Week 3 Places On Local School Board

Three places on Cross Plains Independent School District board of trustees.

Deadline for filing with name printed on ballot passed at midnight Wednesday of last week. Election to fill the three positions will be held Saturday, April 6, at the City Hall.

Roy Neil Tatom, Vernon Phillips, Cowan Hutton and Noah Johnson had previously filed as candidates. Phillips is the lone aspirant seeking reelection. His term and tenures of Edwin Baum and D. C. Jone are expiring. The latter two announced earlier that they would not be candidates.

Trustees are elected for three-year terms.

Callahan Won't Try 2 Gun Theft Cases

Michael Norie, from whom guns stolen from two Cross Plains stores were recently recovered, will not be tried in Callahan County.

Norie was recently sentenced from two to five years in the state penitentiary for a similar robbery in Lampasas County, and local officials said there is little reason to secure a similar conviction here in view of the fact that sentences would likely run concurrently.

Norie was brought to Callahan County jail in Baird last week, but Saturday was returned to Lampasas to await transference to the state penitentiary in Huntsville.

Charges were filed in Baird Monday morning by Deputy Sheriff Howard Cox against another person in connection with robbery of the Higginbotham and Western Auto stores here, the night of Feb. 3. One other gun was reportedly recovered.

The latest charge involves a Comanche County resident. His name was withheld for the reason that he is not yet in custody.

It was not immediately learned whether or not Norie will be tried on federal violations, however, two counts are reported under study, that of kidnapping a night watchman at Lometa and another of possessing a sawed-off shotgun.

No one was at home at the time the blaze was discovered. Mr. Kellar was in a doctor's office in Brownwood, his wife at Texas Department of Public Safety in Brownwood, where she is employed, and the boys were away at school.

Cross Plains Volunteer Fire Department answered the call, but arrived on the scene just as roof of the four-room and bath dwelling collapsed. All furniture and contents of the home were destroyed.

The Kellars are temporarily residing in Brownwood, in a place owned by his mother.

Significant Gas Strike Made In Baird Locality

A wildcat re-entry has been completed as a Gardner Sand discovery three miles northeast of Baird and prorated in Callahan County Regular Field.

It is Southwest Production Co. No. 1 R. L. Berry, 2,200 feet from the south and 330 feet from the west lines of Section 70, BOH Survey.

No. 1 Berry had an absolute open flow of 1,790,000 cubic feet of dry gas daily. It is producing from perforations at 3,088-92 feet, treated with 500 gallons of mud acid.

The four and one-half inch casing is set at 3,151 feet. Total

depth was 3,153 feet, plugged back to 3,107 feet.

The venture was originally drilled in 1959 as Fisher-Stocker and Mayfair Minerals No. 1 Myrtle Berry and plugged and abandoned at 3,150 feet.

Allen Ross of Abilene staked No. 1 Earl Brown as a wildcat one and one-fourth miles south-west of the gas strike.

Drill site is 90 feet from the south and 450 feet from the west lines of Section 77, BOH Survey.

Permit depth applied for is 1,200 feet with rotary.

Need Of Adult Leadership May Kill Teenage Baseball

Lack of adult leadership may limit or possibly cancel teenage baseball in Cross Plains this summer.

Normally two junior teenage units and a senior teenage team is fielded locally. Last year the Drillers shared in a three-way tie for the pennant in junior teenage play, and Cross Plains Chiefs won the championship of the senior teenage league. Ordinarily Cross Plains junior teams compete with De Leon and Comanche. Seniors play De Leon, Comanche and Bangs.

A senior teenage league meeting has already been held this

year and Cross Plains was not represented. No official word was received here, but at least one local official said that Goldthwaite had expressed interest in replacing Cross Plains in the loop should no team be fielded here.

Inability to find a person willing to serve as president of the local teenage program has been the main contributing cause of failure to have the local program organized.

Seventeen boys eligible for senior teenage baseball here have indicated desire to play this year. Although no actual

count has been made in the junior age, an even greater number have expressed intentions to participate in that league if adult leadership is forthcoming soon.

Illingworth Field, local teenage baseball park, is a fine, well-equipped diamond, but will be used only if adults of this city and area are willing to work in the program.

