Cross Cut Will Get 2 New SCS Lakes

Bids are being sought for installing two more flood prevention structures in the Upper Pecan Bayou sub-watershed. Sites 26 and 34 in the vicinity of Cross Cut are being advertised for bids to be opened in the State S.C.S. Office at Temple on April 8 at 2 p.m. Construction is due to begin on the job within 20 days following the official award and is to be completed within 196 working days.

Land rights for installation, operation and maintenance were granted to the Brown-Mills Soil and Water Conservation District by Roy Stambaugh, C. M. Garrett and Bill Baucom for Site 26 and by Lawrence Byrd and F. L. Armstrong for Site 34. Maintenance of the flood prevention structures will be performed by the Brown County Commissioners Court as a community service through arrangements with the Soil and Water Conservation District. Farmers and ranchers in the sub-watershed have planned and applied needed land treatment work for protection of the structural measures in cooperation with the Brown-Mills Soil and Water Conservation District, according to John Lee, W.U.C. with the S. C. S. at Rising Star.

Principal bid items in the contract will include approximately 220,000 cubic yards of excavation and earthfill material; about 3,000 pounds of reinforced

steel in 52 cubic yards of concrete for the two principal spillways; salvaging and placing about 18,000 square yards of top soil for growth of grass on embankments and emergency spillways; and about 7,850 feet of woven wire fence for

protection of the grass embankments and emergency spillways. M. W. McNeese, S.C.S. Project Engineer at Brownwood will show the jobs to prospective bidders and will supervise construction according to E. J. Hughes, Area Conservationist.

More Facilities Due At Brownwood Lake

Brownwood Lake's constantly-improving popularity as a recreational spot gained another boost last week as a federal grant was announced for improvements at the adjoining state park.

A \$117,150 subsidy was ap-

proved for development of outdoor facilities.

These funds will be matched by money already appropriated by the State Legislature for the \$243,300 project at the 538-acre park.

Facilities to be included in the project are trailer camping

units, picnic units, tent camping units, restrooms, roads and parking areas.

The park was acquired by the state in 1934 and is located adjacent to 10,900 surface acre Lake Brownwood.

Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission chairman Will

Odom said the project is the 23rd approval of funds for state park development from the Federal Land and Water Conservation Act.

The state park is 20 miles south of Cross Plains and has become a favorite recreational retreat for people of this area.

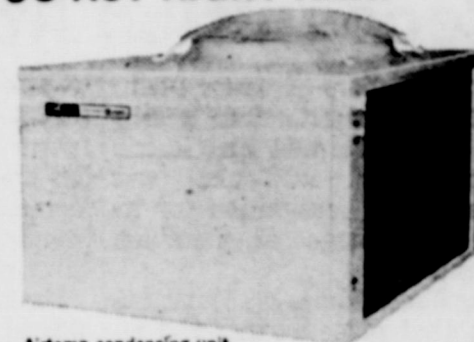

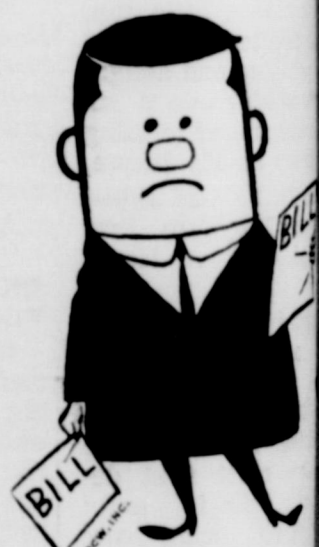

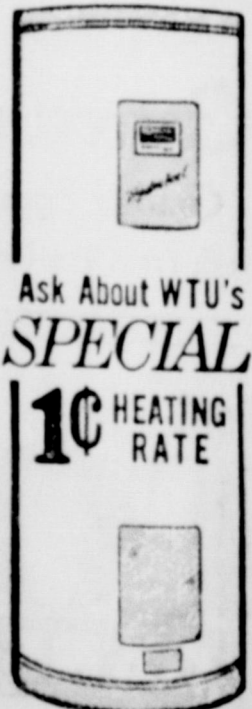
