# New Industry Here Does \$425,000 Business

Cross Plains' newest industry, an egg processing plant operated by the Garrett-Lane Corporation, has developed sales which now exceed \$425,000.00 annually.

The firm, which opened on North Main Street here July 7, presently employs 12 people fulltime, and has two more parttime workers. Annual payroll is more than \$41,000.

Nine shifts weekly are worked, six daytime tours and three at night, in handling the 30,000 dozen eggs which Garrett-Lane processes and moves to retail outlets every seven days.

Last week the Cross Plains corporation contracted to supply seven more large chain stores in the area north of Abilene. Already the local firm was the largest egg supplier of Abilene and held contract for Dyess Air Force Base. Other major outlets include Wichita Falls, Coleman, Brownwood, Rising Star and Cross Plains, as well as a route northward to Sey-

The more than third-of-amillion eggs handled here weekly are placed in a machine, which first washes and dries the shells, and then moves along in a production line to where they are candled, weighed and sorted and finally placed into shockfree cartons. They are then refrigerated in vaults at the plant and in specially-equipped trucks until delivered to retailers.

All of the eggs processed here come from farms individually owned by Harold Garrett of Cross Plains, who is president of the corporation, and Doyle Lane, of San dent. Together the two men have 75,000 hens. Mrs. Harold Garrett is secretarytreasurer of the corporation.
