O. B. Edmondson Writes Home Folk Of Travels Across Europe

O. B. Edmondson, who with his wife and his two brothers and three sisters and their spouses are touring Europe, wrote the following report of experiences through the first week of the trip.

Only three more dates remain on Cross Plains Little League regular season, and no clear-cut favorite for the championship is yet evident.

Rain early in the season washed out two slated double-headers, however, those games will be played only if results will have a direct bearing on league championship.

Bufs Retain Lead

Bufs, team which has either held or shared the loop lead almost from the beginning, remained in the number one spot after last week's play, but relinquished half of a two-game lead enjoyed last week.

Cats had a completely victorious week, and now trail the leaders by only one game. The resurging Kilowatts put together three consecutive victories to regain the challenger role three games off the pace, although slowed by Cats in Thursday's action.

Kilos Shock Bufs

Kilowatts began the week by nipping the Bufs 4-3 in a six-inning tilt. Brad Bowden pitched his team to the win allowing only four hits along the way. Cats pounded Beadels 22-2 in the Tuesday wrap-up. Rex Mayes got the mound win, but three Beadel hurlers gave up 12 hits and a number of walks. Cats got five runs in the second frame and eight and nine in the fourth and fifth innings respectively. Beadels scored two in the third.

Thursday Battles

Bufs opened Thursday's play with a hard-fought 9-6 victory over the Beadels. Both units

scored a pair of runs in the first, but Bufs tallied one run each in the next four innings. The team added the three margin of victory runs in the top of the sixth. Beadels countered with single runs in the fourth and fifth, and added two more in a rally in the final frame. Winning pitcher was Royce Lawrence, who gave way to Calvin Corley after three and two-third stanzas. Loser was starter C. B. Hutchins who twirled five and two-third cantos. Jimmy Bates went to the mound for the last out.

Cats claimed a four-inning, come from behind 7-6 win over Kilowatts in the week's finale. Kilos cracked the scoring ice with a pair of tallies in the second, and added two more in the third. Cats rallied for a trio of markers in the third. Kilos again got a pair in the top of the fourth. David Butler began the Cat rally with a lead-off single which was followed by Russell Steel's walk. They scored after a single by Rex Mayes and double by Tim Bishop. Bishop scored the winning run on a single by Roy Dillard.

Roger Crawford got the win in going the route, and Ricky Westerman took the loss, also going the distance.

Mrs. Roy Gilbreath Made County Judge

Mrs. Roy Gilbreath was appointed County Judge by members of the Commissioners Court in session last Friday. She will fill the vacancy created by the death of her husband until after the general election in November.

She was expected to take the oath of office this week.

County officials checked with the Attorney General, and were told that a temporary appointment should be made, and that political parties could certify a candidate for the general election in November. The candidate polling most votes for the office in the general election will be designated to serve out the remainder of the late Judge Gilbreath's term.

It is expected that the Democratic executive committee, composed of: A. E. Dyer, Jr., county chairman; Hugh Ross, Baird; Allen Johnson, Clyde; Alton Hornsby, Cross Plains; J. C. Dyer, Putnam; Hilton Tarrant,

Eula; B. G. Poindexter, Oplin, and F. L. Coughran, Denton Valley, will meet soon and select a candidate to represent that party for the office in the general election.

It is pointed out that other political parties enjoy the same privilege. There is also a provision in the law whereby independent candidates may have their names printed on the general election ballot.

Judge Gilbreath, who died June 9, after a heart attack suffered more than a week before, was in his first term as county judge and had about 30 months more to serve on the four-year tenure.

Members of the Commissioners Court passed the following resolution in tribute to his memory:

"Whereas, the Commissioners Court of Callahan County has been deeply saddened by the loss of the Judge of said Court, The Honorable Roy Gilbreath; and "Whereas, the said Judge Roy

Gilbreath has served the Commissioners Court and the people of Callahan County with great distinction and dedication; and

"Whereas, the said Judge Roy Gilbreath was a man whose life was greatly respected not only as a public official but as a private citizen and a kind and loving family man;

"Be It Therefore Ordered And Resolved that this Court spread upon its minutes the great esteem and affection this Court had for Judge Roy Gilbreath and be it further Ordered that a copy of this resolution be furnished to his family with the deepest sympathy of this Court and further that a copy of this resolution be furnished to all newspapers of this county for publication.

"Done this the 14th day of June, 1968. Signed: Glen Swor, Judge Pro-Tem; Florene Shelnutt, Commissioner Precinct 1; F. P. Shackelford, Commissioner Precinct 3; Duke Mitchell, Commissioner Precinct 4."

T-Sgt. R. Q. Black Awarded Vietnam Battle Decoration

T-Sgt. R. Q. Black, son of Mr. and Mrs. Monroe Black of Cross Plains, who is serving with the Air Force in Vietnam, has been commended in a special citation issued by Brigadier General Harmon E. Burns.

Excerpts from the citation read: "On Feb. 15, 1968, the 412 Ammunition Maintenance Squadron, 12th Tactical Fighter Wing, Cam Ranh Bay AB, RVN was requested by 7th Air Force to provide a technician to assist in missile matters. This assistance was needed due to the extended temporary duty of missile supervisor assigned to the directorate of Ammunitions Headquarters 7th Air Force. T-Sgt. Black was selected by his commander for this task. From Feb. 15 to March 24, Sgt. Black was responsible for monitoring all missile activities in Southeast

Asia. His outstanding professional skill, ability and initiative added immeasurably in identifying and solving numerous problems encountered in the accomplishment of his duties."

Sgt. Black is a graduate of Cross Plains High School and is a career airman. He has 16 years longevity. While he is overseas his wife and their two daughters, Monique and Michelle, are making their home in Cross Plains.

Gus Hart Laid To Rest On Saturday

A. C. (Gus) Hart, 84, former Cross Plains resident, died suddenly at 11:30 a.m. Thursday in a Big Spring hospital. He was a retired locomotive engineer and had resided in Big Spring since 1912.

Funeral was held at 10:30 a.m. Saturday in the First Methodist Church at Big Spring, with the Rev. John Wagner, assistant pastor, officiating. Burial was in City Cemetery.

He was born in Athens, Tenn., Nov. 29, 1883, and married Minnie Westerman of Cross Plains Jan. 20, 1910. She pre-

ceded him in death June 28, 1966.

They moved from Roscoe to Big Spring in 1912. He went to work for the Texas and Pacific Railroad in 1905 and retired in 1948. He was a 50-year member of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen and Enginemen. He was a member of the First Methodist Church.

He came to Texas at the age of 16 and first worked as a cowboy in Callahan County. Later he worked in a wheat harvest around Ponca City, Okla.

He fell and fractured a hip at his home in Big Spring some time ago. Since his wife's death he had lived alone in Big Spring.

Survivors include one daughter, Mrs. J. W. Garrison of Big Spring; two sons, Tommy of Big Spring and O. C. of Baltimore; one brother, John Hart of Cross Plains; three sisters, Mrs. Ray Frye of Cisco, Mrs. Andy Foster of Cross Plains and Mrs. Eva Huntington of Abilene; eight grandchildren and nine great-grandchildren. One son preceded him in death.

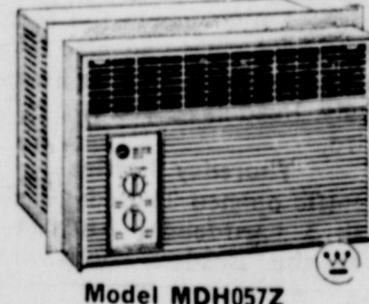
