IF COINS WERE GOLD

Those persons who would like to have a few gold coins to jingle in their pocket would likely be disappointed if they could have their way. Gold coins, to conform to present-day conditions, contain only half the gold of those retired from circulation. A presidential proclamation as of January 31, 1934, under authority of an Act of Congress of 1923 fixed the grams to 0.0 fine, or only 50.06 per cent weight of the gold dollar at 15.5-21 of the amount in the "gold standard" dollar which contained 23.2 grams. The cost of living in Texas in 1880 is reflected in an account in the possession of W. A. (Mose) Hood, a city fireman, at Lubbock.

A. M. Hood, grandfather of the fireman, clothed a family of seven (or nine months with a "store account" of only \$38. The merchant was F. M. Hicks, Grandview, Johnson county.

The most expensive item on the list was an "alpaca coat, \$5." No groceries were listed. Other items listed: "one pair brogans, \$2;" "one bottle sarsaparilla, \$1;" "six plugs tobacco, 35 cents each;" "one box blacking, 10 cents;" "one pair suspenders, \$1."

The account ran from Feb. 28, 1880 to Nov. 3. It is marked paid.

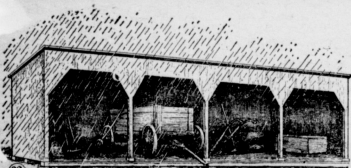

Pyorrhea May Be Cured If It's Done During Early Stage

Austin, Nov. 15.—Pyorrhea is a chronic disease involving the gums and also that part of the jaw bone surrounding the roots of the teeth. It also affects the membrane which fastens the tooth to the bone and helps to hold it firmly in place, stated Dr. John W. Brown, state health officer.

Being an adult's malady it is seldom seen in children. It is most common after middle life. It begins at the gum margin. Early symptoms include swelling and redness. Moreover, the gums are prone to bleed when brushed. Usually there is no pain, even in advanced cases. If the progress of this disease is not arrested, the bone and ligament become involved, pockets are formed between the teeth and gum and pus collects.

Uncleanliness, undue stress on a few teeth, malnutrition, and irritation produced by the accumulation of food, tartar, and bacteria around and between the teeth are outstanding factors in the development of pyorrhea. Badly fitted crowns and bridges, and over-hanging edges of fillings, which are direct contributors to mouth uncleanliness, also lead to irritation. Incidentally, pyorrhea is not contagious. It is a curable disease if it is not too far advanced when recognized. Treatment is not by the use of drugs but in educating the patient in the proper use and care of the teeth and the removal of the remnants of dead membrane adhering to the root surfaces, as well as any existing tartar.

Proper daily attention to mouth hygiene is the one great bulwark against pyorrhea.

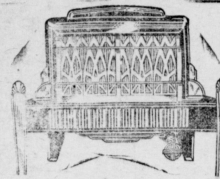
MISSIONARY

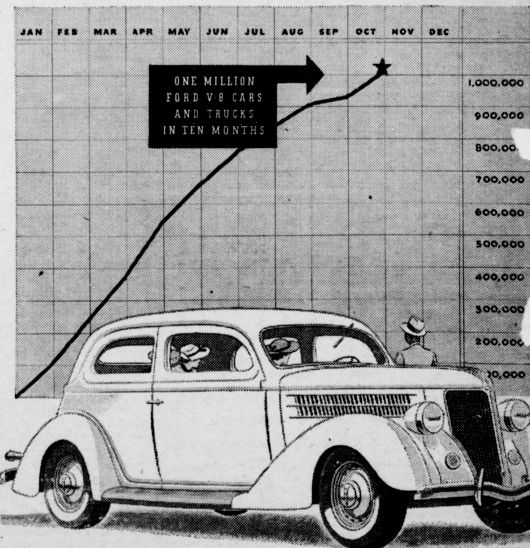

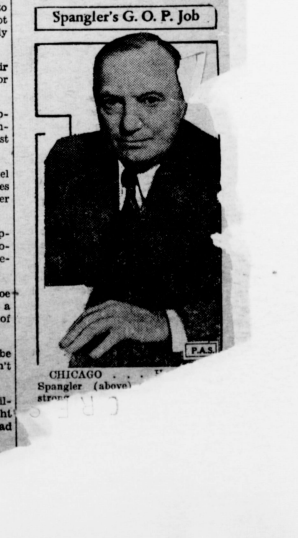
Poverty, in one respect, is very cruel to lots of Muleshoe folks. It deprives them of a lot of things they are better off without.

