Burchfield First To File In City Election

Mayor Doyle Burchfield has filed for reelection to another two-year term in a municipal election to be held April 2.

Candidates for mayor and either of two council places have until March 2 to file in time for names to be listed on the printed ballot. Terms of Raymond DeBusk and T. T. (Nick) Nichols are expiring on the council. Neither had filed for reelection as records were checked at the City Hall late Monday.

Burchfield was first chosen mayor in a special election held April 18, 1965, to fill a vacancy created by the resignation of Dr. M. E. Roth, who moved from Cross Plains. Burchfield ran for reelection again in April 1966, and had no opposition. Thus far he is the only announced candidate in either of two local elections scheduled the first week in April.

The other election is that slated April 6, when three trustees for Cross Plains Independent School District are to be selected. Tenures of Vernon Phillips, Edwin Baum and

D. C. Jones are expiring. Candidates for the board have until March 6 to file candidacy blanks in time to have names listed on the printed ballot. Election judge for the school

election will be Alton E. Hornsby. Presiding official for the city referendum will be designated at the next regular meeting of the council the night of Feb. 20.

2 Champion Steers Net \$4,069 For Burkett Girl

The high point of a young, but already successful career in livestock exhibiting was reached Friday when Vicky Brown of Burkett watched her two champion steers sell for \$4,069 at the Southwestern

International Livestock Show in El Paso.

The grand champion of the show, Chico, an Angus light-weight which was bred by D. R. DeRusha of Abilene, sold for \$2,644, and she collected another \$1,425 from the sale of her Hereford, Tails, bred by Granite Hills Hereford Ranch, which was named reserve champion of the big West Texas exhibition.

The double success feat that Vicky achieved was a new record for the show's junior division.

The 14-year-old Coleman Junior High School student is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Bill H. Brown of Burkett. Her feeding projects were under the sponsorship of Coleman County 4-H Club. She has formerly exhibited champion lambs and steers in similar competition.

Peanut Yield Data Obtained By ASCS

Callahan County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service now has information to facilitate purchasing, selling or leasing of peanut allotments, according to J. C. Earp, manager.

Earp, whose office is in the courthouse at Baird, released the following statement.

"The county ASCS office has received instructions to determine yields on peanut farms where the producer desires to purchase, sell or lease peanut acreage. Any one desiring to purchase, sell or lease peanut acreage should request the County Committee to establish a normal yield for the farm at this time.

"The final date to file application for transfers to take effect during 1968 shall be filed by not later than April 1, 1968. Fields for the transferring and receiving farms must be known prior to the transfer in order to determine the amount of acreage to be credited to the receiving farm.

"Additional information may be obtained at the county office."

Mrs. V. I. Spivey entered Saint John's Hospital in San Angelo Friday of last week. She is suffering with migraine headaches.

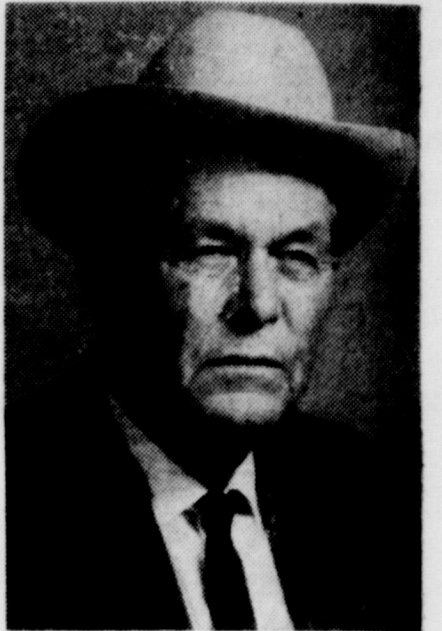

McCord Team Gains Share Of CPBC Lead

J. P. McCord's quartet of bowlers regained a share of the lead of Cross Plains Bowling Club last week with a 3-1 victory over Ted Souder's team.
Tommy Knight's foursome had led the loop by one game going into last week's action, but could manage only a 2-2 split with the Dan Johnston captained squad.
Johnston captured both individual diadems, high game and high series, while leading his team to the top two positions in squad competition during the week. He posted a 201 game for the best single game, and his 516 aggregate was tops in the series division. Benny Glover rolled a 188 game for runner-up spot, and Cliff Gilmore and Barbara Hinkle both posted 168 games. Gilmore was runner-up to teammate Johnston in series competition with a 473 total, and Ted Souder collected 466 pins in the three games.
Johnston's team felled 799 pins in one collective effort, and that spiced a three-game total of 2,319. Souder's quartet toppled 788 maples in one game for second place, and Knight's bunch tipped 786 in a collective effort. Knight was runner-up to Johnston in the team series bracket with a total of 2,232, and McCord was third with 2,221.
The two leaders, teams captained by McCord and Knight, were to have done battle this week, and Johnston was to have challenged Souder for the number three spot. The two leaders hold a nine-game edge over the number three unit.

Cross Plains Buffaloes bounced back from a heart-breaking loss to the Goldthwaite Eagles, which eliminated the Herd from the District 9-A basketball title picture, routing Santa Anna Mountaineers 61-41 Tuesday of last week.
The victory solidly placed the Bisons in the runner-up spot in the league, although the season finale was carded against Early Longhorns Tuesday. Following the win at Santa Anna, Bufs owned a 5-2 loop record, and have compiled an 11-12 season mark.
It was a team victory for the Herd as 10 Bisons got into the scoring column, although only one managed a double figure. He is Jerry Belew, Bufs' tallest player, who counted six field goals for 12 points. Junior Ricky Jones hit four two-pointers and one free toss for nine points. Sharing third place in scoring were senior Mike Bright and sophomore James McMillan with eight points each. Senior Bo Barr chipped in with seven points, and senior Jerry Strickland contributed six. Rounding out scoring for the Bisons were junior Jesse Moon and sophomore David Merryman four each, junior Robert Merrill two and junior Tommy Dodds one.
Bob Rutherford led the Mountaineers in a losing cause with 18, and Larry Williams bucketed 10 points.

Both units fired expertly from the free throw line. Cross Plains netted 10 of 14 shots, a 71 per cent clip, and Santa Anna hit 67 per cent on 12 of 18

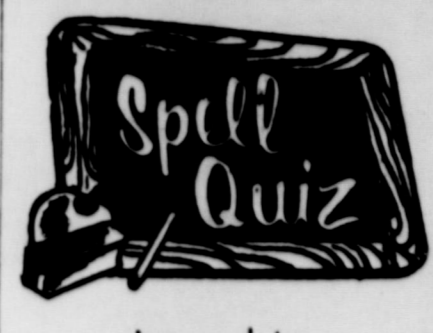
