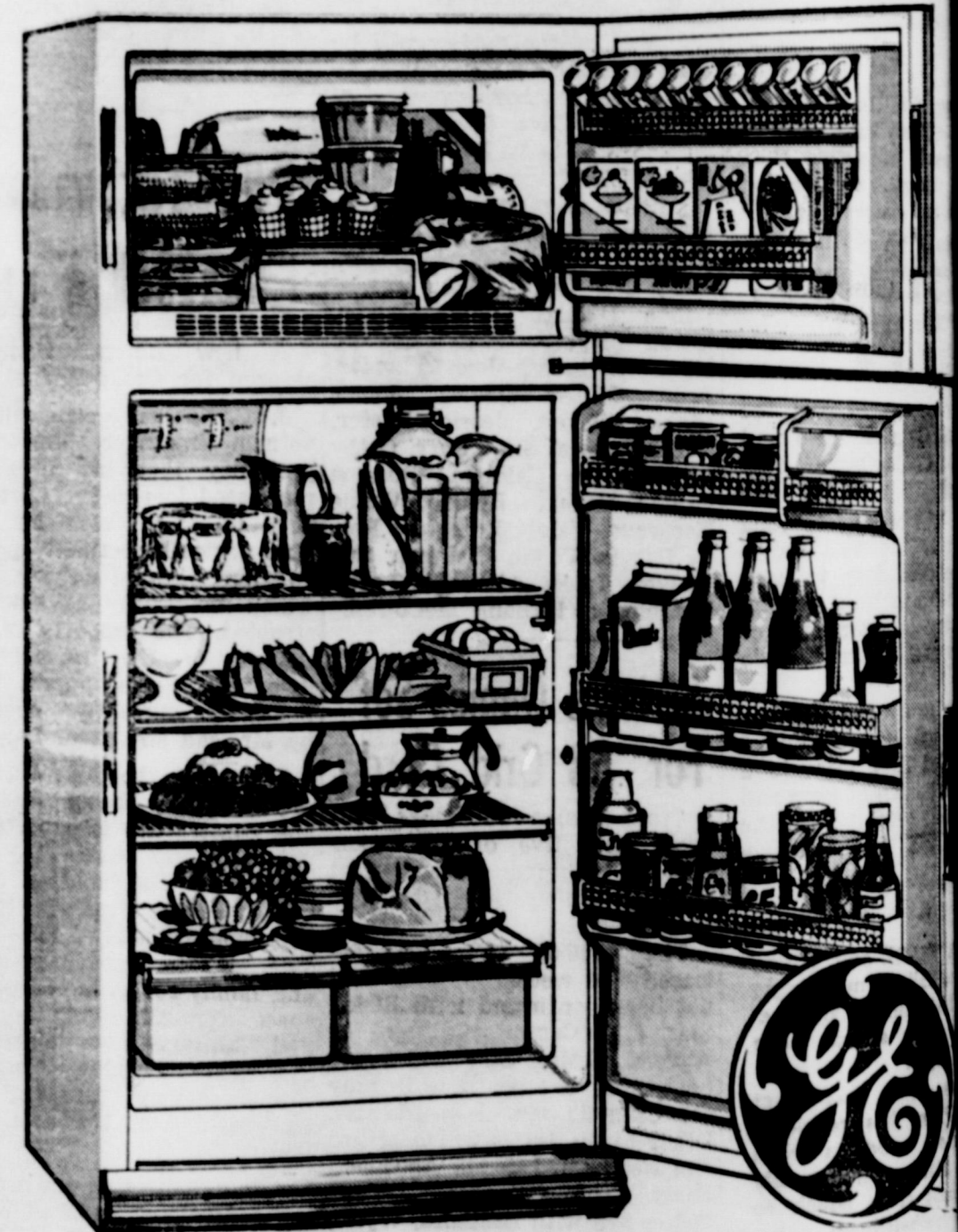