He is particularly interested in studying and observing conditions in the cotton and textile industries and the relationship of these industries to trade between the United States and the countries of the Far East. He feels that the future of the cotton industry, and correspondingly the economic welfare of West Texas and the entire South, depends to a large extent upon world trade and foreign markets. Developments in the Far East will be focal points of interest in this problem in the next decade. The trade relations and tariff agreement between the United States and the Philippine islands will have a different aspect after their independence is actually begun and this alone constitutes an important problem that must be worked out by Congress.

The trip has afforded Mr. Mahon an opportunity to become more intimately acquainted with such outstanding leaders of Congress as Vice-President Garner and Senator Connally of Texas, and Representative Joseph R. Byrns of Tennessee, who is Speaker of the House.

The Congressman will return to his home in Colorado on December 20. He will spend the time before Congress convenes again on January 3 making contacts throughout the district.

New Law Requires Butchers Make Oath Of Animals Killed

A new law now coming into effect is one requiring every person slaughtering and offering for sale animals of any kind, requires that affidavits of such butchering must be made before Commissioners' court, according to Jim Cook sheriff, who has received notice of same. It is understood this law was sponsored by the State Cattle Dealers association and will be effective for the next five years.

The law reads as follows: "Every person in this state engaged in the slaughter and sale of animals for market shall make a regular report, under oath, to the county commissioners court of the county, giving the number, color, age, marks and brands of every animal slaughtered, which report shall be made to each regular meeting of the court, and be filed and kept on file by the county clerk for the inspection of any one interested. Each report shall be accompanied by the bill of sale or written conveyance to the butcher for every animal that he has purchased for slaughter, and, if any of the animals slaughtered are registered by himself, it shall be so stated in the report. Said butcher's report so made to the commissioners court may be destroyed within the discretion of the county clerk after a period of five years."—Art. 7173.

Sudan Assn. Officials Urge Farmers Holding Crop For Five Cents

W. J. Matthews, Texaco, president, Sudan Growers association, E. E. W. Reagan, Clovis, N. M., vice-president of the same organization, and G. D. Anderson, Farwell banker and vitally interested in the success of that organization, were in Muleshoe last Tuesday, returning from a trip to Littlefield, Amherst, Olton and Sudan, where they contacted bankers relative to making loans on this year's crop of sudan which many growers are now holding for better prices.

These men stated there was positive evidence that the amount of sudan seed grown this year had been greatly over estimated, especially the crop grown in California, and were urging growers of this area to hold their sudan for at least five cents per pound, which price they felt sure would be available long before spring planting time.

The average annual consumption of sudan seed for the past five years has been around 27,000,000 pounds, it was stated, and there is no indication of such a poundage having been grown this year. The California crop, which was reported to be around 40,000,000 pounds, it is stated will not be over 6,000,000 pounds.

POULTRY

TOO MUCH HEAT IS FATAL TO CHICKS

Warmth of Brooder Should Be Closely Guarded.

By H. H. Ains, Dairymen, College of Agriculture, University of Illinois

Heat or unhealthy chicks always mean financial losses for the poultryman, but they mean greater losses when feed prices are high and the outlook for poultry raising is favorable.

A general lower temperature of between 90 and 100 degrees Fahrenheit is recommended. However, the room temperature outside the brooder should be maintained at 70 degrees.

Not only is it important to handle the chicks so that they will utilize high-priced feeds to the best advantage, but it is also necessary to protect the feed to prevent losses before feeding.

Dampness reduces the value of feeds and, in some cases, introduces sickness among the birds. A water-proof covering should be spread over the poultry feeds while they are being transported from one place to another in the rain.

