Annual Audit Shows City In Sound Shape

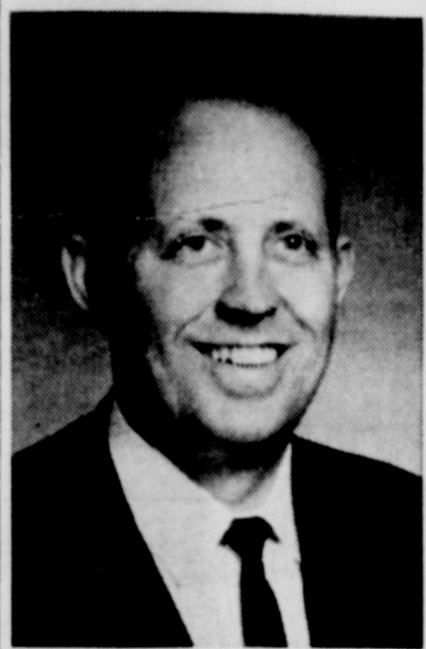
Annual audit of the City of Cross Plains reveals the municipality is being wisely managed.

The yearly statement compiled by Chas. F. Hemphill, Albany public accountant, shows total receipts during the 12-month period from April 1, 1967 to April 1, 1968 were \$93,178.52, an increase of \$11,943.84 over the year before.

Expenses totaled \$92,203.80, a net gain of \$974.72.

Bulk of the city's revenue came from the sale of gas, water and sewer services, which ran \$68,656.90. Current taxes contributed \$11,787.07. Other sources of revenue included: franchise taxes \$1,338.08, penalties and interest \$88.93, gas tax revenue \$655.87, miscellaneous \$596.05, street lights \$88, rent from part of the City Hall \$192.50, tapping fees \$70, uniform rental collections \$140, gas fee charges \$91 and interest on savings \$600.

Mrs. Roy Gilbreath Takes Judge's Oath

Mrs. Roy Gilbreath took the oath of office last Thursday, assuming responsibilities as Callahan County Judge. She will fill a vacancy created by the recent death of her husband, who was in the second year of a four-year term.

Mrs. Gilbreath will relinquish the county judge post as soon as an official canvass has been made of general election returns in November.

Callahan Tax Renditions Drop Near \$ Half Million

A decrease of nearly a half million dollars in taxable renditions in Callahan County became evident Tuesday, when a board of equalization finished assessments on oil, gas, railroads and utility properties.

The figure for this major source of taxation dropped from \$5,306,235 in 1967 to \$4,849,989 in 1968, a decline of

\$456,980.

Callahan County commissioners sat as a board of equalization and met with representatives of corporations, which pay a bulk of county tax. The sessions were completed Tuesday at noon and assessments for the upcoming year passed on to Albert Lovell, tax assessor-collector.

The Cross Plains Review took first place in two statewide writing contests, results of which were announced Friday morning by Texas Press Association in summer convention at San Antonio.

Competing in a category for newspapers published in Texas towns of 2,000 or less population, the Review took first place in both column writing and news writing.

The blue ribbon was the third captured in TPA contests by the Home Towner column since the feature began in the Review in 1961. In other years the column finished second one year and third another.

The blue ribbon in news writing was the first in that division to come to the Cross Plains newspaper, although a third place finish was recorded in 1963.

An engraved bronze plaque was awarded for each first place.

FINE FIGS THRIVE AT C. C. HOLDRIDGE HOME

Figs are not a common fruit of the Cross Plains area.

One grown at the home of Mr. and Mrs. C. C. Holdridge, at the corner of 10th Street and Avenue D, though, equals the best that might come from the Nile Valley. It measures seven and one-half inches in circumference.

The Holdridges have eight trees and this year before they even put out leaves it could be noted that a large crop of figs was evident. First of the fruit is now ripening.

Largest Baptist VBS Closes Here Sunday

Commencement Sunday night closed the largest Vacation Bible School of the First Baptist Church. Enrollment for the annual event reached 175 with an average daily attendance of 158.

Sunday night's program demonstrated the work the students did during the prior week.

The school had a faculty of 37 young people and adults working in six departments on a three-hour program each day.

Auto Crash Is Fatal To Mrs. Tom Lewis

Mrs. Tom Lewis of Rising Star, who was well-known in Cross Plains, was instantly killed Monday morning when she apparently lost control of her car on rainy pavement and slammed into a bridge abutment near Romney.

Funeral will be Thursday at 3 p.m. from the First Methodist Church in Rising Star.

