





Health Tests Given 453 Local Students

Mrs. Lynn Ault of Baird, county school nurse, has reported to Superintendent Wayne Ford results of health tests given to 453 Cross Plains students.

In vision tests 19 of 453 were found to have defective sight. Professional attention was received for 17 of this number.

Of 186 given hearing tests only one student was found to possess a deficiency.

Dental examinations were received by 331 and 50 referred to professional care.

A total of 331 received throat examinations.

Immunizations were given 46 for smallpox, 12 for diphtheria, whooping cough and tetanus, 40 received diphtheria, tetanus and polio booster shots and 17 were vaccinated against measels

Tuberculosis skin tests were given to 122 students with no positive reactors.

Pre-school immunizations (smallpox, measels and D.P.T. shots) were given 25, who begin the first grade this Fall.