Poultry diseases are often spread by feed that has been stored in a chicken house or brooder. If no separate room is available for storage, large-sized garbage cans with close fitting covers make good storage bins.

Darkened Nests Advised

to Fool the Egg Eaters

Egg eating is a habit usually brought on by a lack of something in the diet, particularly the lack of shell forming material, says an authority in the Montreal Herald. The shells should not be broken to hens unless they are dried and given up fine.

Producing Milk-Fed Broilers

Two pounds of either skim milk or buttermilk should be added to each pound of the fattening ration and fed during a fattening period of seven to ten days, says an authority at the North Carolina State college. The milk and ration are mixed so as to make a sloppy feed that will pour easily from a bucket.

Litter Should Be Dry

The important thing about litter is to keep it clean and dry. Dirty litter is hardly as dangerous as wet litter, since germs harbor and develop quickly in wet litter when the brooder house is warm.

Removing Retained Egg

When it is evident that the hen will be unable to lay an egg, smear the cleansed index finger with carbolic vaseline, pass it into the cloaca and egg duct and attempt to work the egg out of the passage.

Time to Fight Lice

During warm weather one can easily rid the laying flock of lice by the use of sodium fluoride as a dip. The usual recommendation is to mix one ounce of sodium fluoride in one gallon of water.

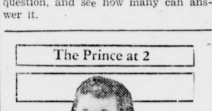

Bailey County Home Demonstration Council will meet Saturday, Nov. 23 in the District court room. Officers are to be elected for 1936. All 1935 and '36 council members are urged to attend.

Has 665 Quarts of Canned Products. "Making and laying tile is simple. With the expense of \$155 we laid 100 feet. My husband made most of the tile and laid it," said Mrs. E. T. Jenkins, farm food supply demonstrator of the Progress H. D. club. Mrs. Jenkins added, "The sub-irrigated soil is easily cultivated and never crusts or bakes hard. One with a sub-irrigated garden truly has something to be proud of. By raising a fairly good garden, and buying different fruits, I have filled my pantry with a nice variety of food for winter use. I have filled 695 quarts of fruits and vegetables, valued at \$139.00 with 38 varieties. I have bought a pressure cooker, and added 104 feet of shelving. My husband traded wheat for flour enough to last us a year. For meat I have canned only a few jars of chicken but intend to can a beef and kill our hogs later. I have sold \$86.40 worth of cream, milk, eggs and chickens. I have made \$41.50 sewing and renting rooms. Even with the drought, cutting crops short and money scarce, the wolf is driven at least temporarily from our door."

Enjoyed Home Demonstrator

"I hope our next farm food supply demonstrator will learn as much and enjoy her work as much as I have," said Mrs. W. O. McCrary, farm food supply demonstrator of the Bailey County Home Demonstration club. "I have 26 varieties of canned products, have built a pantry, bought a cooker and sealer, filled part of my garden and added a recipe file this year," added Mrs. McCrary. The McCrary family plan to enlarge the garden and put out a lot of grapes in 1936.

What's Happening In Washington And Other Cities Of Importance

Manuel Quizon was last Friday inaugurated first president of the Philippine Islands. Pope Pius, Rome, is endeavoring to stave off the sanctions against Italy in the interest of world peace.

Earthquake shocks driving people from their homes were felt in northern Florida Thursday night of last week.

Charles R. Miller, Electra, has been appointed head of the Texas State Liquor Control Board.

Secretary of Commerce Roper has assured business that the breathing spell now being more or less enjoyed means the end of government regimentation.

Much rioting, resulting in several deaths, has been going on in Egypt during the past week protesting against the sanctions being enforced toward Italy.

A cow on the Analla Farm, Ipswich, Mass., recently gave birth to triplet calves. Triplet calves are said to rival quintuplet humans, occurring but once in an average of every million births.

It is stated from Washington that the cotton income has been approximately doubled since 1922, one bale of cotton now buying nearly twice as much as it bought that year.