In the past the teenage program has been hampered with lack of financial support, and approximately \$1,100 is still owed on construction cost of Illingworth Field.

Schools Closed By Tuesday's Snow

Heaviest snow of the present winter, which fell over this entire section of Texas Monday, caused Cross Plains schools to be closed Tuesday. Icy roads made driving conditions dangerous.

Other area schools dismissing for the day included: Baird, Clyde, Eula, Wylie and Merkel.

Postponement of classes was the sixth time this year that

weather has halted instruction at the local educational system.

In Cross Plains Monday's snow measured from three to four inches with drifts running much deeper. Clyde reported as much as 12 inches in some spots.

Freezing temperature Monday night and early Tuesday left all area roads extremely hazardous.

An oddity of this week's weather was that within a period of 12 hours from 4 p.m. Sunday, sunshine, lightning, thunder, hail, rain, sleet and snow were all seen here. Winds Monday night reached a velocity of 30 miles per hour.

Wednesday of next week, March 20, marks the arrival of Spring and probably never in history have local residents

more eagerly awaited advent of a new season.

The Winter of 1968 has already gone into the records as the most severe within memory of oldest citizens. Temperatures have hovered well below normal, and rainfall measurements show the first 72 days of the current year to have been wetter than any other similar period in history.

Moisture measurements recorded by S. F. Bond, local observer for the Weather Bureau, showed Tuesday that a total of 12.08 inches of rain has been received in Cross Plains this year. Some other residents, though, have measured as much as 14 inches.

Only 22 clear days have been recorded in Cross Plains during 1968. Snow, which fell over this entire area Monday, was making its fourth appearance of the season.

Small grain crops and winter pasturage have been growing slowly due to the extreme cold. With an abundance of moisture in the soil, though, lush growths are expected as soon as warm weather sets in.

Cox And Clinton Seek Reelection

Howard Cox of Cross Plains and R. L. Clinton of Putnam will be candidates for reelection to Callahan County school board at the annual election scheduled April 6.

Cox represents commissioners precinct four and Clinton serves precinct three. Neither is opposed for reelection.

Successful Cage Season Closes For Cross Plains High School Girls

Third time was not a charm for Cross Plains High School Buffettes who were trying for a berth in the state Class A tournament in the Region II-A tournament at Denton Saturday.

Cross Plains earned the right to play in the tourney by dumping Baird 45-39 in bi-district, beginning of state elimination play. Knox City was the second victim as Buffettes won 42-29 in first game of regional play Saturday morning. Glen Rose Tigerettes blocked the way to a third consecutive shot at the state crown with a 66-47 beating of the local sextet Saturday night.

Local girls brought home a large trophy with "Second in Region" engraved as proof of a successful 24-9 season. Coach Jim Ethridge said, "I'm very proud of the girls, and they put out a tremendous season, game after game."

Fall To Glen Rose

Foul trouble early set the stage for the Somervell County sextet to post an advantage in the first quarter and build to the margin in later stanzas.

Wide Foul Gap

The victors committed only seven team fouls while Buffettes had 22 infractions called. Although Cross Plains made five of the seven shots, Glen Rose bucketed 18 of 34 at-

tempts. Stalwart guard Peggy Purvis was tagged with four first half fouls, versatile forward Valeta Edington was caught twice in the first two minutes of the game, scrambling forward Barbara Renfro drew a quartet of personals in the game, and starting guard Sue Walker exited in the last period because of infractions.

Brief Buffette Lead

Although Buffettes took a quick 6-1 lead, it was not destined to stand. Buffette misques helped Glen Rose to a 35-18 edge at intermission.

Miss Edington topped Buffettes scoring with 21 points on 10 field goals and one free

shot. Vickie Hargrove counted 13, Miss Renfro had 11 and Rhonda Knott hit a two-pointer.

Height Aids Win

Superior height helped Buffettes to a 42-29 win over Knox City in the regional opener Saturday morning.

Leading all the way Cross Plains opened a 17-8 gap in the first eight minutes, and built that to a 29-13 edge at halftime. Ethridge said that is was one of the team's better game, and although some foul trouble developed it was not serious. Cross Plains made 14 of 26 charity tosses, and Knox City bucketed 12 of 22.