Mrs. Lewis, cashier-bookkeeper for West Texas Utilities Company in Rising Star the past 10 years, was on her way to Eastland for jury duty at the time of the accident, according to Gene Rhodes, WTU manager at Rising Star.

Mrs. Lewis was thought to have applied her brakes to avoid meeting an oncoming truck on a narrow bridge. The car then went out of control and slid broadside shearing off a high-way pole before slamming into a concrete bridge abutment.

Martin Weiser of Cisco, the truck driver, witnessed the accident, but the truck was not involved. He sought to give emergency first aid to Mrs. Lewis, but she was apparently killed instantly.

Officials said the highway was slick from rains which had fallen earlier. A light mist was still falling at the time of the accident.

Mrs. Lewis was well known in Cross Plains having been here much when her only son attended Cross Plains High School, from which he graduated with valedictory honors in 1958.

She had been organist for the First Methodist Church in Rising Star many years.

Mrs. Lewis is survived by her husband, working on a construction job in Baytown; one son, Jimmy of Pasadena; and a daughter, Judy, a student at Sam Houston College in Huntsville; and one grandchild.

Pallbearers will be Lane Wells, Pete Groce, John Pruet, Frank Gray, Edd Witt and George Steel.

Final Game May Tell Little League Victor

Cross Plains Little League teams may have to go to the last game of the regular season, and possibly beyond, to determine a champion.

As the four units headed into the last week of the season, Buffs and Cats shared the lead. Kilowatts were three games behind the co-leaders, and Beadels were far back in last place.

Buffs and Cats will tangle in the second game Thursday night, and a champion could be decided. However, depending on results of Tuesday night action, it could throw the race into another tie. Two twin bills were rained out early in the season, and officials have advised that the make-up games will be played only if the league championship hinges on outcome of those contests.

Cats Share First

Cats, runners-up last year, gained a share of the top spot Tuesday of last week with a 9-4 victory over the Buffs, defending winners. Buffs counted a run in the bottom of the first inning, but Cats rebounded in the second half with a dozen tallies. Buffs got one in the third and two in the fourth, but Cats added a trio of insurance runs in the fifth. Winning pitcher was Roger Crawford in going the route, and Calvin Corley was the loser in four and one-third frames.

Kilowatts stayed in contention on Tuesday by rallying to defeat the Beadels 9-7. Kilos pushed two runs across in the visitors half of the initial canto, but Beadels countered with four runs which stood until the top of the fourth when Kilowatts tied the game. The victors scored five in the fifth, and a Beadels rally was cut short after three runs crossed the plate in the last half of the inning. Ricky Westerman started on the hill for Kilowatts, but Roy Merrill, in two relief innings picked up the win. Andy Walker, Ricky Purvis and Jimmy Bates shared hurling chores for the Beadels.

Cats Clip Beadels

Again on Thursday it took a late rally to eliminate the Beadels from the win column. Cats took leads in the second and third, but had to rally in the last of the third to knot the score at 6-6. Roger Crawford scored the winning run in

the fourth frame of the abbreviated contest. Rex Mayes went the distance and was credited with the mound win. Loser was Jimmy Bates who pitched two innings in relief of Andy Walker.

Rally Turns To Rout

Kilowatts were coasting along with a 5-3 advantage in the second game Thursday until Buffs stampeded for 16 runs in the fifth frame, and re-affirmed their share of the top spot with a 16-6 triumph.

Kilowatts took a 5-0 edge in the bottom of the first, and Buffs could manage only two in the second and one in the fourth breaking loose in the fifth. Jerry Lewis was the winning pitcher in three relief innings of Royce Lawrence. Brad Bowden was the loser in four and two-thirds stanzas, and Roy Merrill worked one-third of an inning.

New Oiler Hit In Eula Sector

A re-entry project was completed as a producer seven miles south of Clyde in Callahan County Regular Field.

It is Laco Oil Co. of Abilene No. 1 S. E. Edwards, 2,310 feet from the south and 1,663 feet from the west lines of Section 15, BBB&C Survey.

No. 1 Edwards had a daily potential of 28 barrels of 40.1 gravity oil, plus 11 barrels of water. It is pumping from perforations at 1,243-48 feet, fractured with 30 sacks of sand and water.

Operator set the 4 1/2-inch casing at 1,274 feet. Total depth

was 1,275 feet, plugged back to 1,274 feet.

The venture was originally drilled by Bloomer and Skinner Corp. and plugged in 1962.
