Peanut Producers At Decision Time

Final date to sell, lease, buy or transfer peanut acreage allotments is April 1, and deadline for release of acreage which will not be planted is April 4.

"As of this date a very small per cent of peanut acreage has been leased or bought," says J. C. Earp, office manager for Callahan County ASCS.

It is a normal practice for peanut producers of this county to release several hundred acres for reappportionment. It is expected, therefore, that many transfers or releases will occur within the next three or four days.

Earp pointed out that on a considerable number of Callahan County farms the peanut allotment will be reduced, and in some cases lost, if not planted, leased or released before the deadline dates.

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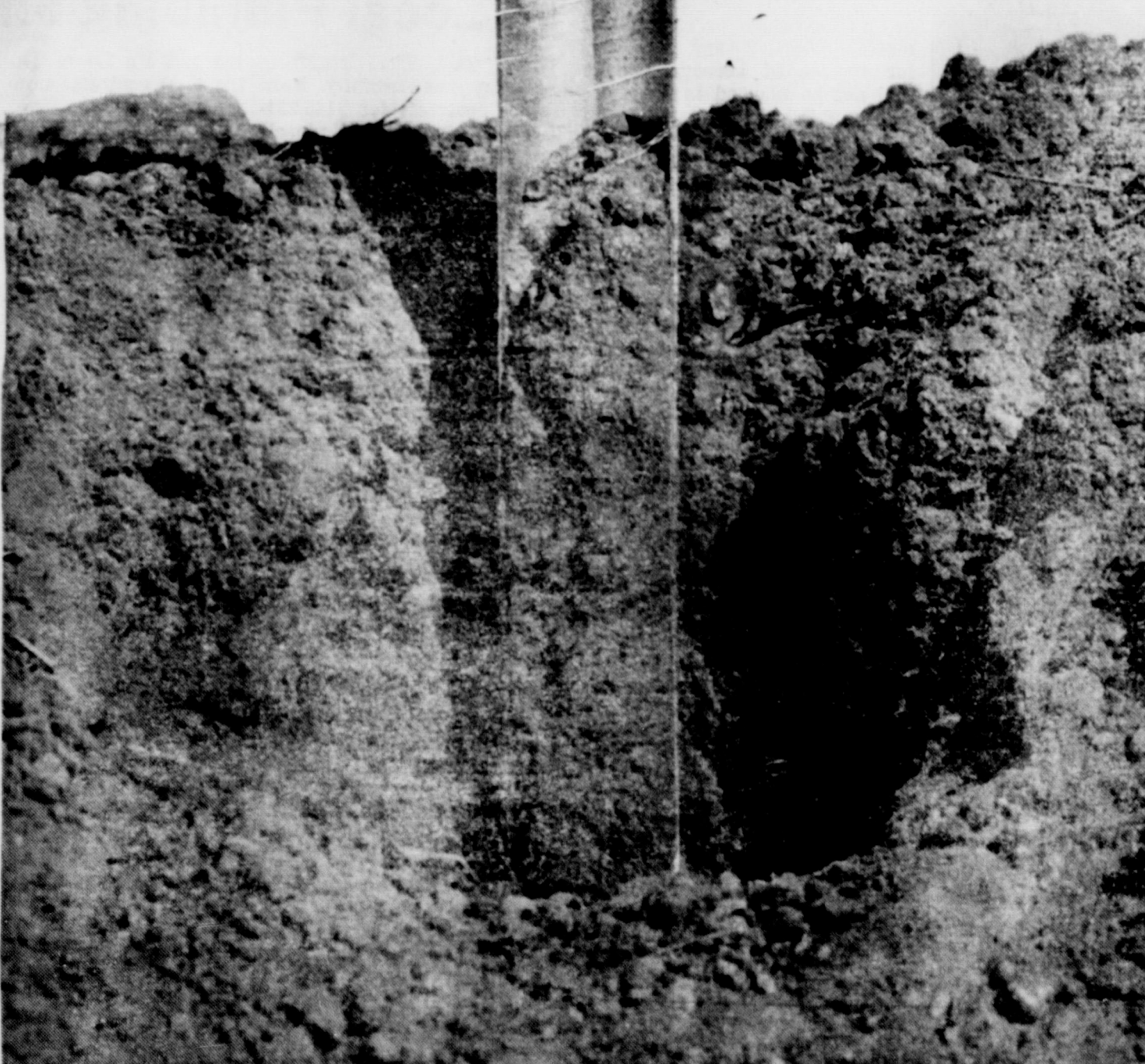

Burkett Man Has Heart Surgery In Ohio

Callahan County residents who were born before July 1901 and have not enrolled for doctor-bill insurance under Medicare now have a last chance to sign up, Wayne Baker, field representative for social security, said today.

"If they do not sign up by April 1," according to Baker, "they will never have another chance to be covered by the provisions of the Medicare program that helps pay doctor bills and other medical expenses. Those born August 1901 through September 1903, can enroll early in 1969 if they miss out this time."

"This coverage will involve \$4.40 monthly premium, ten per cent more than those who enroll before they are 65 will pay, and will be effective July 1."

Additional information regarding enrollment may be obtained at the Abilene Social Security Office, which will remain open until 9 p.m. on April 1, to accommodate all possible near last-minute decisions.
