Numbering Houses To Start Here Soon

Cross Plains High School seniors have undertaken the project of selling house num- bers to homes and businesses within the city. Activity of the students is in cooperation with second phase of a project launch- ed by "city fathers" and the Chamber of Commerce to have all streets, avenues and individ- ual property sites plainly desig- nated.

The Rev. Roger Butler, who has served as chairman of the project, representing both the Chamber of Commerce and the City of Cross Plains, prepared the following statement for pub- lication concerning the under- taking.

"The Senior Class of Cross Plains High School has begun a project to sell house numbers to businesses and house owners within the city.

"A uniform system of num- bers and having all buildings numbered will improve our city

a great deal. It will help when emergency arises. In case of fire or the need to call an ambu- lance, a definite street and house number can save time. This may be the first step toward getting house-to-house mail delivery.

"The City Council took the first step in adopting a uniform system for numbering the houses. The Senior Class will use this code in determining the number of each building.

"1. Houses and buildings on the South and West side of the street will have odd numbers. Those on the North and East will have even numbers.

"2. Block numbers will be- gin with First Street and go North. The East and West streets will number from Main Street.

"3. Each block will have 100 numbers in it. Each building will measure the distance from the door to the lower end of the block and allow a number change for each six feet.

"If your house has a num- ber, it very likely has been changed by this new code. But the change will allow the entire City to have a uniform system of street addresses.

"Seniors will call at each house and business. They will determine the correct number

and take an order for the plates. They will return with the num- bers and install them for each building owner.

"All numbers will be the same size and color. They are of aluminum with reflective num- erals. Total cost to have the numbers installed is \$1."

New Residents Of County Must Vote In Office Of County Clerk

Mrs. Beatrice Deal, county clerk, has reminded new resi- dents of Callahan County that they must vote in the county clerk's office by Tuesday, April 30, if they wish to participate in either the Democratic pri- mary or Republican primary to be held on May 4.

Any person who has lived in the county less than six months (who became a resident after Nov. 3, 1968) must vote in the clerk's office during the period of April 15-April 30. He must be a registered voter either in this county or in the county of his former residence, and must have lived in the state for a year. He will be required to present his registration certifi- cate or to make an affidavit of its loss when he applies for a ballot.

A voter with less than six months residence in the county will be able to vote on all statewide offices and on the referendum propositions on the primary ballot, and will also be able to vote on district offices for districts in which he has six months residence preceding the election, but he will not be permitted to vote in local races.

Randy Montgomery Gets Trip To State Track Meet

Randy Montgomery will be the lone representative of Cross Plains High School at the State Class A UIL track meet in Austin during the first week end in May.

Montgomery a senior and son of Mr. and Mrs. John D. Mont- gomery, earned the trip to Austin in Region II-A competition at Denton Saturday. He captured second place in the 440-yard run in a time of 51.8 seconds, his best time of the year.

He is the first Buffalo to win a trip to the state games since Junior Lee won the Class A mile run two years ago.

Jerry Strickland lacked only one and one-fourth inches earn- ing a similar honor. He leaped 20-feet, 6-inches in the broad jump on his last try, but had to settle for third place.

The Herd mile relay team turned in its best clocking of the year, too, a 3:32.0, but had to settle for fifth place. Quar- tet was composed of Troy Wat- son, Vernon Johnson, Bo Barr

and Montgomery. Winning time was 3:29.4.

Bison track team tallied 18 points, and Coach Les Cowan said that he was very proud of the entire team. He added that he appreciated the fine ef- fort of every boy in each event in every meet this season.

Cross Plains had representa- tives in regional finals in two other events, but placed sev- enth, out of point system. They were Mike Bright in the 330-yard intermediate hurdles, and the 440-yard relay team. A bad hand-off foiled the sprint- ers bid. The quartet included Bright, Barr, Montgomery and Strickland.

Goldthwaite, District 9-A win- ner, won the region title. Cowan said that the state event would be held in Mem- orial Stadium at the University of Texas May 2 through 4, but exact date and time for Mont- gomery to run was not known here yet. He will compete with 15 other of the state's best half-milers in Class A.

the opening of the 60th Legis- lative Session, a session which considered over 2,000 bills and major resolutions and which was described by many as the most action-packed work-load in Texas history.

"By making this many deci- sions on such a volume of legis- lation, it becomes impossible to please all the people all the time, and if you do manage to please all the people all the time, something is either wrong or you aren't really doing any- thing," Musgrove commented. "I have endeavored to be out- spoken, independent and ob- jective in my consideration of legislative matters and in the fulfillment of the duties of my office. I feel the people of this

district deserve and appreciate this type of representation.