Miss Renfro popped the nets

for 19 points, seven field goals and five charity shots, for top scoring honors. Edington pumped in 13 markers and Hargrove canned 10.

Beat Baird

Buffettes bounced Baird Bearettes 45-39 in bi-district play in Abilene Tuesday of last week.

Baird quickly notched a five point lead, but Buffettes erased the deficit and gained a 15-11 first quarter advantage. Cross Plains gradually widened the lead, 12 points at one time, until late in the final canto. Baird staged a rally and cut the margin to four, but Miss Renfro and Miss Hargrove hit crucial foul shots late in the frame

to insure the bi-district victory. Miss Edington, who hit at a 60 per cent clip from the field and counted eight of 11 shots in the first half grabbed the scoring crown with 26 points. Hargrove contributed 12, Renfro had six and Knott 1.

Different Type Game

Etheridge stated that Baird played an entirely different game than during the first two meetings early during the season. "They forced us to shoot from outside," he added.

Vickie Varner led Bearette scoring with 16, and Marian Odum chipped in 15. Dianne Petty and Cathy Reeves each tallied four points.

No. 2 Odom had a daily potential of 24 barrels of 40 gravity oil. It is pumping from perforations at 1,300-08 feet. The four and one-half inch casing is set at 1,319 feet, one foot off bottom.

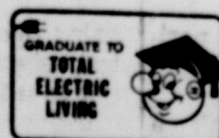

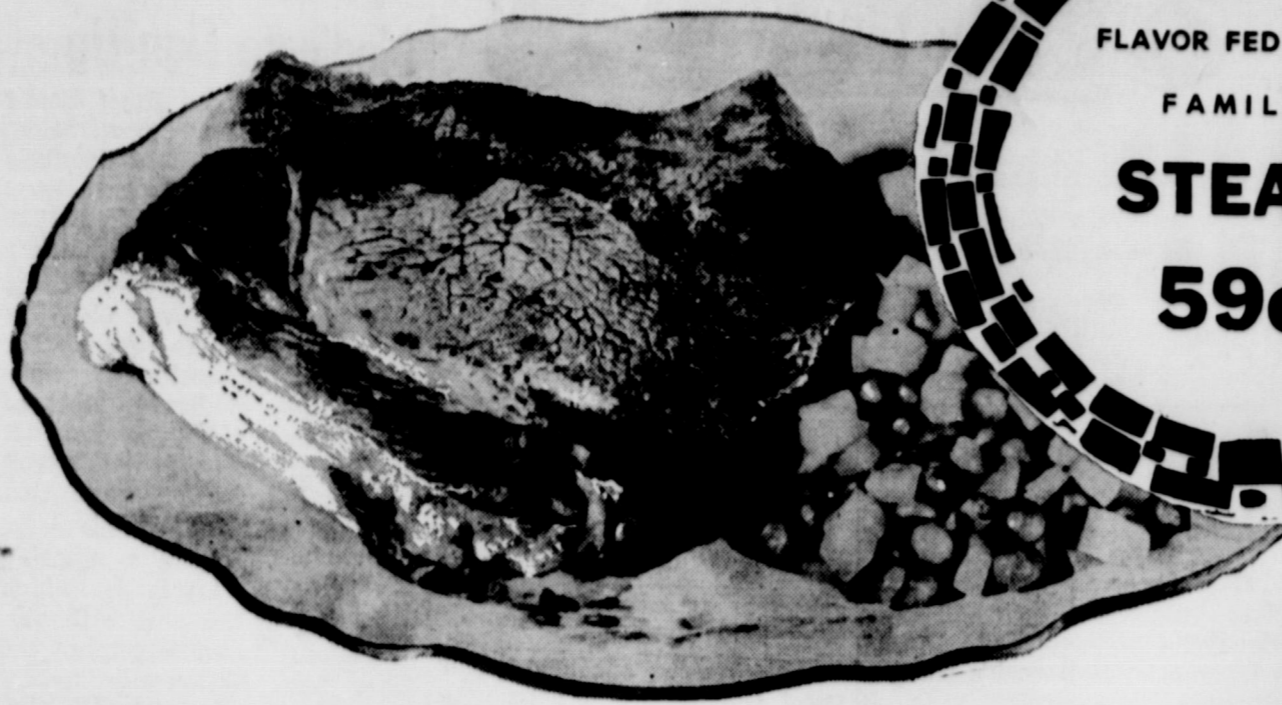

April 1 Date For Medicare Sign-Up

April 1 may be April Fool's day to the younger generation, but it is an important deadline for many older people to keep in mind, according to R. R. Tuley, Jr., district manager for Social Security in Abilene.

