Memorial Services At Burkett Sunday

Annual Memorial Day Service for Burkett and Adams Cemeteries will be held Sunday, June 2, beginning at 2:30 p.m. in the Burkett Cemetery.

Bill Wylie of Coleman will serve as principal speaker for the occasion.

After the program a short business session is scheduled. It will be followed by election of officers for the ensuing year.

The Memorial Day services at Burkett have come to be one of the most widely-attended events of its kind in this section of Texas. In addition to paying fitting respects to the deceased of the Burkett and Adams communities, it is homecoming time for many former residents and large crowds are always in attendance.

"We invite everyone with friends or loved ones buried in either of these two cemeteries to attend Sunday afternoon's ceremonies," said a spokesman.

2,000 May Vote At Saturday's Election

Saturday is judgement day for political candidates who survived the first primary and are pitted in run-off contests. Most interest is centered on

outcome of the governor's race, in which Preston Smith and Don Yarborough vie for Democratic favor. Winner of that race will face a Republican

standard bearer in November.

Only one countywide contest faces local voters. It is that of sheriff in which Grayson Miller and Homer Price are paired. Callahan County Precinct 1, though, has a heated commissioner's race between C. Lee Smith of Clyde and Irvin Corn of Baird. Then voters of the Baird box must settle between Glen Curtis and Glen Boyd in the selection of a constable.

Slightly more than 2,500 votes were polled in Callahan County in the first primary, however, observers feel that no more than 80 per cent of that amount will be tallied Saturday, making the number near 2,000.

As in the first primary, results will again be tabulated at the office of the Cross Plains Review and posted on a bulletin board.

Some Firms Plan Holiday

Small Factory Will Locate In Cross Plains

Cross Plains is getting a new industry.

Clark Products Corporation will open a small factory on South Main Street, next door to the post office, and begin manufacture of automatic livestock feeders.

The corporation is headed by Dwayne Clark, son of Mr. and Mrs. Ivan Clark, who invented and patented the device. It is said to operate on the same

principle as time-clocks, which actuate many pumping oil wells throughout this section of Texas. Other incorporators are Kenneth Sowell, son of Mr. and Mrs. Charie Sowell, and Paul Kimmell, an irrigation equipment merchant from De Leon.

Fred Tunnell and J. C. (Doc) Claborn, members of the Chamber of Commerce's industrial committee, are heading a drive

for local capital to aid the new business. More than \$3,000 worth of stock in the enterprise has already been bought by local backers of the undertaking.

The factory will operate with only a skeleton crew at first, probably three workers, but expand as sales justify. Dealers are now being lined up to handle the automated equipment.

Both Clark and Sowell are

graduates of Cross Plains High School, having finished with the class of 1962. Clark's idea for the automatic feeder was devised while a student at Tarleton State College and both he and Sowell worked on the prototype, which was built in Stephenville.

Livestockmen who have seen the equipment are enthusiastic about its possibilities and predict that it will be widely used.

Cottonwood Sees The End Of An Era

When Miss Hazel I. Resesp closes the doors at Cottonwood Rural Station Post Office Friday night, it will mark the end of a long, long trail. Retirement time has come, and she will hand over the keys and responsibility to Mrs. W. H. Kelly, the former Billie Lou Weaver.

For persons who have known and loved Cottonwood through the years, Miss Resesp's retirement will signify the end of an era. For she has been more than postmaster to that community. Although she would be the first to deny it, her leadership and staunch support of every civic and religious undertaking has been a moving force in the community for more than a half century.

Miss Resesp took charge of the Cottonwood post office Aug. 11, 1918, during the time of World War I, however, she had previously served as clerk in Woodson post office and for Postmaster Walter R. Robbins, who preceded her.

"I have enjoyed the years spent in the Cottonwood post office," she says, "and treasure memories of pleasant, cooperative patrons. I can't recall anyone ever having spoken an unkind word to me."

She pointed out that she will miss the work and the pleasure of seeing former residents who always made the Cottonwood post office a "port of call" when passing that way.

Speed Reading To Be Taught Locally

An Evelyn Wood speed reading course will be held in Cross Plains beginning June 20 and continuing eight weeks.

It is expected that between 20 and 30 persons will be enrolled for the one night weekly classes of three hours each. "Average persons will be able to read from three to 10 times faster, with equal or better comprehension, upon completion of the course," said Bill Condra of Abilene.

Eddie McAnally of Cross Plains, an honor student at McMurry and a graduate of the speed reading course, is representing the reading classes in this area. He is reputed to have increased his reading speed from 260 words per minute to 2,500 words per minute. He is an honor student at McMurry and credits the Evelyn Wood training with having made college work both easier and less time-consuming.

Health Tests Given 453 Local Students

Mrs. Lynn Ault of Baird, county school nurse, has reported to Superintendent Wayne Ford results of health tests given to 453 Cross Plains students.

In vision tests 19 of 453 were found to have defective sight. Professional attention was received for 17 of this number.