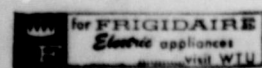

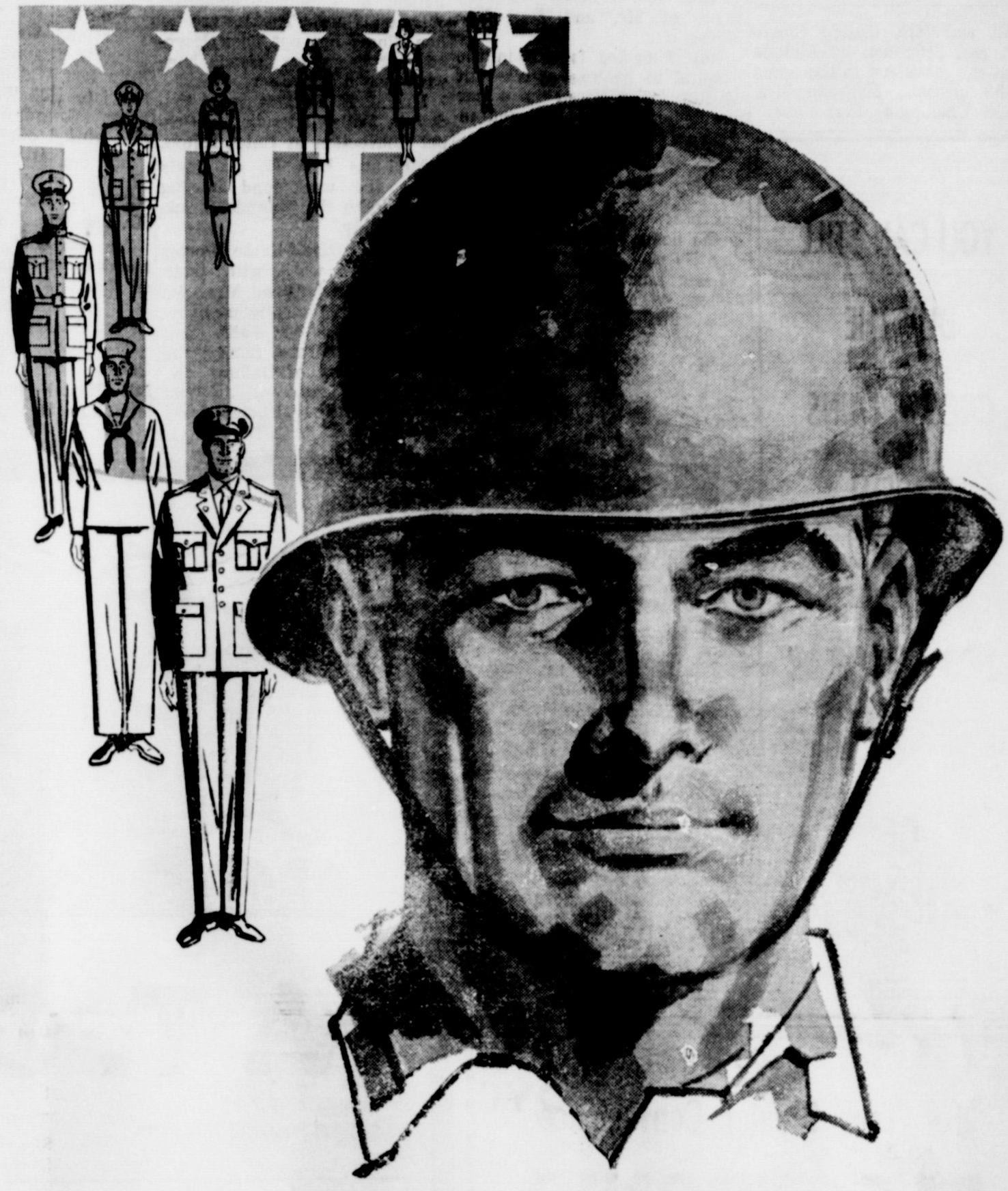