"Many people over 65," Tuley said, "failed to sign up for the voluntary doctor-bill insurance under Medicare. Most of these have Medicare hospital protection but did not enroll by April 1 for coverage that will become effective July 1."

For these folks a monthly premium is involved, which pays half of the cost with other Federal revenues paying the other half. Nation-wide nearly 18 million older people now have this protection, which has helped pay over 28 million medical bills, totaling nearly \$1.3 billion.

Information on the additional Medicare protection provided by the 1967 Amendments to the law is available at the Abilene office, Room 2321 Federal Building. For those unable to go to the Abilene office, a visit to a representative of that office might be in order. A schedule of visits of social security representatives is posted in all post offices.

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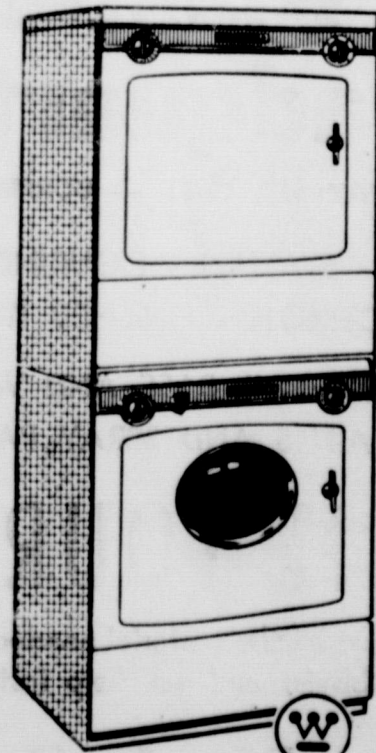

Accidents Plague Area Over Past Week's End

Traffic accidents occurred in epidemic proportions over the Cross Plains and Rising Star areas the past week end, according to information revealed by H. D. Welch, local highway patrolman.

Mr. and Mrs. Robert Mills of Goldthwaite were both injured in a one-vehicle mishap on a country road, a half mile southeast of Cross Cut, Sunday at 2 p.m. Their 1967 model Ford slipped off the road, hit a dirt embankment and overturned. Both occupants of the car were injured, and were rushed to Medical Arts Hospital in a Higginbotham ambulance. The automobile was extensively damaged.

Fifteen minutes later, at 2:15 p.m., Welch was summoned to the scene of a collision, four and one-half miles northeast of Rising Star, where a 1962 Chevrolet sedan, driven by Sylvia Joan Butler, 19, of Rising Star, was involved in a smash-up with a 1962 Chevrolet station wagon, driven by Walker Seth Mathis, 54, of De Leon. Three persons were injured in the accident. Miss Butler was rushed by ambulance to an Eastland hospital, and Mathis and

his wife were taken by private car to a hospital in De Leon. Two other occupants of the Mathis car escaped injury. Both vehicles were extensively damaged.

At 5 p.m. Monday a 1964 Dodge, driven by William Edward Cole, 53, of Abilene, was involved in a collision with a dump truck owned by Texas Highway Department and driven by Charely Dale Wirt, 62, of Putnam. The mishap occurred at the intersection of State Highway 36 and Highway 283, four miles west of Rowden. No one was injured in the accident and only minor damages were sustained by the two vehicles.

Then at 6:50 p.m. Monday a 1966 Plymouth sedan, driven by Jasper Lee Corley, 44, of Whitharrall (in West Texas) slipped off an icy road, seven miles west of Cross Plains on State Highway 36, hit a culvert and plunged into a small creek. The driver, his wife, Avalene, 43, and their son, Lonnie, 17, were all injured and were taken to an Abilene hospital in a Higginbotham ambulance. They were previously treated here.