Of 186 given hearing tests only one student was found to possess a deficiency.

Dental examinations were received by 331 and 50 referred to professional care.

A total of 331 received throat examinations.

Immunizations were given 46 for smallpox, 12 for diphtheria, whooping cough and tetanus, 40 received diphtheria, tetanus and polio booster shots and 17 were vaccinated against measles.

Tuberculosis skin tests were given to 122 students with no positive reactors.

Pre-school immunizations (smallpox, measles and D.P.T. shots) were given 25, who begin the first grade this Fall.

John R. Shrader, 77, Buried At Scranton

Funeral for John H. Shrader Sr., 77, a longtime school teacher in the Scranton area, was held at 10 a.m. Saturday in Scranton Methodist Church.

The Rev. Carrol Green, pastor of First Baptist Church at Baird officiated. Burial was in Scranton Cemetery.

Mr. Shrader died at 3 p.m. Thursday in Callahan County Hospital following an illness of one year. He had been in a Baird nursing home several months before entering the hospital two weeks ago.

Having taught in schools in Stephens, Martin and Callahan Counties since the age of 18, he was honored for 46 years of teaching at the annual Scranton Reunion June 14, 1959.

His career began at Cedar Creek School in Stephens County. He later taught at Cedar Grove in Callahan County, Scranton Academy, Eagle Cove, Clyde, Plainview (now Lenora) in Martin County and at Cottonwood, Scranton and Atwell.

In 1944, he resigned as superintendent at Scranton and became Baird elementary principal for 11 years, resigning due to the retirement rule, he taught for two years at Putnam.

In 1953 (45 years after becoming a teacher) he graduated from McMurry College.

Born July 20, 1890, in Dexter and a resident of Callahan County for about 60 years, he had lived in the Scranton community on his farm for the past several years.

He married Ila Frances Ray Jan. 24, 1914, in Scranton. He was a member of the Scranton Methodist Church, Baird Masonic Lodge No. 522, Woodmen of the World.

Survivors include his wife; two sons, John H. Jr. of Scranton and Hugh Edgar of Notrees; two daughters, Mrs. B. M. (Charlotte) Freeland of Baird and Mrs. Roy (Mary Ruth) Armstrong of Iraan; three sisters, Miss Halcyon Shrader and Mrs. John Langston, both of Dallas, Mrs. Arthur Tarbutton of Houston; 11 grandchildren and two great-grandchildren.

Sen. Yarborough's Campaigns Okay on Don

Sen. Ralph Yarborough, in a public declaration of preference for Don Yarborough for governor by a personal visit to Yarborough's campaign headquarters Sunday morning, said D. Yarborough will be "going away."

Yarborough came down from his headquarters carrying a "Victory" sign, with Yarborough said, "I'm on the verge of being the first loyal Democratic governor since Alford was governor 30 years ago. The people of Texas are entitled to elect a governor once every 30 years."

The D. Yarborough staffers supporters cheered, the senator continued:

"You don't know how wonderful it's going to be. I'm going to think flowers

are blooming in January this year. I wouldn't be surprised to see strawberries ripening in January."

The senator said he had never led into a runoff in a gubernatorial race, and said in 1956 when he ran for governor he was 150,000 votes behind going in the runoff.

"In the runoff I was so close it took 'em two weeks to count me out of it," he recalled.

People Saturday night, Sen. Yarborough said, have been telling Don Yarborough that although they worked as county managers for Hill and Briscoe "we're putting our shoulders to the wheel Monday morning for Don Yarborough for governor."

The senator reasoned "all the shrewd campaigners are out of it now."

It appeared obvious the senator feels Yarborough will attract, among others, supporters of Hill and Briscoe.

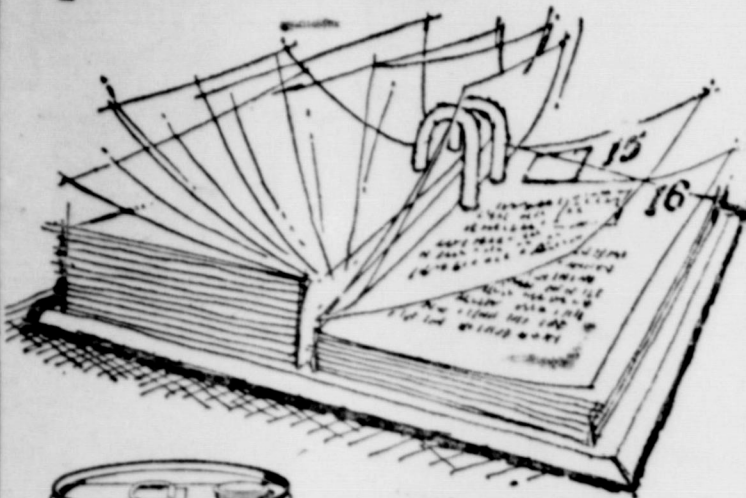