"During my first campaign I advocated full-time represen- tation for our district and pled- ged to be a working representa- tive for all the people. This, I feel, I have done. Not only is this the first time the district has had a full-time represen- tative, but, with the help of many people in this district, the first office of State Repre- sentative was established and opened to the needs of various problems of the 70,000 people in this five-county district. State government is the biggest busi- ness in this state and more scrup- tivity and research should be giv- en to governmental matters by all members of the legislature.

Between sessions, in the inter- im periods, a legislator can work on improvements for his dis- trict and can serve as a valuable mediator between state govern- ment and those individuals in the district who have prob- lems with many phases of gov- ernmental operations. Through my legislative office in Brecken- ridge, I have worked to re- solve the various difficulties that people may have and I certainly feel this type of public service should be contin- ued."

As the legislative leader against LSD and other danger- ous drugs, Musgrove organized a statewide education program on the dangers of drug abuse to supplement the legislation

which he initiated. "The new dangerous drug law provided Texas with the strictest drug laws in the nation," Musgrove stated, "but laws are only as strong as the public demand that they be enforced." The President of the United States in his recent State of the Union Message to Congress, proposed that laws similar to Musgrove's Texas legislation be enacted on the nationwide level to control the growing problem with LSD and other dangerous drugs.

"I have made the develop- ment of our area's park and recreational potential — and like- wise tourist appeal — one of my main legislative objectives," Musgrove continued.

"During the session I spon-

sored a special legislative reso- lution, which was passed and signed by the Governor, Lt. Governor and Speaker, direct- ing the State Parks and Wild- life Department to assist in the restoration of Shackelford Coun- ty's Fort Griffin, and appro- priations have been budgeted to the proper state agencies for this purpose." The bill that I sponsored authorizing a State Park on Hubbard Lake was passed and laid the groundwork for the inclusion of this propo- sed state park in the new state- wide master plan that was approved as a constitutional amend- ment by voters last fall.

"Following the legislative ses- sion I brought all three mem- bers of the State Parks and

Wildlife Commission to our dis- trict to view, first-hand, Fort Griffin State Park, the propo- sed Hubbard Lake Park site, Possum Kingdom State Park and a proposal for a new 2,500 acre State Park on the Palo Pinto County side of Possum Kingdom. This new park proposal that I am advancing on Possum Kingdom would be a tourist boost to this area and would preserve scenic Hell's Gate and would maintain Sandy Beach as a public area," Mus- grove added.

Musgrove said that recent ef- forts to plug abandoned "lost identity" wells causing salt pol- lution in Eastland and Stephens Counties had resulted in more

Mrs. Ramsey Tells Of 'Junk' Mail Law

Mail patrons offended by pandering advertisements can now take steps to curb such mail, says Mrs. V. M. Ramsey, clerk-in-charge of Cross Plains post office in announcing plans for administering a new law which gives each family the right to decide that an ad is "erotically arousing or sexually provocative."

When an advertisement sent through the mails is offensive on these grounds, a postal patron can now ask the post office to direct the mailer to send no more mail to him and to remove immediately the patron's name from all mailing lists he owns, controls or rents.

To assist patrons, the Post Office Department has published a brief pamphlet — "How You Can Curb Pandering Advertisements" — which is now available at the Cross Plains post office. In addition to explaining how the law works, the pocket-size leaflet contains a form letter one can use when sending his complaint to the post office.

wells being plugged by the state in these two counties than in all other counties of the state combined.

The first legislator in West Texas to publicly urge investigation of Liquor Control Board influences, Musgrove also spearheaded a two-month study into sales tax collection problems of retail merchants.

Early in the session a serious legislative effort was begun to move Eastland County's historic 11th Court of Civil Appeals to Abilene. Calling the bill an "act of piracy," Musgrove took Eastland County's case direct to the citizens of Abilene during his appearance on a special Abilene television program. And, later in the session, he brought the legislative subcommittee considering the bill to Eastland to personally inspect the court's facilities. The battle raged throughout the session, but the bill was finally killed in the House Rules Committee. "Without the tremendous support of Eastland County residents for keeping this highly-respected historic court — many of whom traveled to Austin by chartered bus to make known their feelings — our opposition to the move might not have been successful," Musgrove added.

"The rapid growth of both Cisco and Ranger Junior Colleges automatically creates situations needing legislative help," Musgrove added, "and I have