League of Nations economic sanctions, approved by 51 nations, took effect against Italy last Monday in an unprecedented effort to force a halt to the war in Ethiopia.

Williamson county, this state which up to Nov. 1 last year lead all other counties by gaining 57,505 bales of cotton was passed on the same date this year by Nueces county with a gaining totaling 86,074 bales.

A new Canadian treaty was signed last Friday between Prime Minister King of that dominion and President Roosevelt of the U. S., the latter pronouncing it an augury of better times in both the U. S. and its northern neighbor.

An ascent of 74,000 feet, approximately 14 miles was made by the world's largest balloon into the stratosphere last week from White Lake, Dakota. It was the highest man has yet gone. Billed air of the upper strata was brought back for examination, and much other valuable scientific results of the trip are anticipated.

Washington reports now indicate Uncle Sam is now the largest landlord in the world, having nearly a million distressed home owners on his rental list and nearly 5,000 of them behind in their payments of interest and principal which totals \$75,000,000.

Five deaths last week among football players according to record kept by The Associated Press, brought the total for this year up to 34, the highest since 1921. The 49 fatalities last year resulted in a revision of the rules of the game. There may be another revision this year.

President Roosevelt last week was the recipient of a big cheese weighing a half ton, presented in "Behalf of thousands of dairy farmers whose livelihood is dependent upon cheese-making." It was brought to the White House on a float drawn by six white horses.

John D. Rockefeller Jr. has withdrawn his financial support from the Baptist Missionary church North, on the grounds that general Christian teaching is more important with the rising generation than is denomination instruction. Loss to that denomination will average a million dollars annually.

The AAA will soon offer the farmers of the South a four year cotton acreage adjustment contract. Details of such are not yet known, but presumably the program will be much the same as the present with certain improvements.

General News Over Texas And Adjoining States For The Week

Lamb county is advocating a \$60,000 bond issue for road improvements.

Will Rogers clubs are being organized throughout this state by cowboys.

Ten railroad grade crossings costing \$144,000 have been given federal approval for construction in Mexico.

Installation of a new waterworks system was begun at Farwell last week, 24 men being initially employed. Six inch mains will be used.

A state wide campaign is being waged to organize a body of real estate owners to fight increasing real estate taxes in this state.

The City of Anton in Hockley county has been given a WPA allotment of \$78,250.00 for construction of a highway from Anton to Witharhall.

The Young Democrat organization of Texas will meet Nov. 22 at Fort Worth for re-election of officers, most past officers having resigned their respective positions.

John McCarty, Dalhart newspaper editor, has resigned the position of president of the Young Democrats of Texas. Most other officers have also resigned their places.

Taxpayers of Oltom school district last week approved a \$66,000 bond issue which is augmented by a \$54,000 federal grant for building a \$120,000 school building there.

The Court of Civil Appeals last week held that oil production royalty share of the State or University of Texas was not taxable under a two cent a barrel levy.

Oltom, county seat of Lamb county, has received notice that \$43,000 has been appropriated by WPA for paving 16 blocks of its streets. The city will furnish \$6,000 on the project.

Twenty thousand Texas boys and girls have been placed in schools or given an opportunity to go to work during the past two months by the National Youth Administration, according to announcement last week.

A mob of about 700 persons, including several women hanged two negro boys at Columbus, this state, Friday night of last week, for the brutal slaying of Geraldine Kollman, 19 year old high school graduate.

Ranger Tom Huchman, prominently known throughout Texas, was last week dismissed as head of the Public Safety Commission, no reason being made public for such action. A legislative investigation was proposed, but fell down.

Dave Nelson, recently appointed by Gov. Alfred to succeed Lee Simmons as manager of the state prison, died last Friday night of double pneumonia. He had occupied that position but a few weeks and had been testing radical new methods of prisoner control.

Taxpayers of Lamb county have been saved \$27,837.00 in interest on bonds and warrants paid before their due date, and its four county funds are all in excellent condition as result of a cash policy inaugurated three years ago by the present county administration. There is now a surplus in the county's general fund.
