Methodists Make Pastor Exchange

Announcement of appointment of Methodist pastors for the ensuing year, made at annual Central Texas conference of the denomination in Fort Worth Wednesday night of last week, resulted in a shift of ministers serving churches at Cross Plains and Palo Pinto.

The Rev. Lloyd Coker, who has been here the past two years, will exchange pulpits with the Rev. Edwin Sooter, who has been at Palo Pinto. The incoming pastor will serve churches at both Cross Plains and Burkett, and the Rev. Coker will take up the Rev. Sooter's work at Palo Pinto and Grafrod.

Last Sunday was the final Sabbath assignment in present positions for both preachers. They will move household belongings Wednesday and take up new duties Sunday.

The Rev. Mr. Sooter, about 40, is a 1954 graduate of the University of Arkansas, a 1961 graduate of Perkins School of Theology in Dallas and a veteran of four years service with the Army Signal Corps during World War II. He has been in the ministry 12 years, the last two of which were at Palo Pinto. The 10 years prior were spent serving congregations in the Dallas area.

His family consists of his wife and their three children: a son, 20, who is in military service, stationed at Fort Hood, another son, 19, who finished high school last month, and a daughter, 14, who will be a freshman at Cross Plains High School next semester.

Other assignments for this section included the returning of the Rev. Jay Beaver to Rising Star and the moving of the Rev. Floyd Boulwam from the First Methodist Church in Coleman to Cisco, where he will serve as pastor of the First Methodist congregations both there and at Putnam.

Wetsel Has Gift For Gerald Mann

Jim Wetsel has a present for Gerald C. Mann, former Texas attorney general, and will get it delivered soon.

The gift is a 46-year-old copy of the Fort Worth Star-Telegram, which features the prominent attorney in a sports story during his football playing days at Southern Methodist University in Dallas, where he was an All-American quarterback.

"I met Mann at Tahoka a few years later, while he was campaigning for attorney general," Wetsel says, "and have kept the old paper intending to pass it on to him sometime."

Local Plant Begins Operating Monday

Manufacture of automatic livestock feeders by Clark Products Company got underway in Cross Plains Monday.

Dwayne Clark, president of the industry, and Kenneth Sowell, one of the incorporators,

were working with Jimmy Dean of Brownwood, a mechanical engineering major at Texas A&M, in turning out the initial feeders in each of the various type models.

"We are starting on a small

scale," Clark said, "however, as soon as at least one of each of our models is available for display and copies of the catalogue are ready for dealers, we hope to speed both selling and manufacturing."

The automatic feeder was invented by Clark, when he was a student at Tarleton State College. It works on a principle similar to that utilized by automatic (time-clock) pump-jacks in the oil field. Sowell, who like Clark is a graduate of Cross Plains High School, was also a student at Tarleton at the time and actually built the initial feeder from Clark's drawing.

Livestockmen who have inspected the feeder envision good acceptance for it. A number of Cross Plains area persons have invested in the new enterprise, not only as a means of helping this city gain a new industry but because of confidence in the two local men and the product they will market.

County Mourns Passing Of Judge Roy Gilbreath

Callahan County Judge Roy Gilbreath died Sunday at 2:15 p.m. in Callahan County Hospital at Baird, following a heart attack suffered two weeks before.

Funeral was held Tuesday at 3 p.m. in the Baird Church of Christ, with Minister Jack Latham officiating. Burial was in Ross Cemetery at Baird.

Born Nov. 22, 1907, in Brown County, he moved to Baird about 23 years ago. He was Callahan County Judge at the time of his death, having taken office for his first term in January of 1967.

He was a charter member of the Baird Lions Club, the Chamber of Commerce and was owner and operator of Baird Lumber Co. from 1944 to 1966. He was acting postmaster from 1964 to 1966, served six years on the Baird school board and was a member of the Baird Masonic Lodge. Five brothers and one daughter preceded him in death.

Survivors include his wife, Audie, of Baird; two daughters, Mrs. Fred (Nell) Goble of

The loan rate on number three oats and better is 74 cents per bushel in all counties. Oats may be stored on the farm and quality for the loan.

Almost Perfect

Barr pitched five innings before allowing a base runner, and he was quickly erased on an unassisted double play by short stop Rick Jones. The Chief lost a perfect game in the top of the seventh when he walked the lead-off hitter. He also issued a free pass to the final batter, but Chief catcher Joe Dodds preserved Barr's shutout by tagging a runner out at the plate when he attempted to score from third.
